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Farm Agency Opposes Hike In Rail Rates

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (AP)—The agriculture department stepped in today to oppose a requested eight per cent emergency freight rate increase for railroads.

The department filed a motion asking the interstate commerce commission to deny the increase. The action came as railroad representatives completed their testimony at a hearing on their plea for rate boosts.

The ICC next will hear shippers' opposing the plan. Final arguments are set for next Wednesday.

Ask Emergency Rate

The railroads have asked the emergency rate to expire at the termination of their request for a permanent 12 per cent boost in freight charges.

The agriculture department said in its motion that "no national emergency in transportation exists requiring further immediate general increases in freight rates."

The motion said that under present conditions, even if railway employees should be given 10 cents an hour pay increase, the carriers will average a return in 1949 of four per cent on the value of their properties after all payment of taxes.

Level Increases

The department contends the average level of railroads' freight rates has increased more than 44 per cent since June 29, 1946. In the case of farm products it said the increases have ranged from 32 per cent to more than 60 per cent.

The effect of such increases, the department said, will be to decrease the income and purchasing power of farmers and force a reduction of increasing amounts of traffic from the railroads to other means of transportation.

Magic Valley Students Write Script for Idaho State Play

IDAHO STATE COLLEGE, Pocatello, Dec. 4—Two students from Magic Valley, Mary Day, Twin Falls, and Earl Pond, Ellet, are writing the script for the Idaho State college all-student variety show, "Great Day of 1949."

Also working on the script are John Squires and Elwin C. Reynolds, both Pocatello, Reynolds will direct the production.

Mrs. Day, who is also on the publicity committee for the variety show, is editor of the Wickup, the college yearbook; president of the ISG Press club and a staff member of the Brunel, weekly newspaper. Pond is president of the "11" club.

Guiding for "Great Day of 1949" will be completed before Christmas and the script will be done by Jan. 1. The variety show will be presented late in April for the third consecutive year.

The play is one of the most ambitious and elaborate student projects on the campus. It involves months of preparation on the part of the production staff and many weeks of rehearsing for the large cast. Students do practically all the work with only advice from faculty members.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Dec. 4 (AP)—Hotel guests don't mind tipping but they hate the coin-operated radio sets found in most of their rooms, a hotelman who made a year's survey reported today.

And the customers would like to have old-fashioned spittoons put back in the hotels.

These and other likes and dislikes of the hotel-patroning public were revealed in a 12-month survey by Oklahoma City hotelman Dan James. The report was presented at a meeting today of the Arkansas-Missouri-Kansas-Oklahoma Hotel association.

James said he found that: The average hotel guest spends two months out of every 12 in a room with a bath, entitling him, he believes, to a certain amount of courtesy.

Courtesy Desired More than 14 per cent of the 1,300 guests answering the questionnaire listed good, old-fashioned courtesy and efficiency as the No. 1 need in today's hotels.

More than six per cent would like more care in the handling of reservations.

Four per cent wanted to be greeted with a smile when they ask hopefully for a room with a bath.

The survey revealed air conditioning as a big factor in southern and southwestern hotels, while a large percentage would prefer not to have to plunk a quarter into a radio to hear their favorite program.

Pastor Relates Reasons World Calendar Couldn't Be Feasible

Editor, Times-News:

Your editorial in Monday's paper on the newly proposed "world calendar" was most interesting to me, and I'm sure you did not do that something should be done about our calendar. However, I find myself in agreement that "almost everybody" including church groups favors the plan of the World Calendar committee. The plan was never reported out of congressional committee because of the opposition it met from church groups. A statement from their position, I feel, would be appreciated by many readers.

It is obvious to me some aspects of our present calendar could be improved. But when such changes are proposed upon the utilization of groups in complete disregard for established social and religious principles, they are doomed to failure.

The proposed world calendar, in some respects, has the same weakness as the 13-month calendar of 28 days per month which was debated before the old League of Nations a few years ago; namely, that a blank day occurs each year, and two leap years.

