PARIS, Sept. 24 (AP)—Russia suffered seven quick defeats in the United Nations general assembly today in her fight to throw out agenda items she disliked. The Soviet Delegate Jacob Malik returned to the attack on the little assembly, demanding that items referred by it to the full assembly be tossed out. He claimed the little assembly, set up as a committee of the whole and boycotted by Russia, was illegal.

Four Russian assembly proposals were retained, and only the Slav bloc states voting with the Russians. Likewise three other proposals blasted by the Russians were retained. The delegates then, without opposition, adopted the remainder of the 69 item agenda for the full assembly. The request of South Africa to be admitted to the assembly as a full member, the treatment of South African minorities. This was held over for further discussion in committee.

Malik, speaking in the absence of Chief Soviet Delegate Andrei V. Vishinsky, demanded the elimination from the general assembly's agenda of items referring to the little assembly. He said that the problem of independence for Korea; proposed the use of the United Nations to bring about the establishment of the little assembly on a parity with the United Nations to promote international political cooperation.

Malik demanded the assembly be adjourned until the Balkan commission report which found that Greek communists rebuffed Greece's communist neighbors, and the Argentine and Portugal and Trans-Jordan in the security council vote.

State Land Unit Approves Sales Of Special Areas

BOISE, Sept. 24 (AP)—The state land board had a busy session yesterday, approving numerous applications for land sales, timber sales and mineral leases.

Edward Woolley, state land commissioner, said 5,109 acres of state-owned land and timber on 4,133 acres were approved for sale. Nine applications for oil and gas leases and several other mineral leases were approved by the board.

The largest item approved for sale was timber on 3,200 acres in Clearwater county. The timber on the tract is estimated at 119,500.

Other timber approved for sale is located on 413 acres in Bonner county. It is estimated at 115,307.50.

Oil and gasoline leases were approved on 160 acres in Gem county; 120 acres in Idaho county, 640 in Blaine, 640 in Owyhee, 400 in Elmore and 1,160 in Bear Lake county.

The land approved for sale includes 440 acres in Elmore county and 1,700 in Cassia county.

Trial Set for Oct. 11 After Plea Entered

Slots Labeled As Necessary Evil by Group

BOISE, Sept. 24 (AP)—Slot machines were condemned as a necessary evil until such time as the Idaho legislature grants cities the right to raise sufficient revenue, members of the Idaho Municipal League said yesterday.

Several mayors said: "I opposed the idea of municipalities being in partnership with owners of the gambling devices."

"They disliked being dependent for a necessary portion of the municipal income on devices that may not be legal from one session of the legislature to the next or which might be declared illegal in a court decision."

Need Revenue

Many, however, said that until cities were granted the right to levy excise taxes or otherwise obtain additional revenue, the income from slot machines was needed to run city governments. Numerous improvements purchased from slot machine revenue were cited.

The league, at the opening session of its three-day meeting, took no formal action on this or other issues.

Draft Pool of 2 Million Men Is Announced

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24 (AP)—First reports from registration centers indicate America's armed forces will have a pool of about 2,000,000 single, non-veteran men 19 through 25 in which to dip for draftees.

If earlier defense estimates stand, only about 250,000 will be inducted for the 21-month peacetime draft between now and June 30, and officials believe there will be little trouble in getting this many. Almost all of the 250,000 will go into the army.

Selective service said today reports from 43 states, territories and possessions show 2,008,418 men 18 through 25 registered between Aug. 30 and Sept. 18.

Of this total, 1,265,216 are in the classification eligible for induction.

But 11 states, including some of the country's largest, have not reported. Officials would not predict the eventual total, but some said they believed early estimates of around 2,500,000 men 18 through 25 would stand up.



New-Used Car Racket Heads To Junk Heap

WASHINGTON—The fabulous gray market in new-used cars which has flourished in the U. S. since the death of OPA is headed for the big bust.

Reports from all over the nation indicate that efforts of the battle-axe dealers and the manufacturers are rapidly drying up the supply of brand new cars getting into the used car market.

