### Air Transport Service Called Aid to Defense

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 (AP)—The military air transport service is the modern "minute man" of America.

It is more than a global transport service—incidentally, the only one of its kind in the world. It is a guardian of American security and an instrument of U. S. foreign policy, geared to fly anywhere at a moment's notice in an emergency.

Security Is Dependent Gen. Carl A. Spaatz, retired air force chief, has said the nation's security depends on outer bases from which American airplanes can project itself in a decisive struggle for air supremacy.

That is where the military air transport service, an adjunct of the air force, plays a vital if not readily apparent role.

Its globe-girding chain of bases is this country's first line of defense—and attack—in case of war.

Providing Fueling Defensively, these bases provide a cushion of space protecting the United States. From these bases, planes could go aloft to intercept an enemy air thrust well before it got within striking distance of American shores. They also serve the purpose of keeping aggressor bases remote enough to prevent enemy bombs from falling on the United States.

Offensively, the bases provide ready-made springboards for bombing an enemy in the early stages of a war—to hold him at arm's length until reinforcements can be moved in.

Provide "Hold-on" Means Eventually, it would take a combination of ground, sea and air power to hold outlying bases and to mount an offensive from them. But, in the initial stages, the job of holding on would depend largely on air power.

Had such a system existed in the early days of the Pacific war, it is possible that American forces on the Philippines would have been able to hold out until reinforcements could be moved in. As it was, they were completely cut off, with no way of getting needed food and ammunition supplies.

### Patient Leaves Hospital After Six Operations in 25 Months

Two years, one month and two days—and six operations—after he entered Twin Falls county hospital, Joe Kaye was released Wednesday afternoon to go to the county room home. He will remain there until his condition warrants return to the hospital for more surgery.

Doctors saw no chance for the 44-year-old farmer to live when he entered the hospital Aug. 21, 1946, so badly was he burned in trying to save his belongings from his blazing cabin four miles north of Kimberly. Chances to recover are slim when 40 per cent of the skin area is severely burned.

Today, after six skin-grafting operations, Kaye's back, head, arms and hands present an ugly, distorted appearance. With the exception of a donation by Ernest Brundley, Kimberly, all skin grafted came from Kaye himself. More operations of a different nature, are scheduled to restore some use to his crippled hands in the hope he can again earn his living.

Everett E. Moody, hospital superintendent, described Kaye as an ideal patient, one whom the staff will miss. And on his part, Kaye is grateful to his physicians, nurses, hospital and county authorities who made his recovery possible. In many ways it was hard for Kaye to leave his home of two years.

However, he has a probability of meeting life as it comes and refuses to brood over what happened to him or what he lost in the fire of 25 months ago. Nonetheless he is still deeply concerned about his citizenship papers which were destroyed in the blaze.

Proud of his American citizenship, Kaye was born in Czechoslovakia. He is a bachelor and has no family here.

### Expert Avows Propellor Jets Feasible Soon

VANGOVER, B. C., Sept. 23 (AP)—Propellor-driven jets are feasible "within five years" for commercial airlines, Air Commodore Sir Frank Whittle said at the closing session of the Northwest Aviation Planning council convention here.

Whittle, a royal air force officer who designs jet engines, told delegates that the "sticking" problem in airport operations makes commercial use of turbo-jets impractical.

He explained "sticking" is assigning planes to specified altitudes on a certain pattern while awaiting their turn to land at a field.

"However, within five years," he said, "we'll probably see propellor jets on four-engine aircraft used commercially because of their lower speed at lower levels."

Col. Leo Howell, jr., Washington, D. C., revealed Tuesday that a jet fighter designed to travel three times the speed of sound is being built by the U. S. air force.

Howell said one such experimental plane, designed to travel up to 2,100 miles per hour and climb more than 100,000 feet, now is in production. He gave no further details.

HEALTH-Back in 1938-39 there was a growing conception in the United States that America's frontiers were in Europe—the Rhine. **Reserve Count**

The Ruhr industrial area which we are revitalizing for European recovery, the defense of France for which the French are so afraid, the defense of our entire program in Europe, will depend not on what we have here, but on what we have in reserve if the Russians make a break.

Some name to Germany wondering if our authorities here were being shortchanged? In not demanding greater strength right now, I wonder whether we might not be rebuilding German industry merely to let it be a greater threat when ordered, when General Clay said our occupation army of 100,000 men was Europe's best guarantee against war, why 500,000 wouldn't be better?

