

35 Troops Are Killed In Mishap

SEOUL, Korea, Sept. 15 (AP)—Officially today Seoul's American soldiers were killed and 80 were injured last night when a speeding Korean train crashed into the rear of a stalled troop train 80 miles south of here.

Of the Americans injured, 35 were seriously hurt. Identification was incomplete, but it was believed that about 110 soldiers were killed and 80 were injured, 44 of whom were seriously hurt. The crash was caused by inefficiency and lack of safety measures.

One of the passengers, Melborn B. Phillips, a military government employee, said the casualty toll would have been higher had it not been for the quick thinking of the train crew.

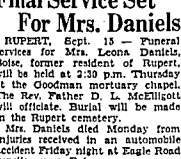

Hospital Bids Close Friday For Gooding

GOODING, Sept. 15—Sealed bids for construction of an addition to and remodeling of the Gooding Memorial hospital here will be accepted up to 2 p. m. Friday, according to Emmet Kelly, chairman of the board of directors.

Frank Hummel, architect from Boise, made a final check with the board regarding the plans before sending them out to prospective bidders.

The old building will be completely repaired, rewired and hallways covered with asphalt tile. A modern laboratory will be completed with X-ray equipment in the basement of the present building.

Modern maternity section, including delivery, nursery and patient rooms, will be included on the top floor of the new structure. A 10 by 18 foot sun porch will be added on the south. A new kitchen and laundry will be built in the new basement. Adequate utility and storage rooms will be on each floor.

Modern lavatory facilities will be installed throughout the building and an elevator will connect the basement to the top floor the plans show. When completed the hospital will accommodate 36 patients and 20 beds can be added without crowding for emergencies.

The new construction is made of brick, cement and concrete. A ramp will lead into the rear entrance.

Estimated cost is approximately \$400,000. Plans for a new nurses' home are now being drawn and will be let on separate bid.

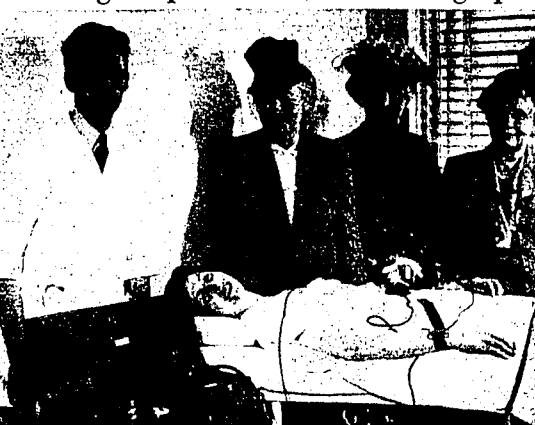

Gooding Hospital Gets Electrocardiograph

Local Anti-Tuberculosis Unit Gives Instrument to Hospital

GOODING, Sept. 15—Three members of the Twin Falls County Anti-Tuberculosis association formally presented a \$1,500 electrocardiograph to the state tuberculosis hospital here Monday morning.

The delicate machine was accepted by Dr. Kenneth A. Tyler on behalf of the institution. He expressed sincere thanks to the group for the contribution of the invaluable instrument.

Those present were Mrs. Clyde O. Smithson, Mrs. L. P. Runyon and Mrs. Louise McCluskey, all of Buhl, and C. R. Weaver, Twin Falls, acting chairman of the association, was unable to accompany the group.

In accepting the electrocardiograph, Dr. Tyler explained the invaluable service of the instrument, stating that it accurately measured action of the heart muscle, thus doing away with the less accurate method of "listening" by the physician. A picture of the "heart action" is taken, showing any of various possible heart defects.

The instrument is compact and portable, allowing for greater usage. Film holders make quick changes possible to facilitate ease of operation for several cases.

A copper plate is being engraved with name of donors to be attached to the case.

Three women from Buhl have served a number of years, holding various offices with the anti-tuberculosis association, and were in charge of the McCluskey Memorial hospital in Buhl when it was in operation. The hospital for underprivileged and "contagious" (tuberculosis) children was in continuous operation for 12 years until the time it was closed in 1942 due to war conditions when adequate help for operation was unavailable.

During the 12 years the McCluskey Memorial hospital functioned, some 1,200 children were served, it was reported. Since that time other youth works have come into existence and has relieved the need for the work which had been done at the Buhl hospital.

It was reported by the three Buhl women that funds from the McCluskey Memorial ultimately may go toward an occupational therapy program for the state tuberculosis hospital.

