





### English Action Typifies Allied View of Crisis

 "An English Affairs Analyst Ernest Bevin's expression of hope for an end to the cold war, but with notice that Britain intends to keep her powder dry by stopping demobilization until the European situation is clarified, just about typifies the allied position at the moment.

Britain has been reducing her army at the rate of 20,000 men a month. By stopping this she will add another stone to the weight of power the allies are trying to put behind their negotiators.

It is well to bear in mind, however, that stopping the cold war and settling the European problem are entirely different things.

To insure all-round economic sanctions (in the form of the ban on traffic with the Russian zone in Germany) and showing military determination, the allies are merely coming around to a viewpoint which Russia understands. The Russian idea all the time has been that, as through centuries past, the victors of World War II would divide Europe and Asia between them by power politics.

But, to the Russians, this is a battle in the old war, a maneuver for strategic position, not the decisive factor.

To repeat a theme which it would be dangerous for us to be bored about, Russian communism has one never-changing goal. It is world revolution. They would like to see it come about without formal war, through the collapse of the western system which they will seek to accomplish through infiltration. But without formal war, they believe—Lenin, Stalin, all of the professional revolutionists have told us—that the revolution must be accompanied by violence. They think it is the only method of rallying and "awakening" the proletariat.

Allied negotiators, in a four-power conference is arranged now, will have to remember that the communists never have accepted the idea that peace, even if entered into for the sake of expediency, can endure. They expect and are counting on one more world war. If the western nations do not begin fighting among themselves again, the Russians will start it when and if they are able.

### Gem Bee Colonies Hiked 2 Per Cent

BOISE, July 30 (AP)—Idaho apiculturists had about 172,000 colonies of bees July 1, an increase of two per cent over a year ago.

Both demand for and the price of honey, but declined, the U. S. department of agriculture said today.

Eighteen per cent of the colonies were lost during the winter and spring with starvation the major cause, the report said.

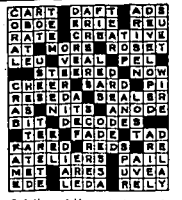

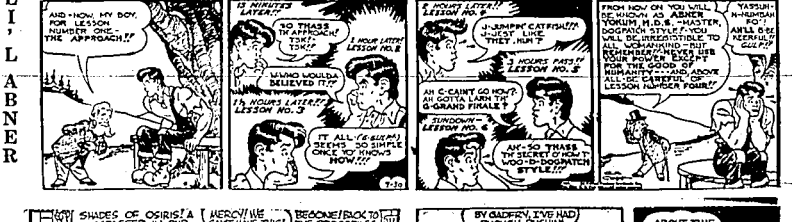
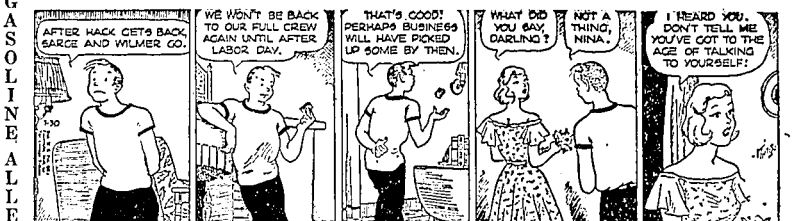

### U. S. Explores Weather's Use As War Tool

By ELTON C. FAY  
AP Military Affairs Reporter  
WASHINGTON, July 29—The United States is exploring the possibility of using the weather as a military weapon.  
Secrecy as deep as that surrounding the atom bomb and germ warfare development cloaks these studies of "meteorological warfare."  
Officials of the armed forces and national defense organization declined today to discuss the project or disclose what progress researchers have made.  
Paper Provides "Tip"  
However, a recent paper published in London by the international committee for study of European governments mentioned military developments in various nationalities and this to say of the United States:  
"She... has got well ahead with her studies of meteorological warfare and meteorological warfare. The latter is likely to become the most destructive of all."  
What military scientists want is a method of controlling the weather and directing its effect on an enemy through the use of meteorological warfare. This control would offer various possibilities, not the least of which would be the ability to create droughts and thus destroy the food supply of a nation.  
High-Banking Method  
This—if attainable—would be a form of strategic warfare ranking alongside existing methods for destroying a nation's munitions factories by air bombing.  
In World war II some infrequent and small-scale attacks were made on growing crops in Germany through the use of incendiary bombs to ignite fields of ripened grain. On a still smaller scale, there were occasional oil spraying attacks, mainly nuisance raids, on gardens of Japanese occupation forces. But these efforts in no way approached anything resembling a strategic attack.  
If scientists can develop the "cloud seeding" experiments already conducted they may be able to turn clouds drought or flood at will.

### High Price of Meat No Aid For Farmers

BOISE, July 30 (AP)—Despite the squeaks in the butcher shop about six per cent steak, Idaho farmers have actually been getting less for some commodities than a year ago.  
The University of Idaho extension service, in its monthly publication "Economic Facts for Idaho Farm Families," shows that prices were less in June, 1948, for wheat, apples, alfalfa seed, red clover seed, hogs (by just 10 cents per 100), chickens and eggs than during the same month a year ago.

Campground Given  
Here are the comparisons for all the crops used in the university's farm price index: June 1947 listed first in each instance:  
Wheat \$2.03 and \$1.99; oats 28 and 1.99; barley 1.34 and 1.27; apples 2.75 and 2.40, and apples 1.53 and 1.35, all on bushel basis.  
Dry beans, 9.20 and 10.90; dry peas 4.50 and 5.30, both on hundredweight basis.  
Alfalfa seed 27.50 and 21.00; red clover seed 24.50 and 24.00, both on hundredweight basis.  
Hogs \$24.40 and 24.30; beef cattle 18.70 and 24.70; hogs 21.50 and 24.50, all on hundredweight basis.  
Milk cows \$147.00 and \$200 per pound; butterfat, .63 and .62 per pound; chickens, 2.80 and 2.90 per dozen; eggs 45 and 435 per pound.

Feeding Haul's Better  
However, the average of farm prices in June was within three points of the high level made in January. Meat animal prices have been raising the index as grain, hay and fruit and vegetables dropping. Thus the livestock feeding ratios have been getting more favorable.  
Total Idaho crop production promises to be somewhat lower than in either of the last two years. The yields for many of the grain crops promise to be somewhat lower than last year—this because of the north Idaho floods and the late spring throughout the state.