This blank day, having no designation as a day of the week, would throw the calendar one day behind the historic weekly cycle every time it occurred. For example, the day which was not to go into effect, 1949 would not begin on Saturday as the continuity of the week cycle would indicate; but instead, it would begin on Sunday, Saturday, the seventh day of the week, would be dropped from their reckoning altogether. 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Report Given on Geologist's Studies of Underground Water Supply in Area

RUPERT, Dec. 4.—To reclaim 600 acres of land on the Burdette extension project, 1,030 second feet of water would be necessary, A. C. DeMary, president of the extension project, told members of the Rupert Chamber of Commerce.

DeMary outlined a geological survey made last summer by Raymond L. Nace of the U. S. geological survey, commission for the bureau of reclamation.

He said 200 second feet of water might be obtained from proposed wells on private land adjacent to the project. He also pointed out that between 5,000 and 6,000 second feet of underground water exists between Miller and King Hill.

Test wells on the project indicate that irrigation wells can furnish 4.0 second feet of water or 2,100 gallons a minute without affecting the water level of the wells.

DeMary said the survey made last summer bears out the findings of other surveys made from 1926 to 1928.

He said if wells prove satisfactory, plans to build a high line canal from Lake Walcott could be eliminated.

Construction of a canal would be complicated by lateral distribution. He said it will prove satisfactory if it could be constructed in a straight line.

Further investigations are planned and additional wells are to be built in 1950, DeMary said.

He pointed out the intake and expansion of large masses of air by the first test wells in greater savings in construction and would make possible the opening of portions of land earlier than expected.

Water Control Unit Locations Are Revealed

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (AP) - Location of field and basin offices to carry out water pollution control activities, authorized by last congress, were announced today by the two responsible federal agencies.

Under the new law enacted in June—the surgeon general of the public health service, supervised and directed by the federal security administrator, will provide financial and technical assistance to the state planning water pollution control.

The federal works agency, through its bureau of community facilities, will administer grants to aid in preparation of plans and the loan for planning or construction of treatment works.

Before such a grant can be made, however, a project must first be approved by the state water pollution control agency and by the bureau general.

To further the program 14 offices will be set up in a variety of locations in areas by the bureau general, in addition, nine divisions of the bureau of community facilities will be established.

Basin location offices and the geographical areas they embrace include: Boulder City, Nev.; All of Arizona and parts of New Mexico, Colorado, Utah, Wyoming, Nevada and California.

Portland, Ore., All of Washington and parts of Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon and Wyoming.

The division offices, the division engineer and the areas over which they will have jurisdiction include: Seattle, I. R., Oregon; Alaska, Idaho, Montana, Durkee, Washington.

Denver, William H. Cheney; Colorado, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming.

Utah-Idaho Sugar Plant Closes Run

W. J. O'Bryant, the company's plant manager, said 142,000 tons of beets were sliced at the plant. An additional 50,000 tons were processed at the Blackfoot factory, which closed Nov. 21.

O'Bryant said the end of the run will release all but about 40 of the 300 employees at the factory here. They will be retained for maintenance.

The Idaho Falls and Blackfoot factories processed beets from 17,000 acres of eastern Idaho land this season.

School Leaders to Attend Northwest Area Annual Meet

BOISE, Dec. 4 (AP) - A large group of Idaho school administrators is planning to attend the annual meeting of the Northwest Association of secondary and higher schools at Spokane Dec. 9-11.

The Superintendent of Public Instruction Alton B. Jones today said the state committee on secondary schools will present its recommendations regarding accreditation of Idaho high schools at the meeting.

Standards for membership in the Northwest association generally are higher than those required by the individual states, Jones said.

He pointed out that only 90 of Idaho's 182 high schools hold memberships in the Northwest association.

Members of the state committee include George Fields, principal, Boise high school; George Little, superintendent, Buhl schools; and O. D. Cole, state high school supervisor.

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Added Funds Required for McNary Dam

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (AP) - A Pacific Northwest Electric company president said today an additional \$10,000,000 will be needed to keep work going on McNary dam on the Columbia river until June 30.

James Polhemus, president of the Portland (Ore.) General Electric company, also told a reporter that lower interests in that area figure at least \$35,000,000 must be appropriated for the dam in the fiscal year starting July 1 if power is to be produced there by 1951.

Power from McNary dam has not been expected until about 1954, Polhemus said and area interests are trying to push it up to 1951 or 1952 to meet the urgent needs expected then.

