

Analyst Avers Allies Merely Guard Trieste

TRIESTE — The allied military government in Trieste stands largely to the outside forces do not interfere with self-government by the civilian population. The Anglo-American armed forces are unobtrusive, representing a guard rather than a police force. The units are stationed mostly in the mountains outside the city, and the real work of policing is done by the Italian V. G. (Venezia Giulia) police. So far as I can learn, there is no agitation for an end to the occupation agreement and no friction.

Appear Efficient
 Such army units as you see give the impression of alert and polished, and of alertness. American officers and their 5,000 men represent the only real American fighting force in Europe, aside from the first division in Germany.

Until recently their eyes were turned constantly toward Yugoslavia via, where 100,000 communist troops represented a menace. This menace has been largely eliminated, since Tito no longer has the support of the Russian-sponsored communist.

Outposts Battered
 Our outposts are scattered along the Yugoslav and occupation zone borders. Most of the actual border duty is done by the V. G. police, who also keep up a constant patrol between control points. But night after night the back of the border is little boxes—observation posts manned by Americans.

Two Italian three-man patrol of the Italian police is taking off for a walk along the border. Two of them are carrying rifles. At the rear little hut beside the barrier at the control point on the highway. A few yards away they are faced by a lone, bedraggled Yugoslav soldier whose protection from the high hills consists of a piece of rusty corrugated iron sticking out over a bank. He guards a six-foot lane through piles of rock just wide enough to let an oxcart pass. People who live on one side of the border and work on the other pass back and forth, a few a day. Maybe 30 to 70.

The Yugoslav sentry won't speak, and the Italians and Americans merely chuckle at how lonesome he must be—something of a symbol of his own country's position in the world.

USDA Avows Feed Situation Best in Years

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8 (AP) — The agriculture department announces the livestock feed situation for the current season is the best in history. The department is counting on this to encourage farmers to expand production of meat animals, poultry products and milk. Such an expansion in turn would bring about lower consumer prices, officials said.

Record corn production this year was said to be primarily responsible for the large supply of concentrated feed, which is over one-fifth larger than last season.

The supply was put at 156,000,000 tons, the largest on record in relation to the number of livestock expected to be fed.

The department said the generally high level of livestock prices of the past year or so is expected to continue at least through most of the feeding season ending next Oct. 1.

State Schools Lag in Taking Over Housing

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8 (AP)— Idaho school have lagged in taking permanent possession of temporary housing loaned by the federal government.

Records of the public housing administration show, as of Sept. 15, requests from only four of the eight eligible Idaho schools.

Records have been received from all but one of the seven Utah schools and all but one of the Arizona schools, University of Nevada, which was eligible in that state, had not yet requested the 208 units it had been using.

Most Here Applied The schools, however, have until Oct. 26 to apply under a recent congressional act which applies only to housing on land owned or controlled by the school. Over the nation, 65 per cent of the eligible schools have applied.

With the transfer of the housing to the institute, the federal government relinquishes its right to receive net revenues from operations of federally-financed projects. The transfer also nullifies the provisions of the Lanham act which require removal of the structures by Jan. 1, 1950.

No Requests Received No requests have yet been recorded from these Idaho schools: Boise Junior college, Boise, 48 units; College of Idaho, Caldwell, 25 units; Northern Idaho College of Education, Lewiston, 94 units; Northwest Nazarene college, Nampa, 65 units.

The following transfers have been approved: Southern Idaho College of Education, Albion, 63 units; University of Idaho, Moscow, 696 units; Idaho State college, Pocatello, 133 units; Hicks college, Reburg, has requested its 87 units.

1-Plane "Air Force" Lost To Indonesia

MANILA, Oct. 8 (AP)—The Indonesian air force was officially listed as missing today.

"The force" was Bobby Freebair, tall, rambunctious American who for more than a year had flown through the Dutch blockade in his best-of-all C-47 transport.

A brief announcement from Bantam said his plane had been missing for six days on a flight between Indonesian republican territories in Java and Sumatra. There were no details.

Former Carrier Pilot Freebair, a former U. S. troop carrier pilot from somewhere in the middle west, was a daring and rather colorful figure.

The slender communication link he maintained between the Republic and the United States and the Philippines had long annoyed the Dutch.

He first drew attention in June, 1947, when he flew a C-47 loaded with quinine from Indonesia. Philippine authorities impounded it, but he later flew it to an action locality interested in a fact recognition of the republic.

Labor Needs Show Gain of 808 for Week

BOISE, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Idaho labor demand shot upward to a total of 4,331 unskilled job listings, a net gain of 808 during the week.

Of this total, 213 were farm openings and late reports indicate need for harvest workers was increasing, the state employment service said.

Major demand areas are the Idaho Falls, Rexburg and Blackfoot sectors, where more than 1,200 potato harvest workers are needed.

In southwestern Idaho there were 377 unskilled farm openings and the Twin Falls area listed a need of 335 with more expected soon.

