### 4 New Faces Predicted for 1949 Cabinet

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (AP)—President Truman may begin his first elected term in the White House with four new faces in his cabinet advisers, associates and aides.

Source close to the White House said that among the members of the new cabinet probably will be Secretary of State George C. Marshall, James Forrestal, Secretary of Interior J. A. Krug and Secretary of Commerce Charles Sawyer.

Reason for their expected replacement range from personal desire to presidential displeasure with those who had paid attention to his campaign.

No Final Decision  
Mr. Truman is said to have made no final decisions as yet on whom he will put in their places. But his opportunity will not come before inauguration day, Jan. 20. It is traditional for cabinet members to submit their resignations prior to that date to give the President a freer hand in making his plans.

Certain to remain aboard the White House ship, intimates say, are Secretary of Labor Maurice J. Tobin and Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan. Both campaigned mightily in Mr. Truman's behalf.

Gives up Chance  
In addition, Tobin passed up a good chance to become governor of Massachusetts when he agreed to take over the labor post during the darkest days of the political campaign. His sacrifice is not expected to go unrewarded.

Secretary of Treasury John W. Snyder, an old friend of the President, is expected to stay on, for awhile at least. He and his family contributed \$5,000 to the election campaign.

Donaldson May Stay  
Postmaster General Jesse M. Donlon looks good to remain in his position, too. A career man in the department, his appointment was seen as an indication that Mr. Truman meant to take postoffice activities out of the "political plum" division. There is no evidence that he has since changed his mind about it.

The question mark, according to administration insiders, is Attorney General Tom Clark. He had a thriving law practice in Texas before entering the government, and has been known to express a desire to return to it. However, Clark has stated proceedings lately and may want to remain on the job to see them through, it is said.

### Way Found to Use Waste of Potato Starch

BOISE, Nov. 5 (AP)—A method has been discovered to turn waste from potatoes into animal feed. It was announced here today by E. D. Felkey, potato expert for the University of Idaho.

Felkey said that pulp and waste water from potatoes which are processed into starch could be turned into feed for animals under a process developed by the scientist of the U. S. department of agriculture.

Under the new process, he said, waste would be cut by about a third and pollution of streams by an equal amount.

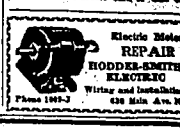

Power, Water Advocates Get Boost in Vote

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (AP)—The Democratic victory will catapult scores of long-time advocates of public power and irrigation developments into key congressional jobs.

It is no surprise the Democrats in position where they can reverse the last GOP congress' action in firing Reclamation Commissioner Michael Straus and one of his top aides. Their ouster will become effective next February unless the new congress saves them.

The dismissals were recommended by Rep. Forest Harnes, R., Ind., one of the GOP election casualties. Harnes also was one of the leading opponents of Secretary of Interior J. A. Krug.

Jensen loses Post While Rep. Ben Jensen, R., Ia., was re-elected to congress, the Democratic House majority committee Jensen will lose his chairmanship of the interior appropriations subcommittee.

Second-ranking members of the appropriations committee and subcommittee is Rep. Michael Kirtland, D., Ohio, a new dealer in his views on public power and irrigation.

In the senate, Sen. Joseph C. O'Mahoney, D., Wyo., is in line to become chairman of the interior and public affairs committee, pending before that committee now the controversial bill to remove the federal limitation on the amount of water the reclamation bureau can furnish a single landowner.

In the house, the Democratic sweep recent congress reorganized the special committee chairman from California, Republican Rep. Richard W. Dyer, who had been chairman of the interior department against attacks from members of his own party during the last congress. He will be succeeded by Rep. Andrew B. Stewart, D., N. Y., as chairman of the public lands committee.

Second-ranking members of the appropriations committee and subcommittee is Sen. Carl Albert, D., Ariz., a champion of reclamation.

The author of a bill to route all sales of public power through the army engineers—stripping the army of its power sales function—was defeated in the house by Rep. George Dondero, D., Mich., chairman of the house public works committee.

Mrs. Amber, a divorcee, told investigators Powell promised to make good the checks if she would stay here and marry him.

"I'm ashamed of you," she said and told him, "You've lied to me and you're a scoundrel. You're reaching the end of your rope and you might as well face the music. I'm going home."

"Well, if you insist on going," she quoted Powell, here's four dollars you can have and marry him. I'm going."

Seconds later she shot himself. Detectives said that Mrs. Amber had known Powell for about four months. Powell was arrested on the complaint of a local hotel which questioned a \$25 check he had submitted.

For several seasons Powell, 30, was the "Pek's bad boy" of the American league where he was involved in several brushes with other players on the field and frequently did not follow training rules.

He started his career by jumping from the sandlots to the Washington Senators in 1920.

In 1924 he was traded to the Yankees. He reached the peak of his career in the 1929 world series against the New York Giants when he was the leading hitter. He had a series batting average that year of .421 with 19 hits, four of them off Carl Hubbel in one game, and scored eight runs as the Yankees beat the Giants in six games.

