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### Renegotiating Of Plant Pact Is Welcomed

Essen, Germany—Word that the United States is moving to renegotiate her plant dismantling agreement with Britain and France comes to them like rain in a desert.

The news of the United Kingdom-United States coal control group—particularly the Americans, who are convinced that high level policy in this matter has put them in the position of a man who feeds his wife with one hand while cutting his throat with the other.

Had to Stand By

Faced with a world coal shortage and the necessity of feeding the German steel industry as a vital part of the Marshall plan, they have still had to stand by while reparations and disarmament policies robbed them of essential equipment.

Not only have the plants supplying this equipment been dismantled, but the machinery shipped out of the Ruhr, but many others are now closed despite the need for their production, merely because they are still on the list for dismantlement.

### Agreed Before Crisis

I am not attempting to convey the idea that there has been bad judgment and bad management throughout in the handling of the policy. Dismantling for demilitarization and reparations was agreed upon by Russia, the United States, France and Britain immediately after the war, when many of today's circumstances were unforseen.

Much of the fault for that lies with those who failed to acquire themselves before and during the war with the obvious long-range purpose of Russian Imperialist communism.

Situation Complicated

The remaining fault, if it is fair to call it that in a situation complicated by hundreds of bewildering factors, seems to have lain more in domestic than in international.

Under present U. S. policy, coal is one of the prime factors in that chain, as well as in the effort to make Germany more nearly self-supporting and ease the strain of the money and supplies which we are now forced to pour in.

### Anglo-Russia Trading Pact Debate Topp

LONDON, Sept. 8 (AP)—British and Russia have begun to bargain on a long-range trade pact aimed at easing Britain's food shortage and helping Russia rebuild its war devastated factories.

The new trade agreement, which is a short-term deal now existing between the two countries, is intended to amount virtually to barter, extending that principle of trade well into the period when monetary exchanges may be expected to become more stable.

The exchanges of goods are expected to come out even, leaving neither country with the necessity of laying out hard cash to level the international account between them.

### Officials Keep Mumm

Board of trade officials are keeping mum about the probable value of goods to be dealt with under the negotiations, but some observers expect it to run into the hundreds of millions of dollars.

The biggest things Britain has to offer—and the things the Russians are most eager to get—the heavy steel products, precision instruments, electrical goods and machine tools. Britain needs, and Russia can supply, grain, timber, flax, newspaper and cotton cloth.

Under the present agreement Russia has delivered about \$40,000,000 worth of grain. Britain has sent steel rails to Russia, but Soviet contracts for other heavy items have not yet been placed and British deliveries under the pact amount to only about \$15,000,000 so far. A board of trade spokesmen said completion of the remaining contracts may take several years.

### Rupert's Council Calls Election on Pool Bond Issue

RUPERT, Sept. 8.—Discussion and adoption of an ordinance providing for the construction of a swimming pool was the main business of the city council at its regular meeting at 8 p. m. Tuesday.

The ordinance submitted by H. B. Redford, city attorney, calls for a bond election for \$50,000 to be used for the purchase of a site for the swimming pool, heating plant, dressing rooms, chlorination plant and fixtures connecting the pool with the city water supply.

The election is slated to be held from 9 a. m. until 7 p. m. Oct. 10. Officials of the first ward will be Mrs. William Broadhead and Mrs. Reed Catmull, judges, and Mrs. John Burnside, clerk. Officials of the second ward will be Mrs. Floyd Pruitt and Mrs. Melvin Madsen, judges, and Mrs. J. J. Van Every, clerk.

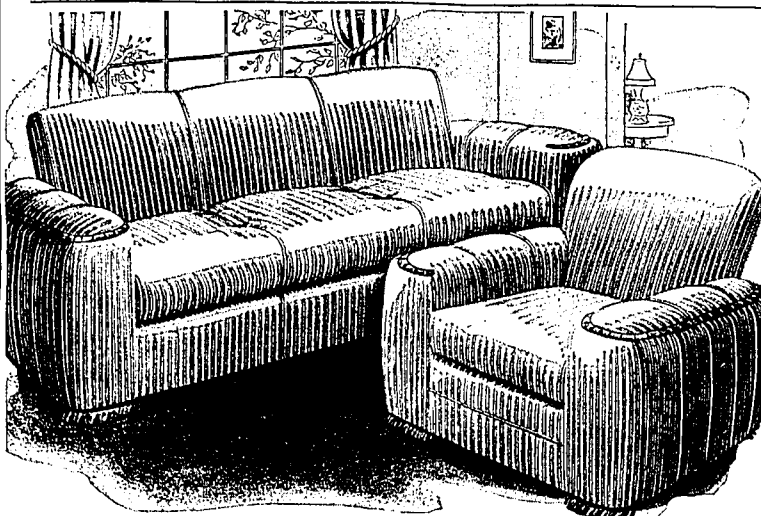

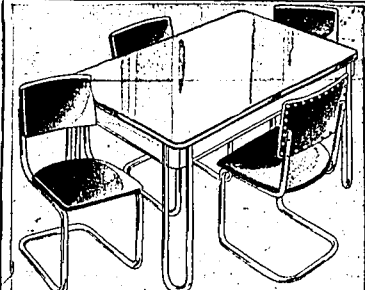

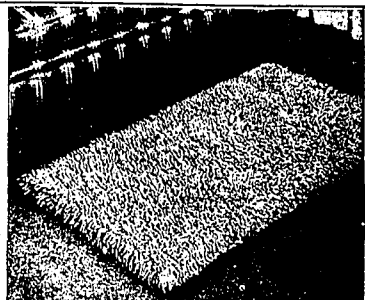

### Appearance of Newest Autos Planned Soon

DETROIT, Sept. 8 (AP)—About a dozen new model automobiles will appear during the next four or five months and in every instance appeal will receive as much emphasis as mechanical changes.

