Grand Jury to Probe Movies Narcotic Case

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 3 (AP)—The district attorney's office moved today for a grand jury jury investigation into the marijuana-smoking case involving Robert Mitchell, handsome film hero, and attractive actress Lily Leach.

Dist. Atty. William E. Simpson announced the chairman of the jury's criminal complaints committee had recommended an inquiry by the entire panel Tuesday when the group resumes session.

Simpson added that if the jury decides to take up the case, Mitchell, Miss Leach and two others arrested with them early Wednesday will be invited to appear and tell their stories.

Probe Is Set In Olympia on Sale of Boats

 A legislative committee will open at Olympia today its hearing into the proposed state purchase of the Puget Sound ferryboat system—with Governor Walgren refusing to answer a subpoena.

Rep. George Kinross, R., King, chairman of the legislative committee, said the committee might not say what action it might take as a result of the governor's refusal to come from eastern Washington to appear.

May be Obtained
 Kinross said that if information desired by the committee can be obtained from other witnesses, including members of the governor's "official family," it will be satisfied.

If today's action shows that part of the \$2,000,000 ferry sale negotiations were handled personally by the governor, Kinross added, the committee probably will feel that it should hear directly from Walgren.

Letters Asked to Administer Estate

An opinion from Atty. Gen. Emith Troy yesterday fortified the governor's claim that a legislative committee can not subpoena and execute the head of state.

Troy's opinion stated: "I believe it to be readily apparent that the separation of powers (executive, judicial and legislative), which has been observed by our constitution, can not be preserved if one branch of the government may by its processes usurp the functions of either of the other branches."

Governor Walgren has expressed a willingness to provide the committee with what information it asks in writing, but not under subpoena.

On Wednesday the party will go to Mountain Home and there will inspect the Anderson ranch dam. The committee will leave for an inspection of Utah reclamation projects Wednesday night.

HEARING HEAD NOISES?

Assorted pundits have been telling us for years that we are living in an age of doubt and confusion. They were probably right all along. But certainly the last week or so has compounded standard doubt and everyday confusion to a point where people can be forgiven for double-checking on their own names.

It's bad enough to sit around gnawing your fingernails over the Berlin crisis, and the difficulty of putting meat on your table. But when you add to these imponderables some of the most baffling extra contractions, you're likely to find yourself looking over your shoulder for the little people who aren't there.

Take the budget, for instance. President Truman came up with a revised estimate and said that, thanks to the tax-cutting Republican congress, we'd wind up the fiscal year with a deficit of \$1,500,000,000. Nonsense, said some Republican congressmen. If the President would stop counting some appropriation chickens that congress won't hatch and take \$3,000,000,000 for foreign aid out of last year's surplus, he'd find that we are going to wind up the year with a surplus of \$1,500,000,000.

Then of course there are Messrs. Whitaker Chambers and Alger Hiss. Mr. Chambers told the Thomas committee that Mr. Hiss was a busy hoper from within in the prewar "Communist underground," and that he had visited Mr. Hiss and pleaded with him to break away from the Communist party. Mr. Hiss told the Thomas committee that he had known Mr. Chambers some 33 years ago as a Mr. Crosley and had subtle him an apartment.

There is a similar confusion surrounding the testimony of Elizabeth T. Bentley before the same committee. She put the finger on various government employees who, she said, had given her secret and valuable information for the Soviets. Some of the accused also said they didn't know Miss Bentley and had never seen her. Others said that they would stand on their constitutional rights and say nothing.

Likewise we have the case of Mrs. Kosenkina, the Soviet school teacher. This is the prize bloom in our bouquet of confusion. The wife, at last count, three different "official" Soviet versions of the unfortunate woman's leap. The only point of similarity in them is that Mrs. Kosenkina did drop from a third-floor window to the courtyard below.

There may be some comfort, though little enlightenment, in the thought that the President and the congress may be making honest mistakes in billion dollar bookkeeping. And there may be enlightenment, though little comfort, in the knowledge that Soviet policy often cuts the facts to fit the propaganda pattern. But it is something else again when two intelligent and educated men like Mr. Chambers and Mr. Hiss, both holders of positions of distinction and responsibility, tell stories that brand one or the other of them as an unmitigated liar.

In the life, we feel, was a lot pleasanter in the earlier era of this age of doubt and confusion when the government was making honest mistakes in billion dollar bookkeeping. And there may be enlightenment, though little comfort, in the knowledge that Soviet policy often cuts the facts to fit the propaganda pattern.

WHAT'S YOUR IDEA?

We overheard a prominent local individual expressing the opinion recently that the average American citizen is almost completely in the dark when it comes to understanding this nation's foreign policy.  4. Do you favor lifting our embargo on the shipment of arms to Israel, in view of President Truman's recognition of the new state?
 5. Do you believe that the United States should give greater financial and military aid to Chiang Kai-shek?
- Are these good questions? Or so, just what do you think would be the logical answers? Or have you any other queries which you believe should be added to the list?

Ex-PW Guard Said Guilty in Treason Case

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 3 (AP)—Tomoya (Tom) Kawakita, an ex-prisoner of war, was found guilty today in a federal court jury convicted of the 26-year-old Japanese-American yesterday after eight days of stormy deliberation. The jury twice reported it was deadlocked and asked to be dismissed.

Kawakita was convicted on eight of 13 overt acts of brutality which the government charged he committed against American prisoners while he was interpreter at Oyama prison camp in Japan.

The nine women and three men jurors, including a young Japanese-American woman, reported they could not agree on the other five counts, including the prison camp death of marine Sgt. LeRoy Hibbing, Minn.

