Survey Lists Parking Plan Benefit Here

The time limits actually restrict parking periods to the specified limits and through the use of additional coins in the meter. The reason for that recommendation is:

"This custom defeats the purpose of the time limits and allows the user to park for an unlimited valuable space which could serve many others. For example, one vehicle parked from 1 to 5 p. m. is occupying space that could have served 12 vehicles each parked on the average of 20 minutes."

Besides showing that 66 per cent of those parking in the business district remained 40 minutes or less in the city, the survey also showed those remaining longer than one hour (20 per cent) were local residents rather than those from outside the city or state.

Supporting their recommendation for amending their ordinance, the consultants declare it is logical the periods should be kept short in the business district where they describe as the focal point of business activity which largely consists of short trips.

When persons with short time missions cannot readily park and return to their business or make their purchases, the engineers state they are likely to be attracted to parking areas where they do not have to pay for parking. This effort involved finding out what space is held to an absolute minimum.

The limits are usually established on a zone basis with a minimum limit at the center of activity, they explain, surrounded by zones which slightly longer parking time is authorized, with additional zones extending to the outer limits of the distance to the center of the district increases.

As Twin Falls grows, the consultants state, the time limits in the various zones will be gradually shortened and the amount of area covered by the zones will be increased. Any recommendations as to time limits should be regarded as tentative and they point out to be revised from time to time to meet changing conditions.

The engineers recommend the following time limits be adopted to compensate at least partially for the present parking situation. The following time limits are adopted to compensate at least partially for the present parking situation.

Commenting on the Saturday restriction, the consultants say that although this approach has not been employed in other cities, they believe it is a desirable feature in an agricultural area such as Twin Falls, that type of restriction should apply when the major part of the retail trade is transacted.

However, they point out the district covered by the time limits and the special Saturday regulations should then be extended over a broader area surrounding the business district.

Returning to their recommendations that an hour limit should be set on hours of parking and no more, the consultants suggest the ordinance be clarified to cover that number of months. The total included fines and costs paid for drunken driving, reckless driving, drunkenness and various traffic violations.

POCATELLO, Oct. 20 (AP)—A 17-year-old girl who absconded her way out of the Bannock county jail with a spoon in September has been sentenced to two years in a federal institution.

The girl is Helen Martin, who was arrested with her father in the automobile from Sheridan, Wyo., to Massacre rocks, near American Falls. The court recommended she be placed in a woman's reformatory.

Boise Man Is Handed Blame In Hunt Death

IDAHO CITY, Oct. 20 (AP)—Roland Hodges, 46, was blamed by a Boise county coroner's jury yesterday for the death of Ralph Smock, Boise deer hunter.

The jury said Smock "came to his death by a rifle firing a bullet which rifle was held in the hands of Hodges, and the death . . . was by criminal means."

Thomas Edla, Caldwell, who was camped near the scene of the shooting, miles from Idaho City, said he believed the shooting was "accidental."

Edla testified before the jury that Hodges ran to his tent and cried out that he had shot his hunting companion. Edla also corroborated Hodges' testimony that an unidentified army doctor had treated Smock and applied a bandage on his stomach.

Hodges said in the hearing that his thumb slipped off the hammer of a rifle Smock was teaching him how to load and that the weapon discharged.

Deputy Sheriff John Rymerson told the jury Smock was dead when he arrived at the scene of the accident. Hodges said Smock died about 30 minutes after he was shot.

Taylor May Become Key Senate Voter

By WILLIAM E. LOWELL
 WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—If the November election should result in a Senate equally divided between Democrats and Republicans, Sen. Glen Taylor of Idaho could hold a position of key importance.

Taylor, the Wallace party's candidate for vice president, has two more years to serve in the senate. And his vote conceivably could be very much in demand by both parties on some issues.

Though elected as a Democrat, he differed with Senator Barkley, D., the Democratic leader, on a number of 150 roll calls in the last congress.

Not Repudiated

Neither the Idaho Democratic organization nor the senate Democrats repudiated Taylor when he became the progressive party's vice presidential candidate. In the senate he still is treated as a Democrat and he never has been barred from Democratic caucuses, though there was some informal discussion of his status.

Just how much Taylor's vote would be in demand is unpredictable.

