Kales E. Lowe, 38, Burley city attorney, was endorsed for district judge and District Judge Hugh A. Baker, Rupert, was endorsed for supreme court justice Wednesday night at a meeting of the 11th and 4th Judicial Districts Bar association, it was announced Thursday by Edward Babcock, secretary.

Babcock said the substance of the bar association resolution is that although Judge Baker has not sought appointment to the state supreme court, the association nevertheless went on record endorsing him most highly for the position.

West Allies Sever Formal Link To Rule in Berlin

BERLIN, Dec. 2 (UP)—The United States, Britain and France withdrew their liaison officers from Berlin's communist-held city today, thus severing the last formal link between the east and west German governments in this divided city.

The big three western powers acted as the two-day-old Soviet sector government held its first meeting in the city hall and claimed jurisdiction over all Berlin.

Across town in western Berlin, the legally-elected city assembly held a meeting of its own.

The United States, Britain and France, with Russia, have maintained liaison officers in the city hall in the Soviet sector of Berlin since the allied occupation began more than three years ago.

Today the officers of the three western powers went to the city hall for the last time, cleaned out their desks and left for good.

The first meeting of the communist city council was called to consider measures "to safeguard the food supply of all Berlin." The Soviet council is headed by Friedrich Bode, former head of the German Democratic Republic, the first president of the Weimar republic.

Police Gird
As the puppet government met, German police in the western sector prepared to turn back expected new invasions by communist agitators.

Security surrounded the communist rump session. Only reporters for the official newspaper of the Soviet administration and the Soviet-sponsored news agency were admitted. The British sector was open to the public.

Ten communists were arrested last night when they tried to break up a Socialist party rally in the western sector. Police dispersed the rest of the group with nightsticks. Those arrested were released.

Other Bands Expected
It was expected that other bands of communists would be treated by police as "organized interference groups" would invade the western sector. Police dispersed the bands by using tear gas and nightsticks.

Police also were expected to be alerted to fan out on possible western sector trouble spots on election day by the children. Many children were seen peering wide-eyed at the colorful toys and decorations in stores.

Higher Telephone Bills Forecast for Citizens of Nation
WASHINGTON, Dec. 2 (AP)—Higher telephone bills are in the works for millions of Americans, many of whom already have had their rates increased.

The American Telephone and Telegraph company says its Bell System is investigating the death of long distance service which would include any additional aid — will not meet for another month.

Frost Tells Court He 'Always Carried Gun'

GODDING, Dec. 2—Fount O. Frost, 72-year-old Bliss man accused of the first degree murder of Junior Carl Broadhead, told the court here today that he always carried a gun.

Frost took the stand to testify in his own behalf on events leading to the shooting of Mr. Broadhead in Hagerman last July 24.

Several times during the testimony Frost stood up in the witness stand and waved his arms and used other motions in relating the fight with Broadhead.

He had trouble at times remembering details of the incidents leading to the shooting.

Frost told of his physical handicaps and recent illnesses that forced him to stop working. He said "I've been no account for nothing."

Always Had Gun
He told the court his gun presented as state's evidence looked like the one he carried but he could not swear it was the same gun. He explained that he always had a gun as far back as he could remember.

Frost told the court that he carried guns in the "old days" as protection on the range.

Frost said he left his gun at Grady's place at about noon the day of the shooting and that he could not remember when he picked the gun up. He admitted being in the "old days" as protection on the range.

Frost told of the first fight between him and Broadhead in 1947. He said "This young feller grabbed me by the neck, almost choked me. He said 'Look here, brother, you damn good!'"

He then said the young man hit him and broke his nose. Frost said he was afraid and ran away. He said "I reached for a bottle but someone said, 'I'll take care of that' and took the bottle away from me."

Frost said he doesn't know who took the bottle away from him, but that man said he would get the other man. He said "I took my towels to clean blood from his face."

Remembered Bartender
Frost said he remembered Billy Doyler, bartender and the only man he remembers by name in the establishment. He said "I don't know if that fellow? I'm not sure."

Frost told the court he then left the bar and went to his home for a man to take him home. He said "I'm not sure."

This station was requested by two national committees which act in an advisory capacity to the research division of the department of agriculture. Magic Valley is the only major agricultural area in this state which is not served by such a station, Smith said.

Gillette Urges Extreme Care On Icy Roads

"Take your time in winter time. Please drive carefully."

This plea for cautious driving came Thursday from Police Chief Howard W. Gillette in the wake of a snowstorm which left icy roads. "We're receiving many calls for accident investigation," the chief said. His statement continues:

"Our job is to prevent accidents as well as investigate them—and we'd rather do the preventing. We don't like accidents any more than the people who are involved in them. That's why I'm pleading for all drivers to be extra careful."

