Traffic Engineer Includes 18-Point Summary in Plan To Correct Local Problem

An 18-point summary of recommendations is included in a 40-page detailed traffic plan prepared for Twin Falls by the Associated Consultants, Evanston, Ill. The report was accepted Monday night by the city council. Incorporated in the plan are the findings of George W. Barton, traffic engineer who surveyed conditions here last summer.

Several of the recommendations have already been accomplished and the city council was planning others before having the survey made. A number of the recommendations were made orally by Barton at the completion of his survey. The traffic engineering firm suggested this order of priority for its recommendations:

1. Create by ordinance a traffic and parking commission and appoint its members. (An off-street parking commission of five men was appointed Aug. 10.)
2. Refer this report to the commission for study, recommendation and action.
3. 4 and 5. These items refer to the creation of an off-street parking system, presently under consideration of the off-street parking commission.
6. Create a maintenance division under the police department and provide it with the necessary personnel and equipment. (This was suggested at last week's council meeting by Police Chief Howard Johnson.)
7. Convert from angle to parallel parking along the entire length of Broadway and along the entire length of Shoshone street. (The next four recommendations are made only if the city council approves the conversion to parallel parking.)
8. Mark Main avenue and Shoshone street with center lines, lane lines, crosswalks, etc.
9. Shorten parking time limits, shorten the time limit and metered zones.
10. Abolish the no-left-turn restriction with the possible exception of temporary restrictions.

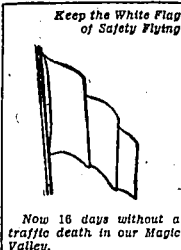

Dewey Assails Foreign Plans As 'Wobbling'

SEN. HOWIE WITH DEWEY, Oct. 12 (AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey charged today that the bipartisan foreign policy has "wobbled" only when the Truman administration "has permitted it." In his frankest public criticism of the President's handling of foreign affairs, the Republican presidential nominee said that if he is elected in November he will carry out a "vigorous, competent and effective" drive for a "bi-partisan peace policy."

Truman Raps Dewey OK of 80th Congress

ABOARD "TRUMAN CAMPAIGN TRAIN," Oct. 12 (AP)—President Truman, campaigning in Indiana, declared today Gov. Thomas E. Dewey "put his stamp of approval" upon a congress which "put the nation's prosperity" in grave danger. The president said that if the Republicans win in November "the same old moosebark" will be in control of congress. He said the congress made things easy for "the speculators" and that there would be no hope for an improvement unless a "takeover" control the Republican party. President Truman sought to rally midwestern industrial voters behind his full-scale championship of the "new deal" which he said Governor Dewey hopes to "destroy."

1,960 Are Sliced Off Pension Rolls

SAINT ANGELO, Tex., Oct. 12 (AP)—The Utah welfare commission today reported that 1,960 persons have been removed from the state welfare rolls for failing to sign property liens as required by the last legislature. Bickering Delays New Nap Cabinet

Ickes Comes Out Strongly For Truman

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12 (AP)—Former Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes, who broke with President Truman in 1946 and left his cabinet, has come out for Mr. Truman's election in November.

"As between Thomas 'Blaine' Dewey, the candidate in sneakers, I prefer to support Mr. Truman," Ickes said in a statement.

Ickes said he would "welcome an election" to vote for someone who is "straightforward and sincere, if at times more unpredictable than I would wish. He is at least comfortably earthy and without cant."

Approves Actions

Ickes told a news conference the President has "acted straight and talked straight" on power, irrigation, tidelands oil and other issues on which the Republican campaign "misses on remaining mum."

He went on:

"I have said harsh and critical things about President Truman. I shall probably do so in the future. I neither amend nor withdraw any of it."

Would Aid Public

Ickes said that if the Republican ticket is elected "there's going to be a raid on the public domain. It's already well organized; they set it up in the 80th congress."

He recited a long list of issues on which he said Dewey has taken no stand. "And yet his actions have spoken louder than words," Ickes continued.

"Ickes said he will 'do all I can in behalf of the Truman candidate, including making speeches in recreation states' which, he said, might include Colorado, Wyoming, Montana and Idaho.

Forest Protective Districts Formed For Entire State

BOISE, Oct. 12 (AP)—Roger L. Churnsey, state forester, announced the entire state of Idaho has now been divided into forest protective districts.

In a report to the state cooperative board of forestry Monday, Churnsey said these forest protective districts are being administered by the state, forest service, grazing service and the timber protective associations.

The forestry board also heard a report on a survey of state forests, administered by John Woods, Washington, D. C., forester. The survey was sponsored by the Society of American Foresters and the Charles Leupold Pack Forestry foundation.

The board considered the report and announced no action will be taken until its next meeting in December.

Churnsey also reported on the Idaho farm forestry program to be begun this fall in northern Idaho. He said details of the program will be announced later.

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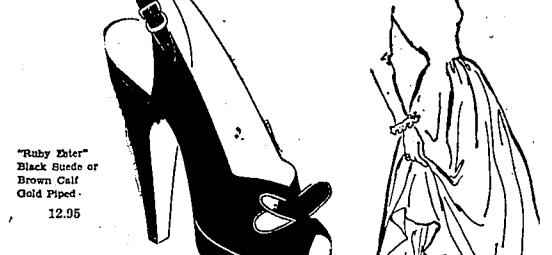

GOP Obscuring Real Issue, Says Demo Chairman

BOISE, Oct. 12 (AP)—State Democratic Chairman Ed P. Brennan said today Ezra B. Hinshaw, state Republican chairman, is trying to obscure the real issue when said confusion exists "in the multitude of government agencies created in the last 16 years."

