

Swim Classes Set in Burley By Red Cross

BURLEY, July 23.—The annual swim campaign, sponsored by the Red Cross and Red Cross chapter of Burley, will start here Monday at Rotary beach on Snake river. Classes will open for swimmers through their life-saving.

Alton Budge, director of the youth recreation division, has been assigned Perry Stephenson, Red Cross water safety chairman, with classes for the campaign. Alvin Pace, life guard, will be instructor. Assistance by Morgan Fowles and Rex Schoonover.

The Red Cross will provide a school bus for transportation to and from the swimming beach. Swimmers will leave the high school at 15 minutes before each class is held.

Classes for beginners will be given for beginners, intermediates, swimmers, advanced swimmers and junior and senior lifeguards.

Mrs. Myrtle Miller, chairman of the Red Cross unit, and Mrs. Zecher, pastor, home service chairman, are urging all residents of the community to take advantage of the swimming lessons. A large staff of instructors is on hand this year. All instructors are trained through the Red Cross and are certified.

Classes for beginners will start at 1:30 p. m., with instruction to be given for boys, men and women. At 2:30 p. m., classes for beginner girls and advanced beginner girls will be scheduled. At 3:30 p. m., intermediates, swimmers and advanced swimmers will be instructed as well as junior and senior lifeguards. Pace will instruct the life saving course.

Oregon, Idaho to Join Forces in VD Control Program

BOISE, July 23 (AP)—Oregon and Idaho public health officials have completed arrangements for a joint venereal disease control program along the Oregon-Idaho border.

L. J. Peterson, administrative director of the Idaho department of health, said he conferred with health officials from Oregon Wednesday on the program in Ontario, Ore.

Present were Dr. Harold M. Erickson, director of the Oregon department of public health, and Dr. R. S. Sullivan, Oregon venereal disease control officer.

Peterson said "city and county officials and public health personnel of both states will work together in a program to control syphilis and gonorrhea, and to suppress prostitution."

"He said the control program is best planned as a joint enterprise because of the nearness of Idaho and Oregon cities in the border area."

Persons infected with venereal disease will be sent either to the Oregon health department's rapid treatment center in Portland or the Idaho department's center in Boise, Peterson said.

Car Fatalities Reach 100 in Idaho for '48

BOISE, July 23 (AP)—There have been 100 traffic deaths in Idaho this year, compared with 94 at this time in 1947, Safety Director George E. Vaughn reported today.

The increase was largely due to being hit last year.

Vaughn said more than half the deaths resulted from violations of traffic laws.

Eighty were killed in Canyon country; seven in Blainey; six in Boise and five in Nez Perce. Twin Falls and Bonneville counties each reported four traffic deaths.

Page, Jerome, Latah, Shoshone, Idaho and Clearwater each reported three.

Two persons died in traffic deaths in each of the following counties: Kootenai, Lincoln, Minidoka, Owyhee, Cassia, Gooding, Gem and Blaine.

One each was reported from the following: Blaine, Bonner, Boundary, Butte, Carleton, Clark, Franklin, Fremont, Jefferson, Lemhi, Madison, Power and Washington.

Board Has Funds From Cattle Sales

BOISE, July 23 (AP)—The state brand board has \$406,571 held for cattlemen providing ownership of animals sold in Idaho auctions.

O. J. Shaw, state brand inspector, said the cattle, including proof of ownership, had been sold at auctions rather than permit them to feed in job while ownership was being settled.

In his quarterly report to the state board today, Shaw said 294,578 cattle were inspected between Jan. 1 and June 30. Ninety-four cattle of disputed ownership were recovered during the period, he said.

The state brand board went over quarterly records, approved accounts and discussed routine business at today's meeting. Shaw said. Members of the board are R. J. Hayes, Twin Falls, chairman; John Spencer, Grangeville, and Lyman Ipsen, Malad City.

Enlistees Fill up Marine's Quotas

WASHINGTON, July 23 (AP)—The marine corps today today enlists more than 1000 enlistees a month as high as that no draftees will be needed for that branch of service in 1949.

The 1949 marine quota is 36,000 men plus 6,000 reservists.

Officials said after a conference today that volunteers this month already have passed the 4,000 mark. It said that marines will need no draftees to fill their ranks.

Polio Clinic Is Success Here As 89 Report

The polio clinic conducted Thursday at the south central Idaho district health unit was successful, with 89 patients from Magic Valley counties receiving examinations and treatment by closing time. Superintendent Dorothy Colvard said Friday.

The clinic, which is sponsored jointly by the Idaho division of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, and the Idaho department of public health, employed the services of two orthopedic surgeons from Boise, it was under the supervision of Dr. Madeline Donnelly, director, maternal and child health and crippled children's service of Idaho.

Patients were checked for muscle weakness and stiffness that may follow the original poliomyelitis attack. Modified Kenny treatment consisting of local hot compresses was used in some cases. Recommendations for special exercises and treatment were made by the orthopedists.

