### Project Delay Seen by Krug In Fund Slash

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (U.S.—Secretary of Interior J. A. Krug said the congressional cut in funds for reclamation bureau personnel will delay development of reclamation projects and probably increase production costs.

He said yesterday increases in production costs on the projects "would compel western water and power users to pay more on a repayment basis for the development of these resources."

Criticism of the "drastic" \$48,000,000 ceiling for salaries for fiscal year 1949. He said that congressional action leaves the bureau with \$5,800,000 less than the minimum sum required for efficient operation.

He said personnel reduction and other steps required to meet the limitation "will mean delays on irrigation and hydro-electric projects and will in the end likely mean increased construction costs."

Program Is Larger

He pointed out that the bureau will have fewer employees than last year to put across a \$250,000,000 construction program, which is 50 per cent greater than last year.

He said no reduction will be made in the chief engineer's office at Denver but that the Washington, D. C., office and regional and project offices "will be required to reduce staffs and curtail essential activities."

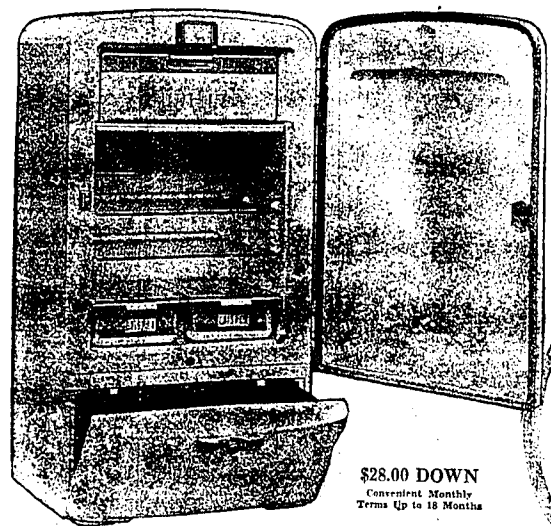

# Many Believe Stalin Trying Tricks Again

The air of cheer among the allied diplomats in Moscow suggests that Stalin has resumed the role of genial Joe, the man who so often expresses sweetness and light to foreigners while his diplomats are busy sabotaging world peace.

Details of the current negotiations are a carefully guarded secret. The job of the allied diplomats in Berlin blockade lifted as a prerequisite for renewal of four-power conciliatory efforts. They naturally think they are succeeding. But the measure of that success will be determined by the progress regarding the food blockade.

A conference, although it might lessen current tension, won't have much real effect on the situation. The Russians are placid while their job of economic and military recovery.

Stalin can afford to appear genial. He's in a nice position. He can be very magnanimous. He the Berlin blockade, and resume his peace offensive. It would seem to be very much to his benefit to reach a truce in the cold war now when allied resistance has reached a point where he can expand no farther without risking war.

A dictator has no trouble going right ahead preparing for war in time of peace. Reorganization of Russia always brings instability to the democracies. Such a period is just what is needed for the three five-year plans which the Kremlin thinks it can make Russia strong enough for what is to come might be imposed by communist expansionism. While Russia would be gathering strength the allies would find military opportunities more and more unpopular, the pressure for western European union would be lessened, and local communist could use Moscow's peace front to remain some of their wartime prestige.

Or Stalin can staminate a four-power conference and create a war scare on the grounds peace with the west is hopeless, thereby zoning to reather beneath his wings the eastern European satellites which are displaying signs of restlessness.

Neither tactic would represent a desertion of communist strategy, which denies the possibility of real peace before they stage their world revolution; which denies the possibility of real collaboration between communist and non-communist countries, but which authorizes any deal for temporary purposes and ends its betrayal when the time is right.

# Truman Try May Be Hardest On Record for Second Term

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (AP) — President Truman's campaign may turn out to be the most extensive—and "lightning"—ever waged for a second term.

During the past half century of Republican-Democratic struggle every President except Harding has been nominated for a second term. He died in his first term.

Only three of the pre-Truman second term candidates—William H. Taft, Herbert Hoover and Franklin D. Roosevelt—made regular stump-speech tours, and those tours were launched late in the campaign season.

President Roosevelt made a so-called "non-political" inspection trip to the dust bowl in the summer of 1933 that Republicans said was a pre-re-election. He and Republican Candidate Alfred M. Landon met and exchanged compliments at a drought conference in Des Moines.

