The Indians will meet the Boston Braves in the first game of the world series at Braves field Wednesday. Southpaw Gene Bearden, pitching with only one full day of rest after shutting out Detroit Saturday, tamed the Red Sox with a five hitter in their own ball yard. It was the 20th win of the season for the 28-year-old rookie from Oakland of the Pacific coast league, and his seventh straight.

# 1 to 3 Months' A-Bomb 'Super-Blitz' Seen as Winning 'Next War' for U.S.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (AP)—Two air strategists, speaking for themselves, believe the United States can win, either in one from one to three months, they envision a "super-bomb" atomic bomb dropped by only a small force of planes.

The claim that "sustained bombing"—the costly program by which the United States has been attacking an enemy's homeland for months or years—ended with World War II and the advent of the A-bomb.

# Red Declaration Fight Solons Fail to Handed Top Tribunal Over Trading

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (AP)—A direct test of the power of Congress to force a witness to say whether he ever was a communist was laid before the supreme court today as it opened its new term.

Film Writer John Howard Lawson asked the court to throw out his conviction of contempt of congress which is holding over him a year's jail sentence and \$1,000 fine.

Lawson is one of 10 Hollywood figures who defied the house un-American activities committee by refusing to give membership in any "front" organization.

Another writer, Dalton Trumbo, received a similar sentence. Both were allowed to make bond pending appeal.

It will be up to the court to say whether it will hear Lawson's case. This will be announced in the course of its term, which runs into months. Important cases also are expected to feature the winter's work.

Lawson already has an appeal pending before the U. S. court of appeals here, but he asked the supreme court to take over instead. "Stated in its simplest terms," his supreme court petition said, "the House involves inquisition by means of compulsory disclosure, carried on by a congressional committee for the purpose of conducting political dissection, and the imposition by the committee of severe penalties for refusal to cooperate."

"On the decision in this case may well depend the nature of our future society, whether the time has come to abandon principles long established or whether the time is now here to reassess those principles."

NEW YORK, Oct. 4 (AP)—Leonard Bacon Clark, 42-year-old socially prominent New Yorker, was arrested Monday for a complex charge he stole \$1,362,000 from his father's estate.

Clark, Harvard educated lawyer, was arrested after he was discharged from a hospital. District Attorney Robert W. Strickland said Clark had committed a suicide attempt at the hospital on Monday.

# Russia Challenges U.N. Right to Debate Dispute

PARIS, Oct. 4 (AP)—The United Nations security council opened debate on the Berlin crisis today, and Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky of Russia at once challenged the right of 13 countries to intervene in the east-west dispute.

Vishinsky said Russia considered the complaints by the western big three accusing the Soviets of endangering the peace to be baseless, outside the competence of the security council, and therefore not subject to discussion in the council.

# Soviets Demand Big 4 Discussion of Trouble

MOSCOW, Oct. 4 (AP)—Russia proposed today that the four-power council of foreign ministers meet to consider the Berlin crisis and the whole German situation.

The Soviet proposal was included in a note to the United States, Britain and France made public by Tass, official Soviet news agency.

The note was a reply to the western power notes of Sept. 26 breaking off four-power negotiations on the Berlin crisis and announcing the question would be taken to the United Nations security council.

The note declared: "The United States government's declaration that it is a matter of international peace and security does not correspond with the actual facts and constitutes nothing more than a means of pressure and an attempt to use the United Nations for the achievement of its aggressive aims."

Directive 14 Basis  
The Russians proposed the directive to be taken to the United Nations security council.

It blamed the three western powers for failure to reach an agreement on a settlement of the Berlin crisis.

The note asserted the western powers "are striving in fact to govern a part of Germany and to force the Soviet occupation zone of Germany in order to deprive the USSR of its legal rights also in this part of Germany and in the end to evict the Soviet union from there."

The Soviets claimed the American notes and statements on the four-power negotiations had seriously distorted the content of the Moscow talks, the statements made by the Soviet government in the negotiations, and also had omitted essential information.

The Soviets listed a long series of charges against the western powers, including establishment of the Berlin blockade, and the currency reform in the western occupation zone, and the plan for setting up a western German government.
