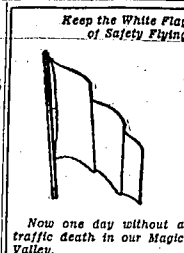

Go Ahead and "Blow" Nose; Doctor Avers

CHICAGO, Oct. 15 (AP)—A physician who believes that 20,000 Navy submariners more can't be wrong says it's all right to blow your nose hard when you have a cold. "It won't cause an ear infection by forcing bacteria or virus-laden material into the ear tube," says a group of ear-throat specialists. Dr. W. Wallace Reed, Ann Arbor, Mich., said he came to that conclusion while serving as a navy medical officer at the New London, Conn., submarine base during the war.

Reveals Experience
In a paper prepared for the annual meeting of the American Academy of Ophthalmology and Otolaryngology, he said: "More than 20,000 submarine men were trained at the base. Part of the course involved use of the membranous 'lung'—a device for escaping from sunken submarines—while submerged in a 100-foot water tank. This procedure required frequent insertion of the tubes between ear and throat.

He said that "for some time I was horrified" to see men with acute infections going through the test repeatedly. However, only one man out of more than 20,000 trained developed an ear infection. "The three weeks of this evidence," he said, "gradually forced on me the conclusion that the old teaching that otitis media was caused by improper blowing of the nose during an infection—was entirely fallacious and should be discarded."

What does cause an ear infection following a cold, he decided, is direct obstruction of the tube by infection of tissue, creating a relative vacuum in the middle ear, which fills with serum that in turn may become infected.

Wallace Says Truman 'Held' By 'Big Gold'

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 15 (AP)—Henry Wallace said last night that Truman is a "victim" of big business and militarists who "clamped down" and stopped his plans to send Chief Justice Fred Vinson to Moscow.

Mr. Wallace said about three million Americans speaking at the Milwaukee hall park as Wallace heard derivative words on him in two speeches.

He said that the ABC network, the Progressive party candidate for President took credit for causing Mr. Truman's plan to send Vinson to talk with Russians.

Demand More News

Wallace said he demanded the resumption of negotiations two weeks ago, the people took up the demand, and the President "was forced" to make the Vinson mission.

"But again," Wallace said, "just as on every previous occasion, the real masters of our policy clamped down and stopped Mr. Truman's move."

"Hind and incapable, he could do nothing but obey their orders and hold his tongue," Wallace said.

Call on People

Wallace called on the American people to demand that the U. S. resume direct negotiations with Russia in the German cities.

"Then, in the special case of the Milwaukee audience," Wallace said, "the pattern of Democrat and Republican actions at home and abroad is always 'initially anti-labor' and 'concocted to enrich only a few muck merchant'."

He also stepped into a hot Milwaukee labor situation.

Wallace warmly defended the former leadership of local 240 of the CIO United Auto Workers. He did not mention those leaders by name.

One of them, Harold Chubb, had been convicted of perjury because he told the house labor committee he wasn't a communist.

Ambitious Goal Set by Legion As 30th National Meet Opens

NEW YORK, Oct. 15 (AP)—The American Legion, which opens its 30th convention in Miami Sunday, has set the most ambitious goal in its history for 1949—3,000,000 members.

The campaign is being undertaken in the face of a general slump in membership which has affected all organizations of war veterans.

The Legion now has more than 17,000 members, but more than 17,000—its membership as of Oct. 8, was 3,005,514, as compared with 3,242,000 a year ago.

Legion officials believe the decline is only temporary, paralleling a similar drop that struck the organization after the first world war. Its membership of 945,103 in 1920 fell to 600,457 by 1923 but hit a between-the-wars peak of 1,653,900 in 1931, a period of national depression.

With interest in national defense rising and millions of veterans of World War I and World War II, the Legion sees a period of rapid growth and increasing influence ahead.

Specifically, women are playing a larger role in its activities. The 3,000,000th member enrolled in 1948 was a former WAVE—Mrs. R. J. Deland, 24, Seattle. Her husband, also a veteran, became Legionnaire number 3,000,001.

Today there are more than 250,000 former WAVES, WACS, SPARS and nurses in the Legion. There are some 302 all-women posts—but most of the girls prefer to join up with "co-ed" posts.

The Legion, the largest but neither the first nor the last association of war veterans in American military history, was conceived three decades ago in Paris by two wounded soldiers—an officer and an enlisted man.