President Truman, not an early start with a political speaking trip to the west coast before the presidential election. Democratic call for more over-sea trips by the President to all parts of the country.

Mr. Truman, 61, is the second oldest candidate to campaign for a second term. Andrew Jackson was when he successfully ran for re-election in 1832. Sen. Albert B. Buckley, 70, is the oldest vice presidential nominee in history.

William McKinley, Calvin Coolidge and Woodrow Wilson "front-porch" to second term victories without making any so-called full-fledged appeals for voter support. Even the strenuous Theodore Roosevelt confuted. He made a "silent" campaign against Democrat Alton B. Parker in 1904.

Well-established political strategy is to have a second-term candidate appear to be too busy with presidential problems to spend his time seeking votes. A President has been expected to conceal his eagerness for both a second term nomination and election.

President Taft made several deniable speeches in the 1912 campaign, but his heavy firing was done by Progressive Theodore Roosevelt and Democrat Woodrow Wilson. Some supporters of Taft criticized him for "half-hearted" efforts to win re-election.

President Hoover waited until four weeks before the election to open his 1932 campaign although the depression had darkened his reelection prospects. Moreover, Democrats and insurgent Republicans had been lambasting his administration for more than two years. Franklin Roosevelt started his regular stump tour for re-election in 1936 the second week in October. He perhaps could have won that year without making any speeches, but he realized a campaign fight and made extensive trips in the middle west and the east.

President Coolidge did some front porch campaigning in 1936. He and his wife were at the father's farm in Vermont. The newspapers and movie reels carried pictures of him wearing a knicker-straw hat, riding hay and tending Henry Ford with a sap bucket.

The "White House sphinx" made no formal political speeches, and Democrats accused him for keeping "shut on the Ku Klux Klan question. A large majority of the voters decided to "keep cool with Coolidge," and he won an easy win-over.

Although election betting odds favored a Republican Candidate Charles Evans Hughes in 1916, President Woodrow Wilson in September not to make a "political campaign." Speakers for Wilson hunted for and made extensive trips in the middle west and the east.

President McKinley spent the 1900 campaign season in the White House and at his home in Canton, O. It was a time of business expansion which GOP stalwarts attributed to "Republican gold standard" and "silver-prospector" slogan.

Vice presidential Candidate Teddy Roosevelt was the star campaigning for the Republicans. He stumped over the country, offsetting the strength of Democrat William Jennings Bryan in 1916. Bryan's record for arduous campaigning, making 673 speeches, traveling 11,200 miles and visiting 567 cities and towns. Bryan had hung up a high mark of 329 speeches in his 1896 campaign.

Colonel Roosevelt, who stepped up to the presidency after McKinley's assassination in 1901, decided not to make any campaign speeches in 1904, Judge Parker of New York, the Democratic nominee, was unpopular with Bryan Democrats in the west, and Teddy coasted to victory.

# Boyle Has Trial With 'Faces'; Now They Seek U. S. Subsidy

NEW YORK, Aug. 5 (AP)—Does congress want the American woman to be beautiful? Well, if it does, it had better start working out some cash.

This is the advice of Mrs. Veronica Denzel, a beauty engineer, who says the high cost of keeping beautiful is pricing many women right out of the market.

"Beauty is so important," she said, "that there should be national beauty clinics subsidized by federal funds which would bring beauty within the reach of every woman."

Mrs. Denzel thinks women have every bit as much right to a chunk of the national budget as farmers.

"There are government subsidies for almost every type of education except for the all-important one of enabling American women to learn how to be and remain a race of beautiful, healthy creatures. And this is a vital necessity to preserve marriages in the face of today's alarming divorce rate."

Mrs. Denzel has been campaigning for some time for equal rights at the drugstore counter.

"Congress should repeal the 20 per cent tax on cosmetics," she said, "because lipstick, powder and cream are as essential to a woman as shaving cream is to a man, but the man doesn't pay a luxury tax on his whisker soap."

Convinced that American women are the most beautiful in the world, Mrs. Denzel regards this as "one of the dividends of democracy."

"As long as we have beautiful women," she said, "our men would slaughter any foreign 'em'."

So she puts it up to congress to save America by saving its womanly beauty.

Mrs. Denzel's views were given in a long telegram in which she directed this department's recent muted protests against "the great American female face."

"There are five basic types of faces," she said.

