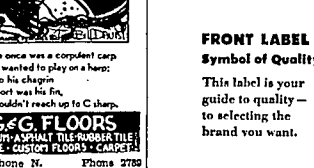

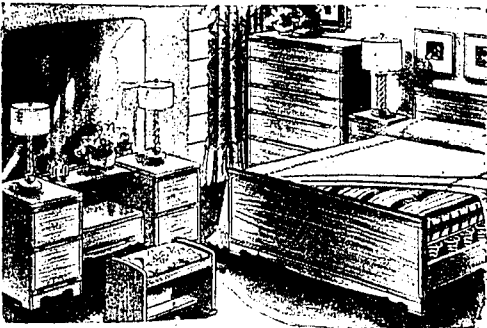

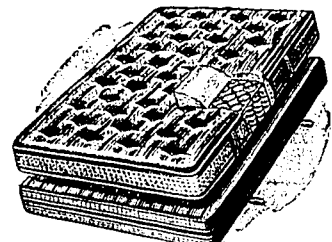

Dewey Plans Speech Tour In Northwest

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 16 (AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey will campaign for the presidency in Spokane, Wash., and Wyoming late this month and early in October.

The Republican nominee's campaign manager, Herbert Brownell, Jr., said tonight Dewey would make a noon address in Spokane Sept. 28. He will speak at noon.

"That evening the New York governor has a speech scheduled in Missoula, Mont."

This is his itinerary for the three days thereafter: Sept. 29, a noon address at Helena, Mont., and an evening speech at Great Falls, Mont.

Sept. 30, a noon speech at Pocatello, and an evening address in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Oct. 1, an evening speech in Cheyenne, Wyo.

In addition to these major addresses, Dewey will make several radio platform speeches from his train in each of those states.

To leave for Iowa The New York governor will leave Albany Sunday for Des Moines, Ia., where he will make the first major address of his campaign Monday evening.

His tour the following seven days, already announced, will take him into Colorado, Arizona, New Mexico, California and Oregon and in Washington to Tacoma and Seattle, as well as Spokane.

To Aid GOP's In Montana, Idaho and Wyoming Dewey plans to lend a hand to Republican renortial candidates.

Brownell later held a news conference it had not been decided whether Dewey would make additional major addresses on the way back to Albany from Cheyenne on the first campaign trip.

In response to a question, Brownell said both Sen. Robert A. Taft, R., O., and Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg, R. Mich., would speak during the campaign on behalf of the Dewey-Warren ticket.

He said also that Harold E. Stassen, former governor of Minnesota, would make a speech for the ticket about Oct. 1.

Queuille Regime Begins to Shake After Short Rule

PARIS, Sept. 16 (AP)—France's 114-day-old government, bludgeoned from the extreme right and left, started seriously today.

While Premier Henri Queuille's cabinet wrestled with emergency financial measures, a wave of strikes, many of them communist-led, spread through the nation.

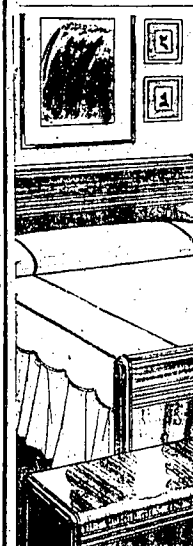

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 16 (UP)—The complicated story of how many Utah club operators bought whiskey from a Salt Lake City state agency at premium prices so they could get protection from a state agent was resumed today in district court.

The court's eight-man jury is trying Robert Harris, former chief law enforcement agent for the Utah liquor control commission, on charges of bribery.

Scheduled to testify today were owners and workers at several private and fraternal clubs in Salt Lake City, Ogden, Provo and Price.

Earlier witnesses have been similar operators from Price and Helper and Cyrus V. Lack, the former operator of the Brigham street liquor agency in Salt Lake City who has been indicted for embezzlement. The operators have all told how they paid Lack premium prices for liquor with the understanding Harris would get part of the premiums to protect their clubs against raids for sale of liquor by the drink.

But all over America folks who work the land share those common traits of hard work, sober moderation, and good fellowship, whether they're growing cattle for beef, or raising for good American beer and ale.

Typhoon Lashing Wide Japan Area

TOKYO, Sept. 16 (UP)—Two persons were dead, three were missing and one was injured in a disastrous typhoon and rainstorm that lashed Japan with winds as high as 80 miles an hour, flooding 5,000 homes and threatening the urgently-needed rice crop.

As the typhoon passed over Tokyo at 8:45 p. m. (14:45 a. m. MST), thousands of Japanese evacuated their homes in the city's low sections. It was expected that several thousands in Tokyo and elsewhere in Japan would be flooded out before dawn.

The fury of the storm began making itself felt a few hours before when mile-a-minute winds and driving rains ripped power lines, damaged railroads and caused river waters to rise to dangerous levels.

Seeding Planned In Range Areas

COODEN, Sept. 16 (UP)—The forest service reported today that 80,000 acres of rangeland in Intermountain forests are being replanted in grass this fall.

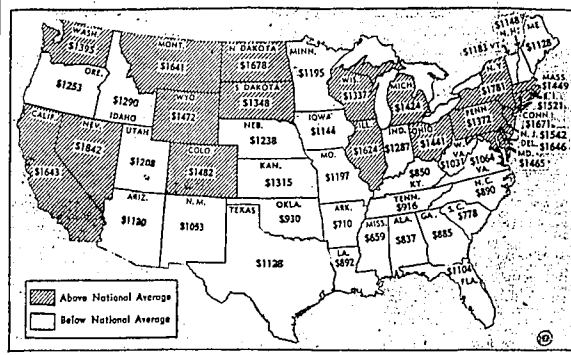

'Magic' Metal Announced By U. S. Firm

By HOWARD W. BLAKENLEE AP Science Editor WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (AP)—A magic new metal, titanium, chemical element No. 22, which makes war-time smoke screens, and the finest white paint, has been announced by the DuPont company.

Titanium is a natural, silver-white metal, one of the lighter weights but has never been made into metallic form because of the difficulties of extracting it from minerals.

This stuff is hard as iron, strong as stainless steel and resists rust as well as stainless steel. It is half the weight of iron and less than twice the weight of aluminum, but is much stronger than aluminum.

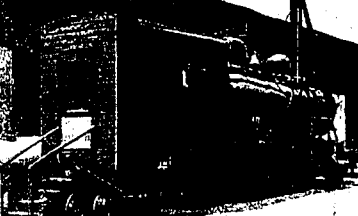
Even before any industrial uses have been found, it looks promising for airplanes. And it may be one of the answers to improved jet and rocket speeds running higher than 1,000 miles an hour.

The DuPont company has erected a small plant to produce 100 pounds a day in hopes that are porous but hard, for industry to experiment on the uses both as a pure metal and as an alloy.