The group complimented Dr. Tyler upon the striking improvement made in appearance of the hospital buildings and grounds. Dr. Tyler outlined the present landscaping program now under way which will add greatly to the general appearance of the hospital.

AFL Enrolls 221 Nominees On Black List

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 15 (AP)—Eight U. S. senators and 113 house candidates were marked for defeat by the AFL in the November election.

Joseph Keenan, Chicago, director of labor's league for political education, announced the AFL will oppose these Republican senatorial candidates:

Sen. Henry Dworshak, Idaho; Joseph H. Ball, Minnesota; C. W. Young, Wyoming; Chapman Bevercombe, West Virginia; and George A. Wilson, Iowa; and GOP candidates: Patrick Hurley, New Mexico and Ross Hitzel, Oklahoma.

Keenan spoke at the 23rd annual convention of the AFL electrical workers. He did not name the 113 house candidates on the AFL list. Keenan told 2,200 delegates that the league (counterpart of the CIO Political Action committee) has begun a drive for \$1,000,000 in dollar contributions.

The fund will be used to help candidates opposed to legislators "hostile to labor," Keenan said. He said his league would work with the CIO-PAC "in some places."

Keenan said the league will support Democratic Sen. Theodore Green, Rhode Island; James E. Murray, Montana; and Edwin Johnson, Colorado, as well as Democratic senate candidates Guy Gillette, Iowa, and Clinton P. Anderson, New Mexico.

The objective of the AFL's political action, Keenan said, is to remove from congress those legislators who approved the Taft-Hartley act.

Bureau Reveals Crop Prospects Are Unchanged

BOISE, Sept. 15 (AP)—Idaho crop prospects remained unchanged during August, the bureau of agricultural economics has announced.
The production outlook improved during the month for oats, barley, prunes, and late crop green peas. The indicated production for dry peas, dry beans and outdoor dropped.
Many of the dry beans in south central Idaho matured early, reducing the yield per acre. The crop is now indicated to be 2,271,000 bushels, about 3 per cent smaller than the 1947 crop. Dry pea production forecasts have been reduced about 8 per cent from the Aug. 1 forecast to 957,000 bushels.
Production forecasts of potatoes and sugar beets remained unchanged. The potato production is estimated to be 36,750,000 bushels; dry sugar beets crop is estimated at 1,348,000 tons.

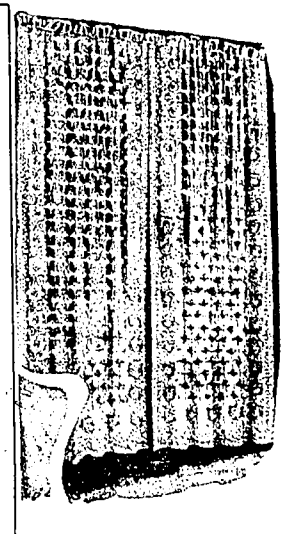

Warren Sets Talk in S. L. On Thursday

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 15 (AP)—The Republican presidential campaign gets under way tomorrow night when California Gov. Earl Warren makes his first major speech since his nomination.

Warren, Republican vice presidential candidate and running mate of New York Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, was expected to set the pattern for the intensified Republican presidential campaign now getting under way.

Warren will arrive in Ogden, Utah, by special train tomorrow night, and will proceed from Ogden to Salt Lake City after a short re-plant-formation appearance.

In Salt Lake City he will hold a press conference, and then speak over a nation-wide radio hookup (CBS) tomorrow from 7:30 to 8 p. m. MST.

Warren brings the presidential campaign to the west, but he will be followed here in less than a week by President Truman, who speaks at the famed Salt Lake laborfest of the 1948 church Tuesday night.

Mr. Truman's special train arrives in Price, Utah, Tuesday at 12:35 p. m. He will speak at the Price railroad station. Then he will proceed to Helper, Provo and Salt Lake City for a major address Tuesday night.

Warren's speech tomorrow night was expected by Republican leaders to set the pattern for their entire presidential campaign. Neither he nor the presidential candidate, Dewey, have made a major political address since their nomination in June.

Harvests at Full Tilt Throughout State Farm Area

BOISE, Sept. 15 (AP)—The week is in full swing in Idaho, the weekly cooperative crop and weather summary said today.

Grain and dry pea harvesting were nearing completion in both northern and eastern Idaho. Planting of fall grains continued and there was widespread activity in preparing seed-beds for fall planting.

