PARIS, Sept. 28 (AP)—France appealed to the United Nations today to end the Soviet blockade of Berlin through the three western powers have "exhausted every possibility of direct agreement" with the Russians.

French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman, in a policy speech to the general assembly, said the United States, Britain and France had not found even "a minimum of good will" in their talks with "our partners."

Schuman spoke as the three western nations prepared their appeals to the security council, formally citing the blockade as a threat to international peace and security.

At the same time, British and American sources said, experts of the three western countries continued drafting the plan to back to U. N. Secretary-General Trygve Lie either late today or tomorrow.

Analyst Sees Annexation of Red Satellites

AP Foreign Affairs Analyst
 There have been widespread and persistent reports that a secret meeting of the powerful Soviet commission has been held in the Crimea where Stalin is said to have been vacationing—an event of high importance whatever way you look at it, and especially in these days of international tension.

The commission is the successor to the committee, the original general staff for world revolution, and it comprises the outstanding leaders of bolshevism.

These include Anna Pauker, Romanian foreign minister; Kliment Gottwald, president of Czechoslovakia; George Dimitroff, premier of Bulgaria; and Ksytan Rakovskii, Hungarian communist chief.

Intense Speculation
 Naturally there has been intense speculation over the significance of this mysterious parley, and London diplomats are debating the possibility that the conference revolved about three points, among others:

1. Russian annexation of one or more of the satellite states, and
2. A tightening of military cooperation with the Soviet Union in view of the tension arising from the Berlin deadlock.

Plans Diverge
 So let's take a look at it on that basis. To my mind these two points diverge perfectly, and they seem logical enough. This isn't by any means the first time that the possibility of Russian annexations has been in the news. Rumania and Czechoslovakia have been named as possible victims.

But these two countries in particular? Because their absolute possession would give Russia a military and political stranglehold on its entire satellite bloc, and it would vastly strengthen Russia's military position in the event of war with the western powers.

Army Plans Call For Journalists

VA Clamping Down on Vet Pilot Classes

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22 (UP)—Veterans who want to drive airplanes can still cost the government a lot of money to learn. But it isn't as easy as it once was.

The veterans administration takes a hard look at applications and the veteran who lacks fool-proof arguments that he needs flight training for business use had better stay away.

A United Press nationwide survey shows that a little more than one-third of the applicants for GI flight training have been approved. GI flight training has been rationed since Congress lightened the rules.

Private licensees have been cut. It appears that candidates for commercial pilot courses have fair access in training government approval while those desiring only private pilot licenses have trouble. Private pilots can use their licenses for business purpose but can not carry for hire.

Those applications actually are rejected outright. The majority are deferred because the VA wants evidence of need for flight training.

Figures Compiled

The compiled figures show these results from July 1 to Sept. 15, 1942: 3,952 applications received by VA officials surveyed. 2,191 approved. 424 at least temporarily deferred; many of these apparently may be considered if consideration it applicants desire. 3,672 returned for more information. Applicants who have not deferred applications, for the most part, amount to rejections.

While Approved

The UP survey was made after nearly three months of experience with the new rules governing approval of pilots. The survey was spread over a period from flying schools. Many content the VA misinterprets the law and turns down applications in red tape to many applicants that schools are folding.

VA headquarters there say that in August its regional offices processed 6,243 applications, turning down 24,474 approving 2,247 and deferring 3,742.

Tricky Parity System Holding Key to High U. S. Food Price

Editor's note: First of a series on farm price support and the parity system.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—With a record high brought in by the U. S. farms this fall the parity system is holding the key to high food prices.

But now at least there's plenty of food for everybody at home. And there's more than enough to satisfy the market abroad. So isn't it a bit strange that U. S. citizens get a break in the market basket department? When you put these questions to the experts in the department of agriculture they tell you the answer is pretty complicated. It involves the mysterious terms, "price support" and "parity price."

It seems that when Henry Wallace came to Washington with the new farm bill, he was to look for the depression. Roosevelt's brain trust decided that agriculture was one of the basic industries in the U. S., which had to be helped first to get back on its feet. It was to be the first step in a program to help the farmer who had been kicking around for only a couple of years. He worked hard and came up with a complicated mathematical solution for the problem called the parity price formula.

The formula was based on the assumption that the farmer should always be able to buy as much cotton for a bushel of wheat as he did during the years 1910 to 1914.

At the time it was obvious that the cost of making sure that the farmer got 100 per cent of parity on everything he grew was far too expensive to try. So in 1938 Congress compromised and passed a law making it mandatory for the government to support the price of crops and what it was due to parity.

In 1941 Congress added tobacco, rice and peanuts to the mandatory list. At the time it was obvious that the production of certain foods for the event of a war. It permitted the government to guarantee price supports on certain foods for two years after the war. Fourteen foods ended up being brought under such guarantee.

In 1942 the price support minimums were raised to 85 per cent. At the end of this year the guaranteed support of several of the agricultural crops was due to expire. This would have permitted the price to come down on these foods, including rice. But the last Congress extended all of the support programs for an additional year. And it set 1938 as the base year for the whole program could start being reviewed.

At the next couple of years there, in spite of overvaluing harvests, prices on many foods just can't come down. And since 1938 certain basic

McGrath Raps Laws OK'd by 80th Congress

Thomas Assails Wallace's Plans For Dixie Area

AUSTIN, Tex., Sept. 22.—Senator Thomas, white-haired veteran socialist candidate for President, today assailed Wallace's plan to build up small businesses in the south as "unworkable under the conditions."

One of the important factors Wallace's formula didn't take into account was the greater yield per acre that improved seeds and growing methods would bring.

