ranging from kindergarten youngsters to the highest grades. There were four or five pupils under years of age, and during the course of the year the teacher helped some of the old people to write. The school terms were usually three or four months, depending on the weather and whether the pupils could be gotten together. Reeves taught arithmetic from a book written in 1852, which he still possesses, and the old McGuffey reader was used, as well as the Independent and Old National.

The long school house at Basin was 24 by 18 1/2 feet, with two and one-half windows. The hinges and latches were wood, the floor was of rough wood, and a sawbrush burner provided heat for the room. The heating the stove would get too warm, while the other part of the body would freeze, students remember. At this school, the pupils could only dirt floors, no books and no desks. At Basin, the Bedke children rode about 10 miles a day on horseback to school.

The Sublette school was 16 by 20 feet in size, with four half-windows, and 20 desks to teach. Here the teacher enjoyed the luxury of a stove and a ton of coal provided by the board. At this school, the Horn, Gallagher, Christenson and Nelson children rode about 12 miles a day to school. The teacher's salary at Sublette was \$20 a month, with \$10 a month going to the Dave Hutchings for board and room. At Basin, Reeves lived at Tom Day's place and received \$50 a month salary.

While at Muldoon, the teacher received \$65 a month from the state for teaching school and \$30 from the mining company for board and room. When not engaged in teaching, at Basin he was engaged in mining. He was paid \$50 a month for the children there and kept books for the company.

There will be a lot of interesting exchange of "remember when" on Sept. 26, when these pupils of 50 years ago get together with their old "school master," who is now in his 80s and remembers each one of them.

U. S. Soldier Is 'Best-Dressed' of All Globe Troops

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13 (AP)—The army wants the duffie to know he'll be the best-dressed soldier in the world.

The quartermaster corps has been spending a lot of time and effort, not to mention money, to make that so.

The new soldier now will be outfitted even better than his prototype just before the war, says the corps, in the amount of clothing, its quality and variety of items for use in any weather or any climatic spot.

By special direction of the secretary of the army and the chief of staff, the quartermaster corps is to form a committee to make such alterations as are necessary to give uniforms a good fit and appearance.

The pile of uniforms, shoes and other gear is issued to the grantee or enlisted when he starts out as a soldier and this wardrobe increases as the weather changes or his assignment takes him to new climates.

Senator Tells Of European Trip at Meet

BULLY, Sept. 13.—Senator Henry C. Dworshak spoke before a joint meeting of the Bulley post of the American Legion and auxiliary Friday night at the Odd Fellows hall, giving a report of the state convention held recently at Coeur d'Alene.

Senator Dworshak, telling of the chaotic conditions in Europe when he visited the continent with other senators last October and November, said that now, a year later, the situation is still menacing and threatening, and people on every hand are asking if and when there will be another war.

"While we are hoping for peace here in America, we are strengthening the Russia," Dworshak said in telling the Legionnaires of the moving armament of Russia under the Potsdam agreement. The senator said United States should maintain strong defensive units, stop depleting her resources to the

place where she is fast becoming one of the "have not" nations, and should diligently weed out "fellow travelers" or Communists.

Senator Dworshak was introduced by Commander L. A. Radloff. Following the joint meeting, the Legion met for a business session.
