Auto Accident Hurts Mother, Two Children

Two children and their mother were injured in a highway accident Wednesday evening, and the driver of another car killed on charges of reckless driving and leaving the scene of an accident.

Injured were Mrs. Jack Slater, Burley, formerly of Mer, who suffered shock, and her two daughters, Linda, 4, and Jacqueline, 12. Their physician said each girl suffered mild cerebral concussion and facial cuts and bruises.

Cited into court was Carroll Smith, Hansen. He pleaded innocent before Justice of the Peace Ray Potter when he was arraigned shortly after the accident. He posted \$100 bail for trial at 10 a. m. Tuesday.

The accident was investigated at 7 p. m. Wednesday a half mile west of Hansen by a deputy sheriff who said Smith was passing a third vehicle and forced Mrs. Slater to drive her car off the road to avoid a head-on collision. The Slater car snapped a fence post before it was stopped by an 8-inch pole guarding a driveway.

Damages to the Slater car included a broken windshield and a smashed front end. The right front end of the Smith car was also damaged, the deputy said.

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Severe Storm Is Headed for Florida Coast

MIAMI, Fla., Aug. 26 (UP)—A tropical hurricane with winds at about 100 miles per hour is headed for the Florida coast at the rate of 12 miles per hour.

Increases in Rise
A navy "hurricane hunter" plane over the storm area reported it was "increasing slowly in size and intensity" and that the storm was moving northwest.

Winds near the center were estimated at 100 miles per hour with hurricane force winds covering an area 50 to 60 miles outward from the "eye." Gale winds were measured within a radius of 125 miles.

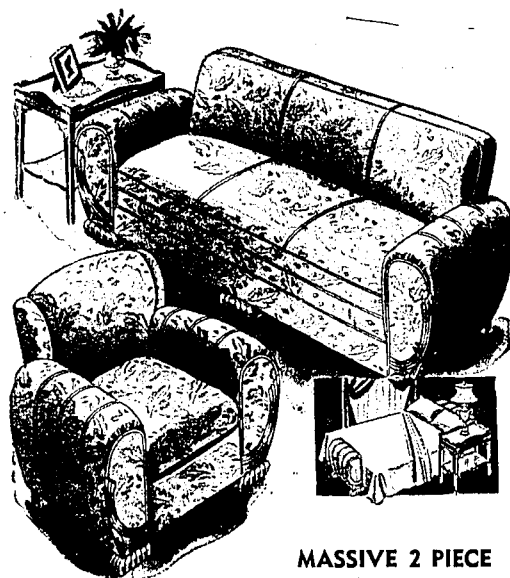

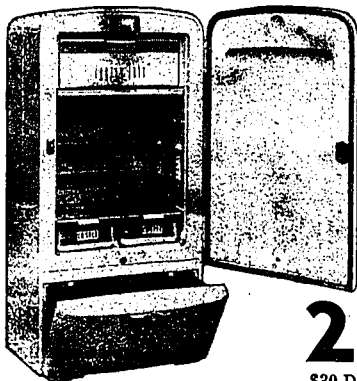

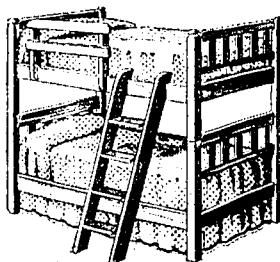

Bruneau Area Plant Planned By Californian

BRUNEAU, Aug. 25 (UP)—H. Merrill of Los Angeles started tongues wagging when he revealed recently that he was investigating the possibility of setting up an \$8,000,000 dairy plant here next spring.

Merrill's idea is to set up a 10,000 cow outfit on new land near here and fly fresh milk from the nearby Mountain Home airbase to the Los Angeles market, presently short on milk. Merrill has had experience in packaging, being an important stockholder in the Package Machinery Corporation of America, with headquarters in Springfield, Mass.

He now has gone back to California. He told the United Press in Los Angeles "the whole thing now is exploratory and in a state of flux." But that is enough to give local residents some sleepless nights.

