Today's Hens Set Problems For Industry

By HARMAN W. NICHOLS WASHINGTON, Sept. 2 (AP)—The hen of today is so far ahead of industry she's practically a menace. Her eggs won't fit the basket, so to speak. They're too big, a lot of 'em, for the cartons and cases that are turned out on the assembly line. The net result has been a frightful breakage in eggs shipped here there and thither yon. So now the problem is before Agriculture Secretary Charles Brannan and his aides: Which comes first—the carton or the egg? The department, bless its soul, stands behind the hen. The egg case people are not protesting too much. They are going along their slow, building bigger boxes to keep up with biddy's production. "Pullet" Size The agriculture department, back in 1918, washed and measured some 2,800 eggs. Only about 18 per cent were six inches long. And only about 11 per cent were that

1 1/2 inches in diameter. Practically pullet size, by modern standards. So we come up to 1948 when another survey was made. Biddy was growing up to be a big girl under scientific breeding and producing rounder and longer eggs. But what did the egg carton people do about it? Not until 1944—far the first time in almost 30 years—do we find a change in egg cases and cartons. About one-sixteenth of an inch this way and that. It's almost enough, but not quite. Bigger and Longer Eggs are bigger and longer today and they're getting bigger and longer all the time. That has prompted your government—in the dress of the department of agriculture—to encourage a committee to get to work. It's working hard and it's called the shell egg container and packing committee, representing people in the egg business. In the government, one committee can't just go along—even on an egg roll—without help. So this one has had a dozen subcommittees. The big and little committees have a number of functions—all of which simmer down to the simple fact that it's about time a man can go to the henhouse and pluck an egg from under a hen and feel reasonably sure that when his packs it, it'll get where it's supposed to go.