And the final blow to the semi-legal business is expected to be given by the new government credit controls.

Four Tactics Combined

Your tactics by the honest dealers have combined to put the racket on the skids:

1. Making new car purchasers sign a "conditional sales agreement."
2. Forcing buyers to sell the car back to the original dealer with a 10 per cent loss if the purchaser decides to get rid of the car before six months.
3. Dealers carefully investigating prospective buyers of new cars to make sure that they plan to hold on to them.
4. Cancelling fleet order sales to individuals. Many large companies' fleet deals lined up for their employees, giving rush delivery. Most auto manufacturers now limit fleet sales to cars which will be registered in the name of the company.

Cross-Check Lists

4. Dealers getting together and cross-checking waiting lists. This reveals the names of persons on several lists who plan to sell the cars for profit.

The tightened supply of new cars available to the used car dealers has had the effect of sending the prices of those left on the lot to unprecedented heights.

An American Automobile association national survey revealed that late model Fords were up an average of 63 per cent over list price. Chevrolts were up 60 per cent. Buicks 42 per cent. Dodges 33 per cent. Studebakers 21 per cent and Cadillacs 57 per cent.

Finance Firms Balk

Many finance companies are already balking at putting up money for cars at those outrageous prices. And the used car dealers admit that with a buyer having to put up a third of the cost of the car at one time and payments spread only over 18 months, prices will be forced down and most purchasers will just disappear.

There is no doubt prices of all used cars will continue to be well above normal and that lots will still do a profitable business in older used cars. But it is hoped that the racket will be broken on the more vicious aspects of the business.

Henry Swears by Hong Kong Cooks After 'Unusual' Dinner

HONG KONG, China—You start off in a motor car, preferably one of the little British ones with the Highland pony power.

Then you switch to a rickshaw.

After the rickshaw you take a sampan, and the sampan, poled by ancient Chinese, takes you to a junk, anchored in a cove.

It is a three-deck junk, lighted with Chinese lanterns from stem to stern.

You get a magnificent welcome when you go aboard. Venerable old men who look a bit on the Cornucopia side shake your hand, middle-aged men and young boys and girls curtsy and bow, women with babies in their arms smile shyly from the shadows, and then all seem to combine to show you their table.

This was our introduction to having dinner at Aberdeen, a fishing village almost directly across the Peak from Hong Kong. It is said to be one of the oldest fishing villages in the world, dating back to a time when the term B. C. was in vogue.

It is a little more than a dot on the map, one of the tiny fishing villages about Hong Kong. Yet, to those who dine in this part of the world, a dinner offered anywhere in the universe if he didn't appear one evening on a restaurant junk anchored off shore from Aberdeen.

The 15 minutes or so spent on the sampan, as it slowly moves across the water, is guaranteed to sharpen the appetite. After the visitor has been greeted and shown to his table, he is requested to come to the first deck and select his food.

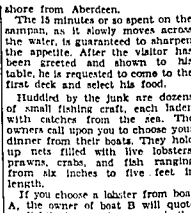
Huddled by the junk are dozens of small fishing craft, each laden with catches from the sea. The owners call upon you to choose your dinner from their boats. They hold up nets filled with live lobsters, prawns, crabs, and fish ranging from six inches to five feet in length.

If you choose a lobster from boat A, the owner of boat B will quote a slightly lower price on a similar lobster. The same goes for prawn, fish and crab. The bargaining is half the fun. Sometimes it takes half an hour to decide which boat has the best and cheapest dinner.

As you decide, the fish or lobster is thrown on the deck where a kitchen helper grabs it. When all the meal is assembled, the head waiter asks you how you would like it prepared.

I have long heard that Chinese cooks are the best in the world, even better than the French. I am inclined to agree, after finishing a meal on a junk off Aberdeen. The prawns were fried in deep goose fat, after first being dipped in rice flour batter, and served with sweet and sour sauce. The baby crabs were served with a sauce of lemon butter and crisp almonds. The lobster I had a la Newburg, and the fish—well, I left it up to the chef and he came forth with a dish that would make Lucius Beebe lick the platter and ask for a second helping.

