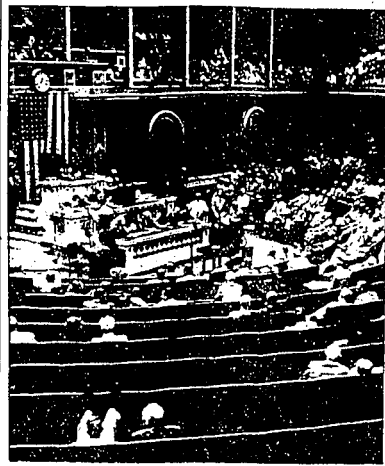

New Airfield Started By U. S. for Berlin

From AP and UP Reports BRLEIN, July 27.—U. S. army engineers started work today on a new Berlin airfield, a project which might silence the most powerful Russian-controlled radio in Germany whose key tower overlooks the area.

At the site is definitely agreed upon and the air field is established, engineers said, the transmitter would have to be torn down.

Responsible U. S. leaders declined that move at the imposition of economic pressure on the Soviets. CIO Maritime Union Finally Free of Reds

NEW YORK, July 27 (AP)—For the first time in 12 years, the National Maritime Union (N.M.U.) was entirely free of communist control today.

National election results showed that the N.M.U.'s 60,000 members had voted right wingers into all 32 posts of the national council, and had returned President Joseph Curran to office by a 3 to 1 margin.

Curran's anti-communist supporters in New York, the N.M.U.'s key port, won appointments for 31 port patrolmen and a committee.

No "Stooge" Outfit

Curran said the vote indicated that the N.M.U. wanted their union to "function as a trade union and not as an organization 'stooging' for a political party."

He indicated he would press a drive to purge communists from the union; the N.M.U. official newspaper, The Pilot; the educational department and even the office staff.

Huge Majority

Curran received 24,041 votes to 9,640 for his long-time rival Frederic Myers.

"I expect some very drastic changes," Curran said after the election returns were announced. "We are going to get rid of all those who are not working for the membership. We are going to put this union back on a real trade union basis with a militant program intended to serve the members."

PHILADELPHIA, July 27 (AP)—To put the robust, newborn Progressive party in its proper perspective, it is perhaps pertinent to point out a geographical fact.

The city of Philadelphia only one hour and a half by train from New York City.

How much does that explain the new party's impressive vigor?

In Manhattan at the rally the Communist party and its friends can crowd Madison Square garden with 20,000 people.

It is important to remember because veteran political observers expressed amazement at the fact Henry A. Wallace and Sen. Glen H. Taylor, the two running mates, drew more than 20,000 voters of a new political muscle to their double-decker at Shibe baseball park last Saturday night.

Result Astonishing
Babe Ruth in his prime hardly did better. But the campaign will reveal whether the Progressive party has astonishing popular strength—or merely was left a long when all the relatives could get there in time for the baptism.

If the Progressive party could draw 20,000 people to a rally in Kansas City, St. Louis, Cleveland and San Francisco there would be no doubt that it represented a powerful cross-section of American citizenship.

But it could have picked no more strategic birthplace than Philadelphia—top of the nation's largest cities and easily accessible from New York, Baltimore and Washington.

Made It Hard
This makes it hard to judge whether the huge attendance was chiefly due to an all-out effort by communist and communist-front organizations, or whether it was an spontaneous outpouring of people identified with the two major political parties.

But the campaign will show quickly whether the strength of Wallace, who disdained no support by anyone sincerely interested in peace, is largely based on the communist.

In what way? By the attendance at Wallace rallies. Only in the western and some western border cities can the communists pack the galleries. Elsewhere the national impact of the Progressive party can be more accurately determined by the people who attend its meetings.

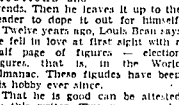

Allies Desire Equal Power With Soviets

The western allies, preparing with one hand for a new diplomatic approach to the German problem, apparently are working, with the other, to obtain a better balance of power with Russia before any conference is held.

They have said repeatedly they would not meet with Russia in an atmosphere of coercion caused by the Berlin blockade. But the allies refuse to lift the blockade beforehand. In that case, the only way to avoid being the coerced would be to balance force with force.

First Step Taken

The first step toward what could become widespread economic sanctions has been taken today with imposition of a man on rail traffic between the Russian zone of Germany and the rest of western Europe, and for the same purpose "technical reasons" which Russia applies to let close-down of the lines to Berlin.

One of the fundamental reasons for Russia's recent offensive in Germany has been the desire to halt the formation of a western German government and consequent Soviet disarmament from any hope of participation in the administration of the Ruhr. But the allies have been pushing ahead and now announce complete agreement with the Germans on a government. This is believed to be responsible for a great deal of political unrest leading to violent disorders in Soviet-occupied eastern Germany.