Merrill talked with Idaho industrialist J. R. Simplot, State Reclamation Engineer Mark Kulp, Budget Director Alvin Reading, Agriculture Commissioner D. W. E. Sublett and many others while here.

Reading said Merrill hasn't revealed his California connections but claims to have the necessary big money. Reading added that in a long talk with Simplot no technical flaws could be detected in Merrill's scheme. Merrill was reported to have dozens of blueprints and other data all prepared.

16,000 Acre Area
The dairy plant would involve an area of 16,000 acres of land, with an employee force of about 225. Water would be diverted from the Snake river to sufficient height to generate electricity with which to pump necessary irrigation water onto the tract and supply power.

Merrill was quoted as saying he had investigated land in portions of Oregon and Utah for the plant site and that the Bruneau area was the most promising.

He gave as reasons for moving out of California the high union wages for milkers and excessive tax costs in the golden state.

State officials frankly are interested but skeptical. It seemed, they said, almost too good to be true.

Lester Hendrix, director of the state bureau of dairying, said for instance that Merrill's estimated costs on feeds are too low but that this probably was not a serious objection.

All were waiting eagerly to see what, if anything, develops.

Other prices included medium steers, \$22 to \$25; common steers, \$17 to \$21.50; good cows, \$21 to \$23.50; medium cows, \$19 to \$20.75; common and feeder cows, \$17 to \$20; canners and cutters, \$15.50 to \$19; good heifers, \$23 to \$26.50; feeder heifers, \$23 to \$25; common heifers, \$19 to \$22; good veal, \$25 to \$30; common veal, \$19 to \$24, and bulls, \$22 to \$28.

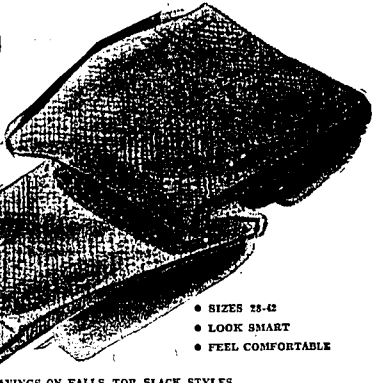

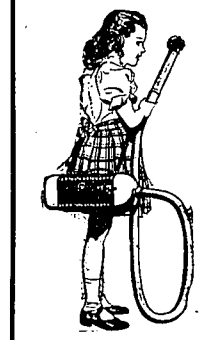

Soldiers' Idea Of Axis Sally Only a Dream

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (AP)—During the war years, allied soldiers thought they were listening to a young, beautiful woman when they tuned in an "Axis Sally" broadcast from Berlin.

Axis Sally had that kind of voice—the kind that weaves an illusion of tired and lonely men who have been months and years away from home.

I remember the first time I heard Axis Sally. Montgomery's eighth army was chasing Rommel's Afrika Korps across the western desert toward Benghazi and defeat in Tunisia. There wasn't much time to rest, but occasionally the traffic jams on the desert road would halt him along the way.

BBC Is Full
One night, halfway (hell here) past, tired British soldiers gathered around a radio after supper. A signman tuned in a BBC program. It was a boring discourse by a Heabstone Wilberington, or somebody with a like name, on the culture in Kensington. The BBC seemed to specialize in programs nobody wanted to hear.

A highlander growled, "let's hear Axis Sally." Jack spun the dial and in a few moments the soft, pleasing strains of an American melody floated across the desert.

When the music ended, a throaty woman's voice whispered words intended to stir longing and desire and homesickness in the hearts of those who listened. The voice talked of home and wives and sweetbarts—and how foolish it was to fight the Germans.

Urged Surrender
It told the men to give up the fight and go back home to their loved ones. It was a voice that tried to seduce and break the hard spirit of the desert rats so far from home.

Oh, they liked Axis Sally—those tough men of the desert. They liked her American brand of music and her warm voice that made them forget for a moment the cold winds of the desert night—just because it was feminine.

