800 Chinese Die As Typhoon Hits

CANTON, China, Oct. 5 (AP)—Press dispatches reaching here today said 800 persons were killed when a typhoon struck Letchow peninsula and the Peking Kwangchow and Hiohow area Sept. 27.

The reports said 600 persons perished when the typhoon sank more than 100 fishing boats near Letchow. Another 200 were killed when 70 sail-laden sailing junks were destroyed near Peking.

Heavy damage and casualties also were inflicted by torrential rains which inundated the area around Hainan island.

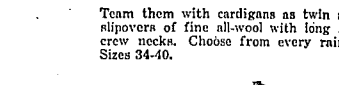

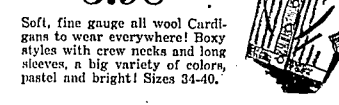

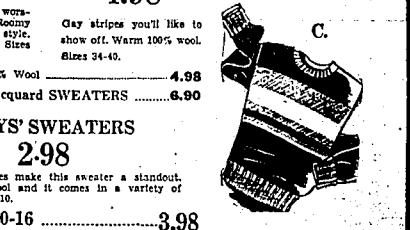

Three projects of statewide interest were adopted at the 30th annual convention of the Idaho State Federation of Women's clubs conducted at Wallace, Monday and Saturday.

The convention body voted to take \$15,000 of the earnings of the state loan scholarship fund to bring two general students to the University of Idaho, Moscow, for one year.

The convention body voted to establish the establishment of scholarships and fellowships to assist students from foreign countries, who can return home, ambassadors of good will. The students receiving such scholarships will be selected by the university.

In order to establish an adequate library at the Idaho state tuberculosis hospital at Gooding it was voted to donate \$10,000 to the Idaho State Federation a project to contribute books and magazine subscriptions which will help furnish a well-filled library for the recreation of the patients.

It was decided to use the money raised through the "Purple Heart Fund" to purchase a picture for the Gooding hospital. This is a project of the fine arts department.

The penny art fund is a voluntary gift of a penny, nickel and functions in correlation with the General Federation of Women's clubs art project by R. H. Nelson, President of the Idaho State Federation of Women's clubs, and will be designed to lend cheer and inspiration to the patients of the hospital.

Mrs. H. L. Hogsett, Twin Falls, president of the Idaho State Federation in which 78 clubs are affiliated with a total membership of 3,000 women throughout the state, presided at the convention. The state club of Twin Falls will be hostesses to the next annual convention, which will be held during the fall of 1949.

Wallace Avers Others 'Snipe' At Farm Plan

FRESNO, Calif., Oct. 5 (AP)—Henry Wallace, in what was tabbed as one of the main farm speeches of his campaign for the presidency, sniped the Democrats and the publishers last night, "sniping away" at the farm program developed under President Roosevelt.

He repeated his criticism of California's Gov. Earl Warren, the Republican candidate for vice president.

Wallace said that when President Truman was in California he described Warren as "almost a Democrat."

"I put it up to you," said Wallace. "When may be a Democrat under Truman's definition. But Roosevelt would never have called him one."

Land's Farm Program Wallace spoke with pride of the farm program which he claimed was developed when he was secretary of agriculture under Roosevelt.

Wallace said the Progressive party program of putting large banks, the railroads and the electric power industry under public ownership "would free California farmers from the grip of bankers who actually own their farms."

Wallace made one less speech in Fresno than he planned.

Invitation Withdrawn An invitation to address the students and faculty at Fresno State college was withdrawn.

Stewart Bryant, chairman of the group which calls itself "Students for Wallace" at the college, said it was withdrawn because of "pressure" on the college from "financial interests" which threatened to withhold contributions and scholarships.

Farmers to Fight New Spud Rules

BLACKFOOT, Oct. 5 (AP)—Directors of the Bingham county Farm Bureau will meet tomorrow to consider protests against the government's minimum grade of two inches diameter for No. 1 Idaho spuds.

Violent objections to the new regulations have been voiced by numerous farmers at the Millon D. Weston, Bingham county agent.

The farmers contend the new grading regulations will leave them with a huge quantity of No. 2 potatoes, which will sell at little or no profit.

Watson has recommended the use of smaller potatoes for livestock feed, but a clash of opinion seemed imminent.

Jack Newsome, Blackfoot representative of the Idaho Falls Potato Growers, Inc., said potatoes are large this year, fully grown and the frost will not deter their growth.
