### General Says 'Recruit's Life' An Easy One

YORK, Pa., Oct. 23.—Gen. Jacob Deyers told the mothers of America last night that every youth drafted into the army will be treated as a human being, never as a raw recruit.

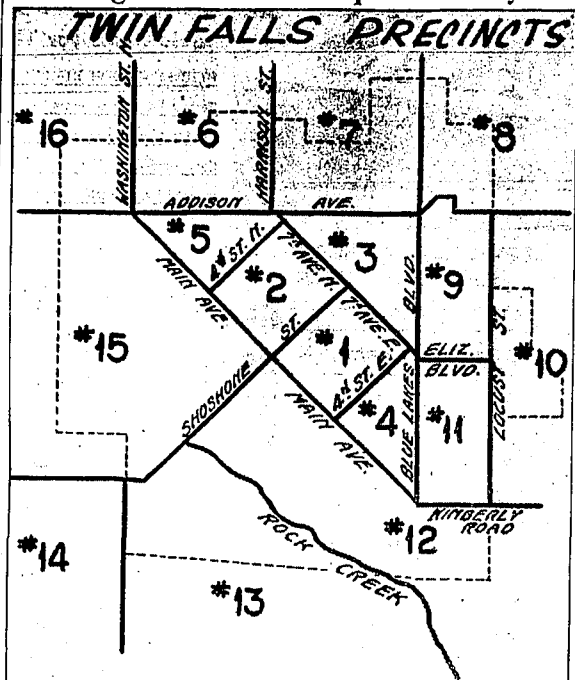
The general, chief of the army field force, painted this picture of what will happen to the nation's youth in the peacetime army in an address to a Pennsylvania convention of the American War Mothers.

1. He will be sent to a post "as near home as possible."
2. His instructors will try to establish a personal relationship with the incoming recruit.
3. He will be explained the reason for everything he does which is new to him.
4. No matter how or when he arrives, "someone will meet him" and he will be given "a chance to ask questions."
5. "His uniforms are individually fitted."
6. The army will insist "that he write home."
7. He will be interviewed.
8. He will be interviewed by his company commander and chaplain, each of whom will write personal letters to his mother.
9. The young man gets "an advance on his pay" immediately.
10. Neither he nor his instructors will use profanity.
11. Deyers, a native of York, told the mothers that the peacetime army is going to be "considerably different from the army you have heard described," and he added:
12. "As mothers of veterans, you have unquestionably overheard your sons exchanging recollections with other veterans. We had the toughest sergeant in the army, one will say. They will tell you how tough the sergeant was, but the sergeant who was a benign foster father to every new recruit to new second lieutenant."
13. But Gen. Deyers added, "make no mistake, the army was and is rugged, too, but not as rugged as represented. Our sergeants could stand an inch of rough, too, if need be, as German and Japanese survivors will attest."

"American sons," he said "are marching away again, not for the first time, but for the preservation of peace."

He told the mothers a recruit will be treated as a person of individual dignity and feelings, entitled to courtesy and consideration. "He will like it."

BOSTON, Oct. 23.—Better drugs to treat hay fever, hives and other allergies are promised by animal tests new chemicals, Dr. Earl R. Loew said today.

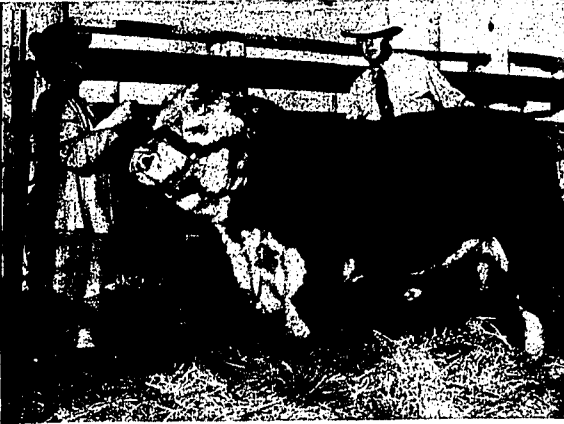

# 75 Farmers Seek Legislative Jobs On Idaho's Ballot

BOISE, Oct. 23 (AP)—Seventy-five of the 190 candidates for the 1949 Idaho legislature are farmers, according to an unofficial list compiled by Carl C. Kitchin, Boise local publisher.

Kitchin said the survey shows 9 of the candidates are businessmen, 12 are storekeepers, 10 are laborers, four are housewives, eight list miscellaneous occupations and 24 were not designated.

One candidate lists his profession as attorney-farmer. Included among the candidates are physician, two teachers, school district clerk and a mail clerk.

