East-West Problems Topic As Reich Governors Meet; End for Blockade Rumored

BERLIN, Aug. 31 (AP)—Russian and western military governors of Germany met for an hour today to discuss east-west problems in blockaded Berlin. "We will meet again," said Gen. Sir Brian Robertson of Britain, "the date, however, still is not fixed."



Key Witness

It was the first top level meeting in Berlin in five months and resulted in diplomatic discussions in the Kremlin for the past month. Another meeting was held in Gen. Lucius D. Clay, U. S. military governor, said "there will be a top level meeting tomorrow."

Robertson said there will be no official statement today. American officials said final settlement of the four powers will continue to confer on technical financial problems.

Debate Currency The state department in Washington said the general news discussion measures to lift the blockade and to solve the dispute over rivaling the western powers so heavily since at least food supplies to the western sectors of Berlin have had to be flown in.

Authorized sources here said the currency matter would top items discussed by the military governors during the meeting in Berlin. Only when this is worked out will any discussion of technical problems of lifting the blockade take place.

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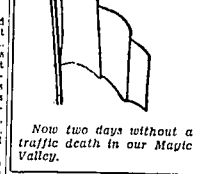

Analyst Lauds U. S. Okay of Merger Plans

Washington's approval of the movement headed by France to create an all western European parliament with advisory powers may well give the added impetus to bring to a head this historic project to fulfillment.

Establishment of such a parliament might be a decisive stride towards creation of a United States of Europe for at least of western Europe's eastern European nations. However, apart from such a long-range development, an advisory parliament would be an invaluable aid to the Marshall plan.

Needs Encouragement

This encouragement from a U. S. state department comes at a moment when France needs it. Britain has indicated she may not want to take part now, and of course her participation is vital.

Only last Wednesday Winston Churchill released a recent exchange of letters in which he proposed to Prime Minister Attlee the creation of a European assembly.

Attlee in "Sympathy"

Attlee replied that he was in sympathy with the basic idea, but thought this meant the "right" time for the government to take this major initiative, when their hands are not already burdened with urgent and difficult problems.

Whether there is any relation between Attlee's statement and the subsequent announcement by Washington is a matter of speculation. However, it is clear that the United States wants to get along with a project over which England is hesitating. As the state department said, "the government strongly favors the progressively closer integration of the free nations of western Europe."

Four Victims Of Air Crash Are Returned

SPOKANE, Aug. 31 (AP)—The remains of four Caldwell residents killed last April in an airplane crash on rugged Elk summit 40 miles northwest of here were brought here last night for removal to Caldwell.

The crash victims were identified as Mayor and Mrs. R. H. McNeill and Mr. and Mrs. Don Bridgely. They crashed into the 7,000-foot peak in Idaho's primitive area as they were returning home from the Republican delegate convention in Coeur d'Alene in a rented Stinson plane.

Remains identified Before the rescue party reached here last night Elmo Heter, state conservation officer, was telephoned from south fork Gator station that the remains had been identified by members of the party who had known the victims.

McNeill, the pilot, had taken off from Coeur d'Alene in murky weather and had apparently struck the ridge, approximately 125 air-line miles north of Boise, while flying in clouds or fog.

Ignition Turned Off Chet Moulton, state aeronautics director, said the ignition switch was in the off position when the wreckage was raised. He adds that unless it had twisted to that position by the impact McNeill must have turned the engine off and turned it off to avoid fire.

The four occupants were still strapped to their seats and probably died instantly, Moulton said. One of the women's wrist watches had stopped at 11:45, indicating the crash may have occurred three hours after takeoff at Coeur d'Alene, or about the time they were running low on fuel.

Pack Into Area The search party had to go the long seven miles up the ridge with horses.

Disappearance of the plane had caused much concern in Caldwell, Idaho history. But the wreckage was found by accident. Don Pezza, Johnson Army flying service pilot, and Heter sighted the wreckage a week ago while making a heavy lift in preparation for the state fish and game department. Bad weather delayed them from returning to verify the discovery.

Expert Shows Safe Driving Saves Time

Following the demonstration, Mayor H. G. Lauterbach, Police Chief Howard Gillette and Safety Commissioner E. E. Nitschke, who made up the driving jury, said they were impressed by the results.

Also accompanying the driver were Mayor H. G. Lauterbach, E. E. Nitschke and a reporter who recorded the violations.

Following the demonstration, Chief Gillette tallied 54 traffic offenses committed by drivers during the "illegal" run, estimating the amount of fine for each. The chief estimated \$493 in traffic fines was the lowest figure a police judge would have assessed the driver if he been brought to court.

The violations were sponsored by the Twin Falls Jayce's in the interest of safety.

Following the exhibition, Jayce mentioned a safety campaign truck and spoke to a crowd on the benefits of sensible driving. He predicted that 10,000 lives would be lost in traffic accidents in the U. S. this year. "Much of this tragedy could be avoided," he pointed, "if Americans would confine speed to the race tracks, and drive moderately while on the highways."

