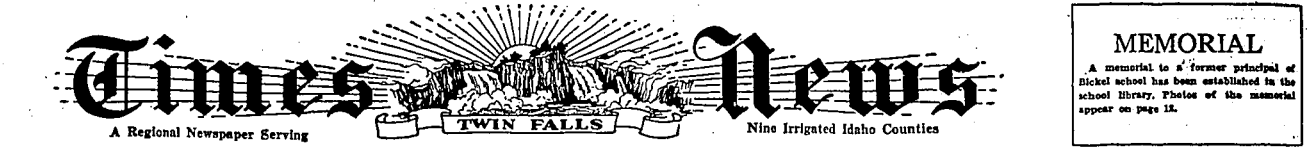

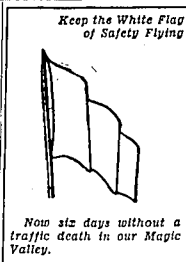
Willard Kuns, Mindoka county agent, said, "If this rain continues it will cause considerable damage to crops with much hay and many beans down."

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Pair of B-29s Complete Hop To Idaho City

BOISE, Sept. 18 (AP)—Two B-29 Superfortresses landed at Glendon field today before a crowd of 7,000 after completing a 4,800-mile flight as a part of air force day celebrations.

The big bombers landed at 3 p. m. (MST) yesterday at Goose Bay, Alaska. One bomber stopped en route at Hill Field, Utah, for refueling. Home base for the planes is Smoky Hill air base at Ballina, Kansas.

Two Races Last

In another feature of the Idaho observance of air force day, Idaho national guard pilots lost two of three races to Boise for three surrounding states.

Lieut. J. V. Mitchell flew to Boise from Salt Lake City in 47 minutes, 37 seconds, to beat Lieut. Earl Francis of the Utah national guard. Francis' time was 46 minutes, 10 seconds.

Washington Pilot Wins

Lieut. R. Vonaska of the Washington state national guard flew from Seattle to Boise in 48 minutes, 8 seconds. His time bettered that of Lieut. Clarence Hill of the Idaho guard and also that of the same trip in 45 minutes, 45 seconds.

In a race from Great Falls, Mont., to Boise, Capt. W. M. Lee of the Montana national guard reached the capital in 1 hour, 48 minutes, 5 seconds. Lieut. William T. Sprout, Idaho national guard pilot, beat him in 1 hour, 9 minutes and 12 seconds.

All the races were flown in P-51 Mustang fighter planes.

Grand Jury's Duties, Work Are Outlined

ment. Grand jurors are sworn in prior to trial jurors.

Proceedings of the grand jury are secret, the prosecutor said, and testimony given before it is secret. However, the names of witnesses must appear on the presentment or indictment returned by the jury.

Sweetley emphasized a grand jury is a legal body operating on legal principles under court direction. From other sources, including the Idaho code annotated, additional information about grand jurors was obtained. Following is the text of the oath given to a grand jury foreman:

"You, as foreman of the grand jury, will diligently inquire into and true presentment made, of all public offenses against the state of Idaho, committed or triable within this county, of which you shall have or can obtain legal evidence."

"You will keep your own counsel, and that of your fellows, and of the government will not, except when required in the due course of judicial proceedings, disclose the names of any witnesses or any other grand jurors who have voted in any matter before you."

"You will not permit any person through malice, hatred, or ill will, nor leave any unrepresented through fear, favor or affection, or in reward or the promise or hope thereof; but in all your presentments you will present the truth, and nothing but the truth, according to the best of your skill and understanding, so help you God."

A similar oath is given other jurors.

A grand jury must inquire into all public offenses committed or triable within the county, and report upon them to the court either in the form of a presentment or an indictment.

A presentment is the jury's formal written statement informing the court an offense has been committed and there is reasonable ground for believing a particular person has committed it. An indictment is the jury's written accusation charging a person with a public offense.

Where the grand jury does not have to hear evidence for the defendant, but must weigh all evidence given it, and where there is reason to believe additional evidence available will exonerate the charge, the jurors should order such evidence produced.

At a grand jury knows, or has reason to believe, a public offense has been committed he must tell the other jurors about it and they in turn must investigate the matter.

Although the court instructs the grand jury on what is to be investigated, the jury can investigate other matters as well, but before doing so it must be given information regarding some other alleged offense. Under Idaho law, any citizen has the opportunity to give evidence to the grand jury.

A grand jury may be described as an arm of the court during a particular term of the court. Its jurisdiction is similar to a justice of the peace or probate judge arranging and giving a preliminary hearing to a person charged with a crime. In either case, if the facts warrant, the

person is bound over for a district court trial.