Anything less than these amounts, he said, will mean the power features will not be brought into production in either 1951 or 1952.

Polhemus said he was informed the budget bureau is apparently trying to hold down money for McNary to \$22,000,000 next fiscal year.

The 90-foot star and its accompanying display of dazzling lights were turned on last night for the Christmas season. They will remain lit until Jan. 2.

All Cooperate

Merchants, college students and the main citizens of this center of Moravian faith pitched in to make the display the greatest in the history of the "Christmas City of the U. S. A."

The Hotel Bethlehem turned out the lights in the word "hotel," leaving in six-foot letters the word "Bethlehem" to glow as a welcome to the thousands of visitors who come here every year.

The city strung up seven miles of illumination throughout the main thoroughfare and residential areas. More than 40,000 individual lights went into the display.

Purchase of an electrocardiogram recently given the state tuberculosis hospital at Gooding was financed by the sale of Christmas seals in this county. The local association also has a number of other projects to help young and old in the prevention and treatment of tuberculosis.

Mrs. Pumphrey said chest X-ray examinations are one way of finding tuberculosis in its early stages. On a national scale, more than 2,000,000 chest X-ray surveys showed 24,000 persons who believed they were healthy had tuberculosis. Of that number, 70 per cent were in an early stage, 25 per cent were moderately advanced, five per cent were in a far advanced stage, and one-third could infect others.

Spy Probe to Resume Work On New Data

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (AP)—The house un-American activities committee decided today to reopen its communist spy hearings on the basis of sensational new evidence found hidden in a pumpkin.

At the same time, the committee issued a pamphlet which declared that an estimated 800 American communists, trained in Moscow, are "high officers of a secret army, now being drilled to overthrow our government."

Pamphlet Issued

The pamphlet, titled "100 things you should know about communism and education," did not say where the "secret army" is being trained in the United States. But it did say that hand-picked officer candidates are trained in Moscow in sabotage, bomb-making, train wrecking, civil war and other methods of waging a country.

The committee's new red espionage hearings will open Tuesday afternoon and are expected to continue government documents, found in a hollowed-out pumpkin on the Maryland farm of Whitaker Chambers, who previously testified he was a member of the "secret army" underground in Washington before the war.

To Reveal Information

Robert E. Stripling, chief investigator for the house committee, said evidence will be presented to show who gave the secrets to Chambers, now a senior editor of Time magazine, has testified he renounced communism in 1938.

The committee's pamphlet on communism and education is one of a series and is presented in question and answer form.

It declared that many communists and fellow travelers have bored the American educational system where they constitute "a deadly danger."

Stock Entries Set Exposition Sales Record

CHICAGO, Dec. 4 (AP)—The 49th international livestock exposition ended today. Records were broken. More people attended, and for each pound of prize animal, farmers got more money than ever before.

The glamor animals of the livestock world—champion fat steers, barrows, and wethers—left the spotlighted show ring and went to the stockyards to become prime steaks, roasts and chops.

Exposition officials said the money that went to exhibitors equaled that year's \$250,000, although the number of animals shown this year was about 10,500, approximately 2,000 less than in 1937.

Judges gave out 287 championship ribbons and prizes, and 974 first place ribbons. Grain growers and cattlemen from 42 states and five provinces entered exhibits. Top honors were scattered over 32 states and two provinces.

The host site, Illinois, as in 1947, took the greatest number of championships—52—and most first places—107.

Adjacent Indiana rated second with 43 champs and 68 firsts. Iowa was next with 28 championships but Ohio had third place in the number of first, 67.