They were the late Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., then a lieutenant-colonel in the first infantry division, and Sgt. William Patterson. They agreed that as soon as the war was over they would return home and work together to start a veterans' association "for the good of the country."

Patterson returned to his outfit and was killed in action. But "Young Teddy," who was to die a brigadier general in France in World War II, carried out the project.

An early hurdle overcome by the Legion was the fact by many enlisted men that it would become an officers' club and an institution of the military establishment. It specifically proclaimed it would be non-political in its act of incorporation.

Chary of bestowing titles, it had only two honorary national commanders—John G. Fernberg and Marshall Poch of France. The Alabama state Legion convention recently adopted a resolution recommending that the organization's

State Turkey Output Down 17 Per Cent

BOISE, Oct. 15 (AP)—Seventeen per cent fewer Thanksgiving day birds will reach family tables from Idaho this year than in 1947, Gilbert Watson, agriculture department dairy inspector, said.

Watson said Idaho's fall turkey production has been estimated at 200,000 hens and toms with a possibility for 225,000, a 17 per cent reduction from last year's crop.

The decrease in turkey production, Watson said, resulted mostly from the high price of feed.

Watson predicted, however, that even though a nationwide turkey shortage is in view, the price of birds will be practically the same as last year.

He explained that Idaho is trying to rebuild its turkey industry, and that prices will have to be low enough to make sure the birds will sell.

Watson estimated the wholesale price of turkeys this year at \$4 to \$5 cents a pound for hens, with a somewhat lower price for toms.

Last year, he added, hens brought about 51 cents a pound, with the

Allied Troops Are 'Quiet' in Trieste Areas

Trieste—Troops in the bottom of a cup created by sharply rising green mountains and furling bay Adriatic, is one of the most beautifully located cities I have ever seen.
Alight the harbor is quiet under its pinnacles of ship lights and flags. Families and young couples stroll along the promenade. Little groups form to strain their eyes watching the movie on the facade of an American cruiser.
No hostilities
There is none of the boisterousness which usually accompanies the presence of foreign occupation troops far from home. American and British troops are conspicuous by their absence.
Numerous saloons in good order, happy groups and a look into the showcase of a bakeshop, finds it too late, and more on with a good-natured "hell, he's practically out of business."
You can get quite a slug of gin cognac or sometimes, whiskey in Trieste for 20 cents. But either the soldiers here are more different or their officers are more strict than the army and navy took most of us officers are used to.
Little Disturbance
After the show aboard ship, five young cadets drink the lounge of the army officers' mess. One of their drinks they begin to hum songs that might have mothers being sung by their fathers. No roaring or chanting here. Just a little quietly-harmonized melody. Nothing to disturb the next table.
It is rather refreshing to one who has come out of England and Germany, where one-legged, one-eyed and one-armed men run the elevators and most of the auxiliary jobs of that type; where the walls of one-sided buildings make jagged recesses against the sky where people struggle to make a little food out of the garbage of war.
Then the boys swing into a song. Still quietly they swing into their song about the adoption of warhills. There's bravery in it, but also cynicism and resignation:
"Here's to the men who are dead. Here's to the next man to die."
It is nearing midnight. Shaving time next a long time ago, but the jaws of these boys are still smooth and clean. They can't know what they are singing about—you hope.

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Pioneer Idaho Electric Plant Loses Identity

WALLACE, Oct. 15 (AP)—A pioneer Idaho public utility plant—which once warned its customers that the use of electric irons was a "felony and punishable by a prison sentence"—has been sold to the Washington Water Power company.
It is the Murray Electric Light System at Murray, famous gold rush city before the turn of the century.
Built in 1910
It was built in 1910 by the late Adam Aulbach, pioneer Shoshone county publisher who died in 1933. Since his death it had been operated by his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Dave Sellers, Murray.
Aulbach had established the Murray water system in 1924.
Aulbach was 66 when he built the plant against tremendous difficulties, including a blizzard that went dry in the summer.
Nearly Wrecked
When the 50 households on the line purchased electric irons, it all but wrecked the plant, which had only limited capacity. Mrs. Sellers recalled that her father issued his warning.
"Despite the stulting of the plant," she said today, "the houses were carried on and became an underground organization of electric irons. A sister of Mrs. Sellers was a credit to the town."
The plant operated only from 6 p. m. to 9 p. m.
In 1921 the plant gave up producing its own power and retaining W. W. P. electrically.