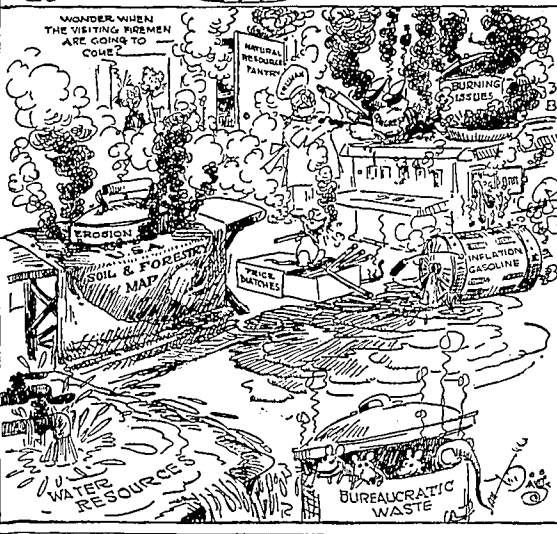
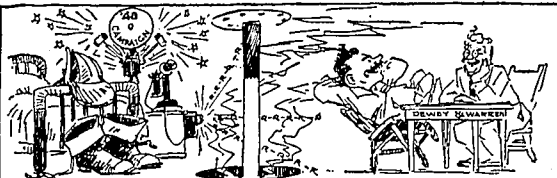

Britons Think U. S. Pressing Customs Unity

By J. M. ROBERTS, Jr.
AP Foreign Affairs Analyst
LONDON, Aug. 25.—There is a feeling in at least some British quarters that the United States is harming the European recovery program by putting on too much pressure for a general customs union.

Even if you accept the idea of customs union, which they do not in its entirety, they point out that its implementation in time to have any effect on the Marshall plan would be virtually impossible.

They cite the experience of Holland, Belgium and Luxembourg which, with all the good will in the world, have been unable to achieve full customs union. This portion of the original Benelux agreement, even at its best, was expected to take several years. It is not certain that it can be done at all.

For the infinitely more complicated economics of the larger powers, the difficulties are increased in proportion. To attempt to run along that line now the British say, would be to divert effort which is needed for the solution of more immediate problems.

They contend that it is not tariffs which are interfering with European recovery. It is shortages and the lack of a basis for international payments. They think the new machinery for handling trade balances is far more important.

To introduce a new impediment, they feel, would only jog up the works.

Nation's Polio Toll Reaches 420 for Year

By United Press
Infantile paralysis has taken more than 420 lives this year, state-by-state survey showed today. The number of cases reported throughout the nation totaled almost 9,000.

Health officials of most states reported that the incidence of the disease was "normal." But many reported more cases than last year, indicating that the dreaded cycle of poliomyelitis was on the upswing in many areas.

California Leads
California reported 91 deaths so far this year, more than any other state. Texas was second with 85 deaths and North Carolina was third with 63.

School Postponed
In many towns children still were not admitted to public places, and a few of the state's schools plan to postpone opening. About one-fourth of the North Carolina cases were of the deadly bulb type.

Wisconsin was far down the list with only 127 cases reported this year, but the city of Milwaukee was in the midst of its most deadly outbreak. The city reported 100 cases, 14 of them fatal.

Health officials said the bulb type caused most of the deaths.

Keep Children Home
Milwaukee Health Commissioner E. R. Krumholz warned parents to keep children at home. He said the highest incidence of the disease was among children under 12.

The Milwaukee health officer of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis voted to buy hospital equipment, three oxygen tanks and a respirator. It also voted to pay the costs in bringing 10 out-of-state nurses to Milwaukee and accepted the offer of the musicians union to play a benefit concert to raise funds.

Dewey Aide Sent To Help in West
SACRAMENTO, Calif., Aug. 26 (AP)—Hickman Powell, Gov. Thomas Dewey's "assistant" in the campaign organization of his running mate, Gov. Earl Warren, began his duties here today with western campaign issues today.

Powell said he would help the Warren campaign "in any way I can." He said he and Warren returned last week when the governor returns from southern California.

Warren is sending State Sen. T. X. Delap, R., Richmond, Calif., to represent him in the Dewey organization.

Salt Firm's Chief Stricken in Auto
SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 26 (AP)—The plant manager of the Royal Crystal Salt company, Keith Beller, 43, Salt Lake, was found dead in his automobile parked in front of an apartment hotel here late yesterday.

