PARIS, Oct. 19 (AP)—The United States, Britain and France notified the United Nations security council today that Russia is tightening the blockade of Berlin even while the U.N. debates the crisis. Anglo-American delegates served notice of Soviet steps to clamp the iron grip more firmly on Berlin when the security council resumed debate on the issue after a four-day recess. Russia was on trial on western charges of menacing world peace and violating its U.N. pledges by sealing off Berlin from the west except by air.

### Big Revisions Are Believed Need in Italy

ROME—Italy is going to have to make important changes in her economic setup, some of them requiring legislation, before the European recovery program can get a full head of steam here.  
Officials say they are going to do it, but they are up against some knotty problems.  
Italian industry struggles under some strange burdens. Costs are assessed against it which discourage both expansion and production.

**4 Per Cent Tax**  
There is for instance, a 4 per cent tax on transactions which pyramids the price of everything the manufacturer buys. Each successive handler of raw materials must fix his price to include this levy.

One of the greatest burdens is the system by which manufacturers are required to employ a certain number of workers whom they do not need as an artificial means of preventing unemployment.

There is a shortage of capital, with resultant high interest rates on money required for productive purposes.

**Hard to Reduce Taxes**  
It's hard for the government to reduce taxes, both because of the general postwar high cost situation and because it is committed to more social security expenditures than it can afford.

But the over-hiring required of industry, pyramiding costs of raw materials and antiquated tax system are putting prices of finished products above the ability of the Italian people to pay and above the competitive level in foreign trade.

**Works Program Proposed**  
A public works program is being proposed to take care of at least a part of the over-hiring, and a new tax program is being devised. In the meantime, the work of the economic coordinating administration in Italy still is largely a relief program.

### Agricultural Unit Speeds Aid on Beets

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19 (AP)—The agriculture department has announced plans for speeding up subsidy payments to sugar beet growers cooperating with the government sugar control program.

It said that heretofore there has been delay in making payments in some areas because of the necessity of waiting until beets sold at a given plant have been processed. Payments are based in part on the amount of sugar obtained from beets.

Hereafter, flat figures on sugar content, based upon a seven-year average, will be used. These figures are 91.1 per cent sugar content for beets tested only at time of processing, and 92.8 per cent for those tested at time of delivery to the processor and also at the time of processing.

These compare with the former rates of 97 and 95 per cent, respectively.

The department said these reductions reflect a general mechanization of harvesting operations.

The department also announced a reduction of three cents per ton in subsidy rate this year. The rate has averaged \$2.50 per ton in recent years.

### Chimp Killed After Attacks On Two Men

EVANSVILLE, Ind., Oct. 19 (AP)—One of two rampaging chimpanzees, who tossed one zoo keeper through a plate glass window and another off a building roof was back in custody today after her mate was shot and killed.

The two chimps, Hank and Kuku, were evicted from their cage yesterday in order that a blacksmith and his helper might install a new heating system. Hank, angered at the transfer to an adjoining cage, snatched the padlock with a paw stroke and marched back into his own quarters followed by the faithful Kuku, who is to bear his young next month.

Workers Terrified Leaving the terrified blacksmith, Albert Luman, and his helper, Paul Robertson, frozen in a corner, Hank and Kuku waddled out an open door on the opposite side of the cage and confronted E. J. Mortenson, a 45-year-old zoo attendant, in the corridor.

They lifted Mortenson and tossed him through a glass door into the animal house entryway, then climbed through the broken doorway and attacked his legs and shoulders with their teeth. Doctors said Mortenson's leg was chipped, but an amputation may be necessary.

Bites Off 2 Fingers Spying a ladder that seemed to lead to freedom, the chimps climbed to the roof of the animal house where 22-year-old George Davis was at work. Hank snatched at Davis' hand as the latter tried to ward off the chimp, and bit off two fingers before grabbing him bodily and tossing him off the roof.

Davis broke a wrist in the fall, and was threatened again by the chimps who jumped at him from the roof. They were beaten off by another zoo attendant and fled into the wooded area of the zoo grounds.

Zoo Superintendent Bob McGray and police sent orders to nearby schools that pupils should be kept in classes, and then began their chimp-hunt.