The driver was introduced by Safety Commissioner Nitschke, who announced the results of the safety experiment. He gave a talk emphasizing the necessity of closer observation of traffic regulations in Twin Falls and throughout Idaho.

Rankovic, who made up the jury, mentioned the occurrence of the city's first traffic fatality since April, 1946, and expressed the hope that the demonstration would cooperate in preventing more deaths.

Expert Driver Saves Time by Observing Traffic Rules Here

"Safe" driving saved two and one-half seconds Monday, when Cliff Jayce, driving a 1948 model 12-cylinder car, obeyed all traffic rules in a 50-mile drive around the perimeter of the Legion hall where he gave a public lecture on safety and showed the "good" and "bad" driving through downtown traffic in Twin Falls.

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When questioned regarding future plans, Jayce affirmed reports that he intended driving in the economy Indianapolis speedway race. Although he has never finished first, he is widely known for his colorful record on the "hot" track. He has smashed up 400 cars during his career and turned over 47 times.

Cheating death on many occasions on the speedway, Jayce considers racing less hazardous than ordinary driving in traffic. "They drivers know what they are doing, and when to expect from fellow drivers," he said. "But few drivers encountered on the highway observe all the rules, most seldom of all, hand signals."

Failure to obey these laws, according to Jayce, results in a loss of money through fines, and damage, actual time loss, and numerous deaths and injuries in the country each year. He recommended a speed of 50 miles per hour as the maximum for all highways.

Cliff Simmons, president of the Twin Falls Junior Chamber of Commerce, and Jack Therkildsen, safety committee chairman, also expressed gratitude for interest and cooperation shown in the program by the police department. Mayor H. G. Lauterbach, Commissioner Nitschke, and the public.

Insects' Toll Reaches New High in U. S.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31 (AP)—Insect damage to American crops has reached an all-time peak of \$400,000,000 a year—a 40 per cent better-than-ever bug killers are available.

This report to the American Chemical Society by Dr. H. L. Haller and Ruth L. Busbey of the agriculture department said that while farmers have the necessary ammunition to fight the pests, they are not using the spray gun often enough.

Address Annual Meet Haller and Mrs. Busbey addressed the 114th national meeting of the society.

In their prepared paper, they said great progress had been made in recent years in the development of synthetic (man-made) compounds which are highly effective against both agricultural and disease-bearing insects.

Among them are DDT, benzene hexachloride, chlordane and chlorinated camphene.

Other more economical synthetic compounds had allowed more economic use of the important natural insecticides such as pyrethrin—which are derived from a plant of the chrysanthemum family. The pyrethrin has been used in the past, but it has been so expensive that it has not been imported and they've had to be made here.

Asia Uprising Likely Climax To Lenin View

By J. M. ROBERTS, Jr.
AP Foreign Affairs Analyst
LONDON — Developments in southeast Asia have given rise to the question of whether the fighting war which Lenin envisioned as the inevitable climax of communist world revolution may not have begun already.

The British are convinced that they have French, Dutch, American and, to some degree, the Dutch, are fighting a concerted communist military effort in Malaya, Indo-China, Siam, Burma and Indonesia.

This actual insurrection, rather than the infiltration tactics used in Europe, seems to be the weapon adopted by something which looks like a far eastern confederate.

British Daily Knowledge
British officials say they do not know whether this organization was formed at a meeting in Calcutta last year, or whether it was formed previously, perhaps at a conference in Manchuria under Moscow auspices.

But the intelligence reports indicate clearly that all the disorder throughout southeast Asia is being carried out under a united communist plan.

Reserved for Allah
Victor Purcell, one of Britain's chief experts on the area, says that "to the observer at a distance, the scale and intensity of the present movement suggest that the communist direction (during the war) were not wanting their forces against the Japanese, but reserving them for use against their then allies."

Britain expects to clean up the military portion of her troubles in Malaya in October. New troops are going out for an operation after the monsoon which will be comparable to the recent campaigns of the British army against the guerrillas there. The odds will be about 200 to 1,000 in Britain's favor then.

Guides Vie to 'Impress' Henry On Wonder of Their Building

AGRA, India—Our second day in Agra we really went sightseeing. Our two Sikhs—our driver and Joe Board—and Turban whom he brought along for company—saw to it that we had them pick us up at Laura's hotel at 9 in the morning.

At 10 they were peering up and down in front of our ground floor rooms admiring the Taj Mahal. One another a mile a minute to be sure that they would wake up and get to sight-seeing. Both of them had been to Agra before, and they were determined not to miss a sight.

With a spear that reacted to his call he explained to us that the tomb of Etmad-Ud-Daula was finished three years before the Taj even started, and that 99 per cent of the Taj is just a blown-up copy of Etmad. To be truthful, the guide has something there. Some of the mosaic work is finer than that of the more celebrated tomb, and the marble pavilion top is lovelier than anything the Taj has to offer.