Harvesting of early potatoes was being completed and the late potato harvest was starting.

Witness Says Maw Knew of Liquor Deals

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 15 (AP)—U.S. Gov. Herbert H. Maw knew of the illegal liquor dealings of Cyrus V. Lack as early as last October, a witness told the Robert S. Harris bribery trial late yesterday.

The witness who linked the attorney's name with the liquor scandal which has rocked the state to its political foundations was Robert C. Osanna, Helper club owner.

Personally Told Governor Osanna, a state witness in the "liquor protection" bribery trial of Harris in third district court here, told the nine-man jury he personally informed the governor of the goings-on.

The club owner said on Oct. 13, 1947, he was called to Salt Lake City along with Tony Nikkaa, Price tavern operator. Harris, then chief enforcement agent for the liquor control commission, took them in to see the club owner.

"Governor Maw, Harris, Tony and myself were at the meeting," Osanna told the jury.

Detailed Procedure He then went on to tell them that he gave the governor details of the dealings he had with Lack, former manager of the Brigham street liquor package agency.

He related to the chief executive how he was paying Lack \$12 and \$18 a case premium on illegal purchases of whiskey in order to gain protection insurance.

Osanna quoted the governor as saying that there is only one way "we can get liquor by the drink in Utah, and that is by law."

Osanna followed Lack to the stand. Lack, in forty two solid days of testimony, described in detail to the jury his dealings with Harris, in which he said he made the liquor sales, and then split the illegal profits 50-50 with the chief enforcement agent.

Vitamin K-5 Is Reported Good As Preservative

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 15 (AP)—A newly found vitamin which may be useful in preserving foods and beverages was reported today by the American Chemical Society.

This new substance, vitamin K-5, when added in microscopic amounts to food and drink, block the fermentation of sugars and prevents the growth of certain molds and bacteria said its developer, Dr. Robert Pratt and a group of colleagues from the University of California college of pharmacy.

The primary function of the K vitamins is to prevent hemorrhage. K-5 is one of this group. In relatively large amounts it can cause toxic reactions. However, the concentration needed to preserve food is well below the toxic level and within the limits permitted by the U. S. food and drug administration, said the sponsors.

"Cold War" Aid to Ruhr Steel Making

By J. M. ROBERTS, Jr.

DUSSELDORF, Germany—The "cold war" with Russia is helping the Ruhr steel industry in the east one respect—it is now getting the coal which formerly went to the Soviets for reparations, and coal is still its greatest need.

But regardless of what happens in the way of increased raw materials, the arbitrary production level of 107 million tons annually placed on steel by allied agreement will be purely an imaginary barrier for a long time. It is, as a matter of fact, just about the maximum capacity of the remaining plant facilities, a fact which I don't think was brought out at the time of the agreement.

Quantity Limited
Theoretically, the war left Germany with enough plants to produce 12,000,000 tons of steel annually, as compared with her previous 20,000,000. Actually, due to the presence of much old equipment and the loss of certain key connecting plants, 107 millions is almost as much as can ever be expected, and that's a long way off—at least two years under the best of circumstances.

North German steel control authorities expect to make it 6,000,000 for 1948 and to reach 7.5 millions for the 1949-50 production year.

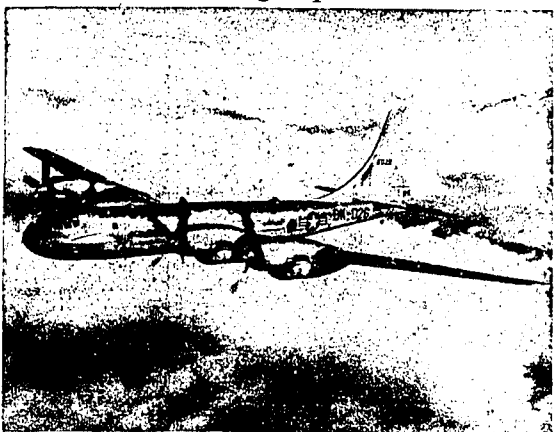
Short of Coal
They are short of coal, and more short of electric power. German power plants received much attention from allied bombers, and they are taking time. They are short of rich ores—Germany produces low grade ores which must be "enriched" with ores from Sweden, North Africa, Luxembourg, and Alsace. There are beginning to come. There is also a shortage of scrap, despite reports in the United States of great stockpiles here.

