The government has taken such a hand in stimulating production that you can't do an amount about face. If parity is to be dropped, it will have to be done gradually. I do not believe in having parity prices so high that they are an incentive to over-production, such as what happened in the potato industry," he declared.

BOISE, Aug. 14 (AP)—Idaho's 1948 potato crop, based on Aug. 1 indications, is forecast today at 25,750,000 bushels. This is 750,000 bushels or about two and one-half per cent above the 1947 record of 24,500,000 bushels, according to the state agricultural economist. The indicated yield per acre of 245 bushels is 25 bushels greater than the average of 1947 and 11 bushels greater than the 1945 record.

Clark also announced that the Junior Chamber of Commerce will operate a "kangaroo court" in the business district, with proceeds to go to the swimming pool fund. All residents are urged to wear at least three articles of western clothing in the downtown area from Aug. 18 until fair time.





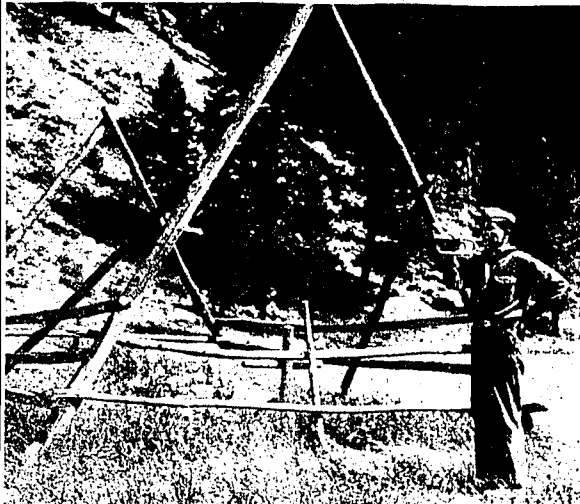

Scout Hears Tale of His Grandfather During Outing at Camp Lightfoot Bar

A new boy at the campfire listened intently this year as Scoutmasters told the traditions of camp Lightfoot Bar and the story of the man for whom the area was named. The boy, making his first trip to the Scout camp as a member of troop 80, Ketchum, was Douglas Lightfoot, grandson of John Lightfoot, who years before had arrived at this bar formed by a bend in the Boise river and a stream from a natural hot spring.

A few feet away from the campfire site is Mr. Lightfoot's grave. It is only a few feet from the place where he had died at the age of 70 early in the 1830's.

Mr. Lightfoot was one of Idaho's early pioneers, coming to Magic Valley in 1833, long before there seemed much promise of the area, earning that name. He had established a successful ranch near Soldier, where he lived with his wife and 11 children. But farm life, while sustaining, could not keep him happy. Here he hunted and fished. One story tells of how he alone once proved the wild game for a banquet for the entire mining area. He blazed his own trails and lived an outdoor life.

In later years, as his health began to fade, he cured feet and less for his ranch and spent more time at his cabin. His wife, not caring for the camp's solitude, left the ranch and went to live with her daughter in California.

Mr. Lightfoot's rheumatism became worse in his last months. He found comfort from the pain by bathing his legs in the stream which flowed from the hot spring. It was here, one day, that he died, probably from overexertion.

Experts Aver Supports Set Grain Prices

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (AP)—Government grain experts said today that government support prices for food exports probably will determine the retail price of bread and breakfast foods this winter.

They made the statement in a letter to the Senate in which Commerce Secretary Charles Sawyer said the United States should do so before increasing food exports despite the prospect of record-breaking crops.

Sawyer made the suggestion at a news conference yesterday. Europe's problem, he said, now seems one of recovery rather than staving off actual hunger.

"It may be time to give some attention to the American housewife," he said.

But government farm experts, who have followed the world food crisis since the first great postwar winter of 1945-46, said Sawyer apparently was not fully informed about the true status of U. S. crop prospects.

Ample Crop
On the basis of last Tuesday's crop report, they said, there probably will be enough grain produced this year to meet all domestic needs, supply all Europe can afford to buy and still have some left over.

The report indicated that production of the four major grains—wheat, corn, barley and oats—will be 1,300,000,000 bushels larger this year than a year ago.

"Collect all the left-over cans of brightly colored enamel in the house and let your imagination ramble" is Jackie Beymer's recipe for decorating a dark and unattractive room into a light, colorful and pleasant place.
When Dr. and Mrs. Charles B. Beymer and family moved into their home, 100 Seventh avenue north, this year they were faced with the problem of redecorating a second floor bathroom which was painted in dingy grey and tan colors and which was poorly lighted by one small window.
Sixteen-year-old Jackie volunteered to paint the bathroom—on the condition that she might decorate it exactly as she wanted. Mrs. Beymer replied that the room "is so ugly now, you can't make it any worse," and so Jackie looked around for some paint and put her imagination to work.
She noticed that the lower portion of the wall in the room was grooved in a manner representing bricks, and the ceiling and long, winding cracks which looked very much like vines," the young painter stated. "This gave me the idea of painting the room to represent an outdoor patio."
Mrs. Jackie found some bright red paint and painted the lower half of the walls like bricks. She then painted the ceiling and long, winding cracks which looked very much like vines. After these basic colors were on the walls, then the fun began.
"I decided to make the walls fun to look at, as well as colorful, so I drew cartoons of animals and birds with which I filled up the empty spots on the walls," Jackie explained.