The Idaho Falls employment office reports that considerable off-farm housing is still available for families. The farm labor camp at Idaho Falls also is in operation to provide quarters for potato workers.

Best Fields Needed In the present area, need for such best fields is being responsible for the labor demand increase. One hundred Navajo Indians are being trained in the area to assist in this work.

SHOSHONE, Oct. 3.—Although damage by fire to land in the Wood River grazing district in 1948 was below last year's figure, 22,484 acres of land was damaged this season by 53 fires, J. A. Keith, district grazer, Shoshone, announced.

In a break-down of the fires, 19,068 acres of federal range land was burned over, 72 acres of other government land, 6,859 acres of state land and 3,745 acres of private land.

Largest fire of the season burned over 4,000 acres north of Carey. To help restore grass to burned over land, the grazing service is re-seeding the area near Jerome and southeast of Dietrich.

USAF's Goal Is More Big Cargo Planes

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—(AP)—The air force is preparing to ask the next congress for a hefty appropriation to begin buying a fleet of modern cargo planes. It was learned today.

It is counting heavily on the lessons of the Berlin airlift to mix across its story. "Operation Vittles" is exacting a large toll from total military transport capacity. The air force has decided it cannot longer delay replacing and expanding its present fleet, comprising mainly World War II planes.

May Buy 30 DC-4s It was also learned that negotiations are in progress to buy 30 or more DC-4 transports from commercial airlines for the Berlin shuttle run. These are the same type of planes, known to the air force as C-54s, now being used in Germany.

The air force has had considerable criticism because it ordered a relatively small number of transport planes on the funds which the last congress voted for procurement.

Answers Critics Air Secretary W. Stuart Symington answers the critics this way: "The best transports in the world are no good unless the combat air force controls the air."

Elsewhere it was learned that tentative plans had called for 75 transports, probably Douglas DC-4s and Lockheed Constellations. It is expected that the new program will call for substantially more planes than this and possibly additional types.

Hogs Regain Losses; Cattle Show Decline

CHICAGO, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Prices on hogs and cattle went in opposite directions yesterday. Pork animals recovered another \$1 to \$1.25 a hundred pounds of their recent losses, but cattle were unevenly steady to \$1 lower.

Changes at wholesale and retail meat levels for this week-end reflected some of the weakness evidenced in livestock last and this week. Chain meat stores in many parts of the country listed declines anywhere from two to 20 cents a pound since last week.

In New York Eugene Schulz, markets commissioner, attributed declines of three to 10 cents in that city largely to increased seasonal marketing of livestock. He said, however, any long-range prediction of meat price trends would be "probabilistic, especially during the present economic situation throughout the world."

The labor department reported much of the 0.9 per cent drop it recorded in wholesale prices for last week came from lower levels registered for most farm products and foods, including most livestock. The department's wholesale index reached 167.1 per cent of the 1926 average. Wholesale prices for farm products were down an average of 2.2 per cent, but those did not yet reflect this week's sharp drop.

Hogs which topped at \$28 a hundred pounds today were at their best since Monday. Choice cattle stopped at \$40, but not much grading that high was around. Most good and choice quality beef steers sold between \$28 and \$27.50.

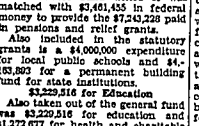

USDA Affirms Buying Halt of Russet Spuds

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8 (AP)—Halt of agriculture department buying of U. S. No. 1 grade Russet potatoes in Idaho, as announced yesterday in that state, has been affirmed today by the department.

The department said it feels such purchases are unnecessary at this time under a price support program. However, growers still may have the privilege of placing their potatoes under the department's price support loan program.

The amount of cash advanced on loans is 75 per cent of the full support price, which also is the price the government buys potatoes.

Officials said the marketing season for Idaho potatoes is in its early stage and there is no reason to believe that growers cannot get the equivalent of their cost—more—of the support price if they market their spuds in orderly manner over the next several months.

Growers putting potatoes under loans have the privilege of reclaiming them later if prices advance. Otherwise, they may surrender them to the government when the loans expire at the end of the marketing season and get the remainder of their price guarantee—that is, the difference between the price the loan is made and the full support price.

Officials said the department will continue to buy lower grade Idaho potatoes under the price guarantee program and divert them into by-product uses. They explained, also, that the department might find it advisable later to resume purchase of the No. 1 grades.

One official explained the situation as follows:

"We see no reason for buying top grade Idaho potatoes when virtually the full marketing season is ahead and prices may advance as they did last year before the next crop is harvested."

William E. Welch, chairman of the resources committee and secretary-manager of the Idaho Reclamation association, said the study is of special interest to Idahoans as the bureau of reclamation is studying the feasibility of diverting Columbia river water to California.

He said one of the proposals being studied is diversion of water from the watershed of the south fork of Snake river to Green river in Wyoming, which ultimately flows into the Colorado river.

She was a graduate of the old University of Deseret and married the late George Henry Horne in 1890 in the Logan LDS temple. He died 14 years ago.
