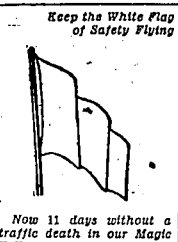

### Nation's Fire Losses Soar To New High

NEW YORK (AP)—The United States fire loss in the first six months of 1948 exceeded the loss for the entire year 1947.

At the present rate of destruction, this year's loss will top 1947, when \$200,000,000 loss set an all-time high.

Losses Heavy

This year's loss, the NFPA reports, promises to be roughly equal to the combined 1947 budgets of the states of Arizona, Colorado, Delaware, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, New Hampshire, New Mexico, North Carolina, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Tennessee, Vermont, Utah, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

To establish this record loss, Americans are permitting fires to attack their homes at the rate of one every 90 seconds, and the NFPA adds: "No type of fire is easier to prevent."

These three programs are expected to enter new agreements because it takes weeks or months to put them into effect.

Industry representatives demonstrated their reluctance at a meeting with commerce department officials yesterday.

Accepting only one of nine new rationing programs sponsored by the department, they rejected four and postponed action on the other four "pending further study."

Volting to commit themselves now to extend only three of the programs, they were reluctant to do so until after the Nov. 20 election.

### Kawakita Begg Mother Not to Injure Herself

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 7 (AP)—Tomoya Kawakita, condemned to death as a traitor to his native America, yesterday penned an urgent appeal to his Japanese mother not to do anything to hurt herself.

The appeal, which Kawakita wrote before his American-born mother, Mrs. Yone Kawakita, was sentenced to a 10-day Federal Jail William C. Mather disclosed that he had received "very touching letters" from the condemned man's mother. Kawakita's attorney said the mother, Mrs. Yone Kawakita, Los Angeles, wrote that if her son were guilty of high treason she did not want to go on living.

Claims Innocence

Kawakita, convicted in connection with the brutalities to American prisoners of war while he was an interpreter in a Japanese prison camp, wrote the appeal to his mother in Japanese.

"Dearest mother," said the note, "I have heard about the things you left under the judge's door. Please do not worry or do anything to hurt yourself. I am innocent. Love you, papa and mama, and I pray that never would violate the laws of the United States of America. I have been and am your faithful son."

Appeal Planned

"This appeal was appended by Mr. Lavine (Attorney Morris Lavine) to the higher courts, I have confidence that it will be completely cleared there. My faith and pray that right may triumph and continue to live for the sake of all of us. Love, Tomoya."

Earlier Kawakita wrote another note to reporters declaring his innocence.

### USAF Reveals New Propeller With Jet Boost

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7 (AP)—The air force has announced a new combination propeller and jet engine which it said will enable bombers to fly farther, faster and higher. The new engine is a development of the Pratt and Whitney R-4300 Wasp Major, a 28-cylinder power plant used in the giant B-36. The B-50 and some other large aircraft. The engine will be used on the Boeing B-54, a modification of the B-50.

Power delivered to the propeller shaft in the new engine will be increased from 3,500 to more than 4,000 horsepower. In addition "several hundred pounds of jet thrust" will be added by using a variable discharge nozzle.

A pound of thrust equals one horsepower when the airplane is flying at 275 miles an hour. Officially designated the R-4300-V27, the new engine increases efficiency and adds power by putting exhaust gases to work.

Operations Explained Roughly it does this: The exhaust is used to operate a turbine compressor which forces air into the piston engine. That eliminates a gear-driven compressor or impeller which uses up at least 500 horsepower and makes that power available to the propeller shaft.

The gases which pass the turbine wheel are then directed through an exhaust nozzle with a variable opening, so that the speed of the exhaust can be changed to give it the most efficiency. The jet action is like that of an ordinary jet engine, but is improved through use of the variable nozzle. Such nozzles are being developed for jet engines.

The air force described the new engine as "an outstanding power plant development."

### Remington Files Suit for \$100,000 Against Ex-Red

NEW YORK, Oct. 7 (AP)—William K. Remington, successful communist department employe, has filed a \$100,000 damage suit against Elizabeth Bentley and two other defendants.

He said Miss Bentley admitted one-time Soviet espionage agent and former communist party member, had falsely named him a communist on a Sept. 12 "Meet the Press" radio program.

The other defendants named were the National Broadcasting company and the General Foods corporation, sponsor of the program. Miss Bentley repeated on the broadcast some "charges" against Remington which she had made before the house un-American activities committee the previous month.

