WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (AP)—Nathan Gregory Silvermaster, now accused of spying for Russia, stayed on the government payroll during the war although both the navy and civil service commission tried to get him off, it was disclosed today.

This was developed at a session of the house un-American activities committee where Silvermaster took the stand and (1) denied he ever was a spy or agent for any foreign government, and (2) steadfastly refused to say whether he is or has been a communist.

Sept. 8—Fly over Cascade dam and Hell's Canyon.

National Park Travel Below 1947 Figures

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (AP)—Travel to most of the scenic sites in national parks during June slumped below last year's comparative totals, the national park service has announced.

Totals for the first nine months of the travel year, starting last Oct. 1, are, however, still well ahead of the previous year.

The park service counted 1,422,078 visitors in June, 6,356 less than for June, 1947.

Capital Parks Decline
Tourist visits to national capital parks in Washington, D. C., declined 11 per cent to national battlefield parks, sites and cemeteries 10 per cent; national historic sites, 7 per cent; national military parks and cemeteries, 5 per cent; and national historical parks, 2 per cent.

Increases for the month were four per cent at all national memorials outside the capital, 11 per cent for parkways and 27 per cent for recreational areas.

A decline of 207,644 was reported for Mt. Rainier, Wash., national park. This was due to the park's not including travelers over U. S. highway 410 which crosses about 12 miles of the eastern edge of the park.

Harvesting of Several State Crops Begun

BOISE, Aug. 4 (AP)—Harvesting operations of several Idaho crops are in full swing, the week cooperative crop and weather summary said today.

Early harvesting was well under way in south central Idaho and fall grain harvesting was in progress throughout the southern portion of the state.

The apricot harvest is nearly completed in southwestern Idaho and the peach and plum harvests have started.

Early potato harvest continued in southeastern Idaho with prices at support or below. Cutting of the second crop of alfalfa was under way in the area.

In northern Idaho spring crops benefited from the rainfall, although some damage was done to cut hay last week. The second crop of hay was making good growth. Drying for winter use was under way in many fields of dry crops.

Sugar beets were making good progress in southern Idaho with the second hoeing well along. Hog poles were being shipped from Valjevo county.

Cattle on high ranges of southern Idaho were making good gains although the ranges were getting dry.

The report is issued weekly by the University of Idaho extension service, the bureau of agricultural economics of the U. S. department of agriculture and the weather bureau.

Story of Polio Cure Labeled As Premature

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (AP)—Published accounts of a drug which reportedly combats infantile paralysis in its early stages were called "unfortunately premature" today by a U. S. public health service expert.

Dr. Leonard Katz of the service's research grants and fellowships section said that the drug—a sulfonamide—appears to have helped some polio victims.

"But it is too early to make any definite claim that this drug actually was suffering from polio," he said. "We are not positive that the patients treated with this drug actually were suffering from polio."

"Not sure of Polio Virus"

"We know that none of the cases developed paralysis. But we have reports that the diagnoses were checked thoroughly to make certain that the polio virus was present."

Furthermore, he continued, there may be different types of polio. "This drug—if it is proved to be beneficial—may help in only certain cases."

Katz said that both the scientists who developed the supposed remedy and the firm which manufactured it were criticized by published reports of the drug.

Flooded With Orders

"The manufacturer is flooded with orders which it can not fill and which it would not fill until the drug had been tested thoroughly," he explained.

Doctors first used the drug on two infantile paralysis patients in New York, according to Katz. The results looked promising. The patients appeared to have benefited without suffering any ill effects from the medication.

5 Parties Likely To Get Approval On State's Ballot

BOISE, Aug. 4 (AP)—Five political parties probably will qualify for places on the Idaho ballot for the Nov. 2 general election, Elizabeth Williams, assistant secretary of state, said today.

She said three parties have indicated their intentions of holding conventions in the state on Aug. 10, primary election day, to qualify for places on the ballot.

The Democratic and Republican parties already have qualified by virtue of receiving at least 10 per cent of the votes cast in the preceding general election.

Miss Williams said the Progressive party will convene in Lewiston; the Socialist party in Boise and the Prohibition party in Nampa. Each must be attended by at least 200 qualified voters to earn a place on the ballot.

Miss Williams said no information had been received at the secretary of state's office on whether the Communist party in Idaho, which was planned to hold a convention in that country on a mission for the LDS church.

Henry Still Finding Istanbul Odd, but Fascinating, Town

ISTANBUL, Turkey.—It happens that Turkish is one of the many languages which I do not speak fluently.

It is amazing how few south Greek grammatical schools teach Turkish. I have seen the writing, arithmetic and a few words of Turkish in the newspapers.

Yet, since arriving in Istanbul, I have been struck by the language barrier with great interest.

I know now that if I say to a Turkish man, "Melmore," he will bring me a glass of ice water. And if I say, "Tommy," he will bring me a pack of excellent Turkish cigarettes.

