## Intensive Manhunt Starts for Slavers in Area Near Triennial

JEROME, Nov. 2.—A nation-wide alarm has been sounded by Jerome county police for two Mexicans wanted for the first degree murder of Salvador Ornelas, a transient beet worker, whose body was found at 10:15 a.m. Monday.

Ornelas' badly battered body was found under a pile of cardboard and junk two miles east of here on U. S. Highway 93.

Magic Valley news was blackened early last night and all available police officers in the area were pressed into the manhunt for Benjamin P. Medina, 21, and George Kalderson, 22, who are believed to have committed the crime. The men are reported to be armed and dangerous.

Roads were blocked in the area throughout the night, and two places were added to the hunt at dawn. The blockade was lifted at 10 a.m. Tuesday.

Sheriff Galen Hall said Tuesday morning he doubts if the two wanted men are still in the area. "If they are, they are hidden pretty well," Hall explained.

Medina was described as weighing 160 pounds, five feet eight inches tall, straight black hair, "V" scar on his forehead and a half-moon scar on his left cheek.

Kalderson was described by officials as being blind, about the right eye, five feet seven inches tall, and weighing 150 pounds. He has black curly hair.

Both men were beaten almost beyond recognition with a piece of pipe which was found near the body, officials said.

Police had been searching for the body since 10 p.m. Saturday night. The two men were last seen walking 1941 sedan in a borrow pit one-quarter mile west of here. Sheriff Hall, State Patrolman J. W. Blum and Jerome Chief of Police Fred Abrams suspected foul play and immediately began the search.

The officers searched for the automobile owner until 3:30 a.m. Sunday. The search continued Sunday but was not successful until Monday morning. The officers said the car was a 1941 sedan, light blue, with a black 1941 Chevrolet coupe with a badly dented left rear fender. The car was found near the body.

Sheriff Hall said he did not know if the car was stolen. He knew the two wanted men did not own an automobile.

## Parking Plan Is 'Criticized' By Merchants

The parallel parking plan for Twin Falls, as recommended by Traffic Hall, State Patrolman J. W. Blum and Jerome Chief of Police Fred Abrams, was criticized Tuesday morning by merchants. The plan was to parallel park on the main street in the downtown area.

The opposition centered the problem of Twin Falls was not one of traffic, but one of parking. Their argument was based upon the contention that parallel parking would not only decrease the number of parking places in the business section, but also increase the number of vehicles in the downtown area and traffic in the suburban sections of the city.

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## Weather Is Encouraging Possible Record Turnout in Presidential Balloting

Good voting weather encouraged a possible record turnout of Americans today to ballot for a President, 32 governors and a new congress. Heavy forenoon voting was reported from many industrial cities. And good weather helps bring out a big farm vote.

For the country as a whole, it was fair with mild temperatures. There was some rain in the central valleys, the northern Rockies and the state of Washington.

A vote going over 50,000,000 in this 41st presidential election would be a record. The biggest vote in the past was 49,820,312 in 1940. It fell nearly 2,000,000 under that four years ago when many Americans were overseas at war.

The usual race among small precincts to be the first to report their vote was won this time by Harris Location, N. H.

Both Find Cheer  
Backers of Democratic President Harry S. Truman and Republican Candidate Thomas E. Dewey both found something to cheer about in the first trickling returns.

Harris' Location sent 11 for Dewey and one for Truman. Franklin D. Roosevelt carried the precinct 6-4 over Dewey in 1944.

China Cabinet Summoned for Crisis Debate

SHANGHAI, Nov. 3 (AP)—The Chinese cabinet will be called into an emergency session tomorrow to meet a political crisis caused by communist forces in the north.

Some observers said the government of Chiang Kai-shek might collapse as a result of military defeats and a disastrous economic situation.

The cabinet ministers to submit their resignations.

## State Voters Making Early Rush to Polls

BOISE, Nov. 2 (AP)—Idaho voters today began the process electing county and national officers, and registrars reported an early rush to the polls.