The complaint, filed in federal court, said the program was heard over the radio network and seen by owners of thousands of television sets. It greatly damaged Remington in his profession of economist and in his employment and in "bringing him into public odium and contempt," the complaint said.

### William Chisholm Passes at Burley

BURLEY, Oct. 7.—William Chisholm, 71, died at 1:45 a.m. Wednesday at the home of his son, John Chisholm, following an extended illness.

He was born July 16, 1875, at New Glasgow, Nova Scotia, and came to the United States in 1922. He lived in Chadron, Neb., for 35 years, moving to Burley in 1941. He married Bridget McDonald in 1892 at Salina, Kans. His wife preceded him in death in 1935.

In addition to his son, John Chisholm, he is survived by one son, Donald H. Chisholm, Burley; three daughters, Mrs. Kenneth Brian, Loveland, Colo.; Sister Mary Matthews, Omaha, Neb.; and Mrs. R. A. Berg, Bridgeport, Neb.; two brothers, John Chisholm, Pennsylvania.

Goff will meet the Warren train at Sandpoint Oct. 13 and accompany the GOP vice presidential candidate to Rathdrum and Coeur d'Alene. Warren speaks in Coeur d'Alene that evening.

Goff, a University of Idaho graduate, will attend the homecoming festivities at the Moscow campus Saturday, and will be a Vandal rooster at the Washington State-Vandal game at Pullman Oct. 30.

Rep. John Sabin will carry his campaign into nearly all counties of the second congressional district during the next month. Goff will campaign in Idaho and Lewis counties tomorrow and attend the district American Legion convention at Lewiston tomorrow night.

### Christians Urged To Be Ready to Go Underground

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 7 (AP)—Christians must be prepared to go underground in Asia if communists win control of that continent, Rep. Walter H. Judd, R., Minn., told the world mission assembly last night.

Judd, a former medical missionary to China, is a member of the house foreign affairs committee in Washington. He said that if communists gain control of Asia, Christians will be in the same position as they were in the days of ancient Rome.

"Communists never will permit Christians to continue their missionary work in communist-dominated areas," Judd said, "and we certainly must be prepared for the

eventuality of a communist victory in the far east.

"This means that Christians must be prepared to go underground—not to wage a destructive campaign against the enemies of Christianity but to retain in those areas the constructive influence that is Christianity."

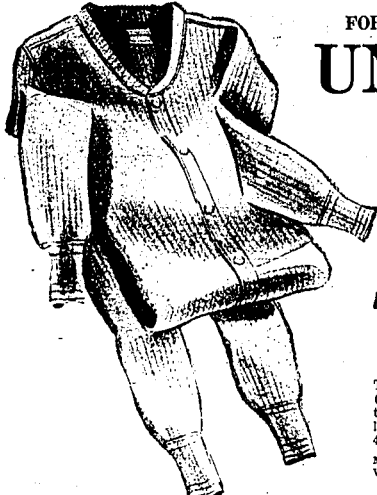

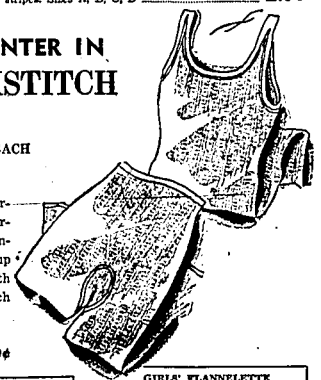

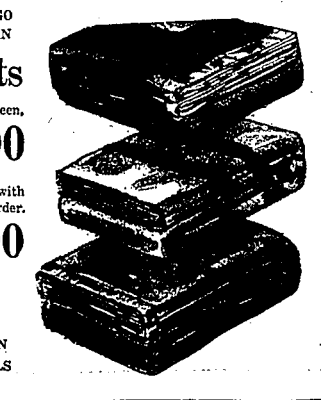

### China Forces Leave Capital Of Manchuria

NANKING, Oct. 7 (AP)—The government Wednesday announced it had abandoned Changchun. The Manchurian capital had been hurriedly evacuated by the Chinese government.

It was believed President Chiang Kai-shek made the decision in order to concentrate government strength against the growing red peril in North China and South Manchuria.

Some experts believe Chiang also may be ready to tell his troops to fight south into China proper. This would come only if there is no other way to save North China.

**Abandonment Urged**

The abandonment of all Manchuria reportedly has been urged by U. S. military advisers in Nanking. They want the government to bring all its forces to bear in North China, clear out the communists, and then fight back into Manchuria, a great industrial area.