Twenty-four of the farmer candidates seek senate seats and 22 are candidates for the house. Forty-six of the farmers are Republicans.

There are 20 Democratic candidates listing farming and associated fields as occupations. Eleven are candidates for the senate and 18 for the house.

Of the businessmen seeking election to the state senate, eight are Republicans and 13 are Democrats. There are 22 Republicans, 12 Democratic aspirants for the house who are businessmen.

The Chinese communist radio immediately afterward announced capture of Chengshien. It said Gen. Liu Pao-cheng's communist troops were encircling the fleeing government garrison between the Yellow and the Yellow river, nine miles north.

On the home front, both President Chiang Kai-shek and Premier Wang Wen-hao came under critical fire in China's legislature.

The justice department said yesterday a federal grand jury in Washington is "looking into reports of payroll irregularities in Thomas' office. The case was presented to the jury by the justice department."

Clark Replied Earlier, the department received a petition from 17 lawyers in Thomas' home district, asking an investigation into charges made by Congressman Drew Pearson concerning the payroll.

Thomas, who is at his home in Allendale, N. J., released through his office here copies of an open letter to Clark. It said in part:

"It is singularly strange that out of 131 members of congress, you have selected the chairman of the committee on un-American activities as the target for this vicious smear tactic, less than 10 days before the election."

"No one in official Washington is more aware than I of the complete failure of you and your administration to prosecute the communists' fifth column in America. Why you have seen fit to coddle, rather than prosecute, the communist traitors and conspirators who threaten the very security of the United States, can best be answered by yourself."

Mrs. Edna Edwards, head of the Democratic national committee's women's division, said that Dewey's "innate decency" the President "didn't want to bring that up."

Mrs. Edwards told a news conference it had been "alleged" that Dewey was deferred from military service a lifetime.

A GOP spokesman said recently, however, that Dewey gave his occupation as a lawyer when he registered for the draft. He was 40 when the induction age was reduced to 35 the spokesman said.

### Army Reserves to Receive Pay for Drill Attendance

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (AP)—The army announced today that for the first time in history it is paying its organized reserves for drilling.

The drill pay started Oct. 1. But the army said it has only \$12,000,000 for training pay between now and June 30, and that probably won't be enough.

A system of priorities has been set up for making the payments. Except for some 3,000 men in class "A" units, the army said, the payments will be more "token."

First priority goes to organized reserves who are assigned to units which have active duty pay in the army's present 18 division force for "mobilization duty."

Inactive duty pay is on a quarterly basis at the rate of one day's regular army base pay plus longevity for each two-hour drill period.

### UEW Ordered To Eliminate Red Officials

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (AP)—The atomic energy commission today issued a virtual ultimatum to the United Electrical Workers union (UEW) to get rid of its communist officials or lose its bargaining rights in atomic plants operated by General Electric company.

Chairman David E. Lilienthal of the atomic energy commission wanted the union that the commission intended to act "promptly" if the union did not comply with provisions of the Taft-Hartley labor act and file non-communist affidavits.

Lilienthal's position was made clearer in a letter to Albert J. Fitzgerald, union president. Lilienthal said he had received no reply as yet to his letter of Oct. 6. Fitzgerald had said that union leaders must purge themselves of communist affiliations if the union is to be permitted to work in General Electric atomic plants.

At the time, Lilienthal asked for return mail of the union officers' intentions. Today, he said, the delay in answering would indicate the officers of the electrical union would not take up the commission's request.

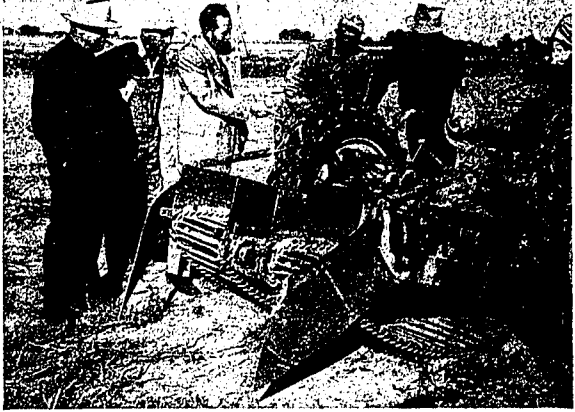

# U. S. Military Planes to Be Put on Market

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (AP)—U. S. military aircraft, including some of the latest and fastest postwar models, will be offered for sale to other American republics for purposes of hemispheric defense. The air force announced the offer Friday.

The planes are the F-80 Lockheed Shooting Star, F-84 Republic Thunderjet, F-82 North American "Twin Mustang" and the troop-carrying C-52 Fairchild packet.

