## Honor Medal Was Won by 3 Idaho Men

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—Three times the congressional medal of honor—the nation's highest military award—has gone to Idaho soldiers. A 400-page volume, giving the history of the medal and the records of the 3,715 army recipients since creation of the decoration in 1933, has just been published.

Idahoans listed in the medal list of navy and marine corps winners of the decoration has been compiled.

One of four in War I  
Nineteen war I four men who received the medal in the first World War before regulations governing its award were clarified in 1919.

The award is made for an act of personal bravery or self-sacrifice beyond the call of duty in actual combat. It must involve risk of life and be witnessed by two persons.

With the award goes a \$2 monthly pay increase and a pension of \$120 a year after the recipient reaches age 65.

Another medal winner is Pvt. Louis Carter, 34, of the 1st Marine Division, who was listed for Washington state because he enlisted at Tacoma.

# Animal Feeds Are Topic for Farms' Clinic

SEATTLE, Dec. 3 (AP)—The Pacific northwest farmer will get a clear picture next week of just what can be done to produce animal feed from various materials available in his own area.

That topic will be one of many to be considered by 25 outstanding scientists at an agricultural clinic here next Tuesday and Wednesday.

Dr. H. K. Benson, University of Washington, chairman of the clinic, described the Pacific northwest as "unique" in its ability to produce animal feeds.

**New Methods**

The conference, he said, will discuss these methods of turning out feeds:

New methods of dehydrating the rich alfalfa and grass crops of the northwest.

Use of fruit and canning wastes, fodder yeast and other products rich in protein and vitamin content.

The possibility of using a huge alcohol plant at Springfield, Ore., to extract wood sugar molasses from waste wood and feeding the molasses to livestock. Such wood sugar molasses used here now as dairy feed has to be shipped from a laboratory at Madison, Wis.

**Beet Uses Important**

Dr. Benson said the Pacific northwest beet sugar industry also is an important factor in the production of animal feeds.

The processing of surplus and waste crops into industrial commodities, as well as animal feeds, also will come in for discussion at one session.

Farmers of other northwest states will hear from Halphus Idaho Power company, about the successful starch industry in Idaho.

The use of excess wheat in the state will be discussed by C. E. Rist, head of the starch and dextrose division of the Northern Regional Research Laboratory, Peoria, Ill.

**Potato Uses Explained**

The same session will hear from Dr. R. K. Baker, Eastern Research Laboratory, Philadelphia, Penn., how potatoes can now be reduced to a more stable form so that they will last longer while awaiting use as stock feed.

The clinic will be sponsored by the University of Washington. The school's department of extension services is accepting registrations for the sessions.

# Practical Nurses Urged to Qualify For State Permit

Practical nurses in Magic Valley who have not obtained licenses are urged to take necessary courses at the University of Idaho. The state board of nursing, according to Mrs. A. W. Bachmann, Boise, president of the Idaho Practical Nurses association, who addressed the group Thursday, said the law now provides for enforcement. To correct this oversight, the association plans to take the next session of the state legislature to pass a law providing penalties for violation of the licensing regulations.

Mrs. Bachmann said the present law provided that practical nurses were to obtain licenses prior to Feb. 1, 1948. Because the law lacked provision for enforcement, she said many practical nurses had failed to comply with the regulation. The proposed law would provide for a fine of \$50 for practical nurses not licensed prior to April 1, 1949.

Included under the licensing regulation are all persons doing nursing work, including assistants to doctors and dentists and all others practicing nursing technique. Mrs. Bachmann said.

She was accompanied here by Mrs. Beata Davis, member of the advisory board for the Idaho Practical Nurses association.

How does an American feel when he gets back to America after being away nearly six months? This column is going to be an effort to give you an answer to that question.

The first thing I wanted was milk. That will come as a great surprise to many of my friends who know that I do not normally spend my time hunkering around Borden's siniglab, but it is true.

Next I wanted ice.

Then I wanted lettuce, and all of lettuce's green growing cousins that are made into salads.

All the first things I wanted, you will notice, are things that Americans take for granted. I would like to tell you that we Americans are living in a country which is the only place where the almost things are available to every citizen no matter his station in life.

You may or may not know this, but the United States is the only country in the world where a man can drink water as freely as that flows out of a tap or flows into a tub or comes out of a spout.