**View Clarifying**

A cleavage view of the situation is being developed by the military authorities for military preparatives here when it is considered against the background of the whole allied program.

The United States is in no position to go into Germany now an army which might throw in. If it (defense) day comes again the outcome will depend on the mobilization of all Europe, not just on what America does.

**Army Complicating**

The experts figure it is better to make a first class army out of what is here, cultivate military agreements with our allies, and be prepared to throw in the real strength from home—the strength of both industry and the new draft army.

The C-47 Dakota, which was believed to have been carrying 11 persons, \$240,000 in payroll money and 400 pounds of gold bullion, disappeared Feb. 5, 1943, on a flight from Fort Nelson, B. C., to Whitehorse, Y. T.

Canadian air force authorities received reports the wreckage was found by C. Falter, a Yorkton, Ore., hunter and his guide, John Bayne, Fort Nelson, about 20 miles from T'chudi lake, which is about 43 minutes flying time from Fort Nelson. The plane was 10 minutes away from Fort Nelson when it crashed.

First reports said the plane did not burn and that the hunter and his guide found the currency and gold intact. The bodies of the 11 passengers were in the wreckage, authorities here were told.

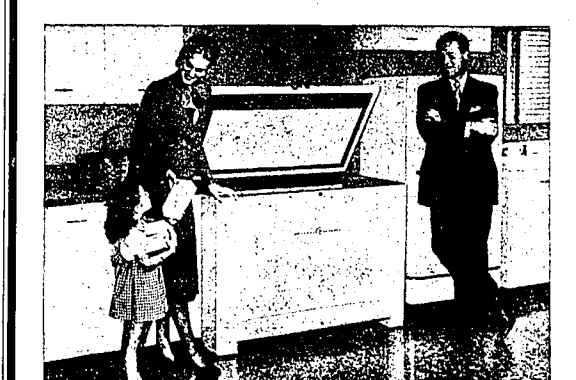

Repeating "secret deals" and "under the table" diplomacy, Warren said an effective foreign policy also must have the approval and understanding of the people.

The Republican vice presidential candidate spoke in Memorial auditorium here after a day in which his special train traversed southern Illinois, Indiana and Kentucky.

As the Warren special stopped at Henderson and Owensboro, Ky., the California governor paid his respects to Gen. Albert Bradley, the Democratic vice presidential candidate and his opposite campaign number.

"It is a fine American who has made many contributions to good government in his years of public service," Warren said, speaking extemporaneously.

Attacks "Commercialism"

In his talk here, Warren leveled a critical attack on "commercialized" official foreign "secret" dealings in "best" sales and "dealt" literature.

Warren declared American bipartisan foreign policy was conceived four years ago by Gov. Thomas D. Dewey as titular head of the Republican party. Since then, he added, it has been led by Senator Vandenberg of Michigan, Republican senate spokesman on foreign affairs.

Warren called the Republican party "fringe unified" than at any time in its history.

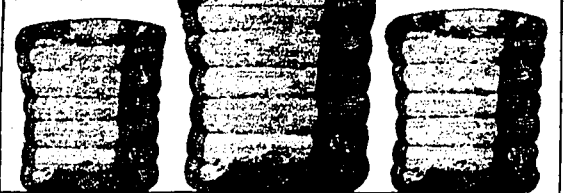

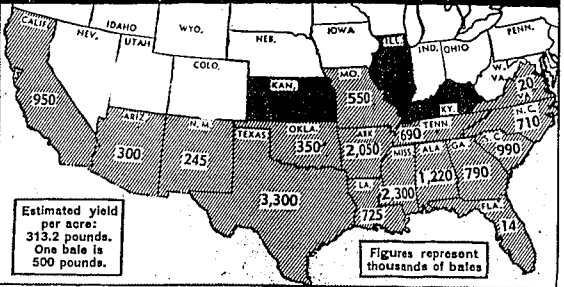

### Coal Dealers Of Area Hold Session Here

"Better service and equipment in the coal business will pay large dividends," Harold G. Mays, Salt Lake City, Utah, chairman representative of the National Coal Heating Association, told 35 coal dealers and outfitting men at a banquet at 7:30 p. m. Wednesday at the Park hotel.

