

Troop Withdrawal Proposed by U.S. For Danger Area

The proposal was placed before Russian junior officers by American junior officers. It was understood the recommendation had been transmitted to Maj. Gen. Alexander Kotikov, Russian commander in Berlin, with the approval of high American authorities.

The move was made in hope that the British and American troops could be withdrawn from the heart of Berlin's bomb-damaged district.

Code for Ground Water Needed in State, Kulp Says

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., Aug. 24 (AP)—Idaho badly needs a ground water code, Mark R. Kulp, Idaho reclamation engineer, told the Association of Western State Engineers at their conference today.

Kulp said "high prices of agriculture, higher yields, and expectation of lower power rates have resulted in an unprecedented number of subterranean water appropriations."

"Already some basins or underground courses show indications of being over-developed and laws regulating the appropriation and administration of water from subterranean sources are badly needed," he said.

Kulp said ground water bills have been presented to nearly every Idaho legislature in the last 30 years but have been hard to pass "especially if it requires an appropriation."

He said proposed legislation is an extension of the surface water code based on priority to ground water as an initial step in the development of a ground water code in Idaho.

People of Magic Valley are looking forward to Aug. 31, first day of the 23rd annual four-day Twin Falls county fair and rodeo, which sponsors some of the greatest agricultural and western fests ever presented in this area.

With only six more days before the fair opens to Aug. 31, first day of the 23rd annual four-day Twin Falls county fairsgrounds are in full swing. Several new buildings are being erected and installations are appearing which indicate a bigger program than previous years.

Interviews with Tom Parks, fair program secretary, and Bud Purdy, representing the R. A. Richter stock and riding group, revealed new additions to the agricultural exhibits and a cast of star riders, each favored to give real entertainment and claim top money from the \$7,500 prize list covering the completed event.

A new entry in the fair will be a pured rabbit show, sponsored by the Magic Valley Rabbit association. Rabbit breeders from several states will participate. In conjunction, demonstrations of proper butchering and dressing of rabbits will be made with the meat displayed in special freezer boxes.

Entries will be made in many classes to include beef and dairy cattle, swine, sheep, poultry, farm produce, fruits and bees.

In the women's department the entrants will have a chance to demonstrate their skills in canning and cooking, to be judged on appearance and taste of the prepared food, and techniques used. Also in that division will be a complete flower show, in which several Magic Valley flower clubs will present colorful displays. In this class separate prizes will be given in group and individual exhibits.

Twenty-two complete buildings are reserved at the fairgrounds for merchant household displays, such as radios, furniture, fixtures and other items of prime interest to homemakers.

Especially appealing to the farmer's eye will be a side array of up-to-the-minute farm implements and soil-testing devices shown by dealers.

Participants in the fair will be 13 Magic Valley Grangers, FFA and 4-H club chapters from that area towns, and independent entries in all classes.

Fairground improvements, according to Parks, include the construction of two new buildings to house the fair, a complete rearing of the social hall and women's lounge building, to accommodate all-time records to be shown there.

R. A. Richter's livestock and rider

group began arriving Monday in Twin Falls. With the Grand Richter is bringing to the Twin Falls county fair some of the most outstanding novelty acts of riding in the world. These top-ranking western riders, many internationally known for star performances at Madison Square garden and the Boston garden, are expected to figure largely as winners of prizes in the record \$4,500-plus-entry-fee purse being offered in the rodeo event.

Among the feature trick-riders slated for the rodeo will be Mrs. Tad Fugate, Ft. Worth, Tex., who, although a grandmother, holds the title of the leading all-round cowgirl in the world. In spite of injuries received Aug. 7 at the Preston rodeo, she will appear in Twin Falls.

Carl Dosey, Chandler, Ariz., slated for appearance in the Twin Falls fair arena, can be remembered as first prize winner in last year's aster bull-dogging contest. Dosey, formerly was world champion barrel rider, and "shows no loss of ability," Purdy said.

Accompanying Dosey will be his wife, Berenice, feature trick artist, equally famous for performances in very large rodeos in the country.

The renowned Cabral family will appear in several acts nightly, including a unique Roman pyramid number, executed atop 13 1/2 ft. high matched planks.

Other renowned stars to appear will be Slim Pickens, Courtenova, Calif., versatile rider and rodeo clown, and Andy Womack, Phoenix, Ariz., and his chimpanzee, "Covind Hugo," who will join forces to fight a wild brahma bull.