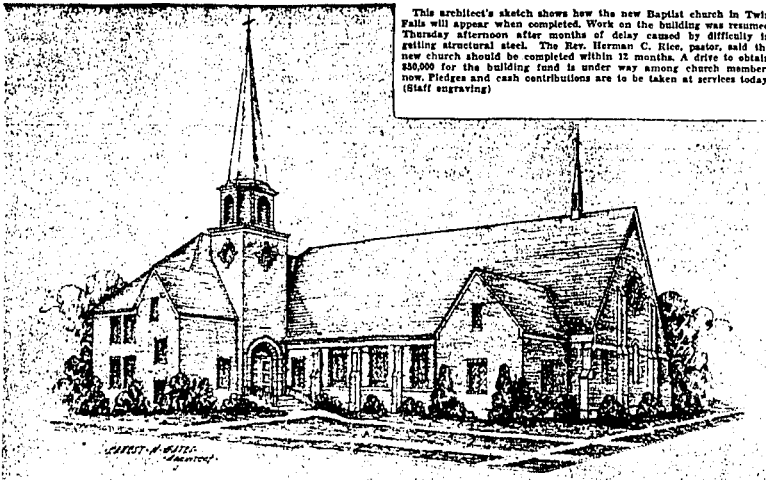

The first floor houses in a well coordinated plan the main auditorium or sanctuary; the chancel, providing ample space for the pastor, choir, organ, communion table and the related functions of each; the baptistry; choir room; pastor's study; secretary's office and reception room; church parlor located to provide room for expansion for the sanctuary, and a nursery.

The north end of the building, on the first and second floors of the basement, is devoted to the Sunday school where classrooms and space are provided for all departments.

The basement houses a comprehensive fellowship hall and accessories such as kitchen, stage and dressing rooms which will provide a large number of church recreational activities.

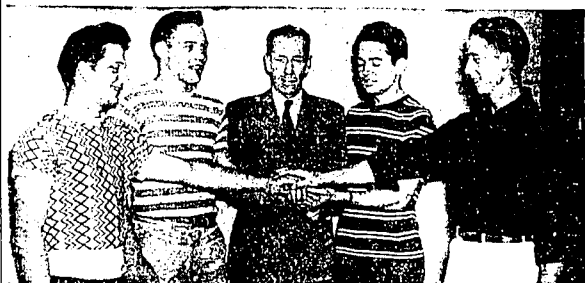

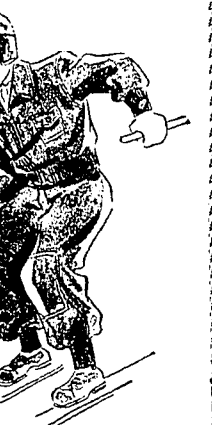

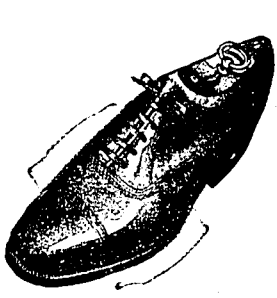

If the Russians want to insure that Gen. Luchin D. Clay will remain in Berlin to back them at every point the best thing they can do is to keep on putting out propaganda about his possible departure.

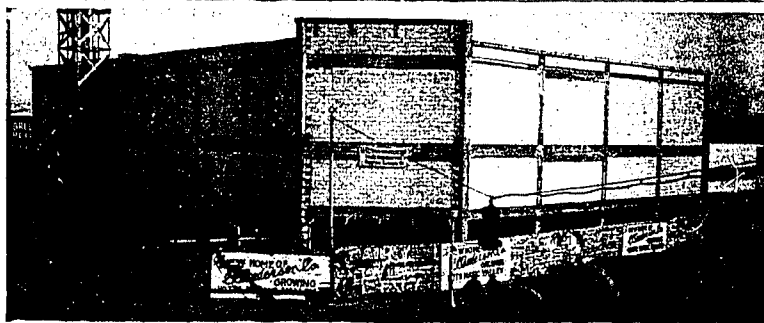
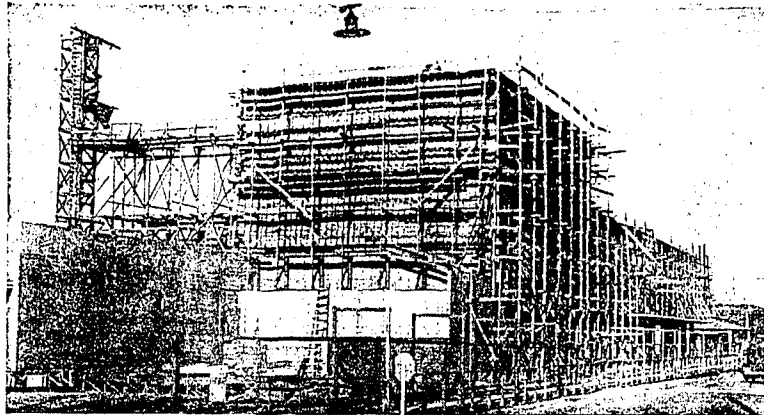
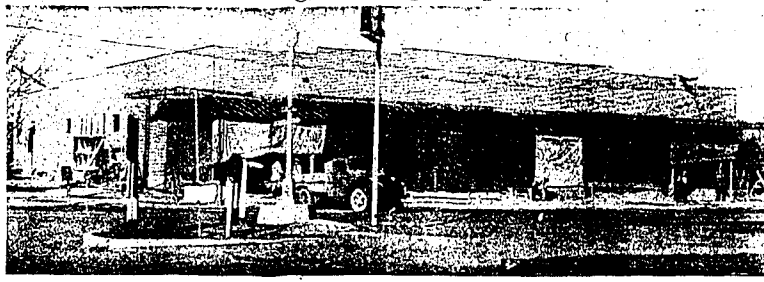
It's no secret among the general's intimates that he would like to retire—but never in such fashion that he would be accused of running. He would like to have gotten out before now. His wife is a good "army" wife, who appears to take everything in charming stride. But dealing with the Russians frequently means working nearly all day and all night, and the general would like to see more of her.