Kawakita, a stocky, bespectacled native of California, sat in the courtroom with bowed head, showing little emotion as jury foreman Mr. Eric Nicksel listened.

"We find him guilty of treason," Federal Judge William C. Mathes pronounced him to jail to await sentence Oct. 5. He faces a possible death. Five years to the minimum sentence on each count.

"Tokyo" Rose on Way to Mainland

TOKYO, Sept. 3 (AP)—American-born Tokyo Rose, facing a treason trial in San Francisco, started home today.

"Tight-lipped and poker-faced," Mrs. Frances T. Tamm, 37, walked up the gangplank of the U. S. army transport Gen. Hodges, which had hundreds of hindquarters—bound American soldiers aboard.

The soldiers crowded the decks and "snapped" in the air. Mrs. Tamm, who wore a smart brown jumper skirt and silk blouse, showed a "flat" in both Japanese and English for requests for a statement.

No Arrests Made On Use of Water

Delich said the jackrabbit problem in the Hollister area has increased, and that dozens of farmers had reported crop losses from the pests.

Russia Urges Big 4 Talk on Italy Colonies

LONDON, Sept. 3 (AP)—The Soviet Union has proposed that the big four council of foreign ministers meet before Sept. 15 to consider disposition of the former Italian colonies, Moscow radio said today.

The Soviet radio broadcast a dispatch by a London correspondent of Tass, the official Russian news agency, which said the proposal for a big four foreign ministers meeting was made Aug. 31 by George Zarubin, Russian ambassador to Britain.

Parleys Unsuccessful

He urged the meeting at a conference of the foreign ministers' deputies who have been trying unsuccessfully to agree on the future of the Italian colonies in a series of discussions in London.

Under terms of the Italian peace treaty, if the big four foreign ministers are unable to settle the question by Sept. 15, the whole issue will go to the United Nations.

Deputies End Parleys

The deputies concluded their meetings last week without any complete agreement. There have been reports, however, that they did agree to give the Italian Somaliland to Italy under a U.N. trusteeship arrangement, and also to give Ethiopia enough of Eritrea to provide her a port on the red sea.

They were understood, however, to have disagreed as to the future of Libya and that part of Eritrea which would not be given to Ethiopia.

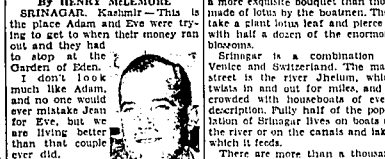

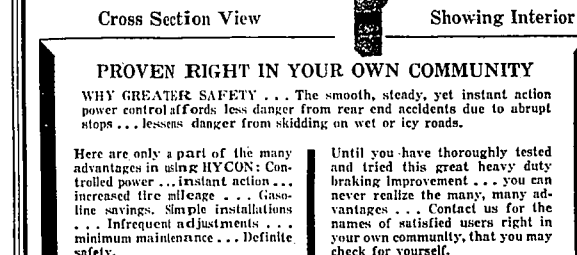

HOBBART, Okla., Sept. 3 (AP)—When this town was laid out on the south western Oklahoma prairie in 1898, every street was wide enough for a 20-mile team to turn around in the middle of each block.

The National Safety council reports that Hoobart, population 2,200, is in a class by itself without a single traffic accident in its 50 years of existence.

Police Chief, Fred Smith, scratched his head and said, "I'll be glad to know how we do it, but I guess we have the world's most careful drivers. When you see someone coming your way, you move over."

Serious Item
Safe driving is a serious thing here. The entire community is concerned on a long-range campaign to keep traffic death at least four miles from the city limits.

Here are some of the reasons more people die from accidents in the towns than in the cities of Hoobart: 1. The exceptionally wide streets. 2. The level land. 3. Unobstructed view at all intersections.

Traffic Kept Out

Future Tourists to Alaska Warned of Rough Roads, Costly Gas by Resident

People planning a trip to Alaska over the Alcan Highway are warned of rough roads, high gasoline and "only mediocre scenery" by Mr. and Mrs. Buell Warner, Twin Falls, who returned here from an 8,000-mile vacation trip through Alaska and Canada.

The Warners left Twin Falls July 1, visited Glacier national park in Montana, and traveled over the newly-built road to Fairbanks, Alaska, returning to their home on 30 days.

Warner told of rough gravel and broken-up, hard-top surfaces on stretch of highway through Canada. The Alcan highway actually begins at Dawson Creek in central Canada, some 1,700 miles from Twin Falls.

After passing the "mile-zero" post, located in the center of Dawson Creek town, the going gets even worse. The next 1,200 miles is Canadian, part of the Alcan highway, and because of insufficient funds to maintain the road in that section.

Animal Parasite Control Methods Told by Chemist

NEW YORK, Sept. 3 (AP)—Adoption of a new technique of animal parasite control could add hundreds of millions of pounds of beef supplies within a few months, the head of a chemical company said today.

William P. Marsh, Jr., president of U. S. Industrial Chemicals, Inc., reported in a statement results of tests of a new insecticide used on 800 cattle in seven western states. The results were combined with a new chemical, Piperonyl Butoxide,

to provide lasting effectiveness, he said.

Tests under practical range conditions, Marsh said, showed that a single application gave adequate lice control for the entire winter season, and that weight gains were as much as 150 pounds per animal within a period of 60 days, or eight times as much as the results of untreated animals.

The tests were conducted on ranges in Arizona, Montana, Wyoming, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Colorado and Utah.