From Etmad's tomb two slightly-seeing Sikhs rushed us to the Agra fort, built by Akbar, first of the great Moghuls. Here we fell into the hands of a guide who not only though the Taj Mahal was an eyesore, but who felt that Etmad's tomb

was little better than a Quonset hut. His brain was in the fort, and he spent four hours telling us. There never was a dull moment, either. In the introduction, to our guide book on Agra, a distinguished traveler says: "I would give up the Taj if I had to choose between the Taj and the fort. Magnificent as the tomb of the Moghuls are, it is in the fort that we can realize the manner of their living, and life is surely more interesting than death."

The Moghuls lived in such splendor that even now, when eggs are taken in to eat, it is breathtaking to see. There is the Jaamine tower, the Pearl Mosque, the Bath of Mirza, the Fish palace, the magnificent throne at the center of the place, from which the reigning Moghul either held court or looked down on wild elephant fights. This was a favorite spot.

It might interest Eddie Arano and Johnny Longden to know that the wild elephants had jockeys to guide them on in battle. No jockey ever rode but one race, but their families were always well pensioned by the Moghul.

USAF Europe Size Is Based On 'Cold War'

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31 (AP)—The heat of the "cold war" in Europe just about determines the size of the American air force there, an official said here.

If the "cold war" gets hotter, more units will move in. But if there is no increase in tension, the number of planes and men probably will not be increased, this officer said.

With winter coming on, if the Russian just about blockade Berlin, the size of the American transport force supplying the city will have to be boosted.

Undoubtedly, he said, the number of planes and men in Europe in England also will be increased should the situation worsen. There are 80 of the Superforts and 5,000 men based in England now.

The air force has approximately 12,000 officers and men on the European continent. They operate two fighter squadrons, one of F-47s and the other the speedy new P-50 jets. They total 100 planes.

The air force is taking no chances and is preparing for a continuation of the Russian land blockade of Berlin through the winter. It has 10 C-47, twin-engine transporters and 128 of the faster, C-54 four-engine transports with a 10-ton payload or double that of the C-47.

It has established facilities in England for the repair and maintenance of this fleet. Thus the air force has become an "instrument" of foreign policy, an air force officer said. The ability of the air force to supply the western sectors of Berlin through air power alone probably is an effective diplomatic weapon in the Moscow talks, this officer said.

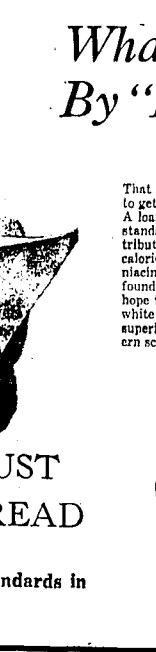

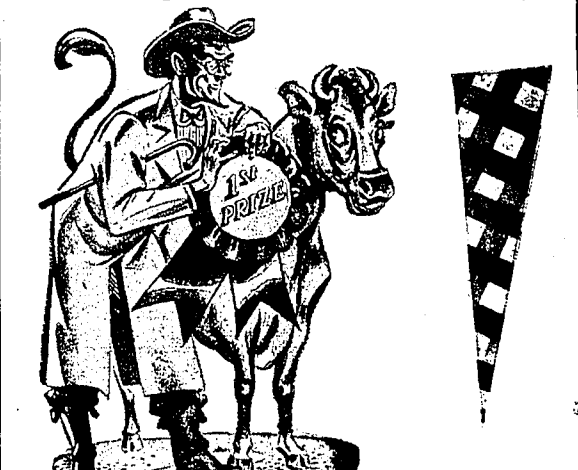

Wilhelmina to End 50 Year Rule Saturday

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 31 (AP)—Queen Wilhelmina came out of retirement Monday to spend the last week of her 50-year reign in the palace on Dam square.

She reached orange-flowered and flag decked Dam square in the early evening and was welcomed at the palace doormat by Juliana, the German-born princess, aged 21, and three of their four little princesses, who kissed their grandmother.

Juliana gave up the role of princess regent during the day in order that her mother might get the full attention of her people in the resumed position of active queen of the Dutch for this final week.

In High Spirits
The old queen was gracious and smiling, obviously tired but in high spirits.

She arrived at The Hague wearing a simple gray suit and a plumed gray hat.

There in the diplomatic and operational capital of The Netherlands she was driven immediately to the small palace of her mother, the late Queen Emma.

Dons Velvet Robe
In the palace she threw a mauve velvet robe over her simple costume and emerged with this symbol of her return to the monarchy as princess regent.

Then began the ovations that will continue through the week.

Then Wilhelmina came on to Amsterdam, the constitutional capital. The welcome at outlying Amstel station was the same as at The Hague.

Amsterdam Her City
The queen said that Amsterdam always will be for her the city where the peoples resistance against the (naz) invader first broke out as a flame. She said the city was "heroic, resolute, merciful."

Juliana and Bernhard were waiting at the palace when Wilhelmina's open limousine pulled to the curb in the milling thousands.

The whole royal family appeared on a balcony, ending the first public phase of the jubilee for them. But the festivities ran on into the night in cafes and along the canals.

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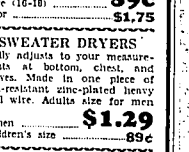