Shot in Head Hank and Kuku were discovered a short time later, shivering in the dank cellars of a school. Hank was just off and set off by his own head. McGray's automobile, back at the animal house, however, he resisted his keepers and just attacked the attendants. McGray shot him through the head, using a .38-caliber pistol.

Kuku lost her fight after her mate had been led away. She snuggled against McGray's leg and held the seal pin and led her back to her lonely quarters with a halter fashioned from his pants belt.

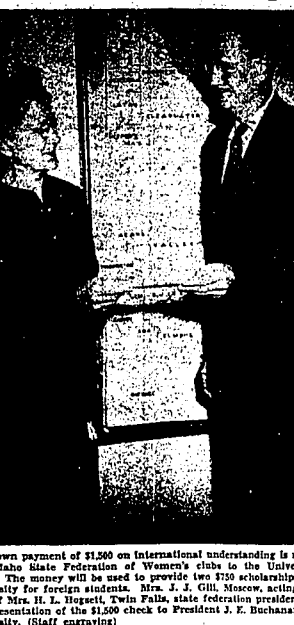
### Costs Awarded in Suit Over Saddle

### Marshall Pushes Alliance Plan Aimed at Showdown With Russia

PARIS, Oct. 19 (AP)—Secretary of State George C. Marshall is hard at work establishing the basis of a vast geopolitical-military plan aimed at facing Russia in a diplomatic showdown by next spring, a reliable informant said today.

It was understood the project is supported in principle by Republican presidential candidate Gov. Thomas E. Dewey so that it can be carried to completion despite the outcome of the presidential election.

The general aim of the plan is to coordinate the interests of the non-communist world in the same direction. This, it was understood, is an authoritative call for not only putting a stop to Russian expansion, but for pushing her back out of eastern Europe.

The project involves: 1. A play for time in Berlin by increasing the airlift, refusing to negotiate while the Soviet blockade is in effect, and obtaining an overwhelming world indictment of Russia in the United Nations.

2. Proceeding all non-communist Europe, including western Germany, to take as many steps as possible to unite politically, militarily and economically.

3. Obtaining American congressional approval of the new peacetime military lend-lease program for western Europe. The initial cost is expected to total \$200,000,000.

4. Creating an unprecedented north Atlantic alliance between the United States and Canada on one hand and the key north Atlantic European states of Norway, Britain, the Lowlands, France and Portugal on the other.

5. Inducing other key European areas on the flanks of the Brussels pact nations, such as Scandinavia in the north and the Mediterranean powers in the south, into closest collaboration with the project if they won't or can't join it directly.

6. Keeping the United States and non-communist Europe to join in a federation. In this connection, though, Marshall is said to be holding a United States of Europe is visionary at this time.

7. Keeping the focus on the offensive, which started with the Truman doctrine of military aid to Greece and Turkey and continued

### Heart Attack Takes Life of Nazi General

HAMBURG, Germany, Oct. 19 (AP)—Former German Field Marshal Walther von Brauchitsch died last night in the British custody hospital here, where he was under guard awaiting trial as a war criminal.

Von Brauchitsch faced trial with three other leaders of the German army of World War II—Field Marshal Gerd von Rundstedt and Erich von Manstein and Col. Gen. Adolf Strauss—will in British custody.

A British army announcement said von Brauchitsch, 67, died of coronary thrombosis.

Others in Hospital Von Rundstedt, von Manstein and Strauss also are in the military hospital. All four were taken there last month, and placed in comfortable quarters under constant guard.

Previously they had been held in a prisoner-of-war camp in England. British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin recently announced in the house of commons that American investigators had turned up evidence establishing a prima facie case against the four German military men. The British had intended to begin the trial in Hamburg next January.

Took Over in 1938 Von Brauchitsch became commander in chief of the German army as a result of a sensational cabinet shakeup by Hitler in 1938. The shakeup had culminated in the resignations of Field Marshal Gen. Werner von Blomberg, then minister of war, and Col. Gen. Baron Werner von Fritsch, who later died on the Polish front.

Brauchitsch remained commander of the German army until he bogged down in the Russian drive toward Moscow. Hitler fired him Dec. 20, 1941.

Brauchitsch was born in Berlin Oct. 4, 1881. He had a military education and devoted his life to the army. He was a member of the German general staff in World War I.

