

Soviets Evacuate 4-Power Regime Building in Reich

BERLIN, Aug. 13 (AP)—The Russians evacuated the allied four-power kommandatura building in Berlin today and hoisted down their flag.

This action appeared to complete the division of Berlin between the east and west—at least as far as the Russians are concerned.

The Russians withdrew July 1 from the allied kommandatura, which had provided four-power administration for this city for three years. They pulled out with the comment that the kommandatura no longer exists.

They then announced they would retain their entry and flag at the main central building which had been removed. The kommandatura is situated in the American sector of the city.

Still at Control Center Although they walked out on the allied control council for Germany on March 20, the Russians still in their colors and maintain sentries at the allied control authority building.

They also maintain a representative in the permanent allied secretariat there, which now has little to do but exchange inter-armed messages and handle protocol matters.

The allied control building also is situated in the American sector. At both buildings flags of the four powers have flown side by side and "do nothing" signs have been on duty since the western allies joined in the occupation of Berlin in July.

Recognition Refused After the Russian withdrawal from the kommandatura, which the U. S., Britain and France refused to recognize legally—the so-called "German" kommandatura alone remained to hold Berlin together.

Since then, however, the anti-communist administration has been under constant communist attack and several of its branches have been split between the east and west. This includes the police force and food administration.

The only Soviet property left in the building were photographs of Stalin and Lenin, hanging in the chief of staff's office.

No Notification When the Russian withdrawal from the kommandatura was announced, the U. S., British and French governments were notified by the Russians.

Asked if the western powers plan to set up a four-power regime, the spokesman said that ever since the Russians left the kommandatura the western allies have been holding talks with the U. S. official told Germans in the U. S. sector last night that polls were being taken to see if the Americans want a strong stand against Russia.

Even if War? The American military government spokesman, broadcasting on a radio, said he was disappointed that four out of five Americans said the United States should remain in Berlin.

"The American people believe that peace is not to be found in retreat," he said. "In fact, evidence of the American people shows that the government might well have been firmer in its attitude toward the Russians in its past negotiations."

No Boycott, but Meat Sales Drop

No organized boycott on the part of most consumers exists in Twin Falls, a survey of four leading meat retailers revealed.

The reports of retailers were varied, with one saying his business is currently "very healthy," another saying sales were continuing on an even keel, and two reporting sales had dropped from 10 to 20 per cent.

This is in contrast to conditions in Boise where a buyers' strike instigated by a woman's club has resulted in sales as much as 25 per cent, as reported by United Press, which also reported declines in sales in the Nampa area.

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Teacher Declares Her as 'Prisoner'

NEW YORK, Aug. 13 (AP)—A Russian school teacher who jumped in fear of her life from the third story of the Soviet consulate accused the Russians today of holding her as a prisoner for six days.

"You kept me a prisoner," Mrs. Oksana Kosenkina, 52, told the Russian vice consul when he entered her hospital room this morning. "You would not let me go." She refused to see Soviet Consul General Jacob Lomakin, who announced last Saturday he had "rescued" her from the Tolstoy foundation farm colony where he claimed she was held as a prisoner.

She said she had been drugged and kidnapped by "white Russians." Mrs. Kosenkina kept her eyes closed most of the time Soviet Vice Consul Chepurnykh was in her room. When she did open them, she refrained from looking at Chepurnykh.

Mrs. Kosenkina had asked police, who kept a heavy guard around Roosevelt hospital to prevent possible attempts on her life, to tell her Russian officials away from her room because "I fear them."

Although she told the vice consul she did not want to be interviewed, Mrs. Kosenkina last night, a few hours after she leaped from a consulate window, was visited by three persons. One of them was Vladimir Zenshov, anti-communist Russian writer who lived in the same room as Mrs. Nyack, N. Y., from which the Soviet consul general later "rescued" her.

Mrs. Kosenkina, held in the consulate in defiance of the New York supreme court order to produce her, was interviewed by a reporter from the newspaper.

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U.S. Pledges Asylum For Soviet Teachers

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 (AP)—The state department today promised asylum for two Soviet school teachers who had figured in current congressional spy investigations if—as expected—they want to remain in this country.

At the same time, the department disclosed the Russian government's claim of official agencies of the United States were involved in "kidnapping" at least one of the teachers have been denied directly to Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov by American Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith.

Moreover, a department spokesman, Michael J. McDermott, also vigorously denied a report broadcast by Moscow radio that the undersecretary of State Robert A. Lovett had told the Russian ambassador in Washington last Monday night that one of the teachers, Michael Ivanovich Samarin, was subject to McDermott at his federal bureau of investigation.

"Pretty Rough" McDermott was characterized that Moscow radio report, which was represented as the official version of the case, as being "pretty rough."

McDermott said Lovett actually told the Soviet ambassador that all he knew was what he had read in the newspapers about the case. The newspaper's version of the case, however, had voluntarily requested an interview with the FBI.