Auto Clipped by Passing Vehicle

State police investigated an accident at 11:45 a. m. Thursday three-fourths of a mile south of South Park on E. Sterling, route 1, and drivers E. Sterling, route 2, were the victims.
Investigating officers said Sterling had pulled to a stop from a driveway with the front wheels of his machine touching the pavement. The truck, driven by E. Sterling, hit another automobile at this point and the right side of the truck bed struck the right front end of Sterling's machine, they said.
Estimates of damage were \$100 for Sterling's machine and \$1 for the truck upon which a clearance light was broken.

USDA Says World Sugar Supply Good

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15 (AP)—The agriculture department has reported that world sugar production increased to meet this year. It predicted even more sugar next year.
Much of the increase is expected in areas recovering from war damage.
The department's report said there will be plenty of sugar in areas which normally supply the United States to meet its 1949 requirement. Consumption in this country is expected to be about the same as this year, or about 55 to 60 million pounds per person.
Estimate
World production in the 1947-48 season was estimated at 34,035,000 tons. This is nine per cent above output of the previous season, but two per cent less than the 1945-49 pre-war average.
The 1948-49 season crop is expected to be around 35,500,000 tons. A smaller Cuban crop is indicated, but larger yields are likely in Europe, Formosa, the Philippines, Java and Hawaii. Puerto Rican production is expected to be unchanged, about 9,000,000 tons.
Present reports indicate a crop of about 10,500,000 tons for the United States, its regular possessions, Cuba and the Philippine islands. This would be about eight per cent smaller than the 1947-48 crop, but about 27 per cent larger than the 1935-39 average.
The department said sugar prices, in general, were lower in 1948 than in 1947. They fell steadily from January to mid-summer and then recovered. No forecast was made for 1949 prices, but sugar control legislation covering the supplies in this country are designed to stabilize prices at levels equally fair to producers and consumers.

S. L. Grand Jury Continuing Probe

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 15 (AP)—Grand jury was nearing the end of its work. The jury and attorneys today continued to push their probe of alleged gambling activities.
However, Harry Calton, jury foreman, discounted the reports. He said he doubted if the jury would finish its investigations before the end of the court term on Dec. 31.
A dozen witnesses have been called before the jurors this week. Most of them were employed by or associated with four officers "raided" by the jury last week-end in its probe of alleged horserace book-making activities over the county.

Gain Seen on Prospects for State's Crops

BOISE, Oct. 15 (AP)—Idaho crop prospects improved today as a result of better weather conditions.

The U. S. department of agriculture today predicted a good potato, hay, oats and fall lettuce was greater than had been forecast Sept. 1. Corn and wheat crops turned out smaller than expected.

Tonnage was added to the potato crop in most of the important producing sections as killing frosts were delayed. The average yield is indicated at 250 bushels per acre.

Wheat 36.75 Harvested. This would equal the yield harvested in 1930 and 1932, and would be exceeded only by the 1940 and 1942 yields.

Indicated production is 37,400,000 bushels, exceeded only in the wartime year, 1945-46. Late planted spring grains also were benefited by the moderate fall weather and those crops are turning out at least as well as forecast earlier.

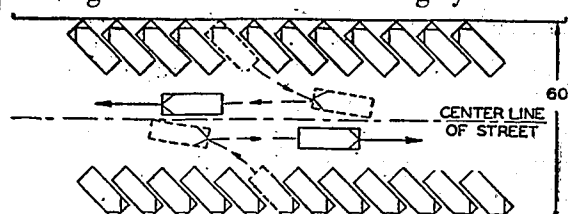
Alfalfa Yield High. The alfalfa yield per acre was indicated to be the third highest on records dating back to 1942. Dry but not too dry conditions produced yields more than expected a month ago.

September milk production, estimated at 63,000,000 pounds, was slightly less than in September last year. Egg production was slightly higher.

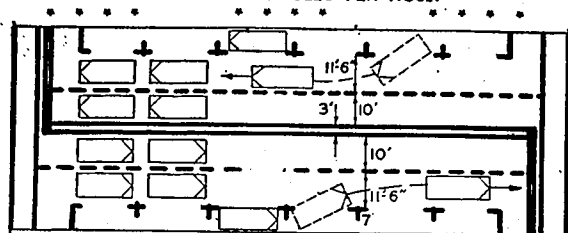

Eliminate Angle Parking in Business Areas Here, Experts on Traffic Urge

(Editor's note: Three phases of development Twin Falls traffic are described in the first of a series of articles about the street traffic plan which was recently prepared for the city council by the Associated Consultants, traffic and transportation engineers at Boise, Idaho. The article will describe various parts of the plan, which will include the elimination of angle parking in the business district, and of off-street parking.)