CHICAGO, Oct. 19 (AP)—Safety experts were told today that accidents over more years from the working fatalities of Americans than any single illness.

Ned H. Dearborn, president of the National Safety Council, told the National Safety congress that "accident prevention has failed to keep pace with medicine and other sciences in preventing death and suffering."

"There is no reason on earth why the American people, properly informed and aroused, cannot do exactly the job in accident prevention they have done on disease, famine and epidemics," Dearborn said.

### Changes Are Urged for Five Points Intersections Here in Expert's Survey

(Special Note: Implements for the five points intersections are recommended by the Associated Consultants in their report on the five points intersections. A traffic engineer by George W. Barton, traffic engineer there last summer, showed 600 vehicles an hour enter Five Points west during business hours, except during the evening peak when the total reaches 850 vehicles per hour.

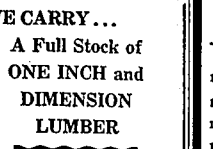

### Wallace Says Labor Chiefs Join 'Enemy'

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 19 (AP)—Henry Wallace said last night labor leaders who call people communists are joining with the "enemy"—the corporations—and this enemy is "slaughtering his slaves."

In a speech at Duquesne park, the Progressive party candidate for President sought the votes of rank and file union members in this steel center.

He did not name the right wing labor leaders whom he was criticizing. Philip Murray, president of the CIO and the United Steel Workers union which have their headquarters here, is an outspoken foe of communists in the labor movement.

Use Same Tactics  
Wallace said it is a "pity" that some of the same men who led labor victories 10 years ago, men who built the Steel Workers union and the United Mine Workers union, are today "using the same tactics" of "red-baiting" that were used against them.

He said: "I do not understand labor leaders who point out that everything the corporations say is a lie, designed to make themselves more money; but who when they see a man, a dirty communist join with the corporations in discriminating against any worker who dares support the Progressive party."

Does Roadwork  
Earlier today, Wallace: "I'm a mile or so of roadwork in East Pittsburgh."  
2. Addressed a polite and rather dull one-hour crowd of about 3,500 electrical workers at the gate of the Westinghouse Electric corporation plant in East Pittsburgh.  
At the evening rally, Wallace made a double-barreled attack on the "Red-baiting" and the Marshall plan. He said they both "spring from the same source—Wall Street. It is time we dried up that source."

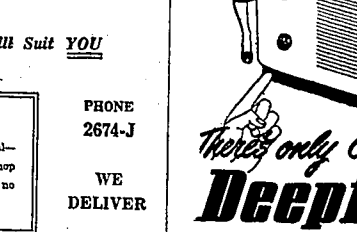

### ECA Wants More Funds For Europe

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19 (AP)—More than \$5 billion for European recovery and a bigger long-range program for China have been urged by two officials of the economic cooperative administration.  
Roger Lapham, chief of ECA's \$23,000,000 China aid program, suggested a four-year recovery plan for China as well as Europe.  
"It is going to take four years for Europe. It probably won't take any less for China," Lapham told newsmen on his return from the orient.

Suggests Long Range Plan  
"It is my personal view that we should plan a longer range than our present one-year (FY-1) don't think they (the Chinese) are going to get back on their feet in a year." He declined to estimate China's needs beyond the present one-year program.  
Another ECA official, Edward T. Dickinson, said congress will be asked for more money to pay for European recovery until mid-1949. He did not say how much more.

Funds Insufficient  
Dickinson told news conference the ECA's present fund of \$3,635,000,000 will all be committed some time before April 1, 1949. The money, authorized by congress, was intended to last until next July 1.  
Newsman understood Dickinson to say a deficit of about \$500,000,000 is expected for the first quarter of 1949. Other officials, however, said later it was a misunderstanding. They declined to estimate what the deficit might be.

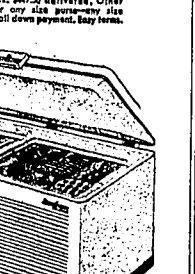

Security Act Is Explained In ECA Unit WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—The economic cooperation administration is teaching its employees what it can and can't talk about of the agency's foreign recovery operation.