Preventive Step

Removal of the Russian-appointed chief of Berlin's police probably is a preventive step designed to scotch any attempt at a communist coup in the city.

General Clay's plan for doubling the Berlin garrison is a bitter pill for the Russians, who apparently hoped to perceive the possibilities of the air corridors when they tried to blockade the city. If the allies are flying in four or five thousand tons a day when a four-power conference is being held, the blockade will have become a "technicality" of a reverse type from any the Russians envisioned.

Probably more important for the long run than all of these is the newly-announced Marshall plan "invasion" of the Russian sphere.

Finland and Czechoslovakia are allotted something less than \$1,000,000 for goods and services of benefit to western Europe, a small thing but one that may lay the groundwork for democracy's recapture of eastern Europe. Tito is reported as saying anti-communism Yugoslavia is ready to start trading with the west. Poland and Czechoslovakia already have been doing so in contracts with individual nations.

Finland and Czechoslovakia

The new deal with Czechoslovakia for repair of freight cars to be used in the west would seem to be cancelled by the ban on east-west traffic through the great German rail network. However, authors undoubtedly expect the ban to be only temporary.

But the big thing for the moment is if allied counter-barricade movements anywhere near equal to Russia's coercion, a four-power conference can be held whether or not the Berlin blockade is lifted.

Idaho's 1947 Costs Exceed Fund Income

BOISE, July 27 (AP)—Idaho state expenditures from the general fund exceed receipts by nearly \$150,000 during the fiscal year ending June 30. State Auditor N. P. Nielson said.

Receipts totaled \$10,585,154.92 while the state paid out a total of \$11,729,543.60 during the period.

Balance on Hand

Nielson said the general fund still has a balance of \$10,940,835.14. Statutory grants accounted for the largest item of expenditures, he said. The \$2,137,093.92 was broken down at \$3,094,000 for public accountancy, \$4,000,000 for public schools and \$4,100,000 for permanent building fund.

Other expenditures listed in the financial statement were: Education, \$3,229,516.97; health and charitable institutions, \$1,272,677.61; general administration, \$402,557.10; prison, \$370,187.42; public land and investments, \$238,195.78; tax administration, \$271,888.50; agriculture, \$205,938.70; other taxes, \$109,000.00; other property, \$107,084.12; all others, \$383,782.52.

State Income Tax

State income tax accounted for nearly half of the general fund income, Nielson said. The income tax brought in \$4,889,581.16.

Other receipts were: Property tax, \$1,801,518.81; cigarette tax, \$1,022,652.81; insurance tax, \$754,467.06; kilowatt hour tax, \$541,925.28; beer tax, \$383,147.39; other taxes, \$87,000.00; liquor profits, \$1,375,000; permits, \$1,284,075.07; other revenue, \$289,767.74.

Radios Prove to Be Successful in Rocket Test Made

WASHINGTON, July 27 (AP)—Thirty radio stations that automatically send back scientific information from a 3,000-mile-per-hour rocket, have been successfully tested at the White Sands proving grounds in New Mexico.

The navy today announced the system was tried out with its Aerobee rocket which recently climbed almost 72 miles above the earth.

Known as "telemetering," the method uses instruments which respond to changes in pressure, speed, heat, light and other physical effects. The instruments are turned into sound and applied to one of six radio channels transmitting to the earth.

If the rocket slows up, for instance, the tone changes and instruments down below record the difference on a graph.

Some of the 24 different things the gauges keep check on: Cosmic ray intensity, the quality of sunlight above the atmospheric blanket, strength of the earth's magnetic field, motor performance and flight characteristics.

WASHINGTON, July 27 (AP)—Secretary of the Interior Krus said today 11,000 Navajos have seasonal jobs off the reservation, a peacetime record.

During the war as many as 15,000 Navajos were employed away from the New Mexico-Arizona reservation.

35,000 Supported

The bureau of Indian affairs has estimated that even when reclamation resources are developed fully, not more than 25,000 of the 61,000 Navajos can be supported on the reservation.

A report from the Navajo employment service showed 300 Indians engaged in off reservation ranch work in New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming and Utah, 300 in timber work and fire fighting in Arizona and New Mexico, 300 in miscellaneous employment in neighboring towns, and other off reservation employment at various points.

Many Hail Workers

Agriculture—Arizona 550, Idaho 600, New Mexico 500, Utah 1,400. Mines—Arizona 85, Utah 50; railroads—Santa Fe, 3,000, Union Pacific 4,200, Denver and Rio Grande Western 700.