Representatives from Jerome, Burley, Declo, Buhl, Rupert and Twin Falls, heard Master of Ceremonies George Warburg introduce P. H. M. DeLoe, Boise, representative of the Idaho Coal Dealers Association, who discussed the basic plan of the coal heating service before introducing Mays.

**Cooperative Sought**

The overall plan of the national coal heating service is for coal dealers and men selling coal-burning equipment for homes to work together in finding solutions for problems of heating with the aid of the national association. Mays stressed better coal and better coal-burning equipment coupled with 24-hour emergency combustion service to increase the tonnage of this fuel, the western representative stated.

Beveridge said the Idaho service was divided into five separate units including eastern Oregon, and each unit had its own elected officers.

Units began operation simultaneously March 15, and, although they are yet young, the service is available to 63 per cent of the people of Idaho, the state representative said.

### Silver Spike Ends Labors On Rail Line

**POCATELLO, Sept. 23 (UP)—**A silver spike has been driven into the hole of the Ft. Hall Indian reactivation near Pocatello to symbolize completion of the west's newest industrial railroad line.

The line is a 24-mile stretch of Union Pacific track from the main line north of Pocatello to the rock phosphate mine of the J. H. Simplot company on the reservation.

The \$13,000,000 line will be used to transport phosphate from the mine to a plant at Pocatello, now expanded to a capacity of 200,000 tons of superphosphate per year.

It also will be used later to handle phosphate supplies for the Westvaco Chemical company, now putting in a large electric fertilizer installation near Simplot's fertilizer plant.

The blow at the silver spike on the line was struck shortly after noon by George F. Ashby, president of the Union Pacific railroad. Others who helped drive it were Westvaco's J. H. Simplot, and Westvaco's construction company.

Simplot revealed that the townsite at the mine from now on will be called "Gay," honoring his three-year-old daughter, Gay Simplot, who also participated in the ceremony. The reduction plant and furnaces west of Pocatello are at "Don," named for the millionaire industrialist's son.

The spike was handed to Ashby by Chief La Salle Pocatello, head of the tribal council of the Bannock-Shoshone tribes that receive a substantial royalty on the phosphate being produced on their lands.

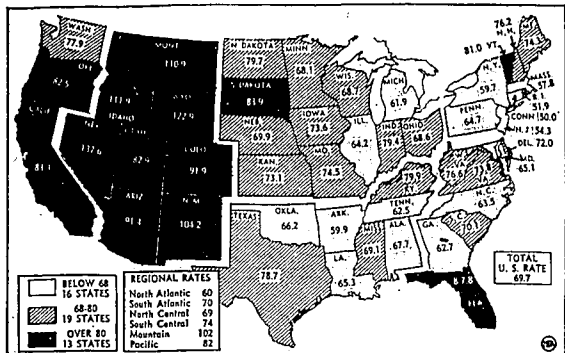
### World Almanac's Editor Succumbs

Irving, a tall, ruddy-faced white-haired man, who had held many top executive positions on New York newspapers, left his home on Staten Island as usual this morning for his office in the New York World-Telegram building.

On the Staten Island train he became ill and was helped off at the Dongan Hills station. He telephoned for his wife, Margaret, but died before she arrived.

### Barkley Plea Plumps Need For Big Vote

**BRIDGPORT, Conn., Sept. 23 (UP)—**Sen. Alben W. Barkley urged voters last night to get out a big vote in November to strike down a growing threat to "progress and liberalism."

The Democratic vice-presidential nominee heavily stressed Barkley's plea under democratic administration in a speech at the Connecticut State Federation of Labor convention here.

They have paid a high price for that failure, he added, limiting GOP congressional control for high prices and labor curbs.

The ship was a C-54, an early wartime transport model.

AF officers said it was flying from Fort Nelson to Port 62, about 600 miles of the wilder territory in Canada.

The plane disappeared February, 1943, on a trip from Fort Nelson to Whitehorse, Y. T. It was last heard from 45 minutes out of Fort Nelson.