Chief Gillette said numerous cars were reported skidding around because of snow and ice. A majority of these drivers had been going a little slower and had been properly equipped for snowy weather—especially if they'd taken a few minutes to put on their tire chains or make their clear windshield. Many of these accidents and traffic tie-ups could have been prevented.

In offering a solution to reduce the driving hazards caused by the chief listed vital precautions that should be adopted by drivers. They are: Reduce speed when streets are slippery, use tire chains when driving on snow and ice, defrosters in working condition to provide the best visibility and see the headlights are functioning.

He further pointed out that inadequate traction is a major cause of accidents in this kind of weather. "All of us as drivers should know what little traction we can get on snow or ice. The most reliable advice for preventing accidents when road surfaces are very slippery is to apply your brakes gently when you come to a stop," he declared.

Girl From India Not "Disappointed," But She Had Different Ideas of U. S.

Joyce Middlecoat is not really disappointed in the United States, she says, but it is not what she expected after seeing American movies and reading American magazines at her home in India.

"I came to the U. S. a month ago from her home in India, and she is living in Twin Falls with her sister, Mrs. Helen Hawley, who has the same name as she.

Joyce's life would sound like something from a fairy story. She was born in India and lived with her family all of her life until she came to Twin Falls, two of which she attended the funeral of Mohandas K. Gandhi and dancing with Lord Mountbatten.

Joyce went to Lady Irwin college at Delhi for three years and while there in India and lived in a college to attend the Asian Relations conference.

"It was a quiet man—loved by all the people," she said.

After his assassination Joyce was followed to the funeral at 8 p. m. for the funeral procession.

"The roads were packed and people sat in trees and on telegraph poles waiting for the procession," she said. "The armored division was mounted cavalry and the military force dropped flower petals before the procession. Gandhi's ashes were kept on the pyre for a day and then sent to different parts of India. He was here 13 days of state mourning."

Lord Mountbatten also attended a convocation at the college. His youngest daughter, Pamela, was one of Joyce's friends and she went to a birthday party at the Mountbattens home and danced with India's hero.

"He is a good dancer," she said, "and he has a very charming personality."

According to Joyce, Indian women are much more modern than they used to be. They are beginning to assert themselves, she said, and some are even bold enough to smoke.

"There is intermarriage between the castes now, but the women are still not so free to present their husbands with a dowry. Although girls may voice an opinion as to whom they marry, their husbands are chosen by their parents."

The poorer class of Indians was at one time completely uneducated, but now even the smaller villages have schools of some kind, Joyce said.

Joyce flew from Calcutta to Manila where she waited a week for a boat, but was unable to leave by boat because of a dock strike.

She flew to Seattle by way of Shanghai, Tokyo, Sneyne and Anchorage. In Seattle he was scared because the people rushed around.

"The first thing she did was to rush to buy an American frock. 'It was a luxury to get one ready made,' she said. In India she wore saris a lot because they could be worn on any occasion without having to wonder 'Will this be suitable?'

Joyce says that her main trouble here is understanding what people say and making them understand her. She is working with her brother-in-law at the Spudnut shop.

Her father, two sisters and three brothers are still living in India, and with the exception of her brothers, the rest of the family plans to come to Twin Falls as soon as possible.

Permits Now Required for Tree Cutting

BURLEY, Dec. 2—Permits are required for cutting Christmas trees from Burley national forest this year to avoid cutting trees from areas where small trees should not be removed, Forest Supervisor A. E. Briggs announced here Thursday.

Briggs pointed out that there is a location in the Minidoka forest, because of extensive cutting of Christmas trees in past years, he said no applications for Christmas trees will be approved for commercial sale unless the applicant is willing to go into nearby inaccessible locations.

Even in the more isolated areas of the Minidoka forest, the supply of trees suitable for use on Christmas is limited. He pointed out that Christmas trees can be cut out in dense stands of young trees in need of thinning. No permits can be issued to cut Christmas trees on or in the vicinity of public campgrounds or other recreation areas or within

in 800 feet of any road, the supervisor explained.

Because young trees which should not be cut need protection, the cutting and removal of such trees without a permit will be considered as trespass and guilty persons will be handled accordingly, he said.

Most of the demand for Christmas trees will be handled by trees brought here from other areas where the supply is much greater, Briggs said.

Persons desiring to cut Christmas trees for church, school or other organizational or public use are requested to contact one of the following district forest rangers: M. R. Stock, Allentown; C. E. Jensen, Oakley; or L. K. Clark, Twin Falls.

Any call that will produce good garden crops will grow good trees.