The voters were greeted by clear skies, the first in four days, in southern and southwestern Idaho; in the east of the state it was overcast, but the rain had stopped, and in the some light rain in some areas.

The weather bureau predicted there might be some light rain or snow over the rest of the state by late afternoon.

By noon four hours after the polls opened, the largest rush had already cast their ballots. But registrars and election officers said they expected a steady flow of voters.

The polls were scheduled to close at 7 p.m.

Liquor Stores Closed  
All bars serving liquor were closed until after the voting is over, and the state's liquor stores were closed for the day.

Tallies of the returns won't be made until after the polls close in most areas of the state, although the law allows judges to start counting the votes after 8 p.m. have been cast in a precinct. The vote must be kept secret, however, until after the polls close.

Pay Is Slighted  
Most election observers said the outcome should be known about 11 p.m. or midnight, although final tallies would not be completed until tomorrow, or perhaps the next day.

This election sees two races which are a repeat performance of the past.

In the senatorial campaign, Sen. Harry B. Hatcher is running against Bert H. Miller, who is Democratic candidate for the Republican senate job. Hatcher defeated Miller in 1944.

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## Washington Waits for Voters' Decision on 16 Years of Democrat Rule

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP)—This election, if it comes, will bring any onslaught against basic new deal laws in fact he has promised to call a special session of Congress to deal with the whole new deal.

What is the story of the new deal? It was born here in Washington in the dramatic 100 days after FDR took office March 4, 1933. The nation's economy was in desperate straits. Banks were failing. Farmers were being foreclosed. Bread lines were commonplace in the cities.

The cry over the land then was Action, action, action!

Immediately upon taking the oath as president, Roosevelt ordered a three-day bank holiday to give time enough to slow down the runs and failures. He then called congress

into emergency session. It convened March 9, 1933—not knowing what it was going to do.

But the White House "brain trust" headed by Prof. Raymond Moley, was at work around the President.

Emergency measures went to capitol hill in rapid order.

The cry against a "rubber stamp" congress went up early in some quarters, but the lawmakers acted swiftly, with hardly a resistance, and sometimes with but little debate.

Vast powers were put into Roosevelt's hands quickly, many liberal laws emerged.

There was bitterness in some quarters, inspired by the fact that laws were taken to the courts.

could be relieved through the use of off-street parking. The city has more than adequate facilities for off-street parking at the present. All it needs is development, the merchants said.

Blake cited a report made by the Chamber of Commerce of Boise City, Ia., which has had the traffic problem in more than 100 cities. The conclusions reached by this survey were in agreement with the recommendations made by merchants, Blake said.

Using a chart of the city as an illustration, Blake showed merchants the location of 15 off-street parking areas adjacent to the business district. He recommended regulation of these areas for maximum efficiency in handling vehicles.

A. S. Hansen made a motion that the subject be thrown open for discussion, so some of the arguments against the plan could be heard. He said he had seen a count of vehicles on the streets of the city and he did not concur with the figures presented in the traffic consultant's report.

He pointed out that Twin Falls has a final decision on the plan months out of the year and during that time customers are looking for a place to park. He said that if the city could not handle the traffic during the Christmas season, he would not want to park in off-street areas.

A motion was made and carried that at the next meeting of the city council a decision on the plan would be made by merchants and recommendations would be given to the city council.

Before the discussion on parallel parking began, the merchants' bureau voted not to extend their hours during the Christmas season, but to retain the schedule of hours now in effect.

Elvis Cain acted as director of the meeting. He said the city council has been patient on the question of parking and that in the final analysis the whole thing is a matter of education.

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## Chairman for Parking Lots Tells of Task

Additional information regarding the means of acquiring and operating off-street parking lots has been outlined by H. P. Blake, chairman of the city off-street parking commission.