There was no indication, however, that the government means to leave Mukden, said Gen. Teng Wen-xi, military spokesman who announced the abandonment of Changchun, said fresh troops were pouring ashore at the south Manchurian port of Huliuo.

**Supported by Manchips**

Authoritative sources said the operations around Huliuo, designed to reopen the land corridor to Mukden, were supported by the six-inch guns of the Chinese warship. The Changchun garrison of 100,000 men, by latest press accounts, has reached Mukden in a race through thinly-held communist lines. Changchun is 175 miles northeast of Mukden.

Part of the garrison from that big industrial city already has moved south to join the battle for Chihshien, Mukden's impertinent supporting base.

In the Changchun garrison were two seasoned armies, the new second and the new seventh. Behind them left a starving civilian population which could not be fed by government food drops.

### Owyhee Ranchers Set for Roundup

MURPHY, Oct. 7 (AP)—Owyhee county ranchers have ridden into the badlands south of here to round up about 800 wild horses.

Robert Melton, owner of the Joyce ranch, said the wild horses must be moved off the range to provide feed for cattle and sheep. He said one horse can "strip" down enough range to feed five or six cows.

The band now being rounded up is smaller than the band roaming the Owyhee country last year. There are an estimated 4,000 horses in that band.

### Commutations Urged for Few "Guilty" Nazis

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7 (AP)—Commutation of the death sentences of a limited number of Nazis convicted of war crimes has been recommended by a special army commission.

Army Secretary Royall said today that the clemency recommendations have been forwarded to Gen. Lucius D. Clay, U. S. military governor in Germany, who has the final say in the matter.

**132 Granted Stay**  
The condemned men are among 132 granted stays of execution last May, after 60 others had been executed as a result of the trials at Dachau, Germany.

Royall's announcement did not specify the exact number of clemency actions recommended. Nor was there any hint whether the recommendation took in any of the 17 men convicted of killing unarmed American prisoners at Malmédy, Belgium, during the battle of the bulge. They were among the 132 granted stays last May.

**Special Unit Appointed**  
The special commission was appointed last summer to make a general survey of the entire Dachau war crimes trials program.

Members of the commission who records available here did not show whether the special commission looked into the case of the Koch widow of a former commandant of the "neust" concentration camp at Buchenwald.

Frau Koch was under a life sentence, but another army review board recently recommended that the sentence be commuted to four years, which Clay approved. The action making her eligible for freedom next year, brought protests from lawmakers and others and set off an investigation by a senate committee.

### Analyst Says Trieste Like Storm Haven

An Analyst of the Analysts  
TRIESTE—To one who has been traveling in Germany, arrival in Trieste is like finding a warm inn after being lost in a storm during a blizzard.

A galaxy of neon lights burns long after the blackout has fallen in Berlin. Instead of expressionless people intent on augmenting their food rations, here are people actually having fun shopping and just associating with each other in the streets.

Feeling Starts Early  
The feeling of release from something dark and unhealthy begins before you are out of Germany, as your plane flies above the details of shattered cities. As you pass over the high Swiss valleys your mind passes from destruction and stagnation into thoughts of what might happen if you were in the water in the hundreds of streams were harnessed for production.

In Milan the Italian customs people rush you through to catch the Georgia plane, being held up because your passport is not in order. They don't worry much with the inside of your bags, or with the cigarettes you are permitted to save the families of bartering for German services.

Pass Guards  
From Gorizia a bus takes you through polite and speedy border guards into the free territory of Trieste, where you are back with another U. S. army of occupation, but in a far different atmosphere. As a matter of fact the army is in evidence. Since the split between "Little Joe" Tito of Yugoslavia and the communists, almost all travel has been removed from what was once considered one of the most dangerous spots in Europe.

The Slovene communists, who stand with Tito and the Yugoslavians, and the Yugoslavians who stand with the communists, have been some minor clashes between them. But the rest of the community has let them quarrel.

Open Air Market  
In the center of Trieste is an open air market, laden with everything you can think of. Prices are extremely reasonable compared with the rest of Europe, although just now advancing slightly.

I have seen much building construction here in any other comparable population area of Europe.

With no trouble expected from Tito as long as he has the communists on his back, Trieste presents a surprisingly normal appearance.

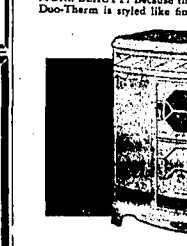

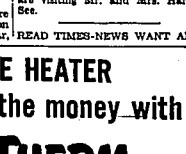