BOISE, Aug. 4 (AP)—Condemning the Progressive party in the form of a resolution, the Idaho State Federation of Labor wound up its 1948 convention.

In a resolution passed yesterday, the federation disclaimed any connection with the third party and repudiated any statements made by Idaho A.P.C. members endorsing Henry Wallace's political organization.

The state labor group went on record in the same resolution as "repudiating any form of communist political party."

**Boise Plant Planned**  
The federation heard of plans being made by the laundry workers union to establish a dry cleaning plant in Boise. The plant will be set up as a result of the Boise laundry and dry cleaning strike now in its second year.

Mrs. Dean Smith of Pocatello, international representative of the laundry workers, said \$25,000 has been pledged for establishing the union cleaning shop.

The state federation passed a resolution pledging support to the Boise strike.

The Idaho federation re-elected A. W. Gallipeau of Coeur d'Alene as state president. Emer McMillin of Boise was elected secretary-treasurer, succeeding Leonard Hall, also of Boise.

**Resolutions Approved**  
Other resolutions approved for the federation's legislative program included:

Approval of Idaho drivers' license tests. Reorganization of positions of the north-south highway to permit women to drive.

Repeal of laws which prohibit women to work in mines and to be bartenders with minor criminal records.

Called for a safety code in the lumber industry.

Condemned use of unlicensed buses for transportation of children and proposed public bus lines.

Established a state merit system to be established for Idaho state police and fire departments.

Requested local unions to act as the basis of general election day as a holiday.

Requested wage scale for the duration of the strike.

Asking city firemen's retirement pay be increased to \$40 to \$50 monthly.

Condemned the state's failure to provide for appointment of a state fire marshal.

Cancels Plan  
Of '48 Opera

NEW YORK, Aug. 5 (AP)—The world-renowned Metropolitan opera today cancelled its 1948-49 season because, it said, demands for union wage increases could not be met.

If the cancellation stands, it will be the first time in 30 years that the Met has failed to present a season of opera.

The opera association said its decision was caused by "failure to reach agreement with all of the 12 unions representing the employees."

**Withdraws Demands**  
Shortly after the announcement, local 602 of the AFL American Federation of Musicians said it had reluctantly withdrawn demands for a wage boost in an effort to reach a settlement with the opera. The union said the only point it had conceded was an establishment of unemployment insurance and old age benefits.

The musicians said in a statement the Met is not a private venture.

**Civic Institution**  
"It is a civic institution," the statement asserted. "It is one which belongs not to a small group of people—not to a board of directors—but to all the people, to those thousands of Americans who have contributed money so that the Metropolitan can continue its existence."

The union said it was "confident that this unilateral action will not stand for long, that those to whom the Metropolitan represents an integral part of our culture will assert themselves and make possible the next season."

### Prospector Is Aided by New Divining Rod

By PAUL F. ELLIS  
UP Science Writer

WHITTE PLAINS, N. Y., Aug. 5 (AP)—A device that permits prospectors to take to the air in their search for oil, gold and other minerals was shown here today.

This 20th century divining rod is known as the airborne magnetometer, developed some years ago but just now winning a place in industry, particularly oil. Its greatest value is in prospecting in jungles and other inaccessible places.

**Trails From Plane**

In contrast to the divining rod of which legend has forked ends, the new device is housed in a bomblike structure and trails from an airplane on a long cable. As pilots take the plane over an area, the delicate instrument measures the varying intensities of the earth's magnetic field.

The information thus obtained is translated by experts into magnetic contour maps.

**Clues Provided**

These maps, it was explained, provide information concerning the structure of the basement rock many thousands of feet below the earth's surface. They furnish clues as to the possibility of oil or mineral accumulations in any particular area.

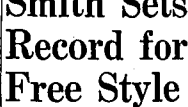

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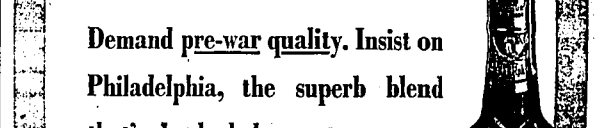

### Cherry Blight "Widespread" In Gem State

MOSCOW, Aug. 5 (AP)—Little cherry disease is "quite widespread" in Idaho, affecting 600 of 55,000 cherry trees inspected in a state survey.