He was found one Sunday in Berlin acting as hostess to one of his sergeants could have an afternoon out. He claimed the sergeant had drugged him. But there was evidence that he was really trying to perform vicariously the grandfatherly duties to which he would like to have been attending in America.

But the Russians are keeping him on the job, just as they are hardening allied determination not to be pushed out of Berlin. They are trying to frighten Berliners away from the allied-sponsored city government and from the polls in tomorrow's election. There may be a few Germans left who are so unfamiliar with Russian methods as to fall for this line, but not many.

One of the most heartening things about the allied effort to withstand Soviet pressure in Berlin is the stand of the Germans themselves. The communists have been unable to entice them into their camp even with promises of badly needed food. Now the communists are trying to get them to register for Soviet food cards by offering to sell Christmas trees which the allies will be unable to supply. The Soviet campaign would be ludicrous were its objectives not so deadly.

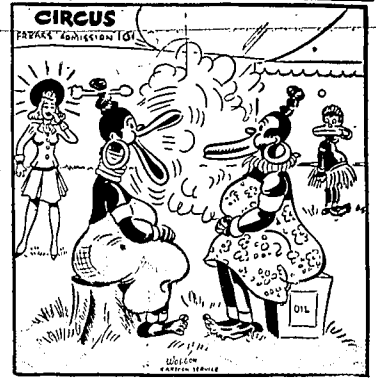

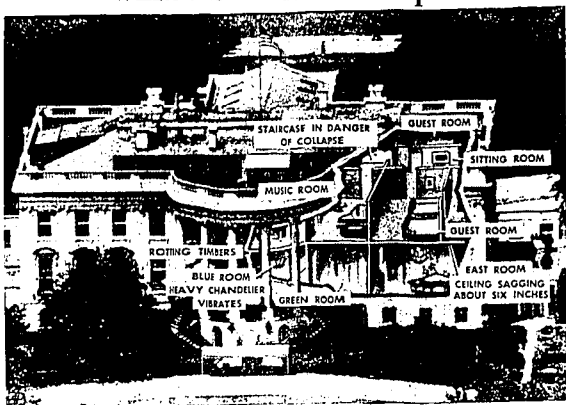

Sugar Supply Is Short of Demand, Department Says

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (AP)—The agriculture department announced recently that the domestic sugar production area will fall short an additional 60,000 short tons in filling its 1948 sugar quota.

This deficit will be divided between Puerto Rico and Cuba. Puerto Rico's share will be 15,435 short tons, bringing its total quota for the year to 1,023,756 short tons.

Cuba's share will be 44,565 short tons, bringing its total for the year to 2,840,467 short tons. Both Cuba and Puerto Rico will supply raw sugar.

Quotas for other areas remained unchanged.

The department also announced that a deficit of 8,700 short tons in Puerto Rico's 1948 quota of refined sugar may be filled by anyone obtaining marketing certificates from the agriculture department.