British steel men also feel they were badly hampered by demilitarization and decartelization. They say the great German sales syndicate which handled the business of all the companies was one of the few examples of efficiency in the great over-centralization of industrial and business activity to which this country was addicted. They estimate that allied policies in these respects cost steel the services of 1,000 of its best men.

B-29s to Make Long Hop to Gowen Field



Two giant bombers of the type shown above will fly 4,500 miles from Goose Bay, Labrador, to Gowen field in Boise Saturday in an air force demonstration of the long-range striking power of the strategic air command. They will be opened for inspection by the public during the celebration beginning at Gowen field at 2 p. m. Saturday.

Big Bombers to Land at Boise After Long Labrador Flight

BOISE, Sept. 15—Fifty U. S. air force B-29s, flying distances as long as 5,000 miles non-stop, will fly from bases virtually around the world Saturday to continental United States destinations.

The flights will mark the celebration of air force day, the first anniversary of the air force's becoming a separate unit, within the nation's military establishment.

The non-stop flights are being conducted to demonstrate the air force's ability to conduct bombing missions over distances far greater than those attempted during the last war.

Two of the B-29s, with crews of 11 men each, will land at Gowen field, Boise, at the completion of a trip from Goose Bay, Labrador. En route they will pass over Florida and Texas, making the trip more than 4,500 miles in length.

Gowen field will be opened to the public for the B-29s' arrival, according to Walter York, Idaho wing commander of the Air Force association. The AFA is sponsoring observance of air force day on a nationwide basis.

The bombers will arrive at Gowen

field during an air demonstration to be conducted beginning at 2 p. m. by planes of the 19th fighter squadron of the Idaho national guard, and by civilian planes.

The demonstration will include actual dive bombing targets in the center of Gowen field, simulated gunnery passes at speeds in the 500-mile-per-hour range, and aerobatic flying.

Civilian lanes will perform balloon-breaking contests, forced landings with dead engines from altitudes high over the field, and feature events such as pajama races, wherein the pilots do a modified strip-tape between landings and takeoffs.

Want to See Politico Squirm? Fire These Questions at Him

WASHINGTON, Two years ago Editor William E. Heath of the Haverhill, Mass. Gazette inaugurated a quiz for his state's congressional candidates. His idea was to pop 10 of the toughest questions he could think of on national and international issues. Then he let the politico squirm out of them as best they could.

So much good came out of the inquisition that Editor Heath wants to repeat it this year. He has asked for suggestions from which to pick his leading questions. For whatever they may be worth in putting other candidates on the spot, here are 12 questions.

Most important domestic issues of the campaign should be high prices and housing. A candidate can be heckled by merely asking him how he stands on these issues and what he proposes to do about them. A better plan is to ask specific questions to nail him down.

1. Do you favor restoration of price controls and rationing on scarce items like meat and automobiles, with the allocation of iron and steel to essential users until supplies increase and prices come down? Some people believe that a fundamental reason for high prices of food is the government's farm price support program. The Aiken farm bill passed by the last congress continues present price supports until Jan. 1, 1950, then puts in a revised, lower formula. To make out where a candidate stands on this issue, ask: 2. Do you favor amending the Aiken farm bill so as to lower farm price supports both before and after January, 1950?
3. Do you favor restoration of the matter of government aid for low-rental housing projects. Most other key points of the Taft-Elliott-Wagner housing bill were passed by the last congress. So ask your man: 4. Will you favor passage by the next congress of the low-cost public housing sections of the Taft-Elliott-Wagner housing bill?

A more basic approach to the housing question comes through rent controls which under present law are due to expire March 31, 1949. Ask Mr. Candidate: 5. Will you favor continuing rent control beyond next March 31? Big issue in the south and in

be done about communism in America. A key question to this issue would be: 6. Do you favor passage of the Mundt-Nixon bill requiring communists to register, or any bill to "out-law" the communist party?

Two great bottlenecks in congress are senate filibusters and the house rules committee which has dictatorial powers over proposed legislation before it reaches the house floor. Ask candidates: 7. Do you favor further reorganization of congress to eliminate senate filibusters and curb the power of the house rules committee? Henry Wallace is trying to make an issue out of the pentecost draft law and the present U. S. defense program. Question: 8. Do you favor repeal of the draft law and a reduction of government spending for U. S. rearmament?