Obviously the whole price support program needs some drastic reorganization. But that doesn't mean that Wallace's original idea should be junked entirely. There are sound arguments on both sides of that fence. Today, as when Wallace first conceived the parity price formula, people still have to eat and agriculture continues to be a basic industry in America.

Such things as unemployment insurance, minimum wages and the right to collective bargaining are guaranteed to workers in industry. Nobody would suggest removing these. Some version of a parity price formula is considered by the farm people just as much a part of their rights as any other.

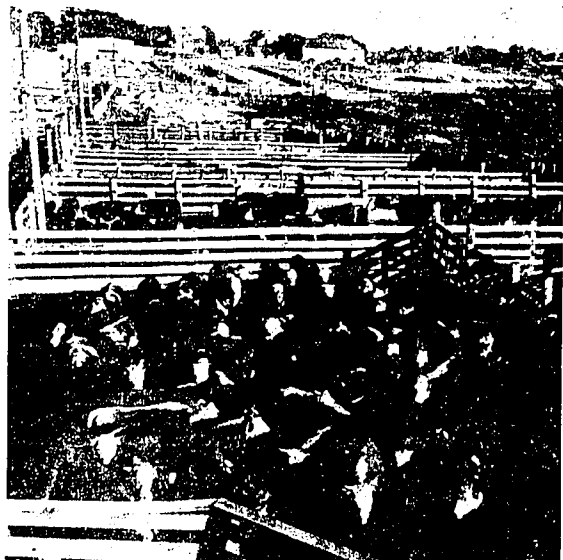
Flames Quelled

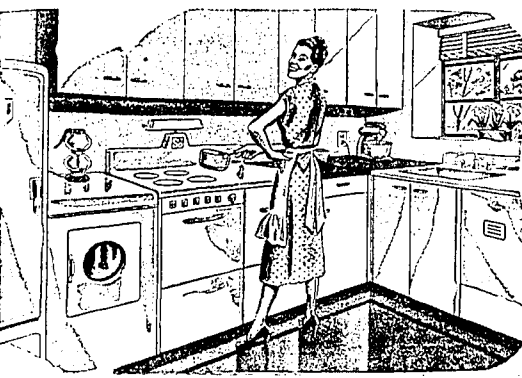

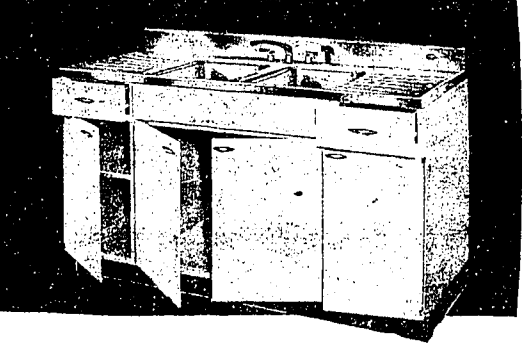

Evidence Bearing Out Reds' Confab

LONDON, Sept. 28 (AP)—The government has received considerable evidence tending to bear out speculation that top ranking communist leaders had held a full scale conference somewhere in eastern Europe, a foreign official spokesman said today.

British misdeeds throughout eastern Europe reported the absence of leading communist diplomats from their capitals. The reports suggested that an international communist information bureau meeting might have been held within the last two weeks.

Premier Josef Stalin has been reported away from Moscow, probably vacationing in south Russia. President Clement Gottwald of Czechoslovakia has been in the Crimea—a likely vacation spot for Stalin—for a short rest. Masaryk, Czech deputy premier and No. 1 Communist in Hungary, was unaccountably absent.

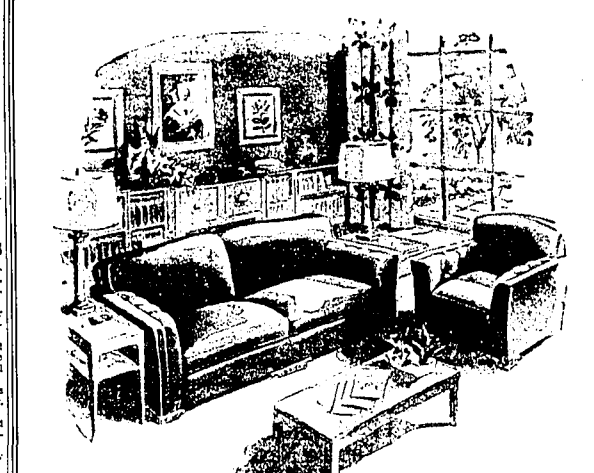

2 U. S. Chiefs Finally Agree On One Thing

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22 (AP)—Two government officials who fell out over how to run the U. S. office of education were agreed on one thing today: Neither likes communism.

The two, who appeared before a Senate investigation committee, were:

1. Dr. John W. Studebaker, who resigned last July as U. S. commissioner of education. He said the office was subjected to "partisan control by the federal agency administration."
2. Oscar R. Ewing, FSA administrator, who branded as "absolutely untrue" charges brought by Studebaker that FSA hampered an effort by the office of education to foster an anti-communist program in the nation's schools.

Favored Program

Studebaker testified that Ewing favored a positive program to "teach democracy" to school children. He said he liked that but also wanted a negative program of anti-communism.

The former education commissioner added that speeches and articles from his office were censored by the FSA and that the organization was too centralized. He also said school administration from 40 states in a statement at Chicago yesterday—for removal of the office of education from the FSA.

Waste Eliminated

Ewing argued that the centralization of which Studebaker complained was simply in line with the wishes of congress — to eliminate waste and inefficiency.

Ewing accused Studebaker of trying to "create the wholly false impression that there was some meddling, or soft-pedaling with reference to communists."

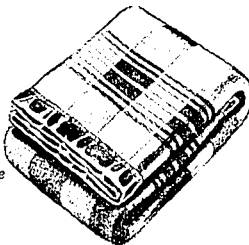
