Spy Investigators Say White House Failed to Concur

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28 (AP)—Congressional spy investigators today accused the White House tonight of refusing to help "protect the national security."

In a report on "communist espionage in the United States government," the house un-American activities committee said:

1. Its inquiry has been hampered by every turn by White House "constructive" tactics and refusal to supply information.

2. The "failure" of Attorney General Clark to enforce laws against spying "as vigorously as he should" is largely responsible for "the growth and power of the communist conspiracy" in America.

3. Laws must be passed to crack down on spying and communist activities.

No Specific Charges

4. It is making no "specific charges of perjury" at this time.

5. In the sensational controversy between Alger Hiss and Whitaker Chambers, it believes the burden of proof "has definitely shifted from Chambers to Hiss."

Yugoslavs on Offense With News Bureau

BELOGRADE, Aug. 28 (AP)—Yugoslavia has gone over to the offensive in her war of words with the communists. It seemed clear today that Marshal Tito and his aides never again could be admitted back into the communist circle of eastern Europe.

Twice this week the Yugoslavs dropped their lead in the Moscow-directed campaign. Their charges were that they were being misled and deceived that these inspired by the communists against Yugoslavia.

The latest blow was aimed at Hungary yesterday. "Responsible" state officials of Hungary have been pursuing a campaign against Yugoslavia and the Yugoslav people which is in full contradiction of the agreement on friendship, cooperation and mutual aid between Yugoslavia and Hungary.

Two days before, the Yugoslavs handed Premier Matyas Rakosi a note charging that communists were splitting the world communist front by seeking the annihilation of the whole communist cause by forcing Yugoslavia out of her strategically important place in the Balkans.

The week the Yugoslavs clashed with another communist country, Czechoslovakia. The Czechs charged Yugoslavia with violating a Soviet agreement. The Yugoslavs simply denied this categorically, but diplomats here view the clash as significant.

New Flying Boat Achieves Record In Distance Trial

CHICAGO, Aug. 28 (AP)—The U. S. Navy's Aquiline Mars flashed over land, water and mountains today to set a new 4,746-mile distance record for flying boats.

The non-stop trip took the colossal craft from Honolulu to Los Angeles, Calif., and Chicago in 24 hours and 20 minutes.

The crowd gaped at the largest flying boat in regular operation. They saw a monstrous aircraft that weighs 82½ tons, has a 120-foot length and a wingspread of 200 feet.

"It was a very satisfactory and almost routine flight," said Capt. James C. Lane of Mather, Minn., squadron commander. "We got a big kick out of taking a flying boat on a long distance flight."

The going was easy all the way. The big ship left Honolulu at 11:15 a. m. EST (one Friday) and reached San Francisco 38 minutes ahead of schedule.

The Greek people and thousands of children have been taken by communist-led guerrillas across the northern boundaries of Greece.

Urgent Appeal To Registered Nurses Given

An urgent appeal for registered nurses free to go to California was made Saturday by Edna Bailey, executive secretary of the American Red Cross chapter here. The appeal is part of a nationwide crusade of nurses to help victims in the Los Angeles area.

Mrs. Bailey stated there is a desperate need for registered nurses to take care of the increasing number of polio cases there. Her office handles all arrangements for transportation by air.

Information Sought
Nurses interested in serving there, or those knowing of nurses who might be available, are asked to contact the Red Cross office in the public library, either in person or by telephone or telegraph. The telephone number is 101. The office is open weekdays from 10 a.m. to noon and from 1 to 5 p.m.

The nurses will be paid \$250 per month plus all maintenance. Mrs. Bailey said. In addition, their travel expenses are paid both coming and going, and while traveling they will receive \$10 per day plus taxi fare, tips and other expenses.

30-Day Duty
She explained the duty is paid by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. The traveling expenses are advanced by the Red Cross which is later reimbursed by the foundation.

