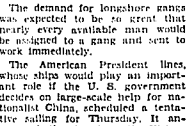
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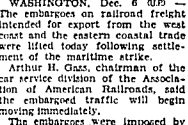
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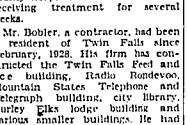


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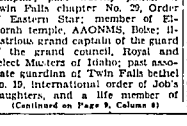
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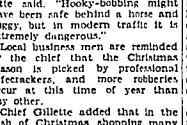
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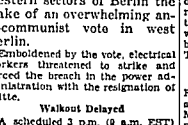


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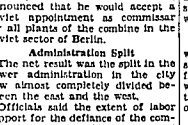


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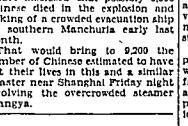
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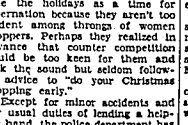
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Famed People Favored Cats; Writer Avows

NEW YORK, Dec. 6 (AP)—Have you got a grudge against cats? You'd better get rid of it. It indicates a lack of discrimination that will forever bar you from the company of great Popes, kings, presidents, writers, composers and leaders of men who have loved these charming creatures down through the centuries.

The Chinese are very blunt about it. They say people who dislike cats are really rats in another incarnation.

I wouldn't go that far, but I do recommend that you familiarize yourself with the influence cats have exercised on the lives of great men and women.

Mohammed Had One Mohammed had a cat. Its name was Muezza. The French poet Louis wrote that he never really understood Mohammed's compassion and greatness until he understood his relationship to this animal. Of the cat went to sleep on his robes. Mohammed always called for slaves and eat and sleep on the slaves or what ever part of the robe the cat had chosen, rather than disturb him.

Edgar Allan Poe, Lafcadio Hearn, Pope Leo XII, Henry James, Thomas Hardy and Samuel Butler were celebrated cat lovers.

Pope Gave Kittens Pope Leo often presented kittens to his friends and once gave a great black and red cat to Chintebriand, who bragged in print. "He was born in the Vatican," he is called Micio, and he is surmised "the Pope's cat."

Antonio Sacchini, the Italian composer, wrote operas with his favorite cats sitting on his shoulder, and Henry James, the writer, worked the same way.

It is worth noting that the Bible fails to mention cats a single time. But considering the scriptural judgment on dogs, the cats probably are lucky. The Bible catalogues dogs, mentioning them 44 times and always with contempt. This must cause some frustration in dog lovers who accept every word of the scriptures as literal.

Cats are purrification and furniture. They are without doubt the cleanest animal alive. They have great curiosity, but they are never jealous and seldom demonstrative—although there are moments when they fairly go into raptures of affection.

More unfortunate even than people who fail to understand cats are purists who claim for cats virtue to the exclusion of all other animals. I have in mind those who regard the loudest tail-wagging of dogs as a vulgar manifestation of affection. This is ridiculous. There ought to be room in the human heart for both.

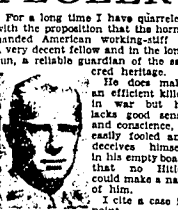

The more the American people hear about these appeals for aid to China, the more they must feel there is something about it all that doesn't add up.

For one who is seeking relief for the Chinese people and military aid for her nationalist government, Madame Chiang is demonstrating exceptionally poor tactics. As a saleswoman she is using bad psychology.

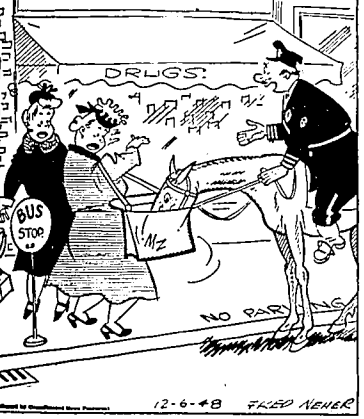

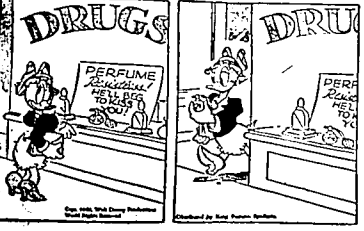

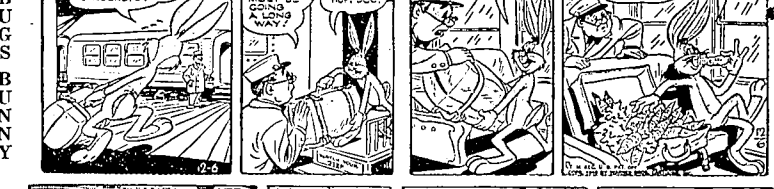

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'Rights' Issue Is 'Trap' for Demo Regime

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 (AP)—The civil rights dispute lies like a time bomb today within the structure of the Democratic party.

