

Nation's Food Bills Continue Their Decline

The Associated Press reports that the nation's food bill is heading lower this week.

Butter prices dropped substantially. In New York wholesale grade "A" declined to 61 1/2 cents a pound—the lowest since June 10, 1947, when it sold for 60 cents a pound. In Chicago "AA" and "A" were lower.

Butter in New York cut butter as much as four to five pounds during the week to amount 68 cents. Lower prices resulted from heavy offerings and increasing arrivals, with considerable quantities of butter going into storage because of slow demand.

Better Meat Buys

Some butchers said they would be able to give better buys in meat this week-end. Pork was lower in the New York wholesale market and there also were declines in lamb, veal and chicken. One large dealer said because of the depth of earlier price cuts in the week it would hold prices at the same levels as last week. But at least one independent butcher says that after pork roasts at 69 cents a pound compared with his usual 80 cent price for two cents.

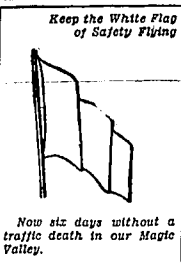
Early in the week four coffee firms marked wholesale prices up one to two cents.

Food Index Down

The Dun and Bradstreet wholesale food index this week declined to a new 1948 low of 66.47 after holding at 66.48 for two weeks. This compares with 65.67 for the week ending in Idaho represents the total cost of a pound at wholesale of 21 foods in general.

The Associated Press food index declined slightly to 145.61 from 145.63 last week, while the Bureau of Economic Warfare index moved up fractionally to 247.70 from 247.42. The base year equals 100.

Wholesale sales prices increased because of a one per cent increase in the cost of various commodities. Some price increases started a new upward trend.

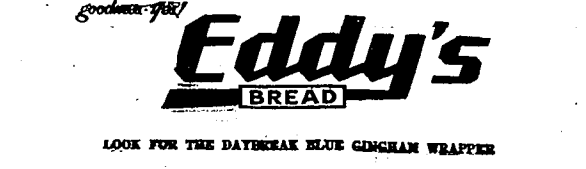

Some units were reported in action against Chinali, some 80 miles west of Yingkow across the gulf of Jiaohung.

BOISE, Oct. 29 (AP)—The attorney general's office has announced that no liquor will be sold in Idaho clubs election day until the polls close.

All state liquor stores and dispensaries also will be closed election day in accordance with the 1933 statute.

The attorney general's office said there is no restriction on the sale of beer election day as far as state law is concerned. It was explained that some city or county restrictions may be made for sale of beer on that day.

Election day is not a legal holiday in the Gem state, so banks and county and state offices will remain open.

DETROIT, Oct. 29 (AP)—The personal estate of the late Henry Ford, one of the world's richest men, was valued today at \$5,159,104.07, exclusive of stocks in the Ford Motor Company.

Mrs. Clara B. Ford, widow of the automobile magnate, is the executor in her husband's will. She was named as executrix in her husband's will.

In the last inventory, announced April 7, 1947, the Ford estate was valued at \$2,200,000, exclusive of A. and B. stocks in the Ford company and of real and personal property.

However, Ford's personal estate includes 386,000 shares of class A stock and 65,250 shares of class B stock.

No exact valuation has been set on the stock, but it has been paid at an arbitrarily fixed value of \$100 per share. If \$100 were the true value, the Ford estate would be worth \$43,361,040.

Must to Widow
Ford on his death April 7, 1947, willed most of his personal belongings to his widow. He left control of the vast Ford Motor Company to a family, headed by Henry Ford II, a grandson.

Payment of state and federal taxes and other obligations reduced the estate's value, exclusive of stocks, to the \$5,159,104.07 figure.

Burley Youth Welfare Head Gives Report

BURLEY, Oct. 29.—Rulon Budge, director of the youth welfare council, reported during the summer months under direction of the youth welfare council, has reported there were more than 40 participants in various activities sponsored by the council during the summer program for children of the community.

Activities included supervised handwork classes and playground games at the Overland school with an average daily attendance of 40 to 60 children taking a four-hour program. Mrs. Gene Draper and Ines Lovelace conducted outdoor games, art and handcraft classes during the season with a puppet show.

At the new city recreation park, Budge directed a basketball team with a five-year league for 116 boys 10 to 14 years old. The games ended the season with a four-team tournament from the Overland school being judged champions. A Mini-Basketball league was also organized for the older people of the community, and the swimming campaign attracted about 200 children and young people.

Budge recommended a winter program to include indoor activities in the present swimming pool, and outdoor winter sports program, with a handicraft class in the shop until Christmas.

Drive Urged
For the summer and winter program of 1949-50, he recommended the earlier start of the drive for financial support to make possible better advanced planning, and a drive for additional playmate equipment for parks and play centers. He asked full cooperation in the present swimming pool campaign.

