

Global Ills Blamed on Iniquities

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 2 (AP)—Wars and other ills have come to man only because he has failed to keep the Lord's commandments, major speakers declared today at second day sessions of the Latter-Day Saints church general conference.

War, plague, locusts, high prices, "the law of the jungle" as practiced in "governmental circles" in Russia, and the cruelties of other evils are the direct result of Satan's influence in men's affairs, some 10,000 of the church's members were told.

Lady Deploras

Three general authorities of the church deplored man's iniquity and failure to keep God's commandments and warned that unless man turns to the Christian teachings of "love thy neighbor" and the golden rule American freedom is doomed.

Reuben Clark, Jr., first counselor in the first presidency of the church, declared "far as I can tell it is in you."

As at yesterday's opening sessions of the semi-annual conference, the tabernacle was overflowing and the assembly hall and other buildings were filled with hundreds listening to proceedings by public address systems and watching them on television screens.

Others Follow Them

Joseph Merrill and Albert E. Doren followed Clark's same theme.

Doren said the world's wars are a direct result of man's inability to keep the 10 commandments. "You shall not covet thy neighbor's property," he said, "is the cause of Satan on the world's problems."

"It kills the leaders of certain nations to report to the world treaties are in the power of Satan—and Satan does not want peace," he said.

VA Says Vet Relapses For Malaria Drop

Although thousands of veterans contracted malaria overseas during World War II, the problem of relapse from the disease is expected to be an insignificant one in the next few years, Dr. L. J. Brennan, regional chief medical officer of the veterans administration, reports. The VA credits much of its success in treatment of war-acquired malaria to the use of the drugs chloroquine, pamaquine (plasmo-chin), and the more recently synthesized 8-amino quinolines such as mefloquine and loxovetaquine. National VA statistics indicate about 130,000 veterans were receiving compensation for malaria in June, 1947. By March, 1948, the number was reduced to 37,000 and is still declining. The number of relapses also has declined—from about 130,000 cases infected during the war to less than 10,000 present. Usually, the malaria parasite "burns itself out" in from one to three years, although the VA said, some cases are known to have remained infected as long as 20 years.

Trio Combing Valley Areas In Gold Hunt

BOISE, Oct. 2 (AP)—Three adventurers today combed the pioneer trails of southern Idaho in search of "robbers' gold." Frank Herburg, 65, and Fred Harmon, 60, both Spokane, and Tom Hayes, 38, Grangeville, set out for Cootwood gulch in Rocky canyon where they hope to find stolen loot. The men were "armed" with an electronic "tracer" they hoped would reveal the loot caches of robber bands who roamed Idaho in early days and died before they could make use of their spoils.

One "treasure" in particular they sought: It is a quantity of gold said to have been hidden by David Levy, Boise, in 1901, just before he was murdered for it. After their search near Boise, the trio will travel to the Craters of the Moon and the City of Rocks in southwestern Idaho, they said. All hope to recover enough gold to retire, Herburg said.