Straight party-line votes are relatively few in normal years but they are more numerous in case of a tie. Presently if half the senate were of the opposite political party from both the President and the majority party in the house.

May Swing Result

There is a number of nominations, for instance, and of votes. Taylor's vote might swing the result in some cases. In case of a tie, the vice president, as presiding officer of the senate, has the deciding vote.

One vote decided at least a dozen issues in the senate during the last two years while there was no vice president. In some matters of party policy, others were controversial from some standpoints. Examples are sugar farm regulations, phases of the long-range farm bill and the southern states educational pact.

Holds "Big" Vote

Within the Democratic party itself Taylor's vote might be decisive. For instance, a few years ago one vote elected Senator Barkley as first leader in his intra-party contest with the late Sen. Pat Harrison of Mississippi.

In any event, it's a fairly safe bet that Idaho's senior senator won't find himself altogether an outcast when he returns from the campaigns.

A telegram caught up with us out of Indianapolis saying the lost bags had been located, duplicate claim checks had been mailed and everything would be along—one of these days.

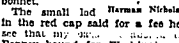

Excess Labor Supply Italy's Main Problem

By J. M. ROBERTS, JR.
AP Foreign Affairs Analyst
ROME—To balance her present economy, Italy needs to get rid of some 2,000,000 workers.

It is a problem which hangs over the desk of the Italian official. It is why they are so vitally interested in some compromise with their present allies and former enemies over return of some if not all of their African colonies.

This over-supply of labor does two things. Under the Italian system, industry, while still short of raw materials is required to over-hire in order to avoid unemployment, thereby increasing prices.

And the demand for goods by the unproductive worker with money has a similar effect.

Disemployed with America and the rest of Europe, prices in Italy seem fairly reasonable. Beef is \$1 a pound in Rome, lamb 50 cents, ham \$1.25, fish 30 cents, eggs 82 cents a dozen, butter \$1 a pound, potatoes 2 cents a pound, milk 17 cents a quart.

Men's shoes run from \$10 to \$12 a pair, women's \$8 to \$10. A woman's first quality silk dress costs about \$85, and a pretty good man's suit \$35.

Under long-standing price controls, an apartment for which a New Yorker would pay from \$10 to \$150 monthly goes to an Italian for from \$3 to \$12.

But the prices have to be considered in connection with the Italian's ability to pay. If he has \$50 a month he is doing very well. The median is around \$40, one fifth of what it is in America.

Italy either has to put her non-productive labor to productive work or get rid of it. To Italian officials, getting rid of it is the first answer.

Although they are also hoping to use part of it on public works projects. But the labor surplus, like labor surplus everywhere, comprises the least able workers.

Neighboring countries who need labor don't want that type. A deal with France is under way, but would be merely a help, not a solution.

But they sigh as they speak of it. Who in America will invest money in plants over here until there is peace in Europe? And where is peace?

SONORA, Calif., Oct. 20 (AP)—A superior court jury convicted Mrs. Alex Peters Hansen, 50, of first degree murder in the poison slaying last spring of Otto Hansen, her common-law husband.

The jury of six men and six women last night fixed the penalty at life imprisonment.

The state charged she gave Hansen strychnine in a medicine capsule. She denied administering the poison but admitted buying it for her husband, formerly of Klamath Falls. She said he ordered her to obtain it.

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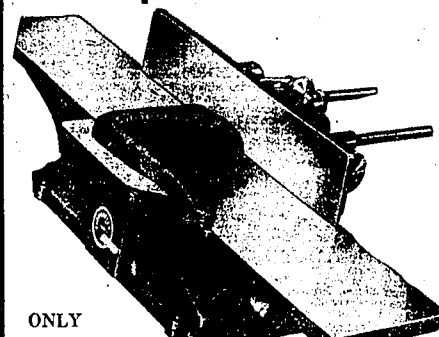



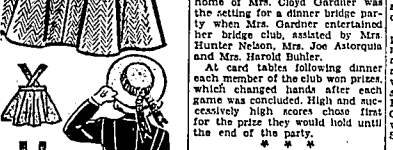

USAF Drafts Plan for War Use of Planes

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—The air force, which is short on cargo planes, has started to make plans that would give it virtual control of the civil airplane fleet in event of war. The planes eventually to be approved by the joint chiefs of staff, are being worked out by the military air transport service (MATS). Under air force direction, MATS operates both air force and navy transport units.