He said the commission is following recommendations made by the Associated Consultants in general. However, he pointed out that if the project is delayed until the city is permitted to obtain off-street parking lots, such lots would be available until after parallel parking has been started.

Suggested by Mayor H. O. Lauterbach suggested to the commission that private enterprise could do the job faster than the city could carry out the same job. For this reason, Blake said, several businessmen, including himself, have started operating off-street parking areas. He pointed out that Associated Consultants had specified that off-street parking areas should be in operation before parallel parking is adopted here.

Regarding the Merchants' bureau proposal for formation of a non-profit corporation to finance the off-street parking project, Blake said the money raised would be used to make payments on property and liquidate the debt at the end of the year. After the corporation acquired property, control would be transferred to the city by the end of the year and maintain lots through the use of parking meters.

Several Lots Open  
Within the past several weeks, several commercial parking lots have been established to supplement the city at a service station, which Blake and his brother, Seth Blake, have a franchise. He noted that the lot located across the alley from the Idaho Department store, Hudson's shoe store, Trolinger's pharmacy and Alexander's men store is being operated under an arrangement whereby customers of the stores get free parking.

The Blakes made a survey of off-street parking here about 18 months ago, later acquiring a three-year lease on vacant lots across the alley from the Orpheum theater. Information compiled by Blake and his brother is expected to be an asset to the off-street parking commission.

## Kline, Iowa Corn, Hog King, Sets Farm Bureau New Look

WASHINGTON (NEA)—There is a decided new look about Washington headquarters of American Farm Bureau Federation, probably the most powerful of the farm groups in the capital. The man responsible for the new look is Allen B. Kline, an Iowa corn-hog man. Since this year he has succeeded big Ed O'Neil, the Alabama cotton planter who was A. F. B. president.

Kline's drawing, easy-going ways have been banished. A new staff of younger, bristling, midwesterners has been moved in under Roger Fleming. The office themselves have been moved from a crowded suite in a downtown building to a half a floor in the Standard Oil building in the Capitol Hill. There are thick carpets on the floor, pastel tinted walls, modern desks. The Farm Bureau is now definitely big business.

AFB was founded in 1920. It grew up with the county agent system. When Ed O'Neil took over his presidency it had less than 300,000 members and it was broke. Today it has over 1,200,000 members and over \$100,000 in the bank. The name of new Pres. Allen B. Kline is apt to be heard a good deal more around Washington in the planning of future farm policies. He is 33, of medium height but stocky with big hands and a weather-beaten face. He has a degree from Iowa State college. He has been to Europe four times in the last four years to study European food problems. His 540-acre farm produces \$400,000 worth of hogs and hybrid corn, has a swimming pool and tennis court.

He can talk farm economics like a college professor and by the hour. He does it without flourish or notes or manuscript, citing statistics all the while, which may account in part for the fact that he is also a member of the Chicago federal reserve bank board. His specialty is monetary policy.

In talking about today's prices, Kline distinguishes between farm prices and food prices. He says most people believe that food prices in grocery stores. They forget that in the grocery store price are also transportation, processing, handling and storage costs—all of which are piled on top of the farm price.

Farm prices, Kline points out, are flexible. They go up and down on the market. But other elements in food prices are what he calls "stuck." They go up, then stick there. Labor and freight costs, for instance.

Until the sticky costs of machinery and land and fertilizer and other things that the farmer buys come down, Kline says, there is little chance that farm prices can come

## Poland's U. N. Envoy Assails Dulles' Views

PARIS, Nov. 2 (AP)—John Foster Dulles, who may be the next U. S. secretary of state, was assailed by a Polish spokesman on the United Nations today of using the same argument against communism as that used by Adolf Hitler and his propaganda minister, Joseph Goebbels.

Julius Katz-Suchy, Poland, attacked Dulles during U. N. political committee debates on Greece. Dulles discussed the Greek problem last week in his first full dress speech here.