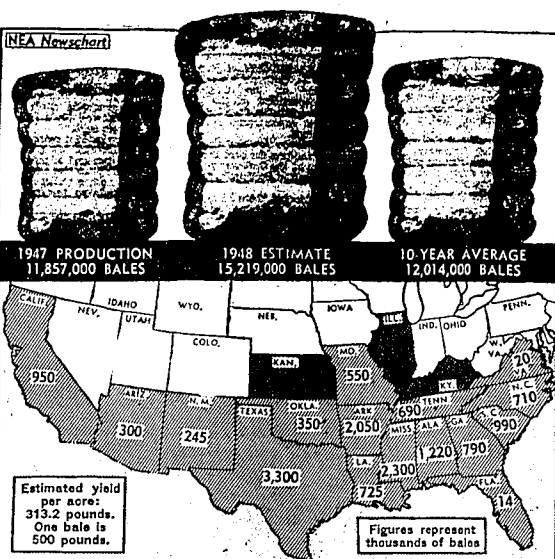

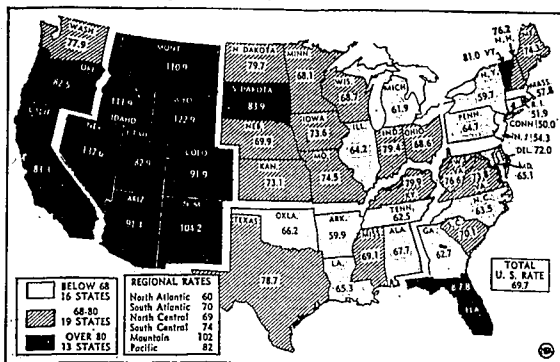
**Cooperative Sought**

# Silver Spike Ends Labors On Rail Line

POCATELLO, Sept. 23 (UP)—A silver spike has been driven into a hole at the Ft. Hall Indian reservation near Pocatello to symbolize completion of the west's newest industrial railroad line.

The line is a 24-mile stretch of Union Pacific track from the main line north of Pocatello to the rock phosphate mine of the J. R. Simpson company on the reservation.

The \$1,200,000 line will be used to haul phosphates from the mine, 21 miles east of Ft. Hall, to the Simpson plant west of Pocatello, now being expanded to a capacity of 300,000 tons of superphosphate per year.

It also will be used later to handle phosphate supplies for the Westvaco Chemical company, now putting in a large storage unit in installation near Simpson's fertilizer plant.

First blow at the silver spike on the line was struck shortly after noon by George F. Ashby, president of the Union Pacific railroad. Others who helped drive it were Simpson, W. T. Nichols of Westvaco and Murray Burns of Boise, an executive of the Morrison Knudsen Construction company.

Simpson revealed that the tonnage at the mine from now on will be called "Gay," honoring his three-year-old daughter, Gay Simpson, who also participated in the ceremony. The reduction plant and furnaces west of Pocatello are at "Don" named for the millionaire industrialist's son.

The spike was handed to Ashby by Chief Le Salle Pocatello, head of the tribal council of the Bannock-Shoshone tribes that receive a substantial royalty on the phosphates being produced on their lands.

# Work Almanac's Editor Succumbs

NEW YORK, Sept. 23 (UP)—E. Eastman Irvine, editor of the World Almanac for the last 11 years, died unexpectedly today on his way to work. He was 64.

Irvine, a tall, ruddy-faced white-haired man, who had held many top executive positions on New York newspapers, left his home on Staten Island as usual this morning for his office in the New York World-Telegram building.

On the Staten Island train he became ill and was helped off at the Donagan Hills station. He telephoned for his wife, Margaret, but died before she arrived.

# Barkley Plea Plumps Need For Big Vote

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Sept. 23 (AP)—Sen. Albert W. Barkley urged labor last night to get out a big vote in November to strike down a threat to "progress and liberalism."

The Democratic vice-presidential nominee heavily stressed his gains under democratic administrations in a speech at the Connecticut State Federation of Labor convention here.

It was his first campaign speech in Republican New England and followed a one-day swing through agricultural Delaware.

**Too Much at Stake**  
"Labor has too much at stake in this election to allow anything whatsoever to prevent it from marshaling its forces on Nov. 2 and marching to the polls in an unprecedented array," he said.

"Labor must not only vote itself, but must see to it that its friends vote. It must organize its campaign to the most minute detail. It must leave nothing to chance."

He said a democratic victory in November is "inevitable" if workers, housewives, businessmen and veterans exercise their right to vote.

**Goals Jeopardized**  
Labor's gains during years of Democratic administration, Barkley declared, were "in jeopardy" by the Republican congressional victory in 1946. That victory, he said, was caused by the failure of millions of American workers to vote. They have paid a high price for that failure, he added, blaming GOP congressional control for high prices and labor curbs.

