Canal Firm's Directors to 'Close' Ditch

A decision to close operating a community canal which crosses the property of Mrs. Betty Nye was made by the board of directors of the Twin Falls Canal company at their meeting Tuesday morning.

The decision was prompted by a complaint from Mrs. Ernest Prager, director of the canal, who said the spillway on their property had been built without their knowledge and that the water over the spillway would cause the water to come tumbling down the spillway onto the Nye property which was termed an "eye-sore."

The board decided that by ceasing operation at the end of the current year, users of the canal would be forced to utilize other means of acquiring the needed water.

The Nye canal system was also discussed, although no action was taken on the situation involving the city of Buhl, the Sego Mill company and the city of Burley, the company and farmers in the vicinity.

The two corporations have contracts with the city of Buhl for water and disposal, but the Buhl sewage system is so overworked that the water from the plants has been sent into ditches, doing considerable damage to farmland and causing a nuisance.

It was pointed out that in the discussions at Buhl concerning the sewage system, the two companies had been asked to provide \$20,000 of the cost. The Sego company was willing to match. The Buecan company, on the other hand, felt that \$10,000 or any similar figure was excessive.

Sweden Plan Of Neutrality Stirs Europe

Sweden's declaration that she intends to maintain "armed neutrality" in a third world war, and her efforts to persuade Norway to join her in this stand, have been conveyed repeatedly, though informally, to



Norway has been anxious to keep neutral and the doors open to military cooperation with the western powers. However, discussions regarding a Scandinavian defense alliance, initiated by Sweden, have been going on for several months.

Swedish sources say the British believe the western powers are so strong in the Mediterranean that the Russians couldn't make headway there. Thus the only feasible place for the Muscovites to open a front would be Scandinavia. Hence the desire to see these northern nations in the democratic bloc.

No Chances Seen
Of course the crux of the matter is that there isn't a shot of a chance for Scandinavia to remain neutral in a war between the communist bloc and the democracies. As a matter of fact informed quarters in Stockholm say British Foreign Secretary Bevin told the Swedish ambassador in London the chances of maintaining neutrality were slight.

That is true not only of Scandinavia but of every other country in Europe—save the democracies. As a matter of fact the "cold" war between the bolsheviks and the democracies is a third world war in some places, like China and Greece. It actually is a shooting war.

New Warfare Form
What a lot of folk in the democracies don't yet realize is that they are up against an entirely new form of warfare. It is ideological and therefore deceptive—but it is far more dangerous than the outright military struggles for power in the past.

The old wars were destructive of life, property and resources. But this new world revolution, or the spread of communism aims at destroying the freedom of nations and depriving their citizens of man's bill of rights.

That's a type of aggression that neither Sweden nor any other nation can hope to escape by neutrality.

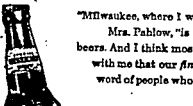
Roberts' appointment was the second major change in university administration in 10 days. Former Gov. Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota was chosen president of the university on July 29.

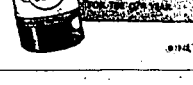

10 Twin Falls Boy Scouts Get Credit For Putting Out Forest Fire on Hike

That rare bit of adventure Boy Scouts dream about was realized recently by 10 boys from the Twin Falls Baptist troop No. 69 and Elks troop 183 during the Scout area camp at Alurus lake. The incident occurred last week while the two troops were on an overnight hike in the primitive area under the leadership of Scoutmaster A. F. Brown.

The group was completing a trip to Alurus lake when one of the scouts spotted a fire on a peak west of Yellow Belly lake. Quickly they returned to the camp and immediately alerted the area, arriving only 15 minutes after the Fourth-of-July creek ranger.

The fire had almost reached the crown of the trees and had spread out over a 30-foot area. It was burning rapidly. The boys were armed only with mess kits and axes, which they immediately put into action, under the direction of Brown and the forest ranger.

Their work was dangerous and they knew it. Unless the fire was extinguished quickly it could spread and sweep down the mountain side cutting them off from safety. They worked about an hour and a half, bending the fire, digging trenches, using what equipment they had

when it became apparent their efforts had been successful and the fire was being brought under control.

About this time another forest service man arrived at the scene, and relieved the scouts who returned to their central headquarters.

The cause of the fire was not determined. It was believed to have been started by natural causes.

The 10 Scouts participating in extinguishing the blaze were Bobby Hildeaway, John Hauser, Avery Floyd, Ansel Clark, Vernon Brand, Junior Jullian, Jesse Kinney, Stanton Sheppard, Walter Rauch and Everett Waddell.

Little Fellows To Gain 'Jolt' In Purchases

NEW YORK, Aug. 10 (AP)—The little fellow who buys on time may be in for a rude jolt.

To get those things he's been drooling over, he may have to put up more cash and there may be more money for bigger monthly payments. A lot of businessmen are afraid the little fellow won't be able to do it.

If the federal reserve board goes back to wartime controls on installment buying, an authorized under-licensing congress sent to the White House, sales of home appliances, home furnishings and furniture may drop by 10 per cent or more.

Retailers finding business slow under the present liberal credit terms are pretty pessimistic about the outlook.