One source said in the event a prosecuting attorney is disqualified, a special prosecutor. Questioning of witnesses and presentation of evidence ordinarily is handled by a prosecuting attorney.

Normally the first step towards a grand jury is the presenting of information to a district judge by a prosecuting attorney. On the basis of that information the prosecutor asks the judge to call a grand jury. In unusual cases, the information can come from elsewhere.

Calling a grand jury is entirely at the judge's discretion. The information of the court probably could appeal to him as a matter the prosecutor could not handle in normal procedure.

If the judge feels a grand jury is necessary, he issues a written order to that effect, and the jurors are drawn ordinarily in the same way as in the case of trial jurors.

The judge appoints the foreman, and through the court clerk, awards the foreman to secrecy. The foreman swears the witnesses called by the jury. Ordinarily the judge gives the jury the services of his court reporter.

The jury arrives at its findings and informs the court by presentment or indictment, labeled a true bill. The grand jury may present its findings from time to time or may wait until its findings are completed before announcing any of them.

Much of the power of a grand jury lies in the fact it is a part of the court, and as such can bring contempt proceedings for refusal to testify, revocation of jury proceedings as well as the usual contempt actions. Maximum penalties for contempt include a \$500 fine, five days in jail, or both.

A person named in a presentment or indictment is arraigned, enters his plea, and the matter is handled in normal court procedure.

"The purpose of the plaintiff in making his applications and in depositing his money was to obtain for his illegal and poultry prohibited business the immunity and protection the ordinance purported to give. Public policy condemns the actions of all parties."

U. S.; English Planes Chalk Airlift Mark

BERLIN, Sept. 18 (AP)—American and British air forces sent 893 cargo flights into Soviet-occupied Germany today in an awesome demonstration of peacetime air power.

U. S. Lieut.-Gen. Curtis Lemay's 14th Air Force flew 411 sorties with 5,572 tons of "bonus" coal for the need of eastern Berlin's 2,500,000 beleaguered inhabitants. The record-smashing feat dwarfed the famed wartime "hump" shuttle from India to China.

The royal air force flew 244 flights with an unannounced cargo tonnage.

Bill Berlin States

The huge armada filled Berlin's skies with an endless roar. Even bad weather will not halt the lift, for the Americans flew 18 of the 24 hours ended at noon under instruction.

The American haul surpassed by 1,624 tons the previous record set four days ago in 498 flights. It exceeded the target of 4,000 to 5,000 tons set by Lemay yesterday when he called on his airmen to celebrate the anniversary of the U. S. air force with record-shattering flights.

Meanwhile, the western press said a wave of terror against non-communists had started in the Soviet occupation zone. Several prominent non-communists were reported to have fled to western Germany.

The American-licensed Neue Zeitung said police in the Soviet zone were being built into a "mass militant organization" armed with machineguns and machine pistols instead of the customary carbines.

The newspaper said the Soviet-backed Socialist Unity party (Sud) plans to use the specially drilled police as the "military arm of the communist movement."

Farmers Told To Push Area Weed Control

The season for control of noxious weeds is far from over, according to Harry Gault, weed control bureau director. Gault urges farmers with wild morning glory or Canadian thistle to irrigate their land thoroughly, allow the weeds to re-grow and then spray them.

Gault said all of this month and October remain for spraying weeds. He warned, however, the land must be wet for either spray or gas treatments to be effective.

Turning to long-term measures for control of thistle, morning glory and ground cherry, the weed control director recommended the planting of a heavy stand of Ranger or Buffalo alfalfa. He stated this will clean out thistle and give an 80 per cent kill of morning glory and ground cherry.

Gault described the Ranger and Buffalo varieties as the only ones sufficiently resistant to bacterial wilt to give a good stand for the four years necessary to choke out the weeds. The alfalfa is planted on the weed infested lands and chokes out the growth of the weeds.

West Germany Skies Filled by 'Vittles' Planes

FRANKFURT, Germany, Sept. 18 (UP)—The air between West Germany and Berlin is so full of planes these days it takes a feat of aerial juggling to keep them from hitting each other.

There is a plane load of food or fuel landing in the blocked, divided city every couple of minutes—day and night, rain or shine. The task of keeping these aircraft safely apart is one that makes the job of a train dispatcher look simple by comparison.

The hazards are obvious. Yet so far, after 23 days of supplying Berlin's western sectors by air—operation "Vittles"—has cost only one aerial collision and two other fatal accidents.
