# Truman Expected To Sign Housing, Price Curb Acts

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (UP)—President Truman probably will sign reluctantly the GOP price and housing bills, but blast congress for inadequate action in both fields, informed sources said today.

Mr. Truman's political advisers believe he was a "tailor-made" campaign issue in the failure of the GOP-controlled congress to grant more than token action on his program at the two-week special session that ended Saturday night. Many Republicans admitted privately that President Truman "won" at the special session, but they count on the communists - in Washington inquiry to even up the political score.

## West Envoys Parley Again With Molotov

MOSCOW, Aug. 9 (UP)—Diplomats of the United States, Britain and France conferred in the Kremlin with Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov more than three hours today.

It was the third such conference to be held in the Kremlin since the Berlin blockade and other problems in the range of differences between the two sides. The envoys left the Kremlin at 7:34 p.m. and went to the British embassy for another meeting. Advisory staffs of all three missions were at the embassy awaiting their arrival.

The GOP informants expressed belief the party's failure to take a strong stand on prices and housing may cost them some votes in their bid for reelection. They are confident Gov. Thomas E. He also was talking with Republicans and Democrats alike of another special session. But as of now it is just talk. That is, a reporter has doubts that congress will meet before Dec. 31.

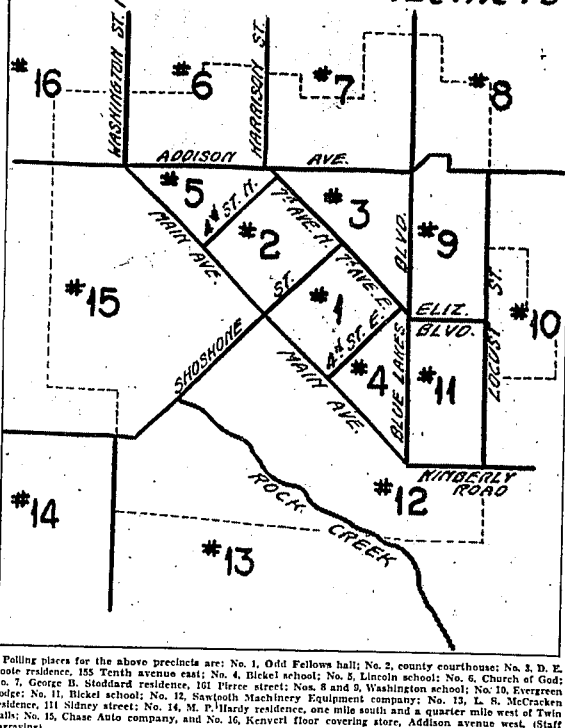

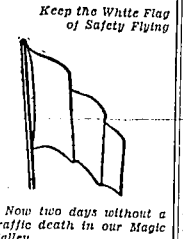

### ABC Network Readies Fight On FCC Rule

NEW YORK, Aug. 9 (AP)—The American Broadcasting company, which specializes in shows giving away thousands of dollars each week, is reported preparing today to fight a proposed federal communications ruling that such programs are illegal lotteries.

ABC attorneys were said to be reading legal arguments to defend such shows as "Stop the Music" on which as much as \$10,000 has been given away on a single telephone call. Basis of the arguments would be that the shows were entertainment and not in conflict with post-office lottery laws.

Contests Examined  
"All the contests being broadcast on the ABC facilities have been examined carefully by counsel," a network spokesman said, "and are in full accord with the provisions of the communications act."

The FCC has announced in Washington that it has drawn up new regulations aimed at checking programs which offer cash prizes, merchandise and vacations on the basis of telephone calls and letters. The networks have been given until Sept. 10 to present their objections to the commission.

The other networks seemed ready to go along with the FCC ruling, however.

To Refuse Shows  
The National Broadcasting company announced that until the FCC has adopted a final ruling on the network's quick program, it would refuse to accept additional shows of that nature.

Resistant to FCC  
The Mutual network announced that until an official text of the FCC regulations has been released, the system's position would not be certain. Officials said, however, that they thought few Mutual programs would be affected.

Cancel Programs  
Eldon Park, vice president of the Crowley broadcasting company, said his network had cancelled most of its prize giving programs three months ago when attorneys predicted that the FCC might make the lottery ruling.

## Stop Sign Violations Blamed for Half of Magic Valley's Traffic Deaths for July

of way. The national figure for this type of accident is almost identical with the Magic Valley figure.