1,354 Planes Used

Both scheduled and non-scheduled air carriers are affected and are working with MATS on the mobilization scheme. The scheduled airlines now fly 1,064 planes and the non-scheduled outfits have perhaps 200. These figures compare with about 600 cargo planes in MATS service.

The war planning was revealed with the publication of a letter from Maj.-Gen. Laurence S. Kuter, MATS commander, to the Independent Air Carrier association, non-scheduled fliers' trade organization.

Included with the letter was a proposed contract which, if adopted, would go into effect on the outbreak of war. Similar contracts have been submitted to the scheduled airlines.

Kuter said the contract gives general terms and obligates the contractor to perform any services within his capabilities that are requested of him by this command.

Quick Changeover

"The flexibility provided by such a contract will enable immediate implementation of war plans in the event of an emergency," Kuter said. He said directives also would have to be issued to each carrier outlining its specific war job. He hoped that would be done "in the near future."

The Air Transport association, scheduled airlines organization, estimates that its members, in an emergency could mobilize to the country more than 10 times as much transport capacity as they offered when World War II started.

Refineries Catch Up, Bringing End To Gas Rationing

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 20 (AP)—Gasoline refining has progressed so satisfactorily despite the OIO oil workers' strike that all rationing to service stations in the west will end immediately, the industry announced late yesterday.

A. C. Stewart, chairman of the industry's allocation committee, also reported his committee next would recommend the manufacture of gasolines of higher octane ratings than at present, and the restriction of premium quality fuels.

Rationing to stations has been in effect in California, Oregon, Washington, Arizona, Nevada and the Idaho panhandle.

The strike against six major companies stemmed from a wage dispute. The union asked 31 cents an hour and later came down to 17 1/2 cents. The employers stuck with an offer of 15 1/2 cents. The basic wage is \$1.68.

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Key on Soviet Aims Believed Given in Book

A man who once "was the most devoted communist in the United States" has written a book about communism.

It may prolong your dreams, if it does not prevent you from sleeping peacefully. Nevertheless, it is an important book because of the man who wrote it, and because, in many respects, it is like a key to a secret door. It will help you to decide the strange, unpredictable, and often contradictory tactics of the communists.

The book is called "The Whole of Their Lives" (Charles Scribner's Sons). The author is Benjamin Gitlow.

Was Party Chief
Gitlow was the head of the American Communist party in 1929.

He made three trips to the Soviet union on official business of the party. He knew Josef Stalin personally. He was in the emerald room, for many years, he was a whole-souled believer in the movement and most important, because he had character and brains.

For the same reason, he says, he no longer is a communist.

Gitlow disagreed with and defied Stalin on the matter of principle (he is one of the few men who lived to write the story of it) and he says that caused him to break with the entire movement.

"Reliable Source"
Therefore he would appear to be what a newspaper reporter calls "a reliable source" on the question of communism. Let's see what he has to say about it.

Question 1—Do you doubt that American communists and their fellow travelers get direct orders from Moscow?

On page 204, describing the birth of the American Communist party in 1919, Gitlow says:

"Stalin took over the American Communist party lock, stock and barrel, in the middle of May, 1929, by a series of decrees promulgated by him and read by Molotov."

Moscow "branch office"
On page 54 Gitlow writes, "In 1919 the American Communist party became a branch office of Moscow."

Moscow made the decisions governing the actions of the American communists.

Question 2—Do you wonder sometimes, in the light of Soviet pronouncements, whether the American system and the Russian system can get along together?

Gitlow says, "From the days of Lenin to the supreme ruler, Stalin survival of Soviet power and communism is held impossible unless capitalism with its political and social structure is destroyed."

Explains Theory
"It explains why the theory of world revolution has never been abandoned and why the Soviet government at great expense and effort maintains and supports Communist parties in other countries."

You may have wondered too, why the communists are able to capture young people, boys and girls in their teens, and bend them to the will of the party. The stories that explain it are numerous in this book. They make shocking readings.

2,800 Firms Said Behind in Reports

BOISE, Oct. 20 (AP)—About 2,800 Idaho corporations have become delinquent by failure to file annual statements, Secretary of State J. D. (Cly) Price said Thursday.

The corporations have until Nov. 1 to pay a \$10 penalty or their incorporation papers will be forfeited, he said.