Recovery Administrator Paul G. Hoffman says in the manual everyone has the responsibility of becoming thoroughly familiar with the security regulations. And J. W. Taggart, former FBI man who is in charge of the ECA unit, explains that much of the information dealt with by ECA is extremely vital and "unusually disclosure" of this information could impede ECA's program.

The American Society of Newspaper Editors has characterized the ECA manual as a "red rule" on the press because any official could withhold public information or even cover up mistakes in his department or agency, by classifying documents brought to his attention.

The ECA manual explains in detail the purpose of security regulations which defines as "safeguarding official data, the unauthorized disclosure of which might impair the welfare of this nation."

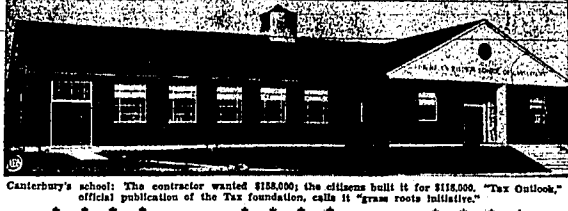

### High Prices, Lower Crop Hits Turkeys

**By United Press**  
The combination of high prices and the smallest turkey crop in 10 years may prevent families in many areas from having the traditional Thanksgiving turkey dinner next month.

State-by-state survey by the United Press revealed today that America's turkey farms have kept production down because of the increase in the cost of poultry feed. The nation's turkey crop this year is estimated at 10 per cent below last year's production.

**High Cost Seen**  
The national Turkey Federation said 1944's estimated crop of 31,710,000 birds should be sufficient to fill the need, but warned that prices would be high because of the high cost of feed. Retailers said it was too early to say what the price per pound would be, but they agreed that the reduced crop of birds would push the price above that of last year in many regions.

The largest cut in turkey production was reported by Iowa. Earl Mason, secretary of the Iowa Turkey Federation, said the organization's 800 producing members have estimated a 25 to 30 per cent drop in the state's production.

Poultry men in Texas, the nation's largest turkey producing state, predicted a slight price drop before the holiday season because of recently lowered feed costs. Texas has an estimated crop of 3,018,000 birds this year, compared with 3,021,000 in 1943.

A more cheerful note was provided by California, the country's second largest turkey producing state, where state and federal crop experts forecast a 12 per cent turkey output over 1943.

Higher in California

But even in California, where no shortage was expected, the California Turkey Growers' association anticipated higher prices than last year. Officials expected the current price to rise to 10 cents per pound for hens and 60 for toms to continue through the Thanksgiving season.

Minnesota, the third biggest turkey state, reported an estimated 22 per cent decline in the size of its crop. The state is producing about 2,700,000 turkeys, compared with 3,337,000 in 1943. A meat buyer from a large retail store believed consumers would be willing to pay 15 to 20 cents more per pound for turkey this year than last year. This would raise the price from 10 to 15 cents per pound in Minnesota.

PARIS, Oct. 18 (AP)—France's Communist party last night conceded a sharp defeat in elections for the upper house of parliament. The communists admitted that Gen. Charles de Gaulle's rightist party and the middle radical socialists probably will dominate the house.

De Gaulle's rally of the French People (RPF) in turn did not show real winnings.

The last count of the ministry of the interior was:

- Rightist Independents 21,178
- Socialists 17,590
- Radicals 12,998
- Communist 10,299
- Popular Republicans (GRP) 8,992
- Radical Socialists 12,224

A de Gaulle spokesman said the general claimed 60 to 65 per cent of the rightist independent vote in the final choosing of the 320 members of the house—known as the council of the republic—will take place Nov. 7 when 100,011 electors, including those picked in yesterday's voting will cast ballots. National assembly deputies and departmental officers also sit in the electoral college.

Flornant Bonie, a communist spokesman, said the results showed that his party's strength will fall from 80 seats to 12.

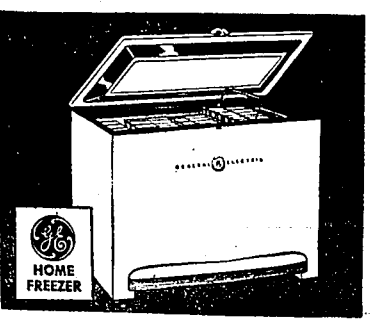