Air officers said it was flying from Fort Nelson to Fort St. John's, over some of the wildest territory in Canada.

The plane disappeared February, 1943, on a trip from Fort Nelson to Whitecourt, Y. T. It was last heard from 45 minutes out of Fort Nelson.

# Indians Opposing Reservation End

PORT HALL, Sept. 23 (AP)—Leaders of the Bannock-Shoshone Indian tribes expressed opposition to proposed abandonment of the Indian reservation plan.

A recent meeting of the Interstate Association of Public Land Councils suggested liquidation of the reservations within the next 10 years.

"Take away the Indian agency and control and right away a third of our people would lose their land," said Le Salle Pocatello, chairman of the Bannock-Shoshone tribal council.

"They would not know how to keep it or they would be too poor to protect themselves," he added. "Many of us are ready to live like the white man, vote, pay taxes, run our own affairs. But it would be all wrong for the families who are not ready."

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 23 (AP)—Woodruff Randolph said Wednesday the legal okay the New York commercial printing industry gave a contract with the International Typographical union led him to propose the same terms for union contracts with newspaper publishers.

The ITU president said attorneys for the New York commercial industry and his own union counsel assured him the contract conformed to the Taft-Hartley law and a federal court injunction.

Randolph testified today first as a government and later as a union witness in the federal court contempt case charging the ITU and its officers with disobeying Judge Luther M. Swygert's decree against Taft-Hartley labor law violations.

Attorneys for the national labor relations board say the ITU contract distributed by the ITU international to locals for use in negotiations with publishers contains clauses designed to violate or bypass Taft-Hartley law provisions.

### Glamour Nags Are Target in Owyhee Area

MURPHY, Ida., Sept. 23 (UP)—A couple of wild horses credited with more glamour than many a captive ranging the Hollywood movie acts are targets in a western roundup in the rim rock country south of here.

Hugh Nettleton of the Joyce ranch says he and five of his wranglers will join other buckaroos in a wild 600-horse roundup next week. Nettleton says 20 to 25 wranglers will be after the biggest bunch of wild ponies in the U. S.

Some of Nettleton's riders reported a wild stallion in the area "which answers the description of Rainbow, king of the wild horses in the Owyhee breaks."

Always Eludes Men

"Several of my riders have taken after him already, but he has given them the slip," Nettleton says. "We hope to bring him in this fall."

The other glamour horse, beautiful mare, is the Rainbow's running mate. Wranglers have named her "Stardust."

About 8 years old, Rainbow got his name because of his elusiveness. Wrangler Bill Johnson explains, "He is just like a rainbow... big and beautiful... always beckoning us on, but never there when we get there."

Wranglers still talk about the time when Rainbow led more than a thousand horses back into a canyon, turned his head about face in a charge that bowled over wranglers like 10 pins.

To Protect Ranges

Nettleton says the main object in going after the wild horses, is not for the horses themselves but to protect the ranges for cattle.

"One horse uses and stomps down enough range for five or six cows," Nettleton explains.

He says he and his men will use tame mares as bait in an attempt to capture the wild horses.

Nettleton says most of the wild ponies are thin and scraggly and that rarely is there a good horse among them. But when there is, he says, it's really a good horse.

### Farm, Ranch Output Values Boom in West

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 (AP)—The value of farm and ranch products in the western states in the first half of 1948 increased by more than \$75,000,000 over the similar period in 1947, the agriculture department reports.

Cash receipts from farm and ranch marketing of crops and livestock in these states in the January through June period were \$1,903,352,000. For the first half of last year they totaled \$1,828,531,000.

California led the western states for the six months with \$678,232,000. Washington was second with \$122,270,000. During the period last year, California receipts totaled \$285,045,000, and those of Washington \$211,031,000.

The same receipts for other western states for the first half of 1948, with comparable figures for 1947 shown in parentheses, were as follows:

Montana \$116,000,000 (\$100,500,000), Idaho \$135,843,000 (\$121,331,000), Wyoming \$35,097,000 (\$31,210,000), Colorado \$189,284,000 (\$167,650,000), New Mexico \$50,653,000 (\$48,005,000), Arizona \$102,202,000 (\$81,203,000), Utah \$61,252,000 (\$52,355,000), Nevada \$12,244,000 (\$15,445,000), Oregon \$122,870,000 (\$117,403,000).