Beller died apparently as he entered his automobile after a visit to his physician, who reported his death was due to a heart ailment. Born in Kentucky, March 2, 1905, he was a 22nd degree Mason. He had been in the Salt Lake business here for 10 years.

Polio Strikes Heir to FDR In California

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 26 (AP)—Curtis (Buzzy) Dall Boettiger, 18, was treated today at general hospital for what was described as a mild case of poliomyelitis, the same disease that crippled his grandfather, the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The youth, who as a child lived in the White House with his sister (Anna (Stella) Dall, and mother, Mrs. Anna Roosevelt Boettiger, was taken ill during the week-end.

He was taken to general hospital last night after his personal physician, Dr. Robert Meigs, diagnosed the ailment as a mild case of infantile paralysis, which reached mild epidemic proportions in southern California last month.

Young Boettiger, who has been working recently as an assistant producer on the "Bride and Groom" radio show, was living with his employer, John Masterson, at whose house his mother also was visiting.

He was expected to be transferred today to another hospital, possibly the naval hospital at Corona, Calif. His mother is recovering.

"He didn't seem very sick, but the doctor advised us to take every precaution," Mrs. Boettiger said. Young Boettiger is the son of New York Stock Broker Curtis B. Dall but took the name of his step-father, John Boettiger, when his mother remarried.

His condition was described as "not serious" by general hospital doctors, who confirmed the diagnosis of infantile paralysis.

Boettiger is one of nearly 200 patients in the poliomyelitis ward of the county hospital, center for treatment of the epidemic in this area.

Blast of Package On Train Begins Passenger Panic
NEW YORK, Aug. 26 (AP)—Scores of subway riders were thrown into near panic today when a mysterious package, carried by an unidentified man, exploded and burst into flames in a Brooklyn train.

Police theorized that the paper-wrapped package may have contained either a bomb or explosive. When the train stopped at the next station, the man who carried the package disappeared.

Three other tracts are under consideration at sites which the department is not yet ready to disclose. Settlers are planned in groups of 20 or more families each.

Up to 2,000,000 acres—only a small fraction of the land available in Alaska—is contemplated for ultimate withdrawal from the public domain and allotment in settlement tracts, Warne told reporters.

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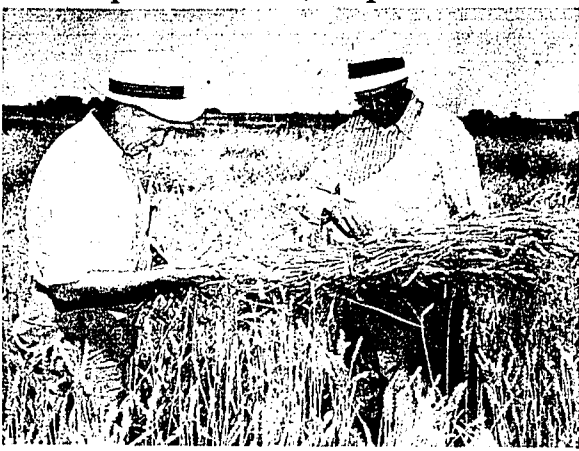

University Studying Samples Of Local Experimental Grain

Samples of 23 varieties of grain recently harvested on an experimental plot near here have been sent to the University of Idaho for a study of yields and resistance to weed sprays. Twelve samples were taken from each row of the grain. The grain was grown on the C. S. Maxwell farm east of Twin Falls by Ralph Knight, Aberdeen experiment station superintendent, and Warren Dalgh, Twin Falls county agent.

On May 20 it was sprayed for insect control with DDT. The experiment was also in charge of the harvesting. Dalgh said the purpose of the experiment was to test out different varieties of wheat, barley and oats. The weed spraying experiment was conducted along with the variety trials to determine if weed sprays damage grain. Weeds present at the time of the spraying were small annuals.

Used in the experiments was 2.4-D. It was sprayed on each type of grain at three different rates, three pounds, one pound and 0.3 pound of pure acid per acre. The three-pound application reduced the

Nation Struck By Heat Blast In East Area

CHICAGO, Aug. 26 (AP)—Most of the nation sweated again today in the heat wave which has been sweeping across the country. There appeared little hope of relief from the hot blasts until the weekend.