Notices were mailed to each of the 6,850 Idaho corporations between June 1 and 10 informing them of the annual statements, Price said. Many of the corporations failed to get the notices either because of changes of address or officers.

Price said 300 notices had been returned to his office for lack of a correct address.

124,000 in Idaho Hold 'City' Jobs

BOISE, Oct. 20 (AP)—There were 124,000 Idahoans employed in non-agricultural jobs in September.

The report shows that wholesale and retail trade and closely allied fields of service industries, finance, insurance and real estate were the state's largest employing groups. They account for 42 per cent of the state's non-farm employment.

State and local governments, including school districts, had an estimated employment of 10,000 in September.

Biggest increase in working force of manufacturing groups were reported in food processing and logging. The gain in food processing was up 46 per cent over August, while logging and lumbering employment was up 10 per cent.

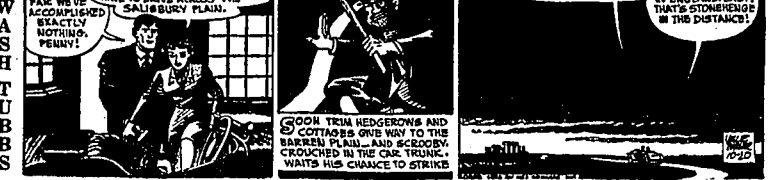

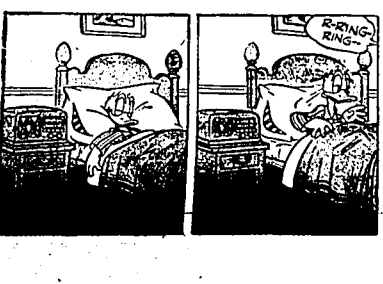

Scientist Says Lightning Can Be Eliminated

SCHEFFER, N. Y., Oct. 20—The possibility of preventing forest fires caused by lightning—by eliminating lightning itself—was suggested Tuesday by Rain-maker Vincent J. Schaefer.

Schaefer, weather scientist at General Electric's research laboratory here, sprang to fame two years ago when he made rain and snow by seeding clouds with dry ice from an airplane.

Use Dry Ice

His belief lightning can be eliminated by using dry ice to transmute towering cumulus clouds into snow. These highly-active cumulus clouds usually grow into lightning-producing thunderstorms.

Schaefer said that clouds given the dry ice treatment either would lose their moisture in the form of rain and snow or would become cirrus (fancy) clouds, which do not produce lightning. In either event, the conditions which produce lightning would no longer exist, he says.

Gave Idea to Service

Schaefer passed his suggestions along to the U. S. forest service in a report on his studies last summer of thunderstorm conditions at the Priest river forest experiment station in Idaho.

He undertook the studies when he learned that three "cumulus-cloud breeding places" existed near the station. Forest service figures show that lightning causes 75 per cent of the 1,400 forest fires annually in the Priest river region.

Would Depend on Region

Theoretically, Schaefer says, the dry ice method of preventing lightning would apply wherever lightning conditions exist. In many places, however, thunderstorms are not predictable and so the method might not prove feasible.

Schaefer made only a study of storm conditions. He did not conduct seeding experiments but recommended that the forest service undertake them in the Priest river region.

It was the 2,856th earth shock recorded here by the weather bureau since the destructive quake Oct. 18, 1935.

The quake caused a 35 per cent boom in air express.

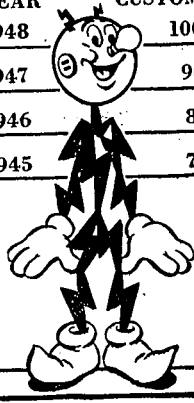

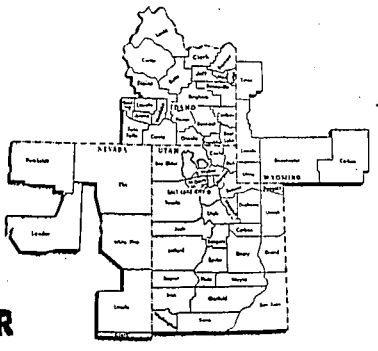

State Schools Forecast Rise In Enrollment

BOISE, Oct. 20 (AP)—Kenneth F. Dean, state director of the school reorganization committee, Tuesday predicted a 30 per cent increase in Idaho school enrollment by 1969.