Body of Area War Casualty Arrives Home

RUPERT, Aug. 14.—The body of Pvt. Walter F. Andrew, son of Mrs. Mina Andrew Perry, Rupert, who was killed April 15, 1945, while fighting on Cebu island in the Philippines, is being returned to the United States for burial.

His body is aboard the army transport Dalton Victory along with the bodies of 3,950 other servicemen killed in the Philippines during World War II. The remains of 17 Idaho who died are aboard the ship.

Private Andrew was killed by a mortar blast while attempting to evacuate wounded men from the battlefield, according to reports received by his mother.

He was born Aug. 10, 1918, at Smithfield, Utah, in 1941, he married Ellen Miller of Ogden, Utah. Following Private Miller's death, his widow married his brother, Fred Andrew.

In addition to his mother, he is survived by one daughter, Patricia, 5, Ogden; three sisters, Zella Andrew, Boise; Mrs. Erma Smith, Idaho Falls, and Mrs. Kease Kinney, Ogden, and two brothers, Charles F. Andrew and Fred Andrew, both Ogden.

One brother, Owen F. Andrew, was reported missing in action by the army during World War II. The family plans burial rites in Ogden.

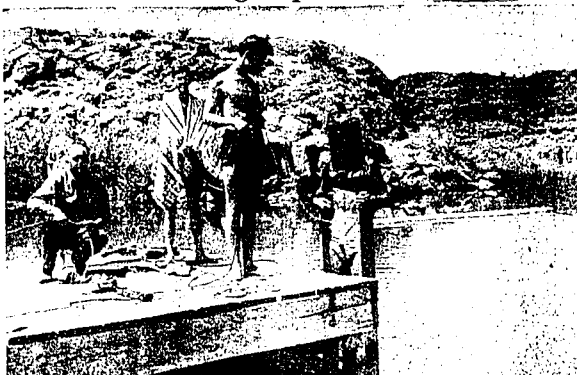

Polio Classes Are Held for Local Women

A class in polio emergency volunteer treatment was taken by 18 Twin Falls women last week under supervision of Dr. Madeline M. Donnelly, Boise, director of the Idaho bureau of maternal and child health and crippled children's service.

Dr. Donnelly outlined the importance of early treatment of polio, the value of post-disease care, and progress made in Idaho in combating and controlling the disease, illustrated by statistics kept during the 1947 and 1948 outbreak in the state.

Jane Sanders, a polio nurse from the "Zika" convalescent home in Boise, told of the work being done at that center.

A talk on polio nursing was given by Dorothy Collard, supervising nurse at the south central Idaho health unit.

Demonstrations of hot pack treatments were given by Ann Brechee, physical therapy consultant from the state health department crippled children's service in Boise.

These classes are sponsored and approved by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and state department of public health, and are given to polio emergency volunteer workers in cities in Idaho upon the request of their organizations.

Similar classes treated more than 300 workers in Salt Lake City and about 100 workers in Boise for valuable aid in polio centers during last year's outbreak, Dr. Donnelly said.

Parents Agree to Decision Medical Board on Child

CHICAGO, Aug. 14 (AP)—If she were your little girl, would you have her undergo an operation at once believing there was only a tiny chance she would pull through?

Or would you leave her as she is—probably to die before she is five?

That tragic question today brought a young mother and father into superior court to ask a judge's decision. It already has estranged them.

The father, Fred W. Lamphere, 23, a shipping clerk, asked Judge Walter R. O'Malley for an order forcing the mother to permit the operation.

The child, Frances Lamphere, 22 months, was born with her bladder formed outside her body. The mother's attorney said that doctors have told her that the child can live two or three years at most.

The mother, Irene, 21, pleaded quietly:

"I live for my child. I want her as long as I can have her. I'd lose her forever if she were operated on."

"I love her just as much," replied the father. "I want her to have a chance to live."

Louis Cernak, the father's lawyer, asked:

"The child has no chance of survival without an operation and one chance in 100 with an operation. There are people living in Chicago who have survived such an operation."

Charles C. Swooley, the mother's lawyer, then said:

"The child is normal in other respects. And I understand it is wishful thinking to believe the chance of success in an operation would be one in 100. It is near one in 1,000. Physicians at county hospital have advised us against an operation. It would deprive the mother of her child prematurely."

"She knows the child can live in her present condition only a few years, but she prefers to have her