The heat belt extended from the Dakotas to the New England states, as the oppressive heat moved into the eastern seaboard yesterday. The nation's weather map showed readings of 90 and above in all parts of the country except the mountains and Pacific coast states. New high marks for the date were set in many cities. Thousands of workers in Detroit, Toledo and other cities were because of the oppressive heat.

Corn Crop Safe
Federal weather bureau officials said the nation's bumper corn crop is holding up well under the heat. It is not in danger of being scorched. Rain is needed in some sections of the corn belt but forecasters said none was in sight immediately.

The north Atlantic and New England states got some of the high temperatures yesterday. Hartford, Conn., sized as the mercury soared to 105. In Huntington, W. Va., thermometers registered an even 100, the same hot mark reported at Alpen, Mich.

Breaks Record
New York and Boston got a scorching 98 reading while Philadelphia felt no cooler with a mark of 95. Chicago's 95 was the hottest Aug. 25 in the weather bureau's history and the fourth consecutive day of 90 or above.

Analyst Finds Consol Break Was Expected

The American-Soviet consular clash is the sharp, quick shower which helps clear the air, rather than the cloudburst which does heavy damage.

When Washington several days ago asked Moscow to recall Soviet Consul General Jacob Lomakin, for "highly improper" activities in the case of the three refugee soviet school-teachers in New York, it was a foregone conclusion that the Muscovites would dramatize the situation to save face. This it occasioned no surprise to see them close not only their big New York consulate but their San Francisco headquarters as well. It was equally certain they would retaliate by closing America's lone consulate in Russia—that at Vladivostok.

Actually neither country will suffer materially through the transaction. Consulates deal mainly with trade, and there has been a heavy drop in Russo-American business since U. S. export controls were imposed last March. So far as concerns Uncle Sam's consulate in Vladivostok, it was so hamstrung by the Reds that it didn't amount to much. They even threw brilliant floodlights on the building to make sure that censors at night could be identified.

The break affects the field of commerce rather than diplomacy. Both countries continue to maintain their embassies so that affairs of state will be transacted as heretofore. As a matter of fact the embassies also can handle business matters, and moreover Moscow still has in New York a branch of its big trading concern—Amtorg.

Diplomatic quarters in Washington don't expect the consular imbroglio to have much effect on other relations between Moscow and the U. S. A. There is no sign at this writing that there will be a suspension of the negotiations among the big four looking to a solution of the German issue.

Mrs. Lucy Bell Smith, wife of a furniture factory worker, succumbed about 16 hours after a 6½-pound son was born under a local anesthetic. Grace hospital physicians performed a Caesarian section as Mrs. Smith lay in an innovative iron lung. As soon as the normal child was born, doctors snapped on the bellows motors and shut the doors as the iron lung resumed pumping.

Mrs. Smith was admitted to the hospital Tuesday night suffering from pneumonia. It was discovered then that a virulent type of infantile paralysis had also set in.

EastMarkets Slash Prices To Sell Meat

Some big meat markets in the east slashed prices today in an effort to move stockpiles of meat through the coolers.

Market analysts said the heat wave and consumer resistance had reduced demand so that meat supplies were beginning to pile up in warehouses.

Steak Price Cut
At Pittsburgh, one market cut prices on steaks to 60 cents a pound, lamb chops to 55 and closed bacon to 55.

Another reduced hamburger from 54 to 39 cents. It advertised a "famous name brand" bacon for 35 cents or three pounds for \$1.

However, price cuttings were not general. Small stores held their prices steady rather than take a loss to keep stocks moving.

At Washington, meanwhile, it was predicted that the government would have to underwrite a support program of more than \$2,000,000,000 to hold farm prices at high levels this year.

Actually, the Fraction
The government will spend only a fraction of the total guarantee but it could be obligated for a considerable amount if a major farm slump developed.