The element of individual rights of the Russian school teachers was subject to McDermott at his news conference at the state department. It was in this connection that the question of asylum was raised.

Dewey Drive Will Hammer Probe Result

By United Press Gov. Thomas E. Dewey's campaign manager made it clear today that the GOP presidential nominee will make a big issue of the current communist infiltration in Washington investigations.

In Albany, N. Y., where he is holding a strategy conference with Dewey's chief counsel, J. P. Brown, the manager said he was most interested in the communist investigation that has gone on during the past three weeks.

"I'm shocked, surprised," he said, "at the attitude President Truman has shown in attempting to cover up the communist infiltration in our national government."

Brown's comment about what has gone on during the past three weeks apparently meant that Dewey will place far more emphasis on the communist infiltration than on the special session of congress.

Extension Planned In Washington, the Republican-controlled House anti-communism committee announced plans for extending the inquiry which Democrats have denounced as an attempt to "smear" the Roosevelt administration.

Chairman J. Parnell Thomas, R. N. J., promised to call "persons high in the government and high in the military."

Meanwhile, Mr. Truman and Henry A. Wallace renewed their charges that the investigation is a "red herring" and an example of "political gangsterism." Wallace said in a radio broadcast from New York the committee was "reporting to the political techniques of Hitler, Mussolini, Goering, Tojo and Franco."

Dewey to Invade Dixiecrats' Area ALBANY, Aug. 13 (AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey will conduct an extensive coast-to-coast campaign this fall, including many of the Dixiecrats' area.

He said "many thousands of Democrats and Independents" were being lost to the GOP because of the "most favorable" response to the national GOP ticket in his memory.

Tobin Takes Oath As Labor's Chief WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 (AP)—Maurice J. Tobin became the national secretary of labor today. As he was sworn in, Tobin, a former Massachusetts governor, pledged an effort to wipe "the word labor" from labor-management relations.

The new secretary, 47, plunged into his duties even before he took the oath. He attended the regular Friday meeting of President Truman's cabinet.

Wheat's Price Drops Below Parity 'Floor' CHICAGO, Aug. 13 (AP)—Wheat is selling today below the government's parity price for the first time in the country. Efforts to hold up the price have bogged down under the weight of sales and lack of storage room.

Recent support efforts have included increased acreage, but exports for September, an official statement that the crop year's export goal will be raised above 1947-48, and a government campaign to get producers to hold wheat on farms.

The government supports wheat mainly through a loan based upon the price below the loan rate. Loan prices are set at various levels. Grain experts believe farmers have applied for loans in very large numbers, but official figures have not been issued.

Prices of wheat yesterday compared with government loan prices for the grade of wheat on which the price is quoted were:

Chicago... \$2.11-2.12 Kansas... \$2.18-2.19 Kansas... \$2.23 Storage Space Lacking Major cause for the slump of wheat below the loan rate is lack of storage space. It is believed that storage space is being used to obtain storage room. To get the loan, wheat must be stored in government-approved storage facilities. With storage space filled, some wheat has had to be dumped on the market.

How year's loan price is the highest on record. Since the program was started in 1938, the loan has increased each year.

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Sales of State Land, Timber Get Approval

BOISE, Aug. 13 (AP)—The state land board has approved for sale 174,373 acres of state land and timber.

Edward Woolsey, state land commissioner, said and approved for sale included 480 acres in Canyon county, 840 acres in Twin Falls county, 310 acres in Madison county, 640 in Minidoka and 80 acres in Blaine county.

The board denied the sale of 824 acres in Fremont county, 640 acres in Payette county and 107 acres in Bonneville county. Woolsey said the sales were denied because it would interfere with proper use, administration and future sale of state land.

Timber Sale Cleared

Timber approved for sale included an estimated 14,611,000 board feet in Clearwater county appraised at \$2,322, 120 acres of timber in Valley county appraised at \$2,826, two tracts of an estimated 3,820,000 board feet in Valley county at \$12,500, 100 acres in Boise county at \$2,800, 4,000,000 board feet in Idaho county at \$13,250, 1,200,000 board feet in Washington county at \$10,820.

Woolsey said timber contract extensions were granted on 2,200 acres of state-owned timber. He said six contracts were cancelled due to completion.

Easements Granted

Three easements were granted by the land board. One for construction of a school in the Island Park subdivision in Fremont county, one to Boise city for construction of sewer lines and one for a logging road in Idaho county.

The board granted seven oil and gas leases in Bear Lake county totaling 3,266 acres, four in Fremont county totaling 1,760 acres, one in Bonneville county totaling 640 acres and four in Blaine county totaling 1,840 acres.

Blaine Quartz Lease

An 80-acre phosphate lease was granted by the board in Blaine county, a 60-acre quartz lease in Latah county, a 38-acre gold and silver lease in Owyhee county, 72-acre quartz lease in Boise county and a 40-acre quartz lease in Blaine county.