Other driver actions causing fatalities in Magic Valley, in the order of their occurrence include driving on the wrong side of the road, reckless driving, cutting in, falling asleep at the wheel, parking in a variety of places, and other traffic violations. Although not strictly a driver action, a number of fatalities have resulted from persons of various age groups falling from a moving vehicle.

Although these figures teach at least a dozen traffic safety lessons, the one that stands out alarmingly is speed. The insurance company publication puts the blame on these words: "Speeding is the most common cause of traffic fatalities. It is the most frequent cause of traffic fatalities. As a footnote to its description of a typical speeding accident, the publication merely states, "The entire calamity was over in less than a minute." A slogan which might well fit the situation is "Spare a minute and spare a life."

Federalian Fatality  
A sharp deviation from the national pattern is seen in the actions of pedestrians resulting in death in Magic Valley. More than half the Magic Valley pedestrian fatalities are caused by three main headings: Children playing in the street, children playing above their home or farm, children and adults coming from behind parked cars. Nationally, last year, only 14 per cent of the pedestrian deaths were caused by these activities, in the order of their occurrence: Walking on rural highways, crossing between intersections, getting on or off vehicles, riding or hitching on the outside of vehicles, walking on a highway, and walking for a bus.

National Causes  
The principal causes of pedestrian fatalities were crossing between city intersections, walking on rural highways, crossing at intersections not having traffic lights, and crossing against traffic signals.

Although pedestrian fatalities in Magic Valley are not as frequent proportionately as they are nationally, the fact remains that death

welcomes the combination of callous drivers confronted with unbound pedestrian judgment. Age gives no immunity from pedestrian accidents.

In Magic Valley, as in the nation, children-pedestrian collisions were the biggest factor in the deaths of children 4 years old or younger, and were important causes of death in the age groups from 5 to 14 years and 65 years and over.

A comparison of the ages of drivers involved in fatal accidents in the nation shows both similarity and a striking difference.

Almost identical were the Magic Valley and national percentages in the age group from 25 to 64 years and the age group 65 years and above. Drivers involved in three per cent of the Magic Valley traffic fatalities were 65 years old or above.

Worst Group  
From these figures it would appear that the age group 25 to 64 years embraces the bulk of the traffic offenders, with two-thirds of the deaths chalked up to it. Because the group contains the largest majority of drivers that is a safe generalization but it also is misleading because research has shown that in the core of this group are to be found the safest drivers.

More Youngsters  
The startling differences between Magic Valley and national figures in the age group under 18 years. Nationally the figure is three per cent. In Magic Valley, 10 per cent of the traffic fatalities involved drivers less than 18 years old.

In the booklets of national statistics, there are these paragraphs concerning drivers under 25 years of age:

"Studies have shown that drivers in this age group are dangerous as a class because they have not had sound training in the use of the automobile. Authorities in hundreds of U. S. communities have faced the problem of untrained drivers and immature attitudes."

"Some 25 states are in various stages of organization for driver education in their high schools. Many communities have mobilized for an earnest attack on the difficult problem of responsibility behind the wheel. Until the movement takes hold in more areas, however, the nation's roads will still be menaced by youths who do not know of care."

Inexperience Bad  
Statisticians could only guess how many deaths and injuries were the result of bad driving habits stemming from faulty instruction or no instruction at all. Accident reports show that even the most experienced drivers stand little chance against the dangerous habits of inexperienced drivers.

Complete information is lacking as to the effect of road and weather conditions in Magic Valley traffic deaths, but what information is available shows the majority happen on dry roads in clear weather. National statistics show the same situation, and reflect the blame back on the speeder and reckless driver.

Straight Ahead  
An analysis of the direction of travel brings another point against the speeder, the reckless driver and the thoughtless driver. In Magic Valley, nearly 92 per cent of vehicles involved in fatal accidents were

moving straight ahead, compared to the national figure of 84 per cent. In the remaining eight per cent, drivers had stopped their cars, or were turning left, or were backing, or were slowing down or stopping.

Folly of Speed  
A comparison of the road locations of death-dealing accidents shows Magic Valley does not follow the national pattern. Nonetheless the figures again prove the folly of speed.

Road location percentages, for Magic Valley and for the nation as a whole, are: Between intersections, 9.29; rural intersections, 10.3; highway, 37.34; driveway, 5.1; street, 4.9; street intersections, 8.17; railroad crossing, 5.4; and bridge, 5.1.