Market analysts at Chicago deduced, however, that the government price support program caused the inflation in food prices. They pointed out, for example, that the support price on hogs is only about \$16.85 and that hogs are selling between \$27 and \$30.50 a hundred-weight.

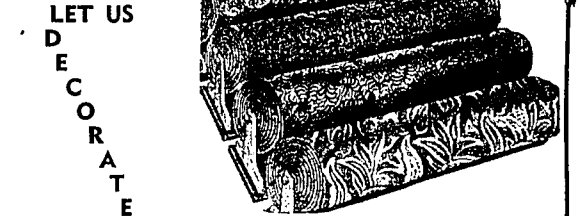

ADA Reveals Board Parley On Week-end

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—The Americans for Democratic Action (ADA) announced yesterday it will hold an emergency meeting next week in Chicago Sunday to decide its role in the 1948 campaign.

ADA leaders are expected to discuss whether they will endorse President Truman—or confine their support through local chapters, to congressional candidates they regard as "liberal" and as meeting other ADA requirements. The group opposed Mr. Truman's nomination at Philadelphia.

Withholds Prediction
Leon Henderson, former OPA chief, is national chairman of the ADA. He would not predict beforehand what action the board would take, but called attention that the ADA has a "big constituency from labor unions."

"I don't know what they are going to do, you probably know what we will do," he said.

In this connection, the American Federation of Labor reaffirmed its traditional policy of neutrality in presidential races, but formed a committee to work for the election of the Truman-Barkley ticket.

Precedes CIO Meeting
The ADA Chicago meeting will precede by one day at meeting here Monday of the CIO 51-member executive board to consider a presidential endorsement. CIO Secretary James B. Carey is a member of the ADA board.

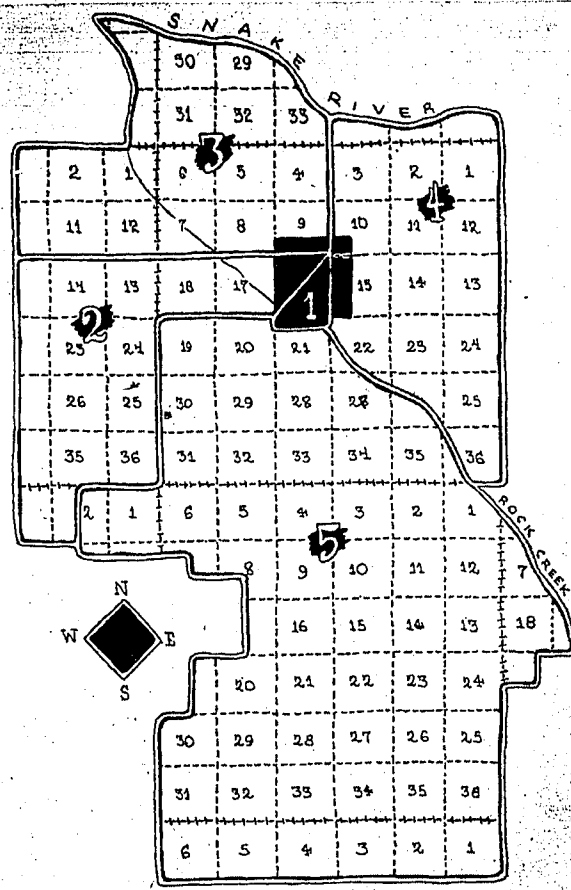
CIO national officers at a meeting here last week all but came out for Mr. Truman. By 8 to 1, they approved a statement assailing what they called "do nothing" Republicans and "bigoted" Democrats in the 80th congress, and denouncing Henry Wallace's Progressive party. They sought Eisenhower.

The ADA fought at Philadelphia for the nomination of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower or Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas for the Democratic presidential nomination.

President Truman continued today to go over notes in preparation for opening his campaign labor day in Michigan. He was aboard the yacht Williamsburg off Yorktown, Va.

His Republican opponent, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, interrupted his Pawling, N. Y., campaign planning to take his two sons to a baseball game in New York.