L. A. Ban on 'Comic' Books Termed Legal

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 24 (UP)—Los Angeles county's new law forbidding sale to children of crime comic books will stand up in court, its author predicted today.

The board of supervisors passed the ordinance Tuesday making it a misdemeanor to sell such comics to anyone under 18. The law fines a penalty of \$500 fine or six months imprisonment or both.

Harold W. Kennedy, county counsel, drafted the law after parents and teacher groups had campaigned for it.

Kennedy said he believes it is the first such action by any government unit in the nation and added: "The ordinance, in my opinion, will be superfluous legally against the attacks to which it is almost certain to be subjected."

Authority for the ban, Kennedy said, lies in provisions of the California constitution which give the county police power over health and morals.

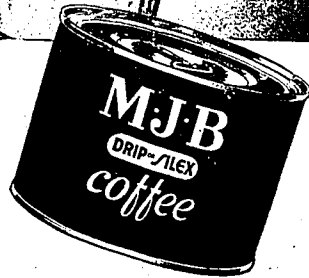

NEW YORK, Sept. 24 (AP)—Gen. Allen W. Barkeley said the United States will not be forced out of Berlin.

"We shall not give up Berlin; we shall move out and we shall not be forced out," he told a news conference before speaking at a trades union conference of the Liberal party.

Hopes for firmness

The declaration remains in Berlin, the Democratic vice presidential nominee said, is the present position of this government and "regardless of who wins in November, I hope the American government will stand up for its position."

It was the first time Barkeley had discussed foreign policy to any extent since he started his eastern campaign eight weeks ago.

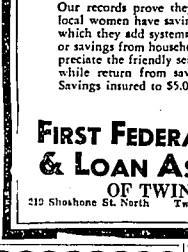

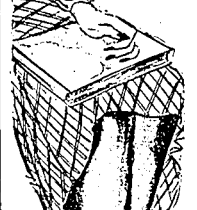

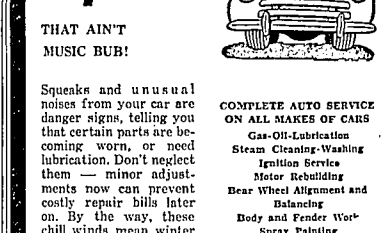

CAPTIVATING CASTLE BUTTE
—on the west side of the Snake River in Owyhee County, about twelve miles downstream from Grandview, gains its name from the formation at its left extremity which resembles a castle of medieval times. Castle Butte is one of the many extinct volcanic cones which rise like sentinels out of the floor of the Great Snake River Plain and attest to the violent action of nature which, thousands of years ago, formed the rugged terrain and fertile soil for which Idaho is so widely noted.

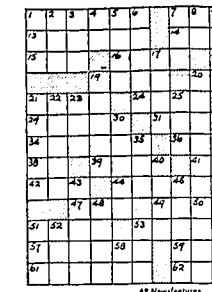

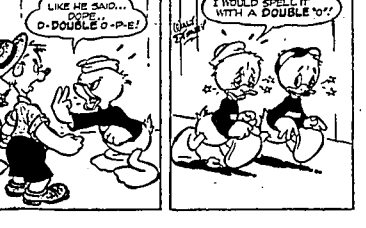

Author's Adage About Weather True No More

PASADENA, Calif., Sept. 24 (AP)—Everybody, said Mark Twain once, talks about the weather, but nobody does anything about it.

Dr. Irving P. Krick has a few ideas, though.

Dr. Krick, widely known meteorologist, said here he has in his possession a battery of instruments which resembles a slide rule in size and form, with built-in dials which can be manipulated by almost anybody.

Data on prevailing winds, cloud formations and the like are fed into the gadget. Twist the dials—and out comes tomorrow's weather forecast.

Dr. Krick said the instrument's accuracy has been proved after six months of experimentation, including tests in the east.

Its operation is based on data compiled from study of daily weather for the past 55 years which, Krick claims, covers every possible combination of meteorological cause and effect.