This report was made by Dr. C. W. Hungerford, dean of the University of Idaho graduate school and head of the plant pathology department. The survey was conducted by the Idaho experiment station, cooperating with the state department of agriculture and the Idaho crop pest control and research commission.

Fruit Not Good  
"Fruit from affected trees is not suited for the fresh market and of little value for processing purposes," Hungerford said. "Once a tree becomes infected, there is no means known for saving it. The trees should be removed to protect healthy trees."

Inspectors checking on the disease in the state found 320 diseased trees out of 6,000 inspected in Nez Perce and Latah counties. In Gem county, 208 out of 35,000 inspected trees were diseased.

None in Twin Falls  
The number of diseased trees in other counties was: Fayette, 25 out of 4,500; Canyon, three out of 6,000; Twin Falls, none out of 2,500.

The Idaho Horticulture society has asked farmers to remove voluntarily all trees infected with the disease. Hungerford said the survey emphasized the importance of the voluntary eradication program.

The disease first was observed in 1933 in British Columbia. No attempt was made to control it for several years, and the disease spread rapidly, virtually destroying the cherry industry in some sections of Canada. Canadian authorities now are trying to protect cherry areas not yet affected by the disease. A voluntary removal program for diseased trees also is under way in the state of Washington.

### No Sentiment

SPOKANE, Aug. 5 (AP)—Poets speak wistfully of "the Jack-knife's carved initials," but officials of a Spokane school district are not nearly so tender about it.

During the summer vacation workers are taking "Bob loves Betty" and similar products of boys' knives off the tops of nearly 6,000 school desks.

In a mass production line workers are retinalining 300 desks a day and think with the head start they can keep at least even with the kids.

### Further Actions On Slot Devices Weighed by Unit

Since the city council has declined to take action regarding slot machine petitions, the citizens committee met Tuesday night to give consideration to appropriate methods of procedure in the matter.

The right of a referendum vote was considered, Mitchell W. Hunt, Jr., a member of the group said. There was a discussion of the possibility of further legal action, Hunt stated.

The group also discussed the desirability of canvassing legislative, judicial and law enforcement candidates for views regarding the slot machine issue, Hunt explained.

Claude Brown, Jr., chairman of the group, appointed a committee consisting of George Dice, C. C. Dudley and Kenneth L. Henson, to interview candidates this week so the candidates' stand on the slot machine issue can be made available before the primary election Aug. 19.

Brown announced that the candidates' views will be made available at all churches Sunday.

It was generally agreed by the 25 members present that the next city election would see opposition, Brown concluded.

### Primary Vote Power Test of Office Holder

Virginia Republicans rolled up their sleeves today to make a fight of it for the congressional delegation in November. Following Tuesday's primary election, the state's 11 men in congress are Democrats.

As in Missouri and Kansas, where voters also went to the polls, all incumbents on the ballot who ran for re-nomination appeared to have won out.

**Girl for Fray**  
Virginia Democrats began getting ready for a GOP attempt to carry the state after a 20-year drought. Virginia gave Herbert Hoover a majority in 1928.

U. S. Sen. A. Willis Robertson, who secured an easy triumph in Tuesday's primary, goes up against Robert H. Woods, state Republican chairman in November. The Republicans are encouraged by the intra-party Democratic fight over President Truman's candidacy, and the winning move by Thomas E. Dewey against the late President Roosevelt in Virginia four years ago.

Kansas Republicans put former Gov. Andrew P. Schoepel up against Democrat George McGuffin for the senate seat which Arthur Capper is vacating next January. Each man an easy victory in the primary.

Missouri's interest centered on the race for governor to succeed Phil Donnell, who couldn't run for reelection. The Democrats named State Auditor Furred Smith and the Republicans Murray E. Thompson, speaker of the state house of representatives.

**Federaleak in Picture**  
In the fourth district, where President Truman lives, a candidate supported by James M. Federaleak of Kansas City, who heads the president's political club, came up as the apparent Democratic nominee for congress.

The leader was Leonard Irving, an AFL union leader, who topped State Sen. Floyd R. Gibson by a narrow margin on the basis of complete unofficial returns.

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### Potato Price Support Loss Is 170 Million

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—The government lost \$170,000,000 on potatoes during the 1947-48 crop year, the senate banking committee was informed today.

The committee also heard that the government is now losing money on potatoes at the rate of \$4,000,000 a week as the new crop moves onto the market.