No Defects  
Both in Magic Valley and throughout the nation, the figures show the great majority of vehicles involved in traffic deaths apparently were in good condition. A few Magic Valley fatalities can be blamed on defective brakes, two to punctures or blowouts, and one to a tail light out or obscured.

Danger at Night  
Vastly different patterns are seen in the hours of occurrence of fatal accidents in Magic Valley and elsewhere in the nation. However, the moral remains the same, when the sun goes down the fatal accident date goes up.

The majority of traffic deaths in Magic Valley have occurred between the hours of 10 and 11 p. m. Other dangerous hours in the order of the

number of deaths are from 1 to 6 a. m., from 6 to 8 p. m., from 10 to 11 a. m., from 8 to 9 a. m., and from 11 p. m. to midnight.

Dangerous Days  
As to the days which Death rides the highways, Magic Valley and the nation show a marked similarity. The end and beginning of the week loom up as the dangerous days.

In Magic Valley, Friday and Monday led in the number of fatal accidents, followed by Sunday, Saturday, Wednesday and Thursday, and Tuesday. In that order, elsewhere in the nation, Saturday was the most dangerous day, followed in order by Sunday, Friday, Monday, Thursday, Wednesday and Tuesday.

### Traffic Signal Invented Here Termed "New"

By HARRY ARNOLD

When his patent attorneys called the first new departure in pedestrian traffic control in a quarter-century has been invented by a Twin Falls man, Joe E. Hawley, 330 Fourth avenue north. It is slated for a test at the intersection of Main avenue and Snodgrass street.

The device can be described as an animated wind-sock which pops up and down to block traffic or flutters downward to allow traffic to proceed. The sock is activated by a blast of air from a squirrel-cage blower driven by a high speed electric motor.

The motor is wired to the timing device of a standard traffic light to synchronize the device with the regular stop-and-go cycle. It can be used for either pedestrian or vehicle traffic control.

Hawley, whose 15 years as a livestock and real estate auctioneer gave him an unusual insight into human nature, used that knowledge in inventing his unique traffic control device. Before figuring out how to prevent a traffic violation, he had to know the human nature which prompted that action.

Shortly after moving here last year from Nebraska, Hawley became worried about driver and pedestrian habits. The action that worried him most was the "straining-at-the-leash" attitude of pedestrians who edge far back of traffic and wait for a traffic light to change from red to amber to green.

He felt something should be done about pedestrians exposing themselves to death heedlessly and needlessly. The result was his invention. It originally was planned to hold pedestrians back until it was safe for them to cross a street.

For pedestrian control, the motor-blower unit and the sock would be mounted in a post waist-high, eight to ten feet from the curb at the end of the four pedestrian lanes. However, on the advice of local authorities, Hawley built his pilot model for use in the center of an intersection in controlling vehicular traffic.

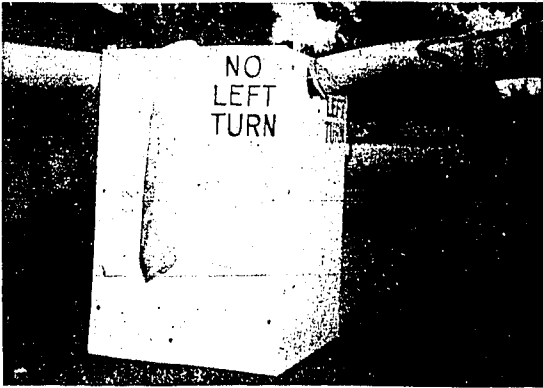
Pointing out why his invention is superior to the ordinary traffic signals, Hawley declares:

"It stops 'em bodily—the kids and absent-minded people who aren't thinking to look for a light—color-blind people who can't tell what color a light is showing. And those fellows who say they didn't see the light haven't got a leg left to stand on. Another thing is that it can't hurt anybody."

As to the mechanical end, Hawley says his invention is free from gimmicks. "Nothing to get out of order." The only maintenance he foresees for it is laundering and replacement of the socks as needed, occasional replacement of the motor brushes, and replacement of lights which could be placed inside the sock for night-time use.

Police Chief Howard W. Gillette said he considers the invention worthy of consideration and trial. He suggested it be tried first for vehicle control, and the pilot model be built accordingly. But Hawley thinks it is better adapted for pedestrians, and is planning other models.

### Freedom Train's Expense Termed About \$1,000,000

NEW YORK, Aug. 9 (AP)—The freedom train has been on the road almost 11 months—at a cost of about \$1,000,000, a spokesman for the American Heritage foundation has revealed.

