### One Columbia River Control Agency Urged

EPHRAATA, Wash., July 31 (AP)—Creation of an international Columbia river control commission was proposed today by a member of the state Columbia basin commission.

Former U. S. Sen. Clarence C. Dill said such a commission, composed of United States and Canadian officials, "could secure the full benefit of storage and power dams on both sides of the line."

Dill said his proposal resulted from a flood control hearing by the international joint commission held at Bonanza Ferry, Ida., earlier this week.

Benefit Both Countries  
"The proposed dam at Libby, Mont., will benefit the residents of the Kootenai river valley by the dam on both sides of the line, by protecting them from floods below the dam," Dill said in a report prepared for delivery at a basin commission meeting.

"Other dams to be built in Canada will be mutually beneficial to both countries in the production of power as well as flood control."

Dill said a joint board of Canadian and United States engineers plans to study every power site and storage reservoir side on the upper Columbia river.

Control All Flow  
"They are recommending dams that will be highly beneficial to both countries," he said, "but if the highest benefits are to be secured, a joint control board should have charge of the river's flow throughout the entire Columbia river basin."

"Such a commission would determine the time for drawing down the storage reservoirs, which reservoirs should be filled first or simultaneously as the flood period develops, and also the releasing of the storage waters during the low water season."

Dill said it would "seem desirable" that the U. S. congress and Canadian parliament jointly authorize creation of such a commission.

Session Held On Reseeding Of Rangeland

Range reseeding equipment was the subject of a conference Thursday and Friday in the Rock creek cattle allotment of the Minidoka national forest 18 miles east of Boise.

Fifty-six representatives from national forests in Idaho, Nevada, Wyoming and Oregon and members of the forest service regional office, Ogden, Utah, attended.

Regional Forester W. B. Rice, Ogden, Utah, welcomed the visiting foresters to the conference and gave a short history of range reseeding in which he stressed the present need for reseeding of rangelands.

Permit issued. Briggs said the range had been overworked in the past, but in 1910 this section of the Rock creek cattle allotment was approved for cattle and use of it granted on a permit.

Our objective is to grow enough feed on these ranges so cattle can run on them, and it takes four and three-fifths acres of grass per cow month.

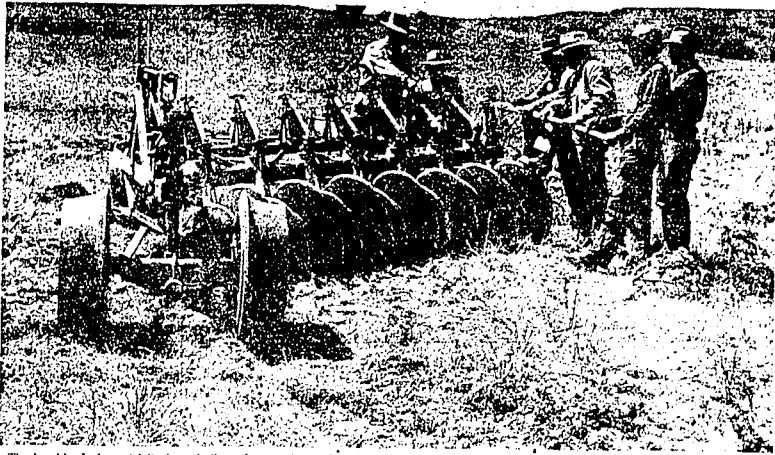

Other pieces of machinery discussed were the disc harrow, the land plow, heavy offset disc harrow, light offset disc harrow, seeding equipment and seed covering devices.