Dealers Not Worried
Automobile dealers, however, say: "So what? Our total sales won't be affected. A few little fellows may not be able to meet the new terms. But these controls would expire next March 15, anyway. And we have such long lists of people waiting for new cars that the little fellow who is squeezed out won't be missed."

But if 15-month payments are the new rule, that might mean around \$8 a month—too rich for the blood of many a wage-earner. Department stores, expect to lose business on some floors and gain on others. Furniture sales on time may be hurt. But many of the little fellows who can't buy durable goods under existing credit terms will have a little more money in their pockets to buy more soft goods and notions.

The heavy goods industries and those dealing with products still in short supply say the sales picture will not be changed in any way—the problem there is time of de-

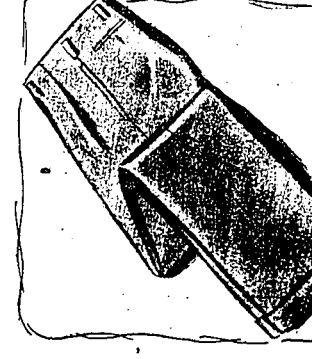

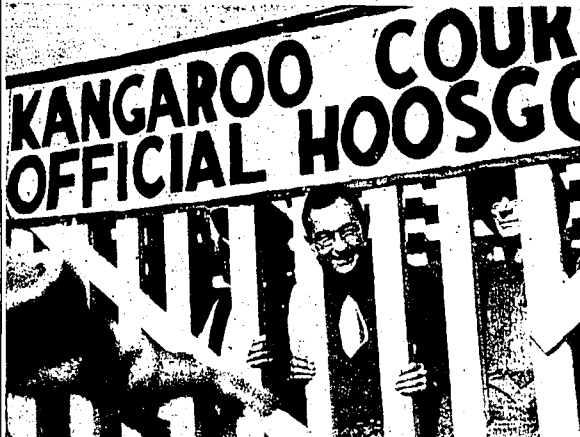

The muse doesn't care—and never did—which she parades her little bag in the pocket of the third cellar down in the slum hotel. She just wants to blank punch a man of imaginative talent after an enlightening quill.

Today there are more men with small talent making more out of writing than at any time since the earth cooled, and Brooklyn began to flourish. Only dull-witted winners on the gray-way program get as much for so little.

Dr. Johnson put the English language in chains in the 18th century in the first popular-selling dictionary. Before his writers lived on the favor and pocketbook of an aristocratic patron, Johnson kicked the muse to enlighten and invent an immortal letter to Lord Chesterfield saying, in effect, "No thanks, Chester, old man. I don't need your help—my dictionary is selling faster than nickel pork chops. I don't need you."

But good writers, writers of what they feel under any system. The two finest books in our time are Shakespeare's "The Merchant of Venice" and the King James version of the Bible.

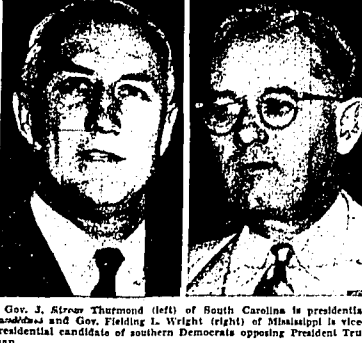

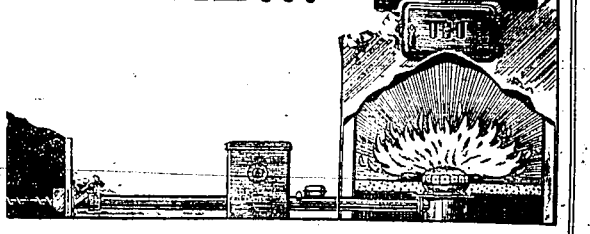

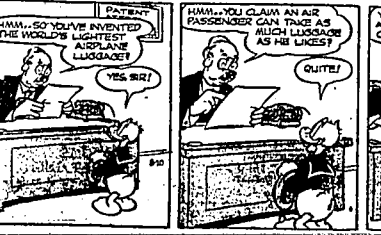

U. N. Official's Report Points To Difficulties

By J. M. ROBERTS, Jr. AP Foreign Affairs Analyst
The annual report of Secretary General Trygve Lie of the United Nations is a pointed reminder of what has happened in the last three years to our wartime hopes of world disarmament and universal cooperation for peace and economic stability.

Mis reference to the race for production of chemical and bacteriological weapons seeks to focus attention on a field whose prospects, in case of war, are as "scary" as the atomic bomb.

Make peace, the U. N. leader urges, and put these weapons under control before mankind is visited with new horror.

Compromise, he suggests. Recognize that the world is not going to accept any one economic system, whether it be Russian or American. The old nationalisms of the west and the new nationalisms of the east can adjust themselves peacefully to each other, he insists.

Logical conclusion, he says, can be drawn within bounds provided no group tries to impose its will by force or threat of force on other groups.

Mr. Lie thus approaches peace from the only angle from which it can be approached. Peace will come by disarmament, but there is the slightest indication now that disarmament will make peace. While Soviet Russia strengthens herself for open competition with the west, the democracies have disappointed their military power.

Reason for Tension
There is little question that this arms race is responsible for much of today's international tension. Yet it seems required if Russia is to be brought to the point of diminishing returns, and therefore to the point of compromise on her aspirations.