Information came out during a discussion with Secretary of Agriculture Brannan, who appeared before the committee in support of President Truman's anti-inflation recommendations. Senator Williams, R., Del., who was sitting with the group, brought up the potato question during the hearing.

The agriculture department is required by law to support potatoes at 90 per cent of parity, along with a number of other agricultural commodities listed under the so-called Stagall amendment.

Information was guaranteed support at 90 per cent of parity for only the two years following the declaration of the end of World War II hostilities.

But the agricultural act of 1948 which was passed in 1947, requires that the 90 per cent support level be continued until the 1948 crop has been marketed. Thereafter the support price will range from 60 to 80 per cent of parity.

Brannan said he thought the amendment should be given more flexibility in the potato program. He said it should "not encourage production above national consumption levels."

He told the committee that he was not advocating repeal of the act, but that it made it plain he thought the 90 per cent support is too high.

ANKARA, Turkey.—The crown prince of Trans-Jordan arrived here in the capital of Turkey just when I did. In fact, we reached the Ankara Palais hotel at the same time.

He stepped out of an outside Mercedes-Benz (as it is called) to have been a gift from Hitler to President Truman.

He was wearing a blue suit and a white shirt, and he was smiling and waving his hand. He was followed by a guard who was looking at it as if it had come from a fancy dress ball.

I stepped out of a cracking old taxi (said to have been a gift from Noah to Job), followed by my retinue of six men, wearing their well-spotted suits which she is afraid of dry-cleaned in this part of the world. For myself I had a party suit, shortly after this, and I went about seeing.

No city in the world can offer such a contrast between the old and the new as Ankara. The old part of the city (known then as Angora) dates back to the times of the Romans and is still thickly inhabited. As you know, the new city was created from a barren plain by Ataturk in 1923. There was not much as a tree or a bush when Ataturk asked for the money to create the new capital of new Turkey right here. It's as modern as Washington, D. C. and nearly as pretty. All done in 28 years. The streets are tree-shaded, the gardens are magnificent, and the buildings modern.

With special police permission we visited Ataturk's tomb. It is a temporary structure, but the old and the new are now being under construction. But the quiet dignity of the man of the people, the great warrior and statesman that he was.

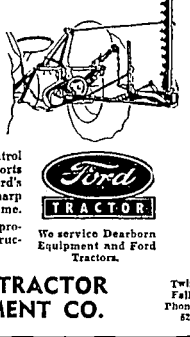

DAYTON, O., Aug. 4 (AP)—Striking workers of the United Lens plant, thwarted by national guard troops, agreed late today to Gov. Thomas E. Dewey's terms for a 90-day settlement of the 92-day-old dispute.

Herbert Hirschberg, regional organizer of the CIO united electrical workers, announced members of the strike plant local would accept the offer. He said he had authority to sign an agreement with the company.

Refused Party

The company, reporting 300 of its normal 650 production workers were back on the job in the second day of operations under protection of guardmen, announced it would proceed immediately to replace the strikers.

No New Overtures

M. H. Stanley, company president, said he intended to make no new overtures to the CIO united electrical workers whose strike he estimated, has cost Union \$1,000,000 in sales and its employees \$500,000 in lost wages.

Stanley said:

"The overwhelming majority of our employees want nothing to do with the CIO union," he declared, "and that of necessity must be the basis of any settlement."

He referred to a national labor relations board election, in which his employees voted 302 to 272 tooust the UEW as bargaining agent.

The NLRB has not yet certified the vote, pending investigation of a union complaint company coercion.

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# U. S. Ready With Plans to Release Danube Territory

BELOGRADE, Yugoslavia, Aug. 5 (AP)—The United States was ready last night to lay before the 11-nation Danubian conference its proposals to unchain the Danube.

The American stand, to be presented today by U. S. Ambassador Cavendish Cannon, will turn down a Russian plan and call for free navigation of the 1,800-mile international waterway by all nations with no strings attached.

American diplomats said Cannon will tell Russia's eastern European communist-dominated countries that the United States will not approve a Danubian peace unless it spells out clearly terms for free navigation.

The Russian plan, presented to the conference today, would place the Danube under exclusive control of the communist bloc from Austria southward. It would give each of the communist-dominated countries immediate supervision over the Danube in its own waters.

United States delegates, after analysis of the Soviet proposal, have concluded the plan would serve only to freeze the present status of the river.