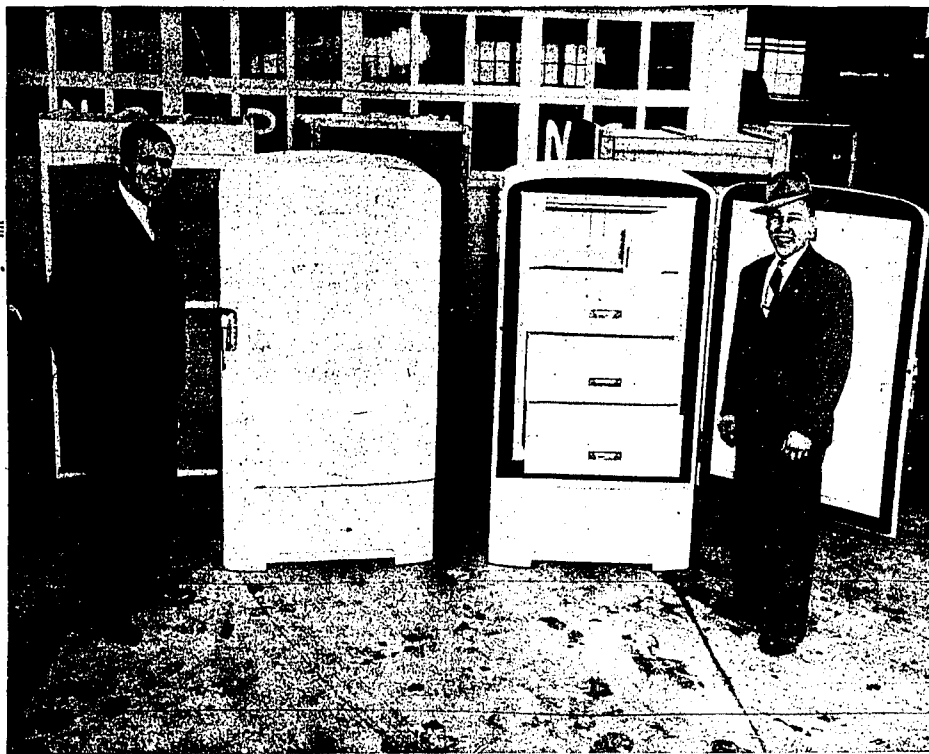

New Data Sought On Deer Herds

MCCOY, Oct. 2 (AP)—Deer hunters this fall will find something new has been added to the routine checking stations operated by the state fish and game departments. One of the projects of the cooperative wildlife research unit established at the University of Idaho last year is a study of the white-tailed and mule deer herds of Idaho. During hunting season much information can be secured at checking stations on the age classes and condition of deer harvested by hunters. Dr. Paul Dalke, research director, has been found, he explained, that the length of the foot and length of the head, are reliable indicators of deer age. Condition of the teeth and the diameter of the antler near the base of the beam also reveal the animal's age, and weights are indicative of age especially in the fall when all animals are usually in good flesh.

U. S. Leaders Debating New "Lend-Lease"

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3 (AP)—A far-reaching and lively debate is underway within the administration over proposed lend-lease of military equipment to bolster a military European military alliance, informed quarters said today.

If advocates of the Netherlands win out, the proposal probably will be presented to congress next spring. But several things must come first. Preliminary steps are:

1. The western European military alliance must complete its organization. The alliance is composed of France, Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg. It is meeting now in London. British Field Marshal Lord Montgomery has been proposed to head it.

2. The alliance must decide what it needs, what it can make itself in the way of arms, and what it must ask the United States to produce.

3. The President and the national security council must decide whether the military aid is for the best security interests of the United States.

Certain to Ask Aid
Informal quarters are certain that the above alliance will ask the United States for lend-lease military aid. But how much will be forthcoming will depend on the administration and congress.

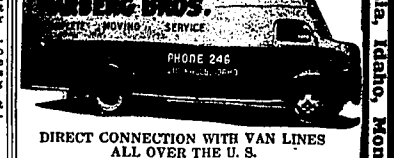

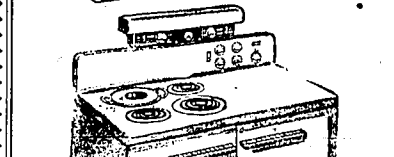

A city man asked this one: "How busy milk consumers, who object to high milk prices, and who work 40-hour weeks themselves, would be willing to work on a dairy farm seven-day week?"

Irvingard Bave, the tall blond, is the first person you run into when you climb the stairs to KTPI in Twin Falls. Studio A is at Irvingard's left and if a visitor is lucky, he will be shown around by the friendly young farm editor and announcer, Jack Farrar. Studio A has all the usual furnishings of such a place—plushy carpet, tables and comfortable chairs.



Jack will show you studio B with the announcer's booth and the control room with its turntables, switches, etc. A dark young man named John Edlington is apt to be in charge there, and he will demonstrate patiently how all the mysterious gadgets work.

John obviously loves his work, and the day he manipulated the control panel and all sorts of knobs and buttons, he had us dizzy. KTPI has a library of more than 10,000 transcriptions covering all of radio's greatest artists. These are whopping 16-inch platters and some of them are non-breakable.

Just to prove it, Jack Farrar bounced one on the floor for us. Down the corridor from studio A is where Traffic Manager Lenore Parker holds forth. She calls herself "vice manager of traffic," but you'll know how important Lenore really is when we tell you she makes the forms for the announcers to follow.

KTPI has several announcers besides John and Jack: Dick Steaks, Jerry Moffat and Bill Hall.

If you visit this station we hope you get to meet the copy writers, Caroline Morris and Florence Kelch, and have a chance to look in on Kenny Montgomery, the sales man-

ager. Kenny has one of those bewitching voices which should be worth a million on the air, but he prefers to sales manage.

Of course the boss of the whole show is a dark, trim little lady named Florence Gardner. Florence is general manager—it said so on her door—and she's all efficiency. Seems this fall is the 20th anniversary of KTPI and Manager Gardner says:

"In looking back over 20 years one is impelled also to look forward . . . and to wonder what form radio will take in 20 more years. Will it be a perfection of P.M., will it be television? . . . Will there be some new form developed?"

Whatever it is, Mrs. Gardner is certain it will be fascinating and we know you agree.

"Twin is a nice town and I'm going to make my home right here," says Jesse Griffin, of The Sporter studio. Jesse says he specializes in children's picture and will take them from three months to adolescence.

Avoid patterns in a dress or blouse, and wear jewelry ONLY if you are accustomed to wearing it. You want to look natural to your friends and relatives, not all prelied up into something they will scarcely recognize."