Mechanical changes will be relatively few. In most cases the manufacturers will claim improved gasoline mileage. Whether the motorist gets it will depend upon a variety of factors including type of fuel used, adjustment and conditions of driving.

Higher Compression  
Higher compression engines are to be installed in the forthcoming new Cadillac and Oldsmobile models. Doubtlessly they will improve gasoline mileage with the best of the premium fuels now obtainable.

More Power  
The increase in compression, of course, will be of only modest proportion. It may move up from the present top of 7.5-to-1 to not more than 8-to-1. This engineers say, however, that even this will give more mileage if all other factors are favorable.

### Rail Leader Raps U. S. Lawsuits on Wartime Charges

BEATLE, Wash., Sept. 7 (AP)—Justice department policies are causing the greatest crisis in the history of the American railroad, a prominent railroad executive warned last night.

Edwin C. Matthias, St. Paul, Minn., vice president and general counsel of Great Northern railway, said that the attitudes of the railroads to meet transportation demands of another year was causing "outrageously threatened" by "political utility" in the department.

Matthias told the public utilities commission that the American railway association convention that 16 suits pending before the interstate commerce commission were "unjustly instituted." He said they might bankrupt the railroads.

The government has accused the railroads of overcharging between \$2,000,000,000 and \$3,000,000,000 for their wartime services.

Matthias said the government paid no higher railroad rates than those paid by commercial and private shippers. In some cases, he said, they were lower.

Baring, a Reno city councilman, defeated Elmon Connelley, a wide mining man, 11,067 to 4,296 on the basis of returns from 90 per cent of the precincts.

Baring will oppose Rep. Charles H. Russell, former Elly publisher, in the November general election. Russell was unopposed in the GOP nomination.

### U. S. Readies Reopening of Reich Quotas

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8 (AP)—The United States is getting ready to reopen the immigration gates to Germans living in the Reich. The war-ratified bars have been up for more than seven years.

The first of 25,987 Germans to be eligible for admission each year will be chosen soon after a mass registration of applicants in the western occupation zones of Germany and Austria.

States department officials said today the registration may start this month. The actual date will be set as soon as American consular officials give the word that they are ready to handle the inevitable rush. Two million registration forms have been printed in Switzerland.

The biggest group of applicants is expected to come from the 800,000 or so displaced persons—those left homeless by the United States has voted to admit 200,000 of these during the next two years.

The new legislation also opened the way for restoring the former German quota.

Next to the British, it is the largest of all the national immigration acts by the basic 1924 immigration act. The German quota was largely gone because since the United States broke consular relations with Hitler's Reich in mid-1941, some remaining German citizens living abroad were admitted as immigrants during the war years. But the unused portion could not accumulate.

### Instruments Get Blame in Air Mishaps

BY HOWARD W. BLAKELEE

DOSTON, Sept. 8 (AP)—A new, major cause of airplane accidents, discovered by the U. S. air force, has been reported to the American Psychological association.  
The trouble is cockpit dials too hard for pilots to read. The blame was put on designers of these instruments. The report was made by Walter F. Grether, aero medical laboratory, Wright-Patterson air force base, Dayton, O.  
An instrument whose face looks like a clock with three hands is the worst offender. It tells a pilot his altitude. Pilots misread this dial more than 10 per cent of the time because it is so difficult.

Always Same Error  
Worse by far than the mistake of misreading Grether said is the fact that they nearly always make the altitude 1,000 feet higher than it actually is. This mistake is always 1,000 feet, and not a smaller and safer error. It may account for pilots being drawn to mountains when they think they are safely above. Grether told of a pilot who tried to fly his plane into the ground because he made this 1,000-foot mistake when close to the ground of an airport.

The aero laboratory new altimeters are being designed to eliminate this mistake.  
"The pilot error," said Grether, "are usually credited with being at least part of the cause of 70 per cent of accidents. This isn't quite fair because the pilots often are not there to defend themselves—they are dead. We think designers' errors have made the pilot's task extraordinarily difficult. We are quite sure these errors due to design of instruments are made in flight."

Errors Not Changed  
These errors, he said, are not changed by training or by long flying experience. They are due to human eyesight being stretched to its limit. Students made no more of these errors than experienced air force flyers.  
Paul H. Filla, of the same laboratory, reported that pilots fix their eyes on instrument dials for periods of one to three times longer than people fix their eyes on words that they read. The errors occur despite this long look.

Mrs. McIntyre started work on the spread in February, 1941, and completed it Aug. 2, 1948. The spread was considered by the jurymen of the women's division at the fair to be the finest piece of crocheting ever exhibited at the event.

More than 25 skeins of yarn went into the spread's making. It weighs about 20 pounds and was fit a full size double bed with three sides of the bedspread touching the floor.

The piece of work is comprised of 50 squares, each in a water lily design. It is touched off with a hand knotted fringe.

Not only did the spread win first prize at the fair, but it also was judged the finest crocheted work in the county during 1948. It won a gold cup that enables Mrs. McIntyre to enter the national crocheting contest late in November in New York City.

Mrs. McIntyre already has made arrangements to enter the bedspread in the nation-wide competition for the Gold Crochet award to win any prizes in the national contest, there are so many fine crocheters in the country.

If the bedspread wins in New York, Mrs. McIntyre will be awarded a medal of \$50 and a trip to New York City.

She started crocheting as a hobby by the war years. However, during the war her crocheting was interrupted by the knitting of sweaters for the Red Cross. She received a certificate of achievement from the Red Cross for completing eight sweaters and numerous pairs of socks during the war years.

The spread, which is valued at \$150, was made on a number seven crochet hook.