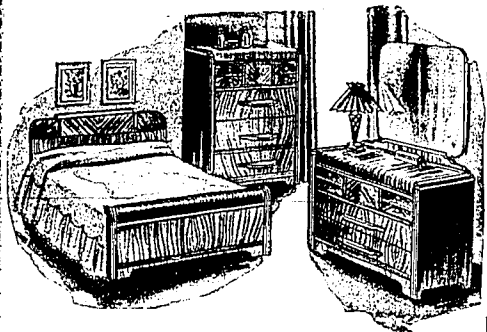

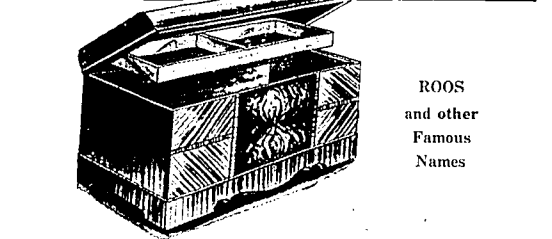

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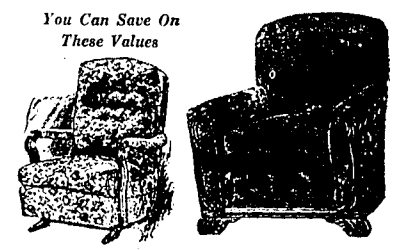

Tests Set to Fill Posts in Civil Service

Examinations have been announced by the U. S. civil service commission to fill positions as student aides and clerical assistants (general) in the Washington, D. C. area. The student aid examination will be used to fill positions paying \$2,495 to \$2,724 a year in fields of engineering, chemistry, mathematics, metallurgy, physics, meteorology and geology. Most of these positions are located in various federal agencies in Washington. However, some positions in meteorology in the office of the weather bureau are located throughout the United States.

Test Required
Jobs to be filled from the student-aid examination pay \$2,086 to \$3,727 a year. All competitors must pass a written test. In addition, applicants for positions paying \$2,495 and above must have had from one to four years of experience in the performance of certain stockpiling duties. Age limits, 18 to 62, will be waived for persons entitled to veteran preference.

Applications for the student aid examination must be received by the U. S. civil service commission, Washington, D. C., not later than Dec. 21, 1948.

Real Estate Officer
Examinations also are announced for appointment as real estate officer. The entrance salary ranges from \$2,235 to \$7,432 a year.

Applicants for this position will not be required to take a written test but will be graded on the basis of their experience, education and training.

Full information and application forms may be secured from the commission's local secretary, H. P. Westbrook, at the Twin Falls postoffice.

Idaho Farm Unit Protests Increase in Railroad Rates

POCATELLO, Dec. 4 (AP)—The Idaho farm bureau has protested against the 18 per cent rate increase sought by the nation's railroads, according to a recent release from Alfred C. Gordon, attorney for the organization.

The protest against the increased rates was filed today with the Interstate Commerce commission in Washington, D. C., by the Idaho Bureau of Agriculture, Inc., through Attorney Gordon on authorization of J. P. Fredrickson, president of Mead. The protest challenges the right of the railroads to increase rates under their petition of Oct. 1, 1948, amended Oct. 12.

The bureau protests on the grounds that the major part of Idaho's agricultural commodities and that the railroads already take a large portion of the market price of such commodities for transporting them to market.

In addition, the bureau says that because of the costs of producing agricultural commodities continue to increase, prices received by agricultural producers continue to decrease.