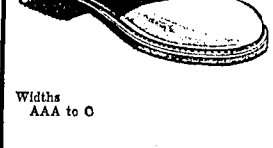

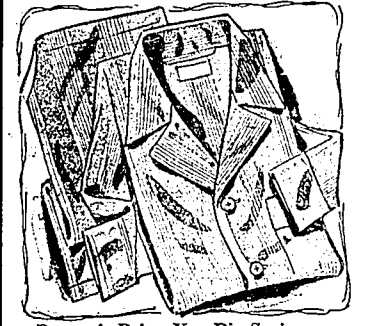

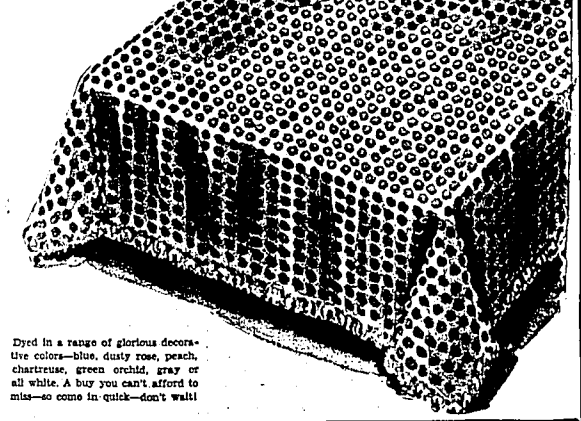

### Allies Not to Yield Berlin, Bevin Avers

LONDON, Sept. 23 (AP)—Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin stated unmistakably Wednesday that the western allies intend to stake peace on an unyielding stand in Berlin. Shortly afterward, a foreign office spokesman announced that Britain, the United States and France had delivered new notes on the Berlin deadlock to Moscow's envoys in the three capitals today. Their contents were not divulged.

**Consentance No Good**  
Addressing a packed and hushed house of commons, Bevin asserted the Russians are people "from whom you cannot buy peace" with concessions.

"Berlin stands out now as the symbol of resistance—a sort of sentinel," he said.  
To save that sentinel, he declared, Britain and the United States will boost the "air lift" of food and fuel into the blockaded German capital, with most of the increased winter burden falling on the United States.

**Agreed on Policy**  
The three western powers are not only "in absolute agreement as to the policy of the lift and of defending ourselves in Berlin, but in the policy we shall jointly pursue in the fall."

French foreign ministry spokesmen in Paris said the notes of the three powers were addressed to the "Kremlin" in Moscow instead of two Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov, and thus might come to the direct attention of Premier Marshal Joseph Stalin.

The notes are the latest move in eight weeks of negotiations over blockaded Berlin. They were the result of consultations in Paris this week among Bevin, U. S. Secretary of State Marshall and French Foreign Minister Schuman and their advisers.

### Organized Units Considered Asset

BOISE, Sept. 23 (AP)—The organized reserve will play a major part in rapid mobilization of the American army, Maj-Gen. Albert E. Brown said Wednesday.

General Brown, the commanding general, northern military district, Vancouver Barracks, Wash., is inspecting the organized reserve training units here.

Termining America's armed forces a "civilian army" General Brown emphasized the increasing importance organized reservists will play in the event of another war.

He said world conditions were "very unstable" and he urged a constant preparedness.

### Boise Blue Baby Operation Slated

BOISE, Sept. 23 (AP)—Boise's blue baby, three-year-old Mary Jo Kent, will be operated upon Oct. 23 at Portland, Ore.

Mrs. George Kent, mother of the youngster, said the operation is being made possible by the Garland Kwanita club of Spokane, Wash., which undertakes to help blue babies in the Pacific northwest.

Two other Kent blue babies have died previously.

Reason Given For No Cost Cut on Bread

NEW YORK, Sept. 27 (AP)—The price of wheat is falling, but the price of bread is not. Why? One reason is that you demand more in service, convenience and fancy trimming than grandma did. In her day the major cost of bread was the price of flour, today it is not.

Only a little more than two cents of a 14-cent retail price on a loaf of bread goes to the farmer for his wheat. Less than two cents goes to the miller for grinding it into flour and delivering it to the baker. Slightly more than two cents goes to the other ingredients—milk, sugar, shortening, yeast and salt.

A cents for "convenience" That leaves eight cents not being to the convenience of not having bread packaged for fancy wrappings and pre-sliced loaves, for distribution and added vitamins, and for having standardized quality.
