

War Isn't Near, U.S. Reporters Told by General

BERLIN, Sept. 14 (AP)—Gen. Lucius D. Clay said today: "I don't think war is just around the corner." The U. S. military spokesman made the statement to American newsmen who came to Berlin on a special air force flight from the United States to view the British-American air lift operation supplying Soviet-occupied western Berlin.

Clay added he doubted the Russians "will make Berlin the final issue on the entire German problem." The American commander predicted that before any forceful action was attempted to break the 82-day-old Soviet blockade, the U. S. would exhaust "all other means at its disposal" to reach agreement.

Clay declined to discuss whether the Berlin blockade was a council of foreign ministers would mean "negotiation under duress."

He left the impression, however, that the U. S. at least would not be prepared to discuss any other larger German issues with the Russians at such a conference before the blockade was lifted.

Clay said the next step, if the Moscow talks fail, would be to bring the Berlin crisis before the United Nations security council as a threat to peace.

Speaking of the Soviet-sponsored drive withdrawal of all coalition troops from Germany, the American commander said:

"This could become popular in Germany, but not now. Fear of communist domination is very great. The Germans would be very distrustful at the withdrawal of our armies."

"We set out to have a very different job in Germany anyhow," Clay said. "I don't know what the hell we came here for in the first place if we are going to get out now."

Repercussions
Asked whether the combined British-American army maneuvers in Bavaria had any effect on the approach to the plant, the CIO unionists started screaming and shouting at the top of their lungs, warning that they were not going to stand by peacefully as they did yesterday with non-strikers went to work.

Disorders started about 8:45 a.m. when AFL members began a moderate approach as though to enter the main gate. Their trucks and heavy equipment were blocked.

Hundreds of strikers and sympathizers formed a flying wedge in the afternoon at the refinery. The rest of the caravan stepped away and went into the plant through a rear gate.

The Richmond police department reported that all 1400 of the workers in the plant were arrested.

The army began signing up west coast dock men to load its strike-bound cargo.

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Mayor Says Bond Okayed for City Hall "too Small"

Lauterbach recommended a similar commission be appointed here to study the city's needs and to make changes as needed. It would handle such matters as building zoning, city street parking, plans for new subdivisions and requests from citizens for exceptions to existing ordinances.

Approved in 1946
The \$150,000 bond issue for a new city hall here were approved in 1946. The city council called an election for April 20 this year regarding a referendum to change the proposed \$150,000 bond issue to \$1,000,000.

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Other board members present at the meeting were Lester McCrean, chief of the school district, and Alton Martindale, business manager, also attended the session.

Tuesday morning, Rambo said he agreed with Gillette that an inquiry was in order and that emphatically he would like to see a grand jury called. "After a grand jury investigation," Rambo declared, "this might be a pretty good town to live in."

Claude Detweiler was another who said he wanted a grand jury. Detweiler said, "I hoped this might be the first additional grand jury to have a grand jury to clear up a lot of rumors and happenings in this community which haven't been but should be cleared up."

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14 (AP)—President Truman assailed Congress in a speech today for a charge that "some politicians" are endangering the nation's safety by their tactics against strikers.

The house-un-American activities committee—here he did not mention the name of the committee—said that some of its members are "in an unscrupulous effort to keep non-striking AFL maintenance men out of a refinery."

A policeman, a state highway patrolman and four strikers were hospitalized but none was believed in serious condition.

Centers of three news photographers were seized by the police and exposed. Several photographers were roughed up. An Oakland Tribune reporter was hit by a tear gas bomb.

First Mass Violence
It was the first mass violence of California's 11-day-old strike over wages, a strike which has curtailed gasoline supplies up and down the west coast.

Most of the violence occurred at the main gate of the Standard Oil refinery in Richmond. But it also erupted in blocks around the approaches to the plant.

Stibnite Mine Building Goes Ahead Slowly

STIBNITE, Sept. 14 (AP)—Construction is progressing slowly on a \$20,000 antimony smelter plant at Stibnite.

H. D. Bailey, manager of the Yellowpine mine, one of the Bradley Mining company interests, said a shortage of steel has held back construction on the plant.

When completed, the plant will be the only primary antimony smelter west of Texas.

Bailey said the foundation of the smelter is complete and that shipments of pre-fabricated steel for the plant is expected to arrive from El Paso and San Francisco plants in about two weeks.

The smelter will employ about 50 men, making a total crew of about 200 Yellowpine mine employees at the Stibnite area. Bailey said 250 men are employed in the open-pit mine west of the village.

Production is going ahead "full steam" at the mine and the output is being processed at the regular processors, Bailey declared.

He said the smelter would process only the output of the Yellowpine mine at first, but by 1950 may accept another job from other properties.