Robins Elects Salary Study Unit for State

BOISE, Dec. 2 (AP)—A special committee named by Gov. C. A. Robins has approved the general principle of salary increases to state officials and recommended a job analysis of all state positions. The committee also approved as a general policy a variable scale for elective state officials' salaries. The group recommended that more responsible elective state officials receive larger salaries than other elected officials. All elected officials, except the governor, now receive the same salaries.

The group also recommended an increase of per diem pay to state officials while traveling. The state officials now receive a maximum of \$5 a day while outside their residence city.

The job analysis was suggested by the committee to get a uniform salary scale for similar jobs within different departments. It was pointed out that a clerk for one department may get \$175 a month while a similar position in another department calls for a salary of \$250 a month.

The committee spent most of the day making tentative recommendations on new salaries of top elective and appointive officials. The group will meet again early in January while the legislature is in session.

Deadline Set To Apply for Potato Loans

BOISE, Dec. 2 (AP)—Applications for commodity loans on potatoes must be made not later than Dec. 6. Larry C. Brandt, member of the Idaho Production and Marketing administration committee, reported.

Brandt advised producers that the application for potato loans must be made at county agricultural conservation association offices.

To place potatoes under loan, growers must have planned within the farm acreage pool established for their farm for 1948 and secured a certificate of eligibility earlier this fall, Brandt said.

He explained that farmers who place potatoes under loan can get immediate financing, and will be eligible to sell their crop to commodity credit between now and April 30, 1949. Loans will be made at 4 1/2 per hundred pounds, for U. S. No. 1's and 45 cents for No. 1B's and No. 2's. They will mature on demand but not later than April 30, 1949, and will bear interest at three per cent.

The support price which is guaranteed if potatoes are sold to CCC ranges from \$25 per 100 pounds in December to \$21 1/2 in March for U. S. No. 1's stacked, washed and loaded on cars.

Minidoka County Plans for March Of Dimes Events

RUPERT, Dec. 2—Minidoka county's march of dimes campaign this year will be held from Jan. 14 to 31, with the President's ball scheduled for Saturday, Jan. 23, according to Bill Ritchey, county chairman.

Half of the funds raised in the drive will remain in the county and the rest sent to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis for treatment and research.

Ritchey pointed out that Idaho led the nation last year in per capita contributions for the march of dimes drive, with Minidoka one of the highest counties in the state. Hoover Panel Begins Probe On Vet Plans

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2 (AP)—The Hoover commission, spurred by President Truman's support for one of its chief governmental reorganization projects, had turned today to discussion of foreign and veterans' affairs.

If time permits, the 12-man commission headed by former President Herbert Hoover may get around to public welfare, revolving funds, or fiscal, budgeting and accounting activities of the executive branch of government.

Consolidation "Sold" Behind it and marked "sold" to Mr. Truman was a recommendation that would consolidate some of the government's 60 administrative agencies into one office.

Such a move would lift a great burden from the President's shoulders, since these agencies now report directly to him. Announcing White House approval after a lengthy conference, Mr. Hoover said: "I propose to group a number of agencies that serve other (executive) departments into one agency. The President agreed that this should be done."

The former President said this plan would affect such functions as procurement, coordination of statistics, information, publications, and public buildings. But it would not include the President's own executive office, "because you should interfere in the President's job of picking his own staff."

24 Major Changes The commission must report on at least 24 major changes in the executive set-up to congress by Jan. 13 and Mr. Hoover said it will have its preliminary report ready at that time. But with 14 months of work already behind it, the commission will ask for another 30 days to prepare its detailed report and recommendations, he added.

Mr. Hoover said he believed that if the commission's recommendations were followed, the government might save \$3,000,000,000 a year. He set as a major objective the compressing of some 70 government agencies into 10 departments of cabinet rank and six administrative agencies on a level with the veterans' administration.

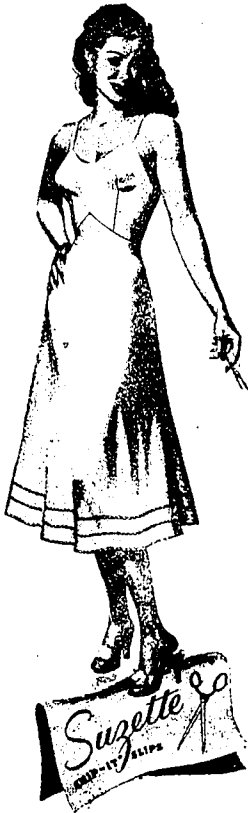

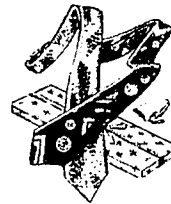
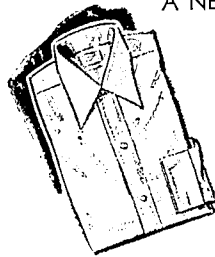