Special treatment prescribed by the orthopedic specialists is given Magic Valley polio convalescents in district court offices in Idaho Falls, Thursday and Friday each week. The therapists also treat patients in the district court offices in Rupert every Monday and Wednesday, she said.

General Eisenhower may have thought that the presidency of Columbia university would give him academic sanctuary from international politics. But he has not escaped in that way. For he was severely attacked at his new desk when a problem in international relations confronted him.

Dr. Arthur Prudden Coleman resigned as assistant professor of Polish language and literature in protest against the university's awarding of a Polish government grant to establish a chair of Polish literature, language and philology at Columbia.

Dr. Coleman contended that the new chair would constitute "academic infiltration" of communism at Columbia. He said that by working in a Polish government grant to establish a chair of Polish literature, language and philology at Columbia.

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Columbia's press corps accepted the resignation. But he did so with reluctance, and with reservations which to us seem justified.

No one can deny Dr. Coleman the right to his sincere convictions and his academic freedom.

But one wonders if this educator, like some other well-meaning Americans, is not borrowing communistic techniques to fight communism. The Soviet government long ago slammed the door on freedom of academic intercourse between its own schools and those of the outside world.

We do not know the personal politics of Dr. Manfred Kridl, now on the Smith college faculty, who was chosen to fill the new chair at Columbia. But Dr. Coleman's objection seems to be one of principle rather than of personal animosity. He would be unwilling to serve with any professor on the Polish government's payroll.

If this were the general attitude, then American higher education would be ringing down as from certain of its own. Such an attitude would imply that there was no common non-political ground where communists and anti-communists could meet, that that two systems could not live together either in the academic or the political world.

In the Soviet sphere outside the Russian borders, the arts and sciences have not been entirely subordinated to political interests as they are in the Soviet union and as they were in Nazi Germany.

In that connection it might be pointed out that nazism in the beginning was a matter of free choice, while communist control of the satellite countries was swiftly and irresistibly imposed. If state-supported education is to continue in those countries, the teachers and researchers have little choice in the matter, whatever their personal opinion.

This is not a pretty state of affairs, and we hope it is not permanent. But while it exists, Dr. Coleman's action raises the question whether it is better to try to preserve some ties of interest and understanding between thinking people who are not unfriendly and who do not want war, or whether they must end all intellectual communication as a prelude to conflict.

TWO TOUGH OPPONENTS

Senator Taft offers the country his assurance, confident but not guaranteed, that "the price situation is all right" and that prices, with the exception of meat, won't rise in the coming year. But he says nothing about bringing prices down.

After the outcome of his stop-dewey drive, the senator is understandably a little wary of rushing into a stop-inflation campaign.

"As we value good manners in our dealings with each other, we should extend equal if not greater courtesy to the visitors to our country. As we respect our commercial integrity, we should be sure to give them full value for their money. But those of us who come into contact with Americans should value upon them the wisdom of using our resources discreetly.

"If they violate the game laws and kill more than a wild turkey, they will be arrested, they will be compelled to journey to far distant lands in quest of future sports.

"The host has many obligations, including generosity and good humor; but the guest has a duty also. He is expected to observe the rules of the house and resist all temptation to pocket the silver, to burn or to pollute the land, to drop chicken bones on the Persian carpet."—Caldwell News-Tribune.

POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—The increasingly dangerous crisis in Berlin, the middle east and the far east are now advanced by White House advisers as an important danger to President Truman's demand that congress assemble in a special session next Monday.

Although they do not attempt to laugh off the general accusation that his primary motive was political and designed chiefly to help Warren ticket, they insist the chief executive may require additional power to deal with the situation. They are expected to request the legislators to remain in continuous session until the current session has been adjourned peacefully or intelligently.

Despite reports, Mr. Truman did not want to bring the congress together in a special session, rather than help him. His so-called political managers, however, argued he had nothing to lose, in view of the present situation.

But it is understood that the most convincing argument for a special session was advanced by Adam Wallace, who has been in the White House since he was elected.

Famous Film Director Dies At Age of 73

HOLLYWOOD, July 23 (AP)—David Wark Griffith, 73, pioneer movie and star-maker, died today.

Best known for his discovery of Mary Pickford and his famous "The Birth of a Nation," Griffith had been inactive in pictures for many years, but the legend of his early days never died.

He was stricken ill Wednesday night in his hotel suite and taken to the hospital yesterday, suffering from a cerebral hemorrhage. He lost consciousness, and succumbed at 7:24 a. m. in an oxygen tent.

Honored Lashby Productions.

In the early days of motion pictures, Griffith pioneered in lavish productions, innovations in photography and tailored scenarios to fit idealistic themes.

During the quarter century when he was most active in films, Griffith was credited with discovering or developing many top stars such as Dorothy and Lillian Gish, Mae Marsh, Lionel Barrymore, Douglas Fairbanks, Mabel Normand and Mack Bennett.

Developed Techniques

Griffith developed such film techniques as the close-up, the flashback and soft-focus photography.

Last November he was divorced by Evelyn Baldwin Griffith, 33, whom he had married in his native Kentucky in 1926, three years after he had retired there.