The Red Cross secretary stressed that nurses who go should be willing to sign up for the duration of the emergency or for at least 30 days. She said the desperate need for nurses has been brought about both by increased polio cases and increased need for nursing attention.

Some 30 nurses were recently flown from Detroit to California, she said. A Twin Falls nurse, Fern Potter, was flown there last week through arrangements made by the Red Cross.

She had registered as being available the next day Mrs. Bailey received a telegram calling for nurses. At 3 p.m. she located the nurse, who, after packing, and less than two hours later she was on her way to the stricken area.

Warm, Humid Period Looms On Week-End

CHICAGO, Aug. 28 (AP)—Continued warm and humid Sunday; very little relief Monday.

Federal forecasters could give no better news than that today as deaths from the summer's longest heat spell rose to 123 in the eastern half of the nation.

A cool air mass which kept Canadian border temperatures in the 50's showed no indication of moving southward toward the heat belt extending from the Mississippi river to the Atlantic coast.

Some Prostrations

The majority of deaths attributed to the hot spell resulted from heat prostrations. The remaining victims drowned as scorching temperatures sent crowds to the beaches for relief.

A few widely scattered thunderstorms failed to break the heat.

Baltimore reported a reading of 101 at Quindlen field, New York, had 92 Philadelphia at Washington 93 and Chicago 89.

West Coast Cooler

Most comfortable spots in the nation were the west coast, which had temperatures in the 60's, and the extreme northwest portion of Minnesota and North Dakota where readings were in the lower 70's.

In contrast to the lack of moving air in the heat belt, hurricanes hovered 600 miles off the southeast coast and prompted an alert in the Georgia-Florida coastal areas.

Winds up to 125 miles an hour spun around the storm center.

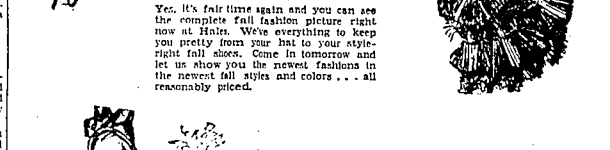

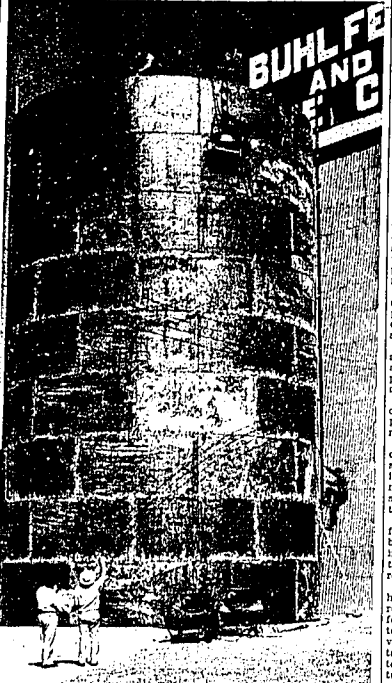

'Normal' Ways of Construction Too Humdrum for Local Firm

By CHARLES LAMB
Most contractors say the way to building anything is to start at the bottom and work up.
That seems particularly true of grain elevators.
However, one builder says that old maxim isn't so. He actually starts with, not at, the top and proceeds from there.

This new and unconventional method of building has been proved to offer advantages of safety, simplicity and economy in grain elevators, according to the engineering department of Kregling's hardware. This of the Twin Falls firm's workers built one 24,000-bushel capacity tank in Buhl recently sounded like a story of "fabrication" until the structure was explained by Kregling's production manager, E. C. Cuny.
The radical construction, Cuny explained, makes use of the roof primarily as a circular pattern to determine the shape of the round structure.

After the first square steel plates are welded into place, they become a platform for the workers. The platform is then jacked up with steel cables and pulleys.
Finally, when the necessary rows of walpiates have been put on, the platform is assembled on the conical-shaped steel plates, the outer and inner segments being overlapped to make a smaller circle than that described in the last stage of construction.