Bailey said the Yellowpine mine supplies about one-third of the U. S. antimony consumption. He said one-third of the mineral is imported from Mexico and Bolivia and the rest is obtained from scrap. Virtually all of the antimony mined in the United States comes from the Yellowpine mine.

The open pit mine is 1,000 by 700 feet. The moderately steeply dipping, drilled and blasted at Stibnite before loading on trucks for shipment to smelter plants. Bailey said the rock contains about one per cent antimony.

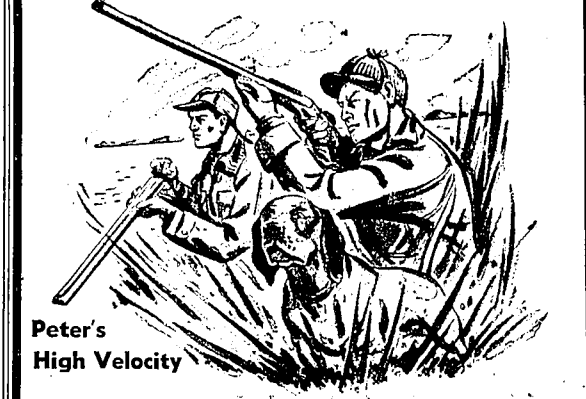

EGGS BOOMERANG

One incident of Henry Wallace's journey through North Carolina symbolizes the third candidate's hostile reception in the south. A man was seen to hold a boy of about 8 onto his shoulders so the youngster could get a clearer shot at the target of his eggs and tomatoes.

Most of the egg, vegetable and rock throwing seems to have been done by kids of teen age and less. But they must have had the moral support, as the little boy had the physical support of his elders. None who took part in these exhibitions, whatever their age, behaved with much grown-up forgiveness. They had they would have seen that they were venturing their own purpose.

For they forgot to consider that eggs and tomatoes have this peculiarity as political weapons: they can be used so much more effectively by those who are hit than by those who do the hitting. The Carolina boys lost the battle when they fired the first salvo.

Maybe Mr. Wallace didn't exactly enjoy the sticky sensation of being smacked by an egg or the instinctive humiliation of being jeered and pelted in public. But his behavior during most of the onslaught showed he was strong in the belief that he was collecting political advantage at the same time that he was collecting yolk stains on his shirt.

Mr. Wallace can't really hope to get far in the south. But every time some egg-slinging young'un in Dixie makes him look slightly messy he also makes him look ally-like, manly and for a man who can only try for a good showing, the few votes picked up as a result are all to the good.

Thus he can almost welcome anything that tries to deny him the right of free speech by forceful undemocratic action. It was a brilliant announcement that his attackers were suffering from mental impotence. Egg-throwing isn't a sign of power or righteous wrath.

If his Carolina trip had been without incident, people might have taken a longer look into one of the biggest pork barrels in American history. If the situation is even half as bad as reported, it is obviously the duty of congress to make a quick investigation and find why its decisions, as represented in the DP bill, are being either ignored or badly mismanaged.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The next senate will be a wild and woolly body from the standpoint of party regularity, and will be a hairshirt to the next President of the United States, whether he be Harry S. Truman or Thomas E. Dewey.

It will resemble the rumpus-raising chamber which was the senate in the years when a small band of extremely able and energetic men, headed by Herbert Hoover in the years when a small band of extremely able and energetic men, headed by William W. Johnson of California, William Edgar Borah of Idaho, and the late Charles McNary of Oregon, and the late two "Boys" La Follette of Wisconsin and Gerald P. Nye of North Dakota, were the power Democrats across the aisle.

CONTINUED—To make matters worse, despite the results of the November senatorial races, the question of which party will enjoy actual and organizational control of the senate may not be decided until it meets next January. As happened in the 1930, Longworth died for the house speakership in 1930, and the senate was left in a state of confusion for the age of their membership is far lower than the average among the Democrats. The latter have had a difficult time getting their own house to show their years by their record of absenteeism.

With the alignment now at 51 Republicans and 45 Democrats, the senate opening day may upset the decision at the polls.

CHECK—Despite the general belief that the Dewey-Warren ticket will divide the Dewey vote, high command will make an extraordinary effort to retain dominance of the senate as a check on the executive branch. The senate is expected to make an ultra-liberal record of legislation and opposition as one means of rebuilding the party for 1952.

The Democrats believe that they can retain their present strength and at the same time knock off at least a few seats from the Republicans. They are aiming at high-powered political rifles are John Sherman Cooper of Kentucky, Chapman Robertson of West Virginia, George A. Wilson of Iowa, C. Wayland Brooks of Illinois, Edward W. Robertson of Wyoming, and Joseph H. Ball of Minnesota.