Thru-stations are frequent in that part of the Associated Consultants' plan regarding street traffic in the Twin Falls business district, particularly concerning parking problems and existing traffic congestion. Among these statements are the following:

About angle parking: It is unqualifiedly recommended that angle parking on the principal business streets of Twin Falls be eliminated as rapidly as possible. About the cause of congestion: It is clear that angle parking has destroyed the ability of the streets in Twin Falls to carry through traffic, has forced the imposing of a morning 'no left turn' regulations and has caused many easily avoidable accidents.

About the congestion itself: On a typical afternoon in the business section, traffic approaches the point of stagnation. With any additional travel, such as a slight peak at the afternoon closing time or during Saturday shopping hours, and undoubtedly...

are the subject of their discussion of off-street parking later in their report.

Turning to angle parking, the consultants brand it as the root of the business district's traffic problems. They state angle parking at both ends of a 60-foot street actually leaves a roadway for moving traffic. With the angle parking, the 60-foot pavement of Main and Shoshone becomes little more than parking areas and fail to give good service to moving traffic.

As shown in the accompanying diagram, the consultants list these disadvantages of angle parking:

1. A car pulling from an angle parking stall must travel to the center of the street in order to proceed.
2. An automobile to pull into such a parking space must block all movement in its direction.
3. A driver desiring a parking space is about to be vacated and stops while waiting for it, completely blocking all movement in his direction.
4. However, the engineers do not overlook the advantages of angle parking which include the accommodation of more vehicles per block and greater convenience for the driver in parking at an angle instead of parallel with the curb. The consultants point out that other cities with the same problem have been rapidly converting from angle to parallel parking.

Their report quotes National Safety Council figures for 1947 which show elimination or reduction of angle parking in 24 of the 67 reporting cities with populations from 10,000 to 25,000, and by 44 per cent of these in the 25,000 to 50,000 population group.

On the matter of street capacity with angle parking, the consultants state approximately 600 cars an hour is the most to be expected on Main avenue as long as angle parking continues. But with the substitution of parallel parking, they declare the ability of Main avenue to carry traffic can be at least tripled.

On another aspect of angle parking, a study of local accident records showed 21.2 per cent of all traffic accidents resulted from drivers backing out of angle parking spaces.

should not delay prompt adoption of parallel parking which they describe as more efficient and modern. Instead, they recommended other methods must be sought to obtain parking space at the same time the changes made from angle to parallel parking. The other methods urged are:

The consultants call this normal and cite studies in other business districts showing between 75 and 90 per cent of the accidents as directly related to angle parking.

Regarding the "no left turn" restriction removed by city officials before receipt of the report, the consultants blamed angle parking as the factor making the restriction necessary. But they declared the turn prohibitions are necessary so long as angle parking continues and moving traffic is limited to a single lane in each direction.

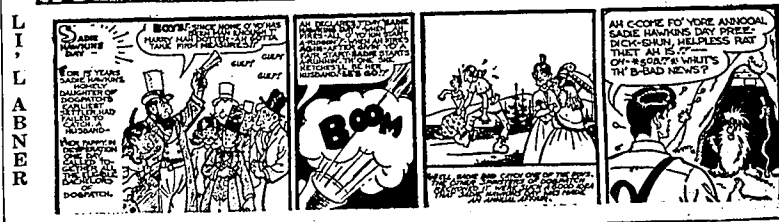
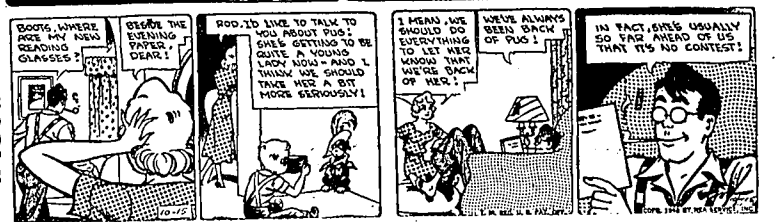

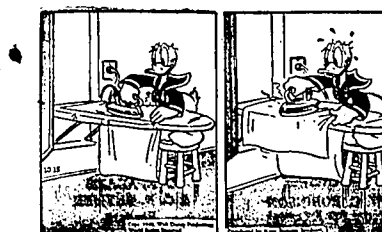