"This means we'll need 1,200 more academic teachers, plus \$14,000,000 for additional school buildings, plus about \$6,000,000 interest, just to take care of our national increase," Dean said.

Dean said 60 per cent of the state already is reorganized under the school merger plan of 1947.

Twenty-one counties have completed their school reorganization programs and 11 others have partially finished, he said. Elections are pending in five more counties.

Dean said misinformation and misunderstanding were the major obstacles to the school reorganization program.

"Some people feel their schools will be closed," he said. "This is not true and all schools now operating can continue to operate."

Dean said that with one or more teachers have a pupil cost of \$142.50 and that schools with seven or more teachers have a per pupil cost of only \$111.75. He said increasing the size of school districts will result in increased educational opportunity and uniform tax levy.



Old Meany McLemore Shoves Boy Off "Center of Universe"

PEIPING, China—It was a mean thing to do, I know, but I pushed a little Chinese boy off the center of the universe today.

There was no other way to move him. He had a big bowl of rice in his hands and he looked as if he might stay there forever.

The center of the universe, according to Chinese legend, is on a particular stone, about the size of two home plates, in the middle of the top platform of the altar of heaven.

The altar of heaven is a beautiful marble structure a few miles from the center of Peiping, and doesn't look much worse for wear despite the fact that it is 400-going-on-600 years old. It was here that the emperors made obeisance to the only power they acknowledged—Heaven. It would be an un-sourly tourist, indeed, who didn't feel the urge to stand on the center stone and play emperor.

It was while fulfilling this urge that I encountered the Chinese tourist putting away his rice. He put up a howl when I shoved him off the center of the universe, but he soon got over it and was making his chopsticks fly a mile a minute when his parents returned.

The altar of heaven and the adjoining temple of heaven were at one time the two most sacred spots in China. The emperors must, he told me, be there for what is happening here today. Thousands of red-robed students from all parts of China have taken over the grounds and the buildings and have turned them into a sprawling camp.

The altar of heaven, and the red and blue tiled walls which surround it, are draped with drying clothes, quilts and blankets. But it is in the temple of heaven, considered by many to be the most beautiful building in China, that the students have wrought the mischief. Hundreds of students have sought down for the winter in the temple, and smoke from improvised stoves swirls about, all but obscuring the beauty of the coloring.

Students have spread their mattresses and bed clothing in the laps of weird images, and draped their feet over the shoulders of the gods. Students perch on the knees of grinning gods to study their lessons, and use centuries-old bronze lions, peacocks and tortoises for back rests.

The once lovely grounds have been trampled by the students in their games, and they race up and down the carved marble steps that once were reserved for the feet of the emperors alone. One of their favorite pastimes is whispering or humming against the round wall surrounding the temple of the God of the universe. Its structure is such that the faintest sound can be heard along the wall at any distance.

The wall really works, because I tested it on Jean. I had her go around the wall, out of sight, and I whispered as low as I could, "Why does a chicken cross the road?"

Clear and sharp came her answer: "To get on the other side."

We are leaving Peiping tomorrow, and heading for Shanghai.

We won't be able to visit the great wall. The communists are too close to it for comfort, and neither of us has a Russian visa.

State Harvest Moves Ahead With Rapidity

BOISE, Oct. 20 (AP)—Idaho's harvesting headed down the home stretch this week with only the late crops still in the fields.

The weekly cooperative crop summary said the last of the hay crop was being up and field seed threshing was nearing completion. Still in full swing are harvesting of late crop potatoes, sugar beets and fall sorgho.

Potato Yield Good

Good yields and quality of potatoes is being reported in nearly all districts.

In northern Idaho fall grain seeding was nearing completion with prospects for good stands and growth. Some late fields of spring grains remained unharvested, cutting being delayed by damp weather.

In southwestern Idaho range cattle continued to move from ranges with Canyon county feedlots jammed with a larger than normal number of cattle.

Best Harvest on

The south central Idaho sugar beet harvest is expected to be limited by Nov. 15, the report said. Feeder cattle were late in coming in and nearly all livestock, hogs and poultry were below average.

Range feed in eastern Idaho was dry because of early dry spells and frost.

The report was issued by the University of Idaho extension service, U. S. weather bureau and the bureau of agricultural economics.