REVERSE—Assuming the Democrats win this contest, although the Republicans do not agree to that assumption, the membership of the future senate would be 51 Democrats and 45 Republicans, exact reverse of the present senate.

But the GOP strategists believe that they have a good chance to out-replace three sitting Democrats. They are James E. Murray of Idaho, James H. Hatch of New Mexico and Tom Stewart of Tennessee. Hatch did not seek reelection because of his expected defeat in the primary contest to Rep. Estes Kefauver.

ABSTINENCE—Former Sen. Burton Wheeler of Montana, who has made friends in that state, will not lift a finger for his old enemy, Senator Murray, and Burton's indifference could mean a vast difference in the senate.

Sen. Dennis Chavez of New Mexico is so ill it is doubtful if he can campaign for the Democrats' nomination for the primary of Agriculture, William P. Anderson. And without the so-called "wild vote" Anderson may have a hard time in defeating Paul Taylor.

Another influential Democrat whose political ambitions may damage the ex-cabinet member is former Gov. John J. Dempsey, who was beaten for the senate in 1946. He is a Democrat, although a Democrat, Dempsey once nothing to President Truman, who supported Anderson. Last, the former agricultural boss is no bit of fire as a campaigner.

LINEUP—The attitude of "Boss" Crump may be the principal factor in Tennessee. He branded Representative Russell as "a red" in a speech in that state, in which Crump suffered one of his few setbacks. If he passes out the word to "lay off Kefauver," Crump will have a hard time in defeating Paul Taylor.

Two Democratic Senators—71-year-old Wagner of New York and 66-year-old McNicoll of Tennessee—have missed as many sessions as they have attended in recent years.

And they cannot vote by proxy next January.

TRIAL—It is the certainty of such a narrow margin in the treaty-ratifying and confirming body that will plague the next President and jeopardize responsible party government at the very moment when the supposedly democratic and majority rule system is on trial before the world, with Russia as the prosecutor. Should the treaty be rejected, the Democratic and conservative Democrats could endanger his program by lining up with Republicans in the philosophy.

But should a Dewey-Warren victory reunite the Democrats, the bloc of six or eight so-called Republican generals—McNair, Vandenberg, E. A. Tamm, and the like—could do the same to the man in the White House. In either instance, the chief executive would be in a tight spot, and it would be no match or underwrite his executive responsibility.

That would be a setup to delight Josef Stalin and Henry Wallace.

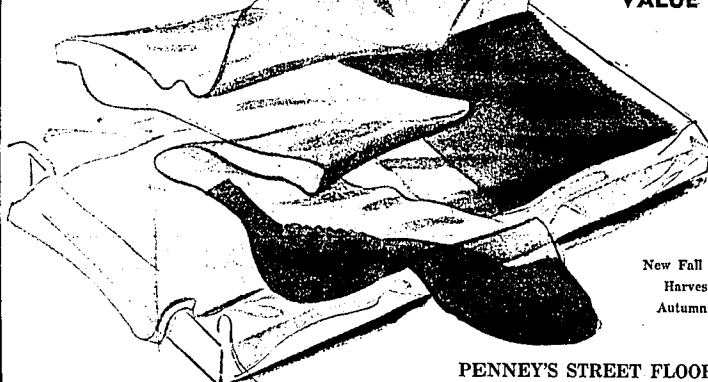

Largest Push Against Tree Insects Ends
WASHINGTON, Sept. 14 (AP)—The most extensive campaign against timber-destroying insects ever carried out on a national forest and neighboring park, state and private lands was conducted during the year ended June 30, the forest service reported today.

Operating under the new forest pest control act with an appropriation of \$43,000, for that 800 foresters, technicians and workers were employed at the forest and about 150,000 trees were individually sprayed with insecticide from the ground while hundreds of thousands more on some 15,000 acres were sprayed from helicopters or airplanes, the service said.

Projects were carried out in the States of Oregon, Idaho, Wyoming, South Dakota, Montana, Michigan and Wisconsin.

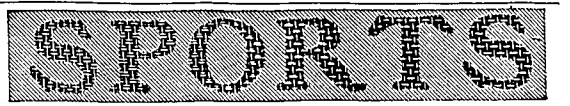

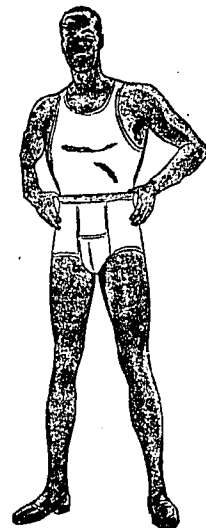

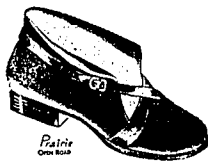