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Penn Road to Build Rolling Luxury Cars

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 26 (AP)—The Pennsylvania railroad announced yesterday it is launching a \$25,000,000 rolling program, the largest in its history. Martin W. Clement, president of the railroad, said the program is to build rolling luxury liners of the trains of the future. Under the plan, every PRR through passenger train will have supervised children's playrooms, movie refreshment lounges, temperature controls and other super-modern conveniences. Clement said the building program will cost more than the U. S. government paid for such gigantic public works as Boulder dam or the Alaskan highway. An important factor in overnight coach travel. 5. Sleepers that are all-room cars with "no movie operation berths" — extra-wide panorama windows — included wardrobes and ample luggage space. 6. Widespread use of private rooms for daytime travel on short trips. Clement said PRR has arranged purchase of 366 new Diesel electric locomotives and is already building steam locomotives on all its through passenger trains from New York to the west and south.

New Engines Set for Some 1949 Designs

By DAVID J. WILKIE AP Automotive Editor DETROIT, Aug. 26 (AP)—A lot of new power plants will be introduced with the 1949 model automobiles due late this year and early in January. Most of them will be of higher horsepower rating than the present compression ratio, but the American motorist still will have to wait for the vastly improved gasoline mileage he has been expecting over the last decade or more. Cutting the best prospect for increased mileage right now is the new Kettering engine, designed by Charles F. Kettering, General Motors engineering consultant. Modifications of it are scheduled to appear in several of the forthcoming 1949 model GM cars, especially Oldsmobile and Cadillac. In announcing the result of tests with the new engine last year ago, Kettering said it would cut the motorist's annual fuel bill by one third. He had referred to a power plant with a 125-to-1 compression ratio. The high quality fuel required for such an engine is not commonly available now and cannot be made so without a huge outlay by the petroleum industry. These power plants with 12-to-1 compression ratios are more likely for 1949 model cars. It has been demonstrated, these engines will perform satisfactorily on presently available premium gasoline and yield slightly greater mileage than the time when the right kind of gasoline will be everywhere available for the 12-to-1 ratio engines still is several years away.

Sawdust Used As Ration for Oregon Cattle

SALEM, Ore. (AP)—Dairymen soon will be supplementing the diet of their herds with a dash of two Douglas fir sawdusts if experiments with sugar molasses at Oregon state college are successful.

Molasses made from Douglas fir wood waste and sawdust is being fed dairy cattle and swine in a long-range study of food value, use and cost.

The sweet stuff can be manufactured at the Springfield, Ore. alcohol plant. The waste cellulose has been converted into sugar successfully.

No ill effects have been reported by the farmers who feed their herds with the difference in effects. They saw the difference between sugar and sawdust made from sorghum can hardly be told.

Wood molasses to see how it compares with the native wood pulp value of wood molasses. The pigs got just as fat on the wood product as on the other.

Experiments also are being made to determine the value of brewer's yeast as a supplement in a wood molasses ration. Use of molasses to improve the palatability of low quality hay also is being studied.

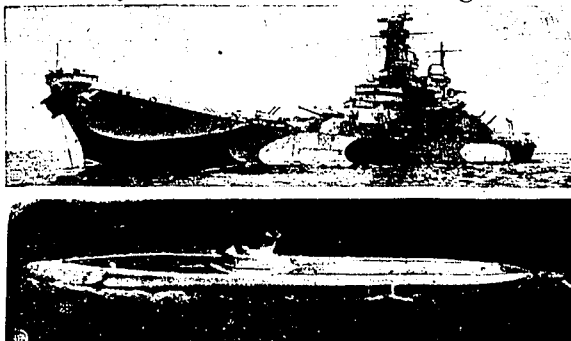

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Navy Abandons Famed Battlewagon

Navy Retires Battlewagons to Put Stress on Carriers, Subs

By DOUGLAS LARSEN NEA Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON (NEA)—The U.S. navy plans to put its last two giant battlewagons—the USS Iowa and the USS Missouri—out of commission.

This marks the end of an era in naval history. The retired sea giants will be added to the "mothball fleet" and will be used as a reserve force in case of anti-submarine warfare.

The era ended by this move is the one during which naval experts believed that having the most of the biggest, most heavily armed ships gave a nation a measure of the sea.