Standing on this improved platform, the workers weld together the bottom row of 5 by 10 foot 3/16 inch plates, which are shaped on the job to fit the contour of the roof-pattern.

Ready for the second row, four hydraulic jacks are used to lift the roof-pattern to the second five-foot level. The jacks are attached to teardrop-shaped iron bolts to vertical angle-iron rods set in the tank's concrete foundation and extending up the height of the structure when complete. After being raised, the roof is held in its temporary position by pins placed in circles located every few inches in the angle-iron rods.
The final phase of roof installation, most difficult in ordinary building operations, is the easiest of building operations, is a closing meeting, according to Cuny. The circular action is merely jacked up beyond the top row of walpiates and its outside overlapping segments are pulled out the proper distance to form overlapping ribs. These segments are then welded solidly together, and the roof trusses are bolted to the circular ribs.

Europe Unity Receives Lift By U. S. Okay

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28 (AP)—The United States gave a new boost to western European unity Friday, it came through with a strong endorsement of France's proposal to go ahead now with actual creation of a continental parliament.

With Secretary Marshall's sanction, the state department announced the administration's backing for such an assembly, just as it actively supported the newly formed five power Brussels alliance.

Delegated Body
To be composed presumably of delegates of the 16 countries taking part in the American-financed European recovery enterprise, the assembly proposal is taking shape as a political counterpart of the Marshall plan.

Under the French proposal, the assembly at the outset would have only advisory powers. It would represent the long step toward the unity which President Truman and congress have urged. Unless Moscow and the Soviet bloc reverse their enmity to the Marshall plan and joined in it, it would help solidify western Europe against the communist tide.

France Wants Parley
France wants a meeting by November of representatives of the five nations which signed the 50-year Brussels alliance—Britain, France, Belgium, The Netherlands, and Luxembourg—to lay the groundwork for a larger grouping. Britain thus far has held back, saying the dominions must be consulted.

But the state department, in a pointed statement, made plain this government favors without delay a "United States of Europe" or any other grouping of the Democratic states which promises to further the idea of unity. There was no mention of the United Nations but officials have noted that the U. N. charter provides for regional alliances.

Sympathetic
Press officer Michael J. McDermott said in response to a news conference question as the American attitude to the French proposal, that the U. S. is "very sympathetic." The idea of a European parliament has taken strong root especially since World War II. A move to create a "United States of Europe" led by Count Coudenhove-Kalergi has won the endorsement of individual government leaders. But France took the lead as the first government to propose immediate steps for an advisory assembly.

Can his eyes really be an academy Because there are pupils there? Can the crook of his elbow be sent to jail? Where's the shade for the palm of his hand? How does he sharpen his shoulder blades? I'm hanged if I can understand.

Commercial mint culture was introduced into the U. S. more than 100 years ago, according to a government bulletin. It remained for Alfred Peters, manager of the Twin Falls Canal company and well known Magic Valley farmer, to be among the first to "experiment" with it in this area. Mr. Peters got the idea of trying mint-growing here after he saw fields in Washington several summers ago.

"I got five tons of roots," he told us. "I had them dug in the early morning and trucked straight through. This amount planted one and-fourth acres, which were put in rows about like onions." Mr. Peters says the mint is harvested in late summer or early fall and should grow about as high as a crop of hay. "Mint keeps growing thicker instead of thinning out," he added, "and it takes more water than average crops. When ready, it cut like hay and then distilled as one distills dill." Mr. E. S. Koke, dill grower on the Peters' mint crop and after the stuff is distilled it will be put in jugs and sold.

There is a heavy demand for this essence as it is used in gum and various drugs.

"If this attempt at mint growing is a success, we expect to go into it more extensively," Mr. Peters says. "The plant is hardy and nothing much seems to hurt it. I hear someone at Castleford also is experimenting with it. Maybe we have a new industry in Idaho."