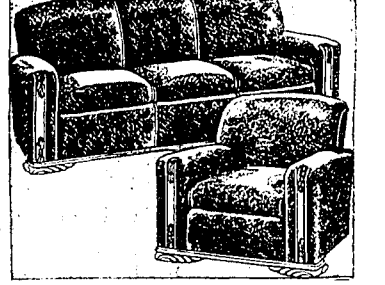

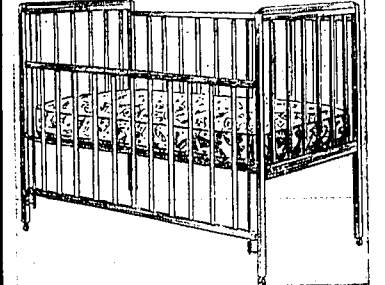

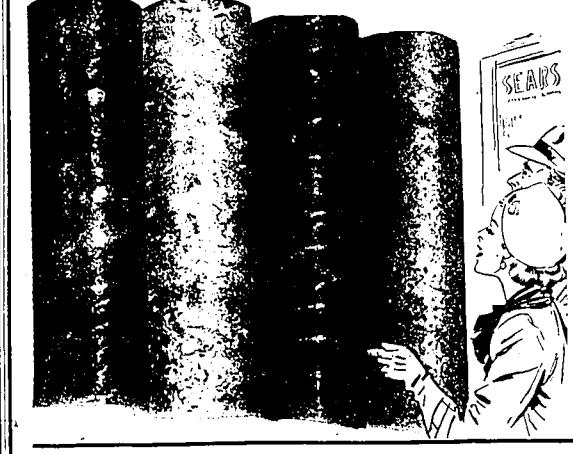

"What changes would you make in your wife if you could?" This question was asked a cross-section of U. S. husbands. Here's the result: Her temper, 20 per cent; tendency to scold, 19 per cent; capacity for long poems, 17 per cent; seriousness, 22 per cent; lack of thriftiness, 7 per cent; truthfulness, 3 per cent; religious life, 5 per cent. Now the smart investigators should ask the wives some questions.

 Editor: "None. Quite the contrary!"

Interested readers send letters, stories and poems to column writers. The "poems" are usually from five to seven stanzas long. Frequently the stanzas are just rhymed words strung together. Columns seldom carry long poems, even when they are too much, so the efforts of these folks must go into the waste basket.

This doesn't mean they aren't appreciated. How to help these contributing who are serious about turning out real verse is a matter of any columnist. Probably the only way to become a poet is to be born with the talent, and then spend years in study and practice.

Sadie Stuart Heger, a professional poet who has appeared in the leading magazines, and whose book, "Earthbound," has just gone into second printing, has many helpful hints for struggling verse writers. Some of these were presented in her article "Story Telling in Verse" which appeared in the November issue of *Author and Journalist*.

Sadie read and studied poetry for years before she was ready to put out finished copy. She thinks a course in short story writing is an asset to any verse-weaver. She also thinks a poet to be successful, should have talent, whimsy, the ability to find "just that one word to convey a particular shade of meaning" and a knowledge of verse structure gained from English classes and handbooks on poetry.

She almost drove the White House domestic staff nuts when a guest there had to have the sheets on her bed changed three and four times a day. They finally fooled her by ironing the same sheets and putting them back on. If you want the real lowdown on this lady and her husband, read General Stilwell's papers. It's a free country and you readers have a right to your opinions on this. As for us, we're sending a letter and some wires to our Washington representatives, telling them just how fed up we are with this kind of monkey business. Glad to have you join us.

"Did it cost much to publish your book?" Writers are sometimes asked this amazing question. Since book publishing is an expensive and involved business, it's also flattering. "Imagine anybody thinking I could afford to bring out my own book—even in the cheapest edition!" wrote a California author. "I'll never have that much dough to throw around!"

It's not done that way, folks. You write a book-length manuscript, you send it to a reputable publisher, or have your agent send it; the publisher is a business man; he wants stuff that will pay for all the printing, binding and advertising costs and leave him a profit.

He hires readers and editors to take manuscripts showing talent and technique, read, discuss and hold conferences over each. If one is considered a likely tickle the author is sent a contract supposedly modeled after one drawn up by the Authors' League of America. It deals with royalties, movie, serial and radio rights; it also states obligations of author and publisher.

The author is usually paid an advance royalty from \$500 up, and guaranteed a percentage for each copy sold. The percentage increases with sales. Cost of manufacturing, advertising, review copies, autographing parties, etc., concerns the publisher. There are people who write a book and finance it themselves; some even hire writers to "ghost" a book for them and then take the credit. (We have had a hand in several of these) but this kind of thing is pure vanity.

Any individual who writes copy and fails to get it printed on the above basis is probably not a writer anyhow, and should turn his ener-

gies to his driving, orchestra conducting or selling plumbing.