Just the way the mention of an Iowa city produces for water, and the name of one of Michigan's all-American halfbacks brings forth cigarettes. I don't know. But it does, and that is sufficient for me. Sometimes today I am going to mention Dallas and Red Grange, and heaven knows what will happen.

Few Americans, I among them, ever associated Turkish people with a great sense of feeling for the decorative and the beautiful. But they definitely have it. Everything that can be made more pleasing to the eye is done. The homes wear necklaces, for example. He may be a drab old plug, pulling a drab old cart, but around his neck will be blue beads, red beads, and back of his ear he will sport a jaunty feather.

We saw an old fellow pushing a melon cart. His suit was checked. In every buttonhole there was a different colored flower, and his hat had a ribbon more valuable than the shoe laces and pencils. It is obvious that hours of work were spent making the tray they were carrying attractive.

At night, the streets of Istanbul are filled with peddlers, selling almost everything you can imagine. They carry their wares on tremendous trays, balanced on their heads. The trays are rimmed by lighted candles to attract attention, and each tray is a little masterpiece of arrangement. Even when the trays hold nothing more valuable than shoe laces and pencils. It is obvious that hours of work were spent making the tray they were carrying attractive.

If you don't mind, I'll continue talking Turkey.

Pressure Cookers To Be Tested

Pressure cookers will be tested every year as the pressure will vary from year to year and it is important that the cooker operates at the same pressure as the gauge indicates. If the pressure in a cooker is too high the food will be overcooked, and if it is too low the food will not keep. Most foods should be canned at 10 pounds of pressure. Mrs. Oliver explained that food cooked at this altitude should be canned two degrees higher than recipe books call for, as these recipes are written for cooking at low altitudes. Mrs. Kleinkopf reported that one cooker she tested Tuesday would not resist the amount of pressure at all. The pressure would not go up but the gauge would not stop at the corresponding degree. This is dangerous both for the housewife and for the food being cooked, as the cooker may explode or the food be ruined, according to the tester. The pressure testing project of the Grange is one of seven projects currently being sponsored by the local group.

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T. F. Protests Order to Replay July 5 Game With Boise Pilots

Twin Falls baseball club officials Tuesday protested Pioneer league President Jack Halliwell's order to replay the second game of a doubleheader played by Twin Falls and Boise at Boise July 5. Boise officials protested the game, which Twin Falls won 10 to 1, because umpires had ejected Walter Love from both games of the twin bill after an argument during the first contest. General Manager Jack Kadtko of the Cowboys said Tuesday that Halliwell had never informed Twin Falls officials of the protest and, consequently, had never allowed his own version of the incident.

In announcing his ruling, Halliwell sent Cowboy officials a copy of a letter which he sent to Boise owner Hayden Walker. The letter read: "Dear Mr. Walker: This is to advise you that I have allowed your protest on the game played at Boise the second game of a doubleheader on July 5. I am authorized to let the fact that umpire Keller would not permit Walter Love to play in the second game fall to the fact that he had been ejected from the first game. This is not according to the rules of the Pioneer league. This game will be played on the next visit of the Twin Falls team to Boise." "You're very truly, J. P. Halliwell, President, 'Pioneer Baseball League'.

Immediately upon receipt of the letter, Kadtko contacted Cowboy President Maurice Boerjesson and manager Charlie Metro, and the three officials decided to protest the decision. Kadtko received permission from Halliwell to write an open letter of protest to George M. Trautman, secretary and president of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues. The letter will go through the National Association office, giving the Pioneer league an opportunity to read the complaint.

Radtke's letter to Trautman will read, in part, as follows: "We believe that the following account of the protested game should involve as many as three different rulings. "Ruling Questioned "On July 5 the Twin Falls club played the Boise club in a doubleheader at Boise, Idaho. During the course of the first game the manager of the Boise club, Walter Love, was ejected from the game by umpire Keller. It is my understanding that Love was notified at this time that he would not be permitted to play the second game either because of his display of temper, Boise immediately protested that the umpire had no right to disallow him to play the second game. President Halliwell based his decision on this ruling and declared that our ruling that he did not have the right to keep Manager Love from the second game. There is no rule that should be as to the right of the umpire to keep this player out of the second game.

"If the National association disallows this ruling, then, of course, the protest will be allowed. However, if the association agrees with this decision, the Twin Falls club will protest this out to other ways we feel the decision unfair. "The second game was played with Manager Love on the field, and the Twin Falls club won the game by the one-sided score of 10-1. We question the outstanding ability of one player to make the difference of nine runs in a single game, especially in since Mr. Love is a first baseman. "It is my opinion that Mr. Boerjesson and the fans of Twin Falls feel that the decision to have this game replayed is penalizing the two parties that had absolutely nothing to do with it. The protest never would have been if Manager Love had conducted himself properly. The umpires, if ruled in error, aren't penalized. It is only the fans of the Twin Falls club who are penalized. It is further rewarded with an added gate receipt and the umpires will receive another game's pay, while the Twin Falls club will be expected to a possible loss, to say nothing of possible injuries."