After that, however, he became a bench-ster, used mainly as a pinch-hitter and for defensive stunts when he was of his great speed. After a brief time with the Senators and Philadelphia, he dropped out of the majors.

ABERDEEN, Nov. 5 (AP)—Who, oh who will be state representative from Bingham county?

That is a question that has been buzzing around ever since Tuesday's election when 29 Aberdeen citizens voted to sample ballots and plain ordinary paper after the supply of official ballots ran out.

It all happened like this. Aberdeen precinct No. 1 was given 330 ballots and Aberdeen precinct No. 2 was supplied with 400 ballots by County Clerk W. J. "Borrowed" Ballots

Robert Hamman, publisher of the Aberdeen Times, and 90 per cent of the votes cast in the Aberdeen precincts were Republican. He said if the same ratio held in the 29 doubtful ballots and if they were ruled out it would change the result for state representative.

Just where does the controversy stand right now? No where, it has officially questioned the vote.

### Other Nations See No Upset Of U. S. Aims

When the result of the U. S. presidential election reached United Nations circles in Paris, A. A. Arundson, a Russian delegate who also is a member of the Soviet foreign affairs department, told American newsmen the outcome "really makes little difference abroad because of your bi-partisan foreign policy."

That seems to be a shrewd appraisal of the position from the standpoint of international affairs. It is recognition of the vital fact that the rival political parties stand together when faced with a foreign crisis. Apropos of this we see Governor Dewey telling President Truman in a message of congratulations:

**Urges Unity**

"I urge all Americans to unite behind you in support of every effort to keep our nation strong and free and establish peace in the world."

It is well that this sentiment be emphasized abroad lest there be misunderstanding among those who are on the other side of the Atlantic, any seeming weakness in America's armor. It is well, too, that it be recognized that the United States is the political life-and-death struggle with communism which we know as the "cold war."

**Lean to America**

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### 'Battle' Nearly Breaks Out in Secession Act

GRACE, Ida., Nov. 5 (AP)—The county secession successfully voted here in Tuesday's general election barely masked civil war near this southeastern Idaho community. The click of new locks placed on highway equipment shows in the disputed territory nearby became the "shot heard throughout the Rocky mountains."

Grace and Bannock communities, some 30 miles from their ex-panhandle county seat of Bannock, voted to secede from Bannock county and trust their futures to Caribou county, adjoining Bannock on the east.

Belonged to Bannock And as final but unofficial returns were tabulated, Caribou County Attorney Roy Dyer ordered workmen dispatched to place new locks on highway equipment ahead. True, the sheds in the disputed territory had belonged to Bannock county—but now they were in Caribou county and the residents and officials wanted to make certain the equipment they had assigned to them as Bannock county residents would still be theirs in Caribou county.

Bannock Sheriff Alma Marley was dispatched by "ried up" Bannock commissioners to investigate and "return the equipment now confiscated."

Retains Emly-handed But he came back empty-handed, considering himself lucky to return in the Bannock county-owned car he drove into the disputed territory.

Marley said he was met by a "mob—three cars full."

"I was conciliatory," he told questioners when asked if he had resigned the two highway patrol graders, two pickup trucks and other equipment, assertedly confiscated. "I told them there was no need for shooting things out and turning the area into the Fort Sumner of the Gem state civil war."

### T. S. Eliot Is Given Drama Nobel Award

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 5 (AP)—T. S. Eliot, American-born British poet and dramatist, won the 1948 Nobel prize for literature. A Briton won the physics prize while the award for chemistry went to a Swedish scientist.

Patrick M. S. Blackett, British nuclear physicist from Manchester university, won the physics award for his development of the Wilson method of studying the courses of radioactive particles and his discoveries in cosmic radiation.

Prof. Arne Tiselius, Swedish biochemist, won the chemistry prize for his development of two methods for biochemical study of proteins, enzymes and other substances.

A week ago Dr. Paul Mueller of

Basel, Switzerland, was adjudged the winner of the prize in medicine for his development of insect-killing-DDT.

The prizes are worth the equivalent of \$44,000 each.

The Nobel peace prize winner, still to be selected, will be chosen by a committee appointed by the Norwegian parliament.

Eliot, whose work strongly influenced the literature of the past two decades, was chosen by the Swedish academy of literature; Tiselius and Blackett by the Swedish academy of science. The

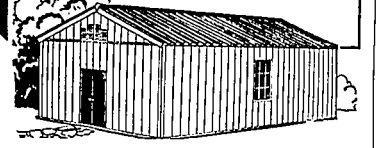

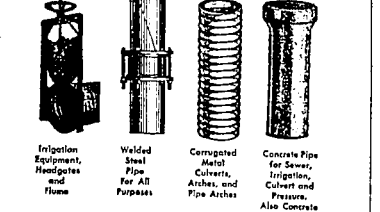