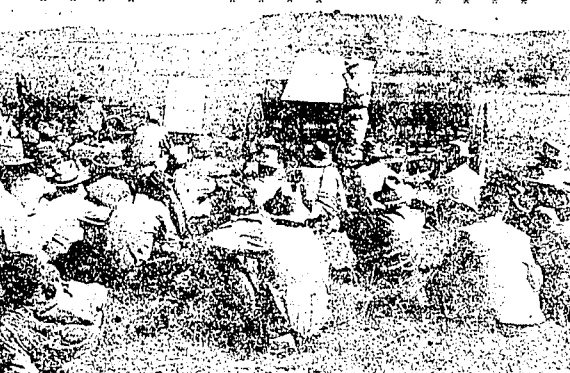
The center of interest at the conference was the pilot model of a brushland plow. It is the only model in existence, having been constructed for the forest service in Portland, Ore.

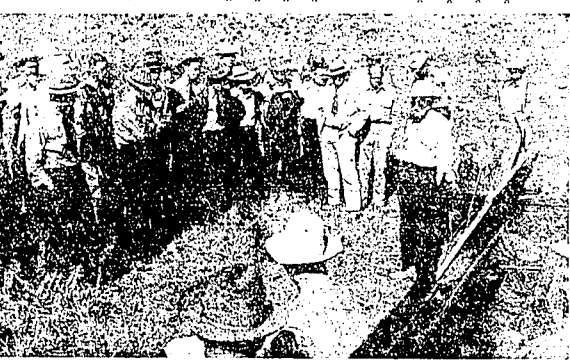
Unusual Equipment Used at Forest Service Range Reseeding Conference

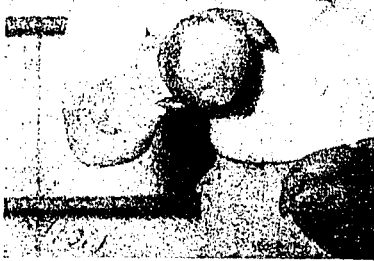

U. S. Takes Big Lead in Olympics

LONDON, July 31 (AP)—America's vaulted track and swim specialists snatched out of the gold medal today with a record-smashing surge that brought them five gold medals and a tremendous lead in the official point standings of the 14th Olympic games.

Almost shut out in yesterday's first final events, Uncle Sam's men and women made up for it today with a vengeance. Besides taking five first places—by sprinter Harrison Dillard, 400-meter hurdler Roy Cochran, broad jumper Willie Steele, swimmer Wally Ris and springboard diver Bruce Jarlan—the American forces broke three Olympic records and tied another. Foreign athletes accounted for two more Olympic marks in the standard-amazing events.

All told eight individual finals in track and field and in swimming were held today and the U. S. scored in seven, very heavily in six, to run up a huge overall total of 101 points.

The behind in second place came from the 200-meter race won by Sweden 25, Australia 17, Hungary 14, the host British squad 17, and Czechoslovakia 17. In the 400-meter race, the U. S. took the lead in the 100-meter final, the former Indiana university eight-year old of the second under the standard he and Raine Larson, Detroit, attacked yesterday. Larson could do no better than finish third today, trailing Duncan Cochran of the Los Angeles Athletic club, captured the first American gold medal in track and field.

America Tallies 101 Points, France Second

LONDON, July 31 (AP)—After two days of competition in the 1948 Olympic games, the United States is far out in front in the unofficial point tally with 101 tallies. Ninety-three of these points were recorded today in an American scoring spree.

Officially, no points are awarded until no Olympic team championships are determined. The unofficial table is compiled by awarding 10-5-4-3-2-1 for the first six places.

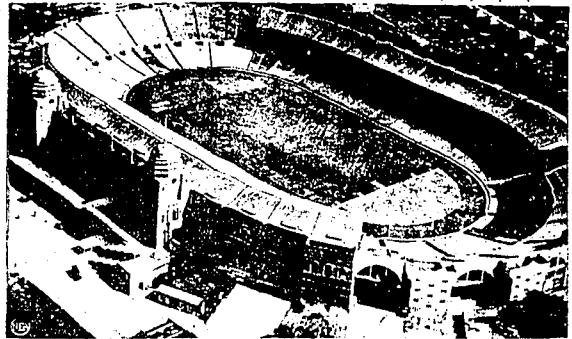

# Olympic Stars Compete in Former Dog Racing Stadium

LONDON—(NEA)—More than 300 frustrated greyhounds, kennelled in the east end of the coliseum, bark in protest as the athletes of 60 nations make over the stadium, at Wembley, for the Olympic games. # U.S.S. Nevada Finally Sunk By Torpedoes

**ABOARD DESTROYER ESCORT** **GRUDGE**, July 31—The battleship Nevada, which survived two atomic bombs, was sunk by aerial torpedoes after even the mighty steamship Iowa failed to scuttle her to the bottom.