Once you leave the United States water becomes a precious article, not because it is scarce, but because this blessed country is the only one that has seen to it that any water available is fit for drinking. It sounds like a little thing, I know, but it is not to always read, "this water unfit for dental purposes." This water must be used only for washing, etc., is a strange and bewildering thing.

We are by far the youngest of the great nations. China had and still talks of a civilization that dates back by centuries. The same is true of Europe, the near, the middle and far east—in fact, all over the world. I walked down the streets of San Francisco today and saw de-

partment stores filled with warm and well-made clothes, grocery and delicatessen stores loaded with all the food anyone would ever want, the streets filled with automobiles. I wondered why this could be seen only in America.

The rest of the world had a head start on us. Not a little head start, mind you, but a great big one that can only be measured in years and years. Could it be that Americans are the elect people of the earth? No, I don't feel that any more than I do, so, as I walked about this, perhaps the loveliest city in America, I tried, with my trip around the world as a background, to determine why the United States is so different from the rest of the world.

Eventually I reached a conclusion. I am not at all sure that it is right, but it is the best I could do. This is why I think the rest of the world looks towards us for the future.

"This is the only country in the world where people really work. This is the only country in the world where there are so much things as sixties, four-hour lunch periods, and where it is a standard practice for a man to go to work at 9 and work until 5 with only an hour off for lunch. Ours is the only country, as far as I can see, where bare existence but accepted no enough.

"The old world laughs at the United States with its skyscrapers, telephones, automobiles—many anything you want. It is a nation where the world looks towards us for the future.

# China Battles Climax Near, Analyst Says

We seem to have reached the climax of one of the great dramas of our time—the life-or-death stand by Chiang Kai-shek before the gates of his capital in the path of the attacking bolshevik armies.

The generalissimo's forces are heavily outnumbered—something like two to one—by the Chinese communists, who are receiving serial aid from Russia. Authoritative Chinese quarters say the rebel ranks are swollen by Japanese prisoners of war and Mongolians provided by Moscow.

**Capital City Tense**

The capital city of Nanking, on the banks of the mighty Yangtze, lies tense. Despite official denials that government headquarters are in the move further south, preparations to meet such an emergency are going forward. However, nationalists, forces and the rebel army to meet the expected red onslaught from the north.

Nanking authorities have been speaking of the recent fierce fighting in this theater as decisive. One use that term guardedly for it, however, is a certainty, but the battle could be decisive.

**New Epoch Begins**

If so, it might mark the beginning of a new epoch in China's history. It could spell the end of the present nationalist regime and the inauguration of a red government in Nanking. Certainly it doesn't call for any stretch of imagination to foresee control of all northern China by the communists, with the nationalists hanging on in the south by their teeth.

Should such a division of the country come about, we might well see the communists receive their demand for coalition government—nationalists and communists. That is common communist practice in countries which they are in process of trying to sovietize. The condition is the entering wedge which eventually gives reds complete control. We've seen that happen in numerous European countries.

## Dunking Best Fire Cure on Holiday Tree

By HARMAN W. NICHOLS  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—If you want to keep from burning the house down Christmas, give your balcony a dose from the tap in the kitchen sink.

That's the official from the United States forest service.

The forest products laboratory at Madison, Wis., did a lot of research on the subject and concluded that good old plain water does more to keep a Christmas tree from getting dry and therefore flame-happy than a lot of things on the market.

Here's what you do:

First buy a tree that has been chopped down recently.



Cut Off End

Then cut off the end of the trunk diagonally at least an inch above the original cut end. Stand the tree in water at once and make the water level above the cut part as long as the tree is in the house. Or, as long as the tree is in the house, sand and pour water over the sand.

Not only will the chances of a fire starting be lessened, but the tree will stay fresh and green a lot longer and the needles won't fall and mess up the place.

Fire-Retardant Coatings

A lot of folks like to pretty up a tree with fire-retardant coatings. They cost a little money and are a lot of trouble, but the service has a home formula. One plan produces a transparent, colorless coating. The second, with about the same ingredients gives a tree that crumpled look, which you can tint with suitable dyes.

For this you use sodium silicate, some china clay and water. Two coats are recommended and can be applied either by dipping or spraying.

But even with this coating, the forest service recommends that you still sink the bottom of the tree in a tub of water—just to be sure.