Richter's aggregation of animals is valued at \$30,000, and includes 75 head of assorted plumage, piano, black and bay horses, especially selected for bucking ability. 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Ore Smelting Process Gains State Interest

SANDPOINT, Aug. 24 (UP)—A new ore smelting process developed over 40 years is attracting mining executives to a tiny log cabin in the mountains 10 miles north of here.

In the cabin lives Albert J. Koebel, 69-year-old prospector who once was a sailor on a four-masted schooner. He thinks his process will revolutionize the smelting industry. At least 25 British Columbia, Montana and Washington mine operators inspected his small pilot plant yesterday.

Koebel said his process consisted of blowing air concentrates into a white-hot furnace. As soon as the concentrates hit the 2,400-degree temperature they "explode" to combine with oxygen and become oxide. In this gaseous state, Koebel said, they are blown through pipes into a bagging plant where the metals are recovered. Only waste material, including iron, emerges from the furnace in a molten state.

While standard smelting plants have bagging plants to reclaim oxides, much of the metal is extracted in the molten state. Koebel said the metals never reach the molten state in his process but explode into oxidized form.

The method, Koebel said, would reduce the cost of smelting ore. Every fair-sized mining firm could operate on major smelting plants in the northwest mining area, he said. He estimated cost of a 100-ton-a-day plant at less than \$100,000.

Koebel patented his process in 1931, he said, but his patent rights expired a short time ago. If the process is adopted by the mining industry he hopes to get credit for developing it.

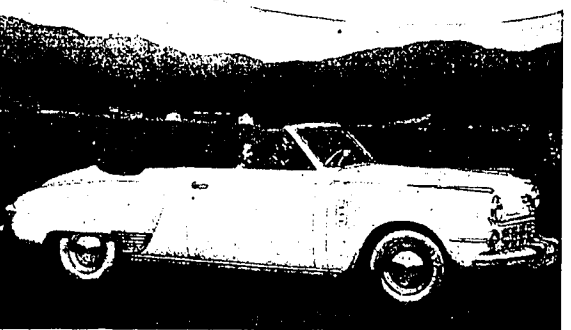

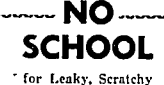

Strange Body Now in Skies Is Sagittarius

Low in the south and twinkling on that mysterious sky stream, the white milky way, there hangs a configuration of stars of only medium brightness, but conspicuous as a group, which reminds one somewhat of our familiar big dipper.

There appears in fact to be two dippers joined by their handles. The bowls hang below the handles and are of a similar shape. The right side facing each other. The left one often called the little milk dipper is easily outlined. The right dipper is more awkwardly constructed.

The stars in these figures, together with other faint ones nearby, make up the ancient constellation Sagittarius, the archer. (Pronounce the "i" and "a" as the three syllable). The western part of the group lies in a rich part of the milky way. The little milk dipper just outside this band and appears drawn back in readiness to plunge into it and reappear in full view of the rich celestial fluid.

In late August, Sagittarius is due south and is visible for an hour or more each night. The exact time depends on the nearness of the observer to a standard time meridian.

It is easily located this summer with reference to the brilliant planet Jupiter, which is now a little higher and higher than the constellation. The bright red star west of and below Jupiter is Antares in Scorpio.

In classical mythology Sagittarius was a centaur, a curious creature with the body and four legs of a horse to which was attached the head of a man. The archer dipper outlines the archer's body and part of his bow.

Our archer was said to have been Chiron, well known to the Greeks and Romans, and to the Christian youth. But his wife, Rhea, was very jealous and constantly argued with him. Thoroughly wearied of this, he finally changed himself into a centaur in order that Rhea might not recognize him and know of his whereabouts.

At last an accidental scratch of a poisoned arrow in the hands of his wife, the mighty Hercules, caused his death. He was then placed in the heavens where he has since ruled his bow at the huge scorpion west of him.

Mid-glass views of the Sagittarius bring out many rich open star clusters. The ribbon cluster, NGC 6544, appears as a hazy spot. Spectroscopists show it as a compact mass of thousands of stars.

Sagittarius, the most southerly star group among which the sun at present seems to move, will surround this luminary in December. The old sol will be directly overhead at noon along the earth's tropic of Capricorn, which, with the procession of the equinoxes, should now more properly be called the tropic of Sagittarius.

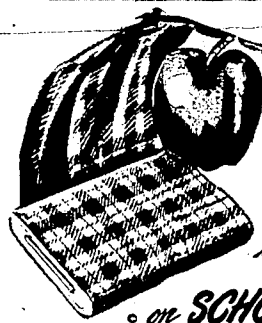

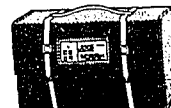