Foreign policy questions can be dealt with in a number of ways. Should we get a "yes" or "no" answer, though some candidates may have a few ideas for amendments. 9. Do you favor repeal of the Taft-Hartley labor law? Republicans are trying to make an issue out of the spy investigations. It boils down to what should

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Lumber Units Ask Labor to Back Friends

BOISE, Sept. 15 (AP)—The 200 delegates attending the annual meeting of the northwestern council, lumber and sawmill workers (AFL) Tuesday were told to get out the vote for the friends of labor.

James Umber, president of the Montana State Council of Carpenters, urged all out efforts to complete the AFL's political education program and to cooperate with all organized labor "except the CIO."

"I won't ask anyone to cooperate with the CIO," he declared. "That would be as bad as asking the national association of manufacturers to cooperate. Before long the CIO would be trying to run the whole show."

Should Begin in Schools He said the education program should begin in the schools and suggested that school teachers be organized into unions.

Leonard Hall, Boise, outgoing secretary of the Idaho State Federation of Labor, said in Idaho "labor has been asleep at the switch for the last 20 years."

Earlier today Earl Anderson, director of the Washington state department of labor and industry, said all activities affecting labor should be directed by one department—and that the department of labor.

He said no labor department should attempt to encroach upon the work of the organized labor movement. He said the federal department of labor has been emasculated and weakened, adding there are now 25 agencies administering labor's affairs.

The convention will consider resolutions at tomorrow's sessions. The convention will end Thursday.

Russ Ahead in Output of Bombers, but U. S. Retaining Lead in Other Phases

Washington—Though the Soviet Union leads the United States in current production of heavy bombers—and, from all appearances, has set her sights much higher in that field—this country leads the world in almost every other phase of aviation progress.

This appears from figures and facts contained in a new publication, "World Aviation Annual," published by the Aviation Research Institute and the James Jackson Cabot professorship of air transportation of Norwich University.

It is borne out, in part, by figures assembled by United Nations World in a recent issue. These indicate that the United States has approximately 25,000 planes, though no more than 7,000 are actually in operation, while Russia is supposed to have about 7,500 first-line planes.

U. N. World says present-day Russian production is estimated at 60,000 to 100,000 planes a year, but that "deficiencies of precision instrument production and delays in completing blueprint designs retard full development of zero air forces."

"The World Aviation Annual" edited by J. Parker Van Zandt, contains one of the most complete collections of information on world aviation ever published in one volume.

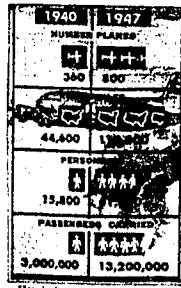
Much of this contains consolation for the fact that this country lags both in heavy bombers and in the rate of production of military aircraft. Here are some facts pointing to the United States' general dominance in the air.

More than half of the 17,000,000 miles scheduled each week, over the world, by regular air lines, at the end of 1947, was flown by U. S. operators.

Approximately 83 per cent of the 11,452 civil aircraft registered in the world—92,814—are in the United States.

The U. S. exported three-fifths of the volume of world trade in aircraft and equipment last year. Russian exports were almost zero.

U. S. Air Growth



Here's how U. S. airlines have grown in seven years to dominate the world's commercial aviation. Chart is from "Planes" and France 10 to 1.

U. S. aeronautical exports dominated every regional market in the world in 1947 except Africa and the USSR, where they were exceeded by British exports.

The combined passenger traffic in 1947 of the U. S. air transport command and the naval air transport service, now merged in the largest foreign airline, was exceeded, however, by each of the two largest U. S. scheduled civil air carriers, American Airlines and United Air Lines.

There are now more than 80 kinds of revenue-producing flying activities in the U. S. aside from commercial freight and passenger flying. They include such things as using planes to stop soil erosion, highway patrol, sign lighting, oil well service, ambulance service, rain-making, herding livestock, knocking ripe fruit off trees and patrolling truck lines. Approximately 2,500 aircraft are used in these miscellaneous air services.

Henry Finds Event Bets Differ At Siam's Horse Racing Spots

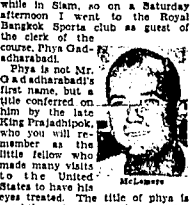
By HENRY McLEMORE BANGKOK, Siam—Horse racing and prize fighting were two of the things I was told that I must see while in Siam, so on a Saturday afternoon I went to the Royal Bangkok Sports club as guest of the clerk of the course, Phya Oad-acharabadi.

Phya is not Mr. Oad-acharabadi's first name, but a title conferred on him by the late King Prajadhipok, who was my roommate at the little fellow who made many visits to the United States to have his eyes treated.