Brennan said "there are some facts which Chairman Hinshaw either does not know or chooses to ignore. Bureaus are not created by the President but by congress. Bureaus are not abolished by the President but by congress."

He added, "why didn't the Republican congress abolish some of the 'confusing bureaus' about which Chairman Hinshaw complains."

"Since the congress, under Republican control the past two years—with power to shuffle or abolish the bureaus—did nothing along that line, can the voter be expected to believe a campaign promise that action will be taken next year," Brennan declared.

Gov. Warren Assails Demo Project Stand

GASPER, Wyo., Oct. 12 (AP)—Gov. Earl Warren last night charged the administration with exploitation and manipulation of the people for the purpose of "political persecution" of the Democratic party. Coming into the Rocky mountain region on his GOP vice presidential campaign, the California governor struck back at President Truman's assertion that he was the Republican party wanted to "sabotage" the west.

Warren provided such assertions, he said in an address at a Republican rally in Casper's high school auditorium, should be answered in terms "that will make that kind of a charge for just exactly what it is."

A Republican administration, he declared, is pledged to: 1. Speed up development of the west's natural resources.

2. Develop "every possible kilowatt of hydroelectric energy."

3. Initiate multiple purpose reclamation, power and flood control projects to supply every drop of water—the west's "life blood."

4. Have the western representation in the cabinet.

5. Establish regional administrative planning in cooperation rather than propaganda.

"It is vital to the west to have a national administration that has not only vision to see the west's possibilities in relation to national development, but also the capacity to forward that program rapidly, efficiently and without using this west of ours as a political football," he said.

"Saboteur" himself, he added. "The thing I would expect to hear is that I have been cast in the role of a saboteur to the west."

The Republican party was interested in reclamation long before the present administration saw fit to claim a proprietary interest in it for the purpose of perpetuating itself in office.

CARE has announced that a coal package containing 400 pounds of pea anthracite coal is now available for guaranteed delivery in the Netherlands, Mrs. Bailey said.

Each package contains enough coal for a Dutch family to keep its home warm to a temperature of 60 degrees during the coldest months, when used to supplement the regular Dutch ration. The coal package costs \$1.00.

Mrs. Klein said she was amazed to see the rows of potatoes lying in fields before potato diggers. She said she didn't believe there are that many potatoes in all of Germany. She said the potatoes grown in her native land are dug by hand.

Mrs. Klein has been a member of the LDS church for more than 60 years.

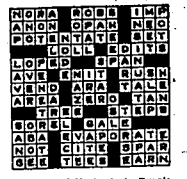

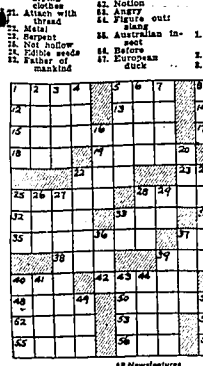

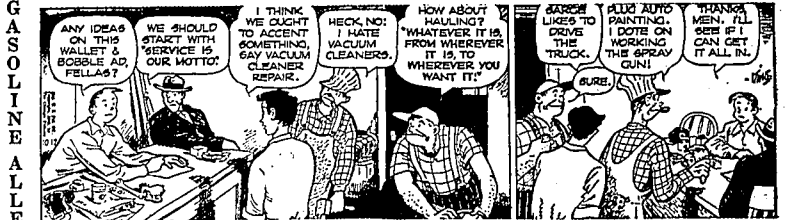

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Plans of War Get Blame in Red Charges

THERSE-Yugoslav officials are saying privately that the confessions moved against them recently because the Kremlin is preparing for World War III and, fearing that signs of independence in Yugoslavia might mean an attempt to remain neutral, wanted to tighten down the Russian sphere of influence in plenty of time.

As I get it, they are not trying so much to convey the impression that Russia expects an immediate war as to suggest that there are Russian attitudes which it would be well for the western powers to cultivate. They can see the Russian efforts to eliminate all weak spots in the Balkans and eastern Europe, and Belgrade fully expects another direct effort to oust the Tito regime. Tito would like to be better prepared to meet it, and the west could help.

For one thing, the semi-blockade established by Yugoslavia's confessions is hurting. Tito has turned west for new trade agreements with Switzerland, Britain and Sweden based on an exchange of goods. Britain has been letting him have oil from Trieste for some time. Holland and Norway are building ships for him. But he also needs money, although so far he has made no direct approach to the allies for a loan. The talk of remaining neutral in a war might be a way of asking for aid. If so, it is not likely to net him much until the allies are sure that the confessions row is all that seems to be. There is some doubt of that in London and Washington.

From what I have learned, I don't think there is any doubt of a deep cleavage between Belgrade and the rest of the Russian sphere. And the Balkan rivalries are involved as well as Yugoslav nationalism and Russian determination to weld her satellites into a tight strategic bloc. But Tito remains a Moscow-trained communist, and a totalitarian. Under domestic pressure he has been forced to move away from international communism in favor of autonomy and nationalism. He might be bought, but whether he would stand hitched to a grave question.

Cotton said the pasteurization plant here will be receiving nothing but graded milk from its producers in the near future. The sanitarian took 45 milk samples for bacterial count.

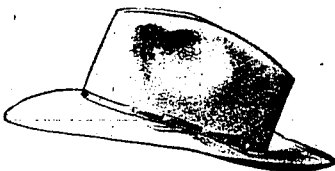

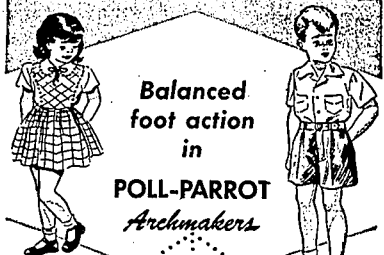