He estimated an additional \$255,000 will be spent in financing the remainder of the train's 12-month tour. It visited Utah and Idaho last spring.

Bearing 127 of the nation's most priceless documents, the train so far has traveled 28,000 miles across the continent and been visited by an estimated 2,300,000 persons in 247 cities.

By the end of its nation-wide journey, the train will have stopped in 310 cities and been visited by an estimated 4,000,000, the spokesman said.

The train started on its itinerary from Philadelphia last September. Now at Portsmouth, O., it is scheduled to wind up its tour at Camden, N. J., Oct. 18.

### Western Mining Calley in Decay

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 9 (AP)—The western nonferrous mining industry is in a "state of decay," Herbert Hoover said in an interview here.

The former President added that unless we get to the roots of the problems the United States may be built accordingly. Hoover said the industry is dependent upon foreign sources.

Hoover leaves today for West Branch, in his trip. He will be honored tomorrow by Iowans there on his 74th birthday.

Western metal mining faces a "combination of conditions," Hoover said. He outlined them as:

- The disappearance of the prospector.
- The inability of individual mine developers to finance new operations.
- The struggle to exist of the "intermediate" size mining company.
- The difficulty to finance the development of big mines.

### Products for Dairy Plants Dip in State

BOISE, Aug. 9 (AP)—Idaho dairy manufacturing plants made 2,320,000 pounds of butter and 270,000 pounds of cheese during June.

Butter production was 1 per cent below June 1947, and 23 per cent below the five-year June average. American cheese production was 1,200,000 pounds, or 5 per cent below the previous month, 17 per cent below June 1947, and 2 per cent below the five-year average.

The figures were released by the state bureau of dairying and are U. S. Bureau of agricultural economics.

Milk production in June was 129,000,000 pounds, compared with 133,000,000 pounds in May this year and the 10-year average for June of 133,000,000.

Idaho production of ice cream in June was estimated at 355,000 gallons, or 55,000 gallons above the May production.

Idaho farmers selling milk to the American cheese factories in June got \$1.14 per pound for buttermilk in milk testing 3.54 per cent. This compares with \$1.10 per pound for buttermilk in milk testing 3.55 per cent fat during May and \$1.01 per pound for buttermilk in milk testing 3.58 per cent fat in June, 1947.

### Copper Strike Is Averted by Verbal Treaty

**SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 9 (AP)—**Accepting a 12-cent an hour wage increase and a "verbal working agreement" the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers today had postponed indefinitely its called strike against the Kennecott Copper corporation—and retained a major toehold on its slipping control in western mining circles.

The strike call, twice postponed, was to have been effective at 2 a. m. today. An agreement reached last night after 10 hours of negotiations averted the walkout which would have idled an estimated 7,500 workers in Utah, Nevada and New Mexico and chopped off 30 to 35 per cent of the nation's copper production.

**Joint Statement**

The agreement was announced in a joint statement by Daniel Edwards, one-time district official of IUMMSW and now a Utah state industrial commissioner, and Donald O. Goodman, Salt Lake City area commissioner of the federal mediation service.

The strike call was voted by members of seven locals of the IUMMSW in the Kennecott council, after company officials refused to negotiate a new contract succeeding one which expired June 30.

**Communication Sale Issue**

Sole issue between the company and the nation's oldest labor union was that of communication. Edwards himself, several months ago, resigned from his post with the union because of what was termed "communistic tactics" and "red leadership." The company said it would negotiate new contracts only if the international leaders signed and filed non-communist affidavits.

Both the company and union negotiators accepted the mediators' suggestion that IUMMSW members work without contract, accepting 12-cent hourly wage boosts retroactive to July 1.

### U. S. Population Gains 9 Per Cent

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—**The population of the United States increased about nine per cent between 1940 and 1947 and is now 142,414,000, the census bureau estimated today.

Population on the Pacific coast increased 41 per cent during that period. Thirty-nine states in all showed net gains. Only three—North and South Dakota and Montana—showed relatively heavy losses.

The principal factor in the increase as a whole, the bureau said, was the excess of births over deaths. Population shifts together with immigration from abroad accounted for the large gains in the west.

The bureau estimated that during the seven-year period, California gained 42.1 per cent, Oregon 41.8, and Washington 35.8. These were the first three states in population growth.

The U. S. forest service estimates that three-quarters of the timber in Alaskan coastal forests is within two and one-half miles of tide-water.