In 1923, the first non-stop transcontinental flight, by Lieut. J. A. MacReady and Oakley Keeley, took 25 hours and 50 minutes, an average of 21 miles-per-hour. On Jan. 26, 1946, Col. William H. Council flew from Long Beach, Calif., to LaGuardia field, N. Y., in four hours 15 minutes, an average of 581 miles-per-hour.

The annual all-star the world's flight records, Maj. Marion Carl of the Marine Corps, the speediest at 650.79 miles-per-hour on Aug. 23, 1947, in a Douglas Skyraider. Capt. J. Cunningham of Great Britain holds the airplane altitude record of 50,492 feet which he set March 22, 1948.

American, the system of betting is a bit confusing. You bet either to win or place, but the catch is that place means second or third. This caused me misery, because in the seventh race I played Phaded Suk of the Tronburt stable to place. When he finished third I threw away my ticket. When I learned that I had thrown away some 300 ticals (what a name for currency!) I established a new Siamese record for rooting and hunting and searching and sifting. But I didn't find them.

A friend told me that more than one Siamese supports his family by following American bettors around and picking up the good tickets they throw away.

He felt the track sadder, wiser—and on foot.

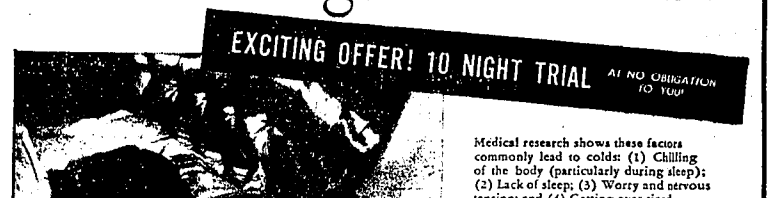

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Water Raise In Kootenay Given Okay

BONNERS FERRY, Idaho, Sept. 15 (AP)—A hearing conducted by the international joint commission today on a proposal to store two additional feet of water in Kootenay lake in British Columbia for power generation purposes developed no opposition.

The proposal was made by two Canadian firms—the West Kootenay Power and Light company, Ltd., and the Consolidated Mining and Smelting company of Canada, Ltd., to insure adequate water for power generation during low periods.

Needs Acute
A. L. Johansson, representative of the companies, said that the additional need for power in Canada is acute. Industries supplied by the companies are expanding and electric power needs will increase, he said.

Much of the discussion centered on how much the storage will increase the water level in the Kootenay river which flows north through Montana and Idaho into the Canadian lake.

Raises Level
Figures presented at the hearing indicated the water level of the river would be raised 17 feet at Bonners Ferry and approximately 2 inches more at the border.

T. R. Newell, U. S. agricultural survey engineer for Idaho, said that additional pumping costs in the drainage districts of the Kootenay valley in Idaho might be expected from the higher water level. Several speakers stressed the point that the applications for the increased storage should reimburse members of drainage for extra costs. Power company spokesmen have said the companies would compensate land land owners in case of damage.

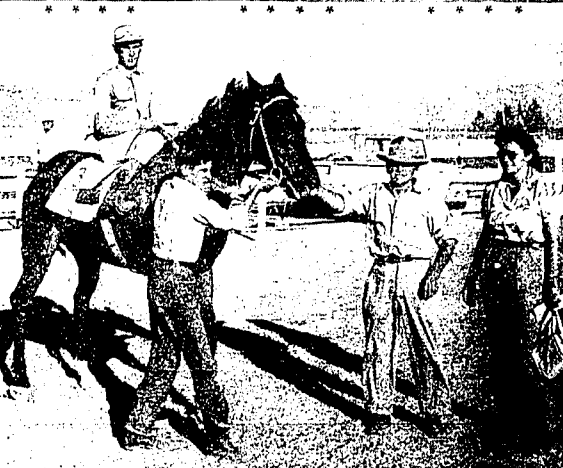
Would Offer Work
Early in the session, D. O. Thomas, representative of the U. S. corps of engineers, Seattle district, requested that the additional storage be deferred until repairs to flood damage in the valley are completed this fall. Thomas said a higher water level in the lake might delay the \$400,000 repair program now underway on dikes ripped out in the spring floods.

The power company official said the additional two feet of storage had been used during the war without apparent damage in the drainage districts. The additional storage in the lake would allow a flow of 11,000 cubic feet per second through company power plants when the river flow has fallen below that figure, officials said.

The joint commission will convene in Creston, B. C. tomorrow for the Canadian hearing on the application.
