Most of T-H Act Backers Retain Posts

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 (AP) — A majority of Taft-Hartley law supporters to Congress survived organized labor's drive to defeat members who voted for the act over President Truman's veto.

This cast doubt on Mr. Truman's chances of delivering his campaign pledge to seek repeal of the law.

The new house will have at least 221 members who voted for the labor law over Mr. Truman's veto and the new senate will have 55.

Of those house members, 140 are Republicans and 81 are Democrats principally from southern states. In the senate, the Taft-Hartley majority includes 41 Republicans and 14 Democrats.

In comparison with the last congress, the new one will have 98 fewer representatives and 19 fewer senators who backed the law. The unions counted 79 of the house members and 10 of the senators as direct victims of their drive against Taft-Hartley supporters.

Labor also claimed victories in other contests.

Union-endorsed candidates for governor won in eight states. Proposed legislation to ban the closed shop was defeated in Massachusetts and appeared doomed in New Mexico. However, the unions failed to block approval of a similar regulatory measure in Arizona.

Labor is estimated to have spent upwards of \$5,000,000 to finance its widespread activities in this campaign.

Some AFL and CIO political leaders hoped to consolidate their gains by winning a united labor coalition within the Democratic party for 1952 and after. In some parts of Pennsylvania, Michigan, Indiana and other states, Democratic party officials are labor union leaders in control of party machinery.



Nation's Drys Join GOPs in Vote-Chargin

By United Press
The election was almost as disastrous for the nation's drys as it was for the Republicans.
The returns showed today that the wet vote in the dry states where proposals concerning drink were submitted to the voters.
Proposals for banning World War II veterans got a mixed reception. Five states endorsed them, two voted "no." In three other states where returns are incomplete, bonus payments were winning in two and losing in one.

Kansas Voters Repeat
In Kansas, the voters repeated a 38-year-old prohibition amendment and gave the legislature authority to set up a state-controlled liquor sale system.
Other wet vs. dry results:
Washington—Incomplete returns showed approval of licensed sale of drink in hotels and restaurants, and defeat for a proposal to abolish wine and beer taverns.
Colorado—A proposal to extend local option to all political subdivisions of the state was defeated.
California—Two proposals to give local authorities control of liquor sales were defeated.
Oregon—Dry forces once more defeated proposed licensing of the sale of drinks in hotels, restaurants and clubs.

In Indiana, South Dakota, Iowa, Washington and Louisiana, voters approved schemes for veterans' bonus payments ranging in state totals from \$30,000,000 to \$145,000,000.

Win in Minnesota, Oregon
Incomplete returns showed similar proposals winning in Minnesota and Oregon. But in Missouri, bonus supporters were taking a licking at the half-way mark.

In California, an "anti-fetter-bedding" proposal to repeal the state's "full crew" law governing the number of drunken men on main line trains brought out a heavy vote. With two-thirds of the county in, the vote was 51,821 for and 51,024 against.

Altogether, voters in more than half the states cast ballots on nearly 200 special issues, mostly proposed state constitutional amendments.