The cost of the summer recreation program including materials and salaries of workers, totaled \$1,242.63. A life guard was employed at the Snake river beach in the city and Burley Rotary club sharing the expense.

Winter Program Aided
The council means of increasing recreational facilities for the winter, and a skating program and other winter sports are being along with other activities. The high school gymnasium was used every night last year for sports and games, Budge said.

The welfare functions of the council, such as helping under-privileged children and improving of public health, were discussed, but some of these activities have been curtailed because of lack of funds.

Following the close of the campaign, Pace and Miss Schoonover were the first swimming pool construction and management. The Burley Rotary club assisted with financing the swim week program.

Manager of Cottage Hospital Speaks to Burley Rotarians

BURLEY, Oct. 29.—A hospital is a very peculiar institution. Elmo Parfitt, manager of the Cottage hospital here, told members of the Burley Rotary club, adding that "everyone in the community is very much concerned over the lack of hospital facilities, when there is such a lack, yet when facilities are present no one wants to have anything to do with the hospital, unless the necessity is forced upon him." Parfitt addressed the Rotarians at a meeting in charge of Dr. Charles A. Terhune. He reviewed the history of the Cottage hospital, built here in 1934, when four patients were treated during the first month. During the next 10 years, a total of 6,890 patients were admitted to the hospital, and during the past three years and four months, there have been 8,414 patients. During the last two-year period, admissions have averaged 142 per month. These 12,214 patients do not include patients given treatment but not hospitalized, including minor accidents, cuts, X-rays and other minor treatments.

Twenty years ago people just didn't use the hospital in the way they are coming to use it today," Parfitt said. "It was the court of last resort, the final appeal. Babies were born at home, and practically any illness, which would require surgery, was found out by the physician, family, and neighbors right at home, much to the inconvenience and handicap of everyone concerned."

There is a constantly increasing percentage of the people, however, who are coming to see the community hospital in its proper perspective—a highly specialized business, with special equipment and staffed with specially trained personnel, he said. It contains highly specialized and expensive equipment which may not be used once a year, but when it is needed, it is like a parachute. "If you don't have it, when you need it—you don't need it."

"We're in the paradoxical position of being a cash business enterprise, engaged in a humanitarian endeavor, and the job of reconciling the two requirements keeps us all working nights," Parfitt concluded. Mrs. Hornbrook, superintendent of nurses, told of experiences while nursing in Boise during the polio epidemic, telling of various types and treatment. Guests at the meeting were John McLaughlin, superintendent of Teton national park; D. L. Evans and G. L. Jenkins, Malad, and Roman, trustee, museum supervisor at the high school.

Fillings on wells than there is water in the basin. It is added that the Mud lake area in particular was "at present supporting as many wells as it can support, and that the depletion of water in exhaustion of the water supply in the area.

W. H. Phipps, president of the association declared "people are going to be injured by this situation very seriously unless the laws governing the drilling of wells. They are withdrawing more water than there is return flow. This is a serious area, and depletion of the water underground resources is progressing rapidly."

The picture is complicated, committee members agreed, by the presence of beneficial use and return flow.

A great many "wells are dug without any sort of record being made by the department of geology. Phipps pointed out. "We have no way of telling how many wells there are or how much water is being withdrawn from the various basins."

Ground water brought out of the ground, it was pointed out, would here return to the river basins of the area. It is added that the water is effective in cutting down the natural surface flow of rivers.

W. H. Phipps, executive secretary of the reclamation association, pointed out, there is one rule governing the drilling of wells which must be kept in operation. If they aren't operated the land will be lost to agriculture.

"There must be some difference in any law written between the water which is being drawn are drawing water needlessly out of the underground reservoirs," Welsh said.

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Nobel Award Is Granted to DDT 'Finder'

STOCKHOLM, Oct. 29 (AP)—The discoverer of DDT won the 1948 Nobel prize for medicine last night. The Carolina Institute, the University of Medicine in Stockholm, elected Dr. Paul Mueller, Basel, Switzerland, as the winner of an award set aside for services to humanity. He will receive 150,000 crowns (about \$44,000).

"Inestimable Value"

One of the members of the award described Dr. Mueller's discovery of the insecticide DDT as of "inestimable value for the benefit of humanity" thus repeating the principles in the will of the late Alfred Nobel, which provided for the Nobel prizes.

Millions of allied soldiers were helped in the last war by the insect-killing dichloro-diphenyl-trichloroethane. It was used by British and American armies to prevent the spread of insect-borne disease.

Discovered by Experiments

Dr. Mueller, 48, made the discovery during a series of experiments in the Basel laboratories of the Geigy drug industry.

Actually, after Mueller had completed his experiments in 1942, it was found that a German student had synthesized DDT in 1874, but did not put it to any practical use. It remained for Dr. Mueller to discover the insect-killing qualities of the compound. Thus, he is sometimes referred to as the "rediscoverer" of DDT.
