CHICAGO, Nov. 29 (AP)—The elements hit the nation in various forms yesterday. Floods and high winds struck the south. Rain and snow plagued many areas.

Rain-swollen rivers left their banks in three southern states—Georgia, Alabama and Tennessee. Hundreds of persons were forced to flee their homes. Property and crop damage was estimated in hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Three died in Georgia and another person was missing. Two were killed on a slippery highway in Pennsylvania.

Southern floodwaters eroded in northern sections of Georgia. Alabama highway recorders at New Jersey, New York and western Pennsylvania were expected to turn to snow flurries tonight.

Rain-swollen rivers left their banks in three southern states—Georgia, Alabama and Tennessee. Hundreds of persons were forced to flee their homes. Property and crop damage was estimated in hundreds of thousands of dollars.

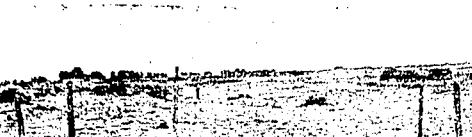

Aid Progress Hampered by French View

Reports from Europe and Washington indicate the serious position of the French government is one of the great obstacles in mobilizing the Ruhr for support of the Marshall plan.

Secretary Marshall obviously was speaking in France as well as America Wednesday when he gave repeated assurances that revival of German industry would be permitted to produce a rebirth of militarism.

The Anglo-American decision to take France into the joint coal and steel control boards immediately, rather than waiting for incorporation of the French zone into Belgium, also is an obvious step to the French political situation.

Phobia Persists
No French statement could stand if it ignored the country's fear of German militarism. Foreign Minister Schuman has proved a reasonable man, recognizing that it is perfectly possible to revive German industry and at the same time control it to prevent its being set up against a phobia in his country.

Just what form the new tri-power control administration will take is not yet clear. Presumably something new will have to be worked out when the French move in. At present, the U. S.-U. K. coal control at Ezean consists of dual organizations, from counterpart chairman on down through all the lower echelons of administration including publicity men and stenographers.

Decisions Come Hard
Decisions are reached through negotiation and compromise. High class men have made it work, but it would seem that only a miracle could produce efficiency when such an organization becomes three-way.

But it's a very delicate business. It must be carried out without upsetting the French aspect domestically. Without encouraging the forces which are tending to squabble over the French control parties. Already there is a tendency to a division between socialists of the right and left, which could lead to an out and out contest between communists and De Gaulle's without the modifying presence of a third force.

In such a contest, at the moment, the communists might have the upper hand.

"Tremendous Trifle" Ends By New Pact

NEW YORK, Nov. 29 (AP)—American and British engineers finally came to agreement on a standard screw thread.
"That may not sound exciting, but it's important," said one of the engineers.
In past years, the thread on an American screw had an angle of 60 degrees and had flat crests and roots. The British thread had a 55-degree angle and rounded crests and roots.
As a result, they were not interchangeable. A British screw wouldn't work in American equipment, such as a washing machine or automobile and an American screw wouldn't work in British or Canadian equipment. The battle to standardize the thread has been going on since 1918.
Final approval of the new plan was given at today's opening session of the annual meeting of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.
During the war the difference in American and British screw threads cost American industry millions of dollars and months of time. It was described as a "tremendous trifle." The new standardization, submitted to the society for its final

Then, Ed Crono, Boise, flew another ski-equipped plane to the meadows from Cascade and was unable to take off Saturday night and yesterday.

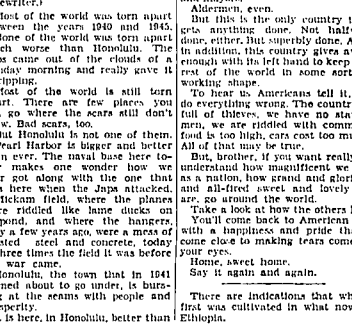

It was announced the annual convention of the association will be held at Burley June 10 and 11.

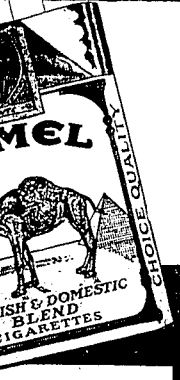
Henry Just 'Bnsts Out' With Praise of U.S. and Its Glory

HONOLULU, Hawaii—To those who want to fully appreciate America, I have this suggestion:
Travel around the world, with New York as a starting point and Honolulu as the first landing point on American soil.
Do this and you'll realize what a blessed thing that green postage stamp issued by the state department in Washington is.
That sentence above may not be much in the way of grammar, but it comes from the heart, not the typewriter.
Most of the world was torn apart between the years 1940 and 1945. None of the world was torn apart much worse than Honolulu. The Japs came out of the clouds of a Sunday morning and really gave it a whipping.
Most of the world is still torn apart. There are few places you can go where the scars still don't show. Bad scars, too.
But Honolulu is not one of them. Pearl Harbor is bigger and better than ever. The naval base here today makes one wonder how he ever got along with the one that was here when the Japs attacked. Mckinn Field, where the planes were stored, is like huge ducks on a pond, and where the hangars, only a few years ago, were a mass of twisted steel and concrete, today is three times the field it was before the war came.
Honolulu, the town that in 1941 seemed about to go under, is bursting at the seams with people and prosperity.
Is it here, in Honolulu, better than

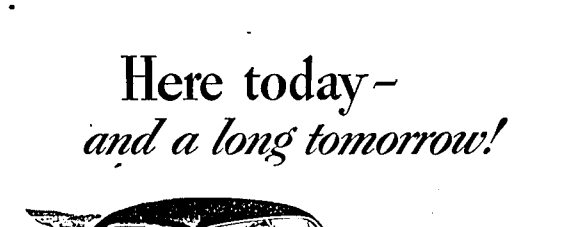


anywhere else, that one is able to see what American strength, American pride, and American guts can do.