The end for the veteran of two world wars came after the navy had fired the works at her for four and a half days in a test designed to show what modern weapons can do against battleship armor.

**Remained Afloat**

Torn by new, coral explosions, scathed by rockets, battered by the Iowa's 16-inch rifles and pounded by the smaller shells of cruisers and destroyers, the Nevada still remained defiantly afloat.

Then navy torpedo planes came thundering in low, released 12-inch "tiny tins," and the bruised old battleship took the full blast of several of them on the port side.

The Nevada lumbered slowly over, her armor settling beneath the waves as she rolled. The bow pointed upward for a second and then it was gone.

**Sunk Near Pearl Harbor**

The Nevada's grave was the sea five miles deep about 80 miles southwest of Pearl Harbor.

It was the end for the battleship which the Japanese thought they had sunk in the attack on Pearl Harbor. Left burning, she was refitted, and fought in the Aleutians, in the Normandy beach landings, at Okinawa and in the invasion of Okinawa.

The end came suddenly. She slipped when the torpedoes ripped into her armored side. But she remained afloat, just as she had through the morning when rockets and shells whirled and blasted her.

**Ripped Amidships**

Then one more torpedo ploved in and ripped her amidships. It was only then that she began to list.

The Nevada, which had been the target ship for the first atomic bomb test, went under at 2:30 p. m. (EST) today.

Early today, navy radar-guided "bat bombs"—each weighing 1,000 pounds—were fired by navy privateers circling the helpless Nevada, but all missed their marks.

The secret explosives, set off aboard the Nevada, had hurt her at the start of the big navy operation.

## Driver Training Courses Held At SICE to Instruct Teachers

**SOUTHERN IDAHO COLLEGE OF EDUCATION**, Albion, July 31—One of the highlights of the summer program at the Southern Idaho College of Education was the driver training course which ended here Wednesday.

The course, especially designed to train prospective teachers in driver instruction, was presented through the cooperation of the New York University center for safety education, the Idaho state department of law enforcement, the state department of education and SICE.

## In Coma 5 Years, Man Still Lives

**CINCINNATI**, July 31—For 2,001 days the man known as "patient X" has lain in a coma in a hospital bed here, outwardly healthy and capable of living for many more years, his physician says.

"Only a miracle could change his condition," said one of his doctors today. The doctor said the 55-year-old former electrical engineer might not die for an unusually long time.

A protective curtain of anonymity out of consideration of the patient, and his wife and children, has hidden this story of the man's coma to all but a few persons since he was hit on the head in an accident Feb. 5, 1943.

The family's name, and those of the physician, who believe his period of unconsciousness to be the longest known in medical history, have been withheld.

Only the man's eyes have been seen to move, at times following the movements of persons in the room, where nurses are on 24-hour duty. He has moved and made a groaning noise, too.

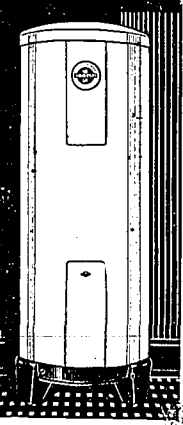

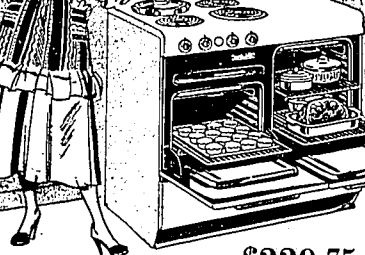

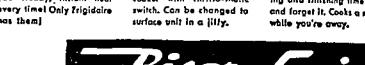

### Survivor Says Robber Gang Caused Crash

**MACAO, July 31 (AP)—**The lone survivor of a plane crash that took 25 lives confessed today that the robber gang caused the tragedy by firing at his pilot. Police Commissioner Luis A. M. Paletti announced.