Since shortly after the war Russia has closed the river below Linz, Austria, to all non-Soviet shipping. This has tied up about 700 river craft.

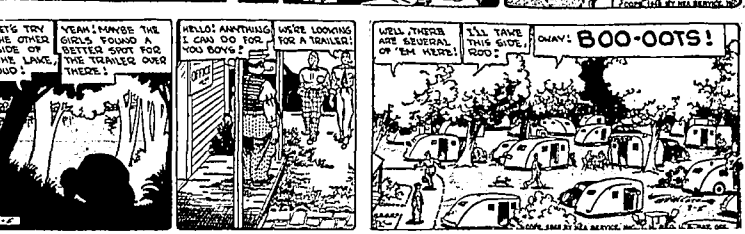

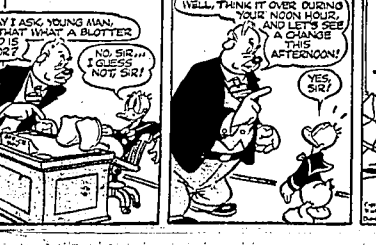

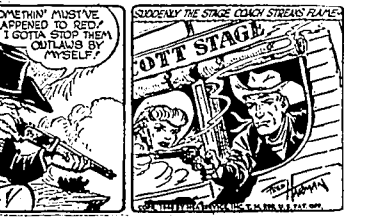

### Italy Ready to Give up Rule For Concord

By J. M. ROBERTS, Jr.  
**AP Foreign Affairs Analyst**  
 Foreign Minister Carlo Sforza says Italy is ready to subordinate her sovereignty, even to the most unexpected degree, to obtain a European union.  
 That sounds very much as though he were willing, and believes his country is willing, to become a state in a United States. He has behind him the support of the Italian senate. Its endorsement of the European recovery program contained the hope the union would develop.  
 Refers to Sovereignty  
 Sforza refers specifically to surrendering "political sovereignty," which is a step beyond the ideas of the Benelux union between Holland, Belgium and Luxembourg. The latter accord goes no further than to envision complete customs union, by agreement rather than under a federal government. And the more complicated requirements even for that, such as a joint currency and free movement of labor, are recognized as requiring a long period of adjustment.  
 If this is true for the small nations, it is doubly true for the extremely complicated economies of the larger powers. For them, with their traditions and languages which differ far more than those of Benelux, with the national and international involvements, political federation becomes an extremely long-range project. Pushed forward by continuing conflict between Russia and the western powers, they might speed up the program. But an end to the cold war, or even a truce, will reduce the pressure for union and probably produce a return to the old attitude of taking the easy way, despite its mischievous of crisis after crisis.  
 Seek Help in Need  
 During times of conflict Europe begins to cast envious glances at Switzerland, where French, Germans and Italians have lived together comfortably, safely and profitably for hundreds of years. But when times permit of negotiation Europe is never willing to let Switzerland (or the Swiss idea) incorporate all the rest "as one federation" once expressed it.  
 As Sforza points out, there are two roads leading to European union.  
 Calls for Renunciation  
 It means renouncing protective ideas of sovereignty, customs barriers, financial restrictions, anti-economic distribution of tasks and functions." Also it means a union

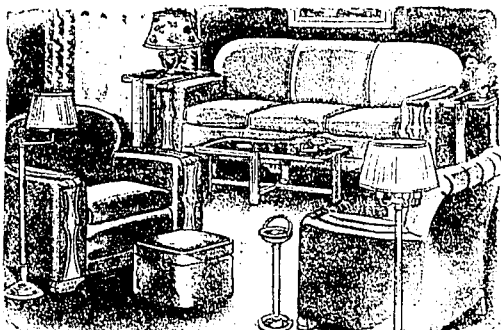

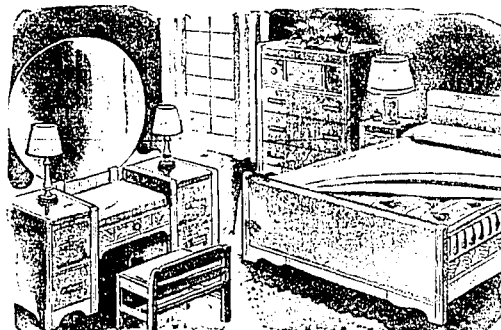