**600-MPH Class**

Both the F-80 and F-84 are rated in the 600 MPH class. Officials emphasized that while these are the fastest U. S. planes in service, most better aircraft "are in the works." For example, they noted that the North American F-86 has a speed of more than 670 MPH fully loaded with ammunition and guns.

The release of the planes is by no means a "blanket offer," officials said.

**Approval in Doubt**

The air force announcement said purchases will not be approved if

they would "endanger the national security or interfere with air force procurement."

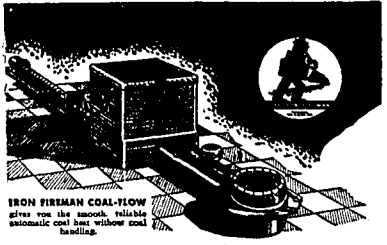
In addition, the purchasing countries must agree that the planes will be used for military purposes

BOISE, Oct. 23 (AP)—Two return contests for top congressional seats will highlight the Nov. 2 general election in Idaho.

Clashing for the second consecutive time for the first congressional district seat will be Rep. Abe McGregg of T. Ida. and Conington I. White, veteran Clark Fork mine operator who served six terms in the House of Representatives.

Two years ago Goff unseated White by a margin of 817 votes. Goff polled 37,238 votes to White's 36,421.

**Fought 10 Years Ago**  
Justice Bert H. Miller, Democratic candidate for U. S. senator, and incumbent Sen. Henry C. Dworshak, R., Ida., had their first election battle 10 years ago.

Dworshak beat Miller in 1938 to make the second congressional district seat for the first time. Dworshak polled 54,277 votes to 47,199 for Miller then.

Miller is seeking to unseat Dworshak from the senatorial seat he won two years ago in an election to fill the unexpired term of the late Sen. John Thomas.

**Nip-and-Tuck Battle**  
The Goff-White contest two years ago was a nip-and-tuck one. Despite his loss to the incumbent Republican, White carried 12 of the 16 counties in the first congressional district. It was Goff's overwhelming majority in Canyon, Payette and Latah counties that gave him the 817-vote margin.

Eight of the first district counties that gave White a majority also gave an edge to Dworshak, the Republican senatorial candidate, indicating considerable "scratching" of ballot.

**7,004 to 6,123 Lead**  
Two years ago Goff compiled a 7,004 to 6,123 vote lead in Canyon county the largest vote of any county in the district. Latah county, Goff's home ground, gave him a 3,664 to 2,126 margin and Payette county went for Goff by 2,218 to 1,264. Only other counties giving Goff a majority were Adams, Boise, Lemhi and Washington.

Except for Latah county, all of the extreme north Idaho counties went for White.

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### Alfalfa Seed Crop Smaller; Unit Reports

BOISE, Oct. 23 (AP)—The Idaho alfalfa seed crop will be smaller this year than it was last year, the bureau of agricultural economics forecast here today.

In fact, said the bureau, this year's crop will be the second smallest on record since 1910.

**AREAS, YIELD LESS**  
The bureau said that the alfalfa seed crop not only would be smaller in acreage this year, but that the yield per acre would be less than last year.

The bureau estimated the crop this year at 32,000 bushels, of which 24,000 bushels would be cleaned.

However, the bureau said, this might vary slightly, depending on whether all crops were threshed or not. It pointed out that in some instances in late September some fields were harvested but left unthreshed because of wet weather.

**FOLLOWS TREND**  
The bureau report indicated that Idaho was following the national trend as far as seed alfalfa is concerned. The report said that 20 of 22 states producing the seed will have smaller crops this year than they usually averaged in the past.

Utah, Wyoming and, possibly, Washington may have as large or larger crops this year than they had in 1947.

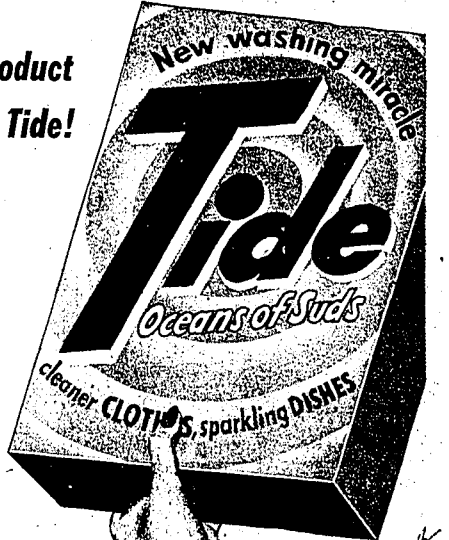