Meeting unexpected opposition, the pirates excitedly shot the pilot and copilot of the Cathay Pacific flying boat just after it had taken off July 16 on its regular 40-mile run from this Portuguese colony to Hong Kong. Their bodies jammed the controls and the plane fell to the sea.

Seven Americans, including Pilot Dale Cramer, were Americans. The survivor was Wong Yu, a Chinese, who suffered broken ribs. Commissioner Paletti told a news conference today that Wong had signed an affidavit confessing to firing the fatal shot in detail. Quoting from the confession, Paletti said:

Chiu Tob, a former pilot from Manila, and a kinman, Chiu Yat Yung, approached Wong and asked him if he was interested in "some work." Wong was broke, so he agreed.

Sold Here Paddles

A third relative, Chin Cheung, was brought in on the scheme and the men sold their small rice paddies for enough money to finance the preliminary stages of the robbery.

Wong made several flights between Macao and Hong Kong to "test" the job, and the 6 P. M. trip of July 16 was agreed upon. An isolated hangar on the Pearl River 25 miles north of Macao was chosen as the place to take the plane.

The pirates were sampling that robbery and ransom of the passengers would be profitable. They apparently had no knowledge that four Chinese millionaires were aboard the flight they selected and that one had a huge sum of money on his person (estimated by his widow as at least \$125,000, U. S.).

### Utah-Idaho Banks Deposits Increase

**SALT LAKE CITY, July 31 (AP)—**Deposits in member banks in Utah and Idaho increased this year over the corresponding date in 1947, the federal reserve bank of San Francisco reported yesterday.

Utah bank deposits on June 30 this year were \$422,000,000 compared with \$418,000,000 on June 30, 1947. Bank deposits in Idaho for the same two dates were \$348,000,000 and \$338,000,000.

### State's Lead, Silver Output Leads Nation

**WASHINGTON, July 31 (AP)—**Idaho maintained its place as the nation's top producer of silver and zinc during 1947 with a silver output of 10,345,779 fine ounces worth \$9,922,200.

Reporting the figures, the bureau of mines said today that production compared with 6,011,104 fine ounces of silver in 1946, worth \$5,244,812. Zinc production aggregated 186,128,000 pounds worth \$19,105,207, a production gain of 10 per cent over 1946.

### Increase Forecast For Silver's Price

**VIRGINIA CITY, Mont., July 31 (AP)—**Additional increases in the price of silver are likely, Ross D. Leick, manager of the Sunshine Mining company, Kellogg, Ida., told the Montana Mining association's annual summer convention.

He noted that silver producers got 91 cents an ounce in 1946 and are currently receiving 81 1/2 cents.

"If you're planning to buy some silverware," he commented, "don't wait for the price to go down, because it's going to go up."

### Improved Labor Supply

The union in silver and zinc resulted, mainly, from an improved labor supply condition in the Coeur d'Alene mining district, the Bureau said.

The state's 1947 production of the five metals, with 1946 figures in parentheses, follows: Gold, 64,262 fine ounces worth \$2,274,370 (42,947 fine ounces worth \$1,404,125); silver, 10,345,779 fine ounces worth \$9,922,200 (6,011,104 and \$5,244,812); copper, 3,280,000 pounds worth \$68,000 (2,076, and \$43,312); lead, 187,688,000 pounds worth \$2,735,230 (119,976,000 and \$1,077,166); zinc, 186,128,000 pounds worth \$19,105,207 (143,014,000 and \$16,447,789).