This theory first began to be seriously challenged soon after World War I. Advocates of more air power, led by Billy Mitchell, began calling the battleship an obsolete weapon.

The chief use of the battleship during World War II was in leading amphibious invasions. It was thought to come soon after such an operation, undoubtedly some of the 15 battleships in mothballs would be needed for service again.

All other nations interested in maintaining sea power followed the same trend. Argentina, Brazil, Chile, France, Russia and England still have battleships in service. But all but one of Russia's and two of the British are over age, and no new ones are being built, except possibly in Russia.

The end of the battleship class makes the cruiser-type ship the heaviest craft the navy will have afloat. The cruiser is smaller but is much faster, much more maneuverable and is more adaptable to anti-submarine warfare than the battleship.

The "Old Mo," nickname for the Missouri, is 887 feet long and displaces 45,000 tons. The navy's next, the Spanish in 1898 in the harbor at Havana, Cuba, precipitated the Spanish-American war and inspired the slogan "Remember the Maine." It was built as a heavy cruiser type but commissioned a battleship in 1896. The USS Indiana was the first ship built and commissioned as a battleship.

Most old navy men agree that the USS Pennsylvania was probably the most famous battleship the navy ever had. She was called the grand old lady of the fleet and probably housed more gold braid in her time than any other ship. From 1918 when she was commissioned until the start of World War II the ship served as the U. S. navy's only flagship.

At Pearl Harbor she was one of the few ships to survive the surprise bombings with only slight damage. She was destroyed at Bikini during the atomic bomb tests. The navy says she probably fired more ammunition than any other ship in history. That included constant service in the Pacific campaign.

The Missouri was launched in 1944, saw extensive service during the Pacific fighting and became most famous as the ship on which the Japanese surrender was signed.

The Iowa is the largest man-of-war ever launched. She was commissioned in 1943, was assigned to the "Fiji fleet" in which she neutralized the threat of German warships which was reported posed in the Norwegian waters. She carried the late Franklin D. Roosevelt across the Atlantic on the first leg of his trip to the historic Tehran conference.

Berlin Likely to Share in Setting Up New Regime

FRANKFURT, Germany, Aug. 26 (AP)—Retarded Berlin may be represented in west Germany's new government-in-the-making, U. S. military government sources said yesterday.

Proposals to give the former reich capital 30 out of some 400 votes in the future parliament in Frankfurt have been drafted by a committee on German experts, the Germans said.

The experts represent 11 individual states of the three western zones. They met for two weeks at Lake Conen, near Munich, and completed last night a 300-page recommended draft of a constitution for the government of the U. S., British and French zones.

This draft probably will be offered to western Germany's "constitutional assembly" when it meets in Bonn Sept. 1 to work out the shape of the new government, which is violently opposed by the Russians.

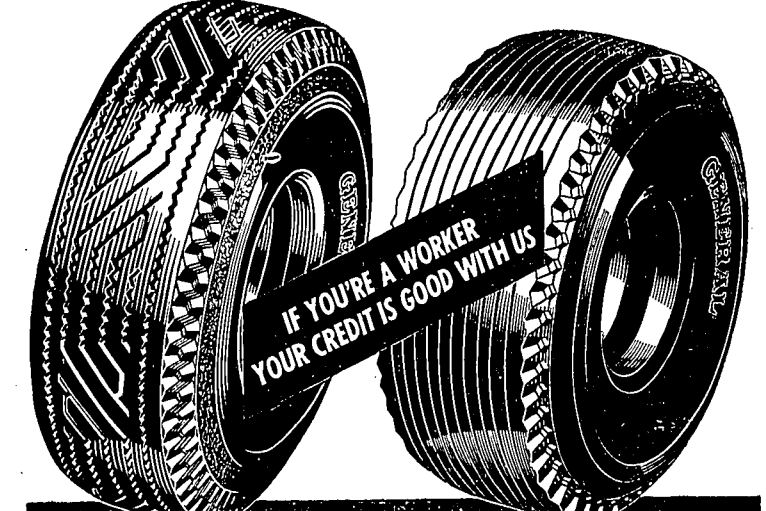