The land board also approved the application of the Wallberg Dredging company to acquire a 220-acre lease for gold dredging on the Salmon river.

Five land sale certificates were cancelled by the board for non-payment and two divisions of land sale contracts.

Complaint Filed To Recover Loss

James A. Ross and Ruth A. Ross filed a complaint in district court Thursday against Jack W. Park, in which they seek more than \$2,000.

Ross' complaint states he purchased a house trailer Dec. 6, 1941, from Park for the sum of \$2,825, and for which Park signed a guarantee against defective workmanship.

On May 1, 1942, the complaint continues, a fire caused by defective wiring gutted the trailer, burning furniture and personal belongings.

Ross is seeking \$2,125 for the trailer which was valued at \$500 following the fire, \$800.30 for personal property lost in the blaze, \$50 per month for rent he has paid, beginning June 28, 1942, and the costs of the action. He is being represented by Harry Benoit.

Divorce Decree Altered in Terms

District Judge James W. Porter Thursday modified a divorce decree which had been granted Freda Jewett from Roy Jewett June 2, 1942, regarding custody of a minor son.

The child will remain in the custody of his mother during the school term of each year, and with Mrs. Jewett during summer and Christmas vacations.

Jewett is required to pay \$1 per month for the support of the boy while he is in his mother's custody.

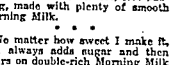

Air of Failure Prevails Over Moscow Talks

By J. M. ROBERTS, Jr.

An air of failure is beginning to surround the Moscow discussions. Even as the allied envoys were conferring again with Molotov's diplomatic informant in London was discussing the possibility of a direct appeal to Stalin.

The two sides have now presented their main themes and rebuttals on how a full-length conference on Germany should be brought about. There are strong indications that Molotov made unacceptable demands and that he was told so yesterday.

Some inaccuracies "leak" from such negotiations usually contain at least some inaccuracies and are entirely misleading. But from such information as is available it seems that the allies were ready to begin four-power negotiations regarding Germany and other European problems, which had been broken off after the Berlin Moscow and London meetings. At that time the allies decided they might well proceed with organization of a western government and incorporate the present into the Marshall plan.

Using currency changes in Western Germany as an excuse, the Soviets frustrated the joint effort of allied-held sectors of Berlin. This was a strong lever, and the allies sought a means of compromise.

Assume New Parley They are assumed to have offered a new conference if Russia would lift the blockade. Russia demanded a more concrete and specific ally is reported to have agreed, conditionally, to compromise on the currency question. Russia is reported demanding that plans for the western German government be decided up pending the conference.

The allies say they will not do this. They apparently feel that currency control and the more leverage the blockade gives her.

The situation in Berlin itself and working in the cold war is as much responsible for increasing world pessimism as in any lack directly concerning the Moscow conversations. For Russia is known to retaliate on every front at once for any irritation anywhere. Daily incidents in Berlin, intrigues at Belgrade, a bitter propaganda attack which might mean the approach of the end of the conference, even a formal protest over a little row about the status of a schoolmaster in New York—all these contribute to the picture.

Western Europe is displaying fear that even the current "phony peace" will not last.

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Russ Scheme On Armament Unlikely Now

LAKE SUCCESS, Aug. 13 (AP)—A United Nations commission decided Thursday Russia's scheme for slashing the world's armaments cannot be put into effect until there are present international tensions.

The vote in the 11-nation commission was 9 to 2 with Russia and the Soviet Ukraine dissenting. A system of regulation and reduction of armaments and armed forces can only be put into effect in an atmosphere of international confidence and security, the commission concluded.

As examples of essential conditions for the establishment of a world police force, agreement in international control of atomic energy and the cessation of the German and Japanese peace treaties.

To Keep Part Program The commission was careful not to junk the program outright and agreed that planning should go forward in preparation for the time when international confidence is restored. However, no further deliberations are expected before the decision is made.

Some delay has been due to Russian insistence that the arms control deal with all weapons, including atomic bombs. The commission also decided that work should be confined to weapons not within the jurisdiction of the U. N. atomic energy commission. The atomic commission has reported outright failure.

GOP Suffers Highest Rate Of Mortality

BOISE, Aug. 13 (AP)—There was a higher mortality rate among veteran Republican candidates for the state legislature than Democrats in the Idaho primary because of four Democratic filings. Clay C. A. Robbins said Thursday. Mr. Robbins said you can hardly make a comparison there so many Democratic tickets were blank. Had they filed an equal number for re-nomination, 114 a mortality rate among the Democrats would have been as high.

Id., said he thought one reason for the large number of Republican filings was an increased interest in party affairs by the young Republicans. He predicted in Boise that this growth would continue as younger GOP members began to assert themselves.