### "Easy to Blame"

Katz-Suchy said Dulles "would find it easy to blame world communism" for the Greek muddle, and added:

"We have heard those arguments before, from Hitler and Goebbels. We heard attacks on the communists in 1932 and 1933. We heard them again later in guns and bombs. What is the aim of Dulles in bringing up these arguments now?"

In an obvious reference of the American election, he described Dulles as "a man of known political aspirations."

### All-Day Session Set

Members of the committee scheduled an all-day session in hopes of winding up general debate and paving the way for concrete action.

The United Nations also scheduled a full-day general assembly session for tomorrow to consider dual action on the atomic energy salarate. A majority of delegates were reported ready to approve the American plan for world control of atomic energy.

The first big post-election test of American foreign policy will come Thursday when the security council meets again on the Palestine issue.

### 10 Years Given in Manslaughter Suit

BOISE, Nov. 2 (AP)—District Judge Charles P. Koelsch yesterday sentenced Arthur Ayres, 21, to not more than 10 years in prison on a charge of involuntary manslaughter.

The maximum sentence resulted from a traffic crash here last May when five members of the Edward Janis family of Star were killed. Arthur Trautman, an occupant of the same car in which Ayres was riding, was also killed.

Ayres was found guilty of the charge last Friday by a jury.

Ayres testified during his trial he was not driving the car that collided with the Janis auto.

Judge Koelsch instructed the jury to find Ayres guilty if as an occupant of the car, he allowed Trautman to drive in a negligent manner.

Cafeman Tells Of 'Powder' to Boost Flavors

NEW YORK, Nov. 2 (AP)—A simple white powder that tastes like the inside of your mouth one minute and a juicy red beetadeak for the next is working magic today for the American cook.

"It just makes things taste more so," explains Victor Bergeron, the "Trade Vic" of an Oakland, Calif., restaurant.

Bergeron claims the powder will make a one-pan broth taste like there had been at least six chickens in the pot. Or a weak pan gravy turn out, instead of the meat it's supposed to accompany.

Good Things Better

But the powder's usefulness isn't confined to making something of nothing. By accentuating whatever flavor it lights on, Bergeron says, it makes almost any good thing taste better.

The Chinese discovered it centuries ago, Bergeron says, and it's apparently the main reason Chinese mixed vegetables taste like individual celery and carrots and peas instead of like vegetable soup.

The American product is known technically as a sodium glutamate or vegetable protein. It's made from what's left of the sugar beets after the sugar is taken out, according to Bergeron.

Offers Proof

To prove its power, Bergeron suggests you take a tall glass of water and add one drop of creme de marmite. That's just like water, he says. But add a pinch of powder and, according to Bergeron, you can taste the liquor—not full strength to be sure, but enough to know it's there.

Bergeron recommends the powder particularly to pep up lackadaisical gravies and sauces and generally make existing flavors stand out in a dish. It is listed as an ingredient in almost all his own mixed-ingredient Chinese dishes.

3 of Every 4 Drafttees Are Getting Rejected

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP)—Almost three out of every four of the 24 and 25-year-olds called up for pre-induction physical examinations are unfit for military service, according to a survey of the nation's 10 largest cities.

Selective service officials reported that the rejection rate varies from 75 per cent in New York City to 37 per cent in Los Angeles. The average is 72 per cent, as compared with 35.8 per cent during World War I.

Heart ailments and psychoneurotic disorders are the principal causes of rejection.

Selective service officials said that because veterans are exempted from the new draft, most of those being examined now were 4-Ps during the war or held essential jobs.

Selective Service Director Lewis B. Hershey said the rejection rate among the 24 and 25-year-olds is just about what he expected, perhaps a shade better.

If the rate of 72 per cent continues, however, the army will not be able to fill its three-month quota of 60,000 men from the ranks of the 24 and 25-year-olds as it had planned. It has asked for 10,000 this month, 15,000 in December, and 20,000 in January.