The dispute is moving toward a showdown in the flat congress. That could rock the administration to its foundations. The vital decision on whether the battle shall be fought this winter or be postponed to the interests of party harmony lies with President Truman. It will be among the most difficult decisions he must make in his first year as president in his own right.

The situation is developing this way:

Southern Democrats: As a group they are looking for some way to reduce the scope of the civil rights program submitted to congress by Mr. Truman last February.

Republicans: Many of them want to enact all-out civil rights legislation. Practically all of them see civil rights as an issue on which the administration can be licked, neglected and damaged politically.

Minority groups: The more advanced minority groups will demand that Mr. Truman and the Democrats make the good 100 per cent on the Democratic platform.

There were four civil rights commitments in the Democratic platform. With three of them the southern writers generally would go along with qualifications. But they don't even talk about a federal fair employment practices act. If Mr. Truman presses for FEPC the congressional brawl will be something to see and hear.

The platform said:

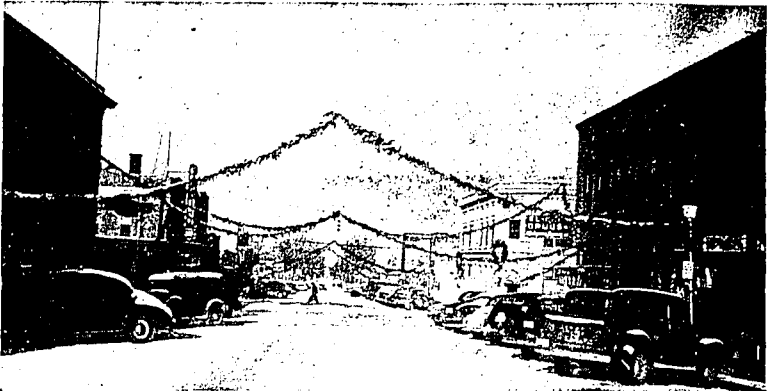
"We call upon congress to support our President in guaranteeing these basic and fundamental American principles: (1) The right of full and equal political participation; (2) The right to equal opportunity of employment; (3) The right of security of person; (4) And the right of equal treatment in the service and defense of our nation."

Having observed in good-eyed amazement Mr. Truman's election without the solid south, southerners generally believe they must accept some of that platform.

They would seek to guarantee equal political participation by means of a constitutional amendment to outlaw the poll tax.

They would accept an anti-lynch bill which was broadened to cover any mass violence—such as might occur in labor disputes—or if it were written to apply only to states without adequate laws of their own. The armed service problem is less difficult than the others.

Wheat Treaty To Be Talked Next Jan. 25

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 (AP)—A new attempt to negotiate an international wheat agreement will be made here next Jan. 25.

The state department announced this following a meeting of an 11-nation preparatory committee. All countries belonging to the United Nations food and agricultural organization are expected to participate.

Replaces Old Pact

The proposed pact would replace the agreement negotiated early this year which did not become effective because of the failure of the United States congress to act on it.

That agreement, which had the backing of President Truman, would have covered a five-year period. It would have set up a system of maximum and minimum prices to protect growers and consumers, and would have divided the world wheat market among most of the major exporting nations.

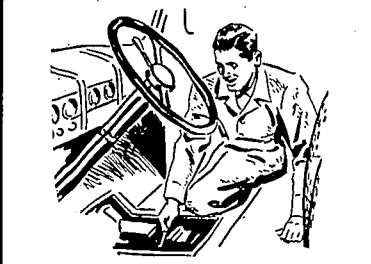
Assured Market, Price

Under the plan the United States would have been assured of an annual market of 168,000,000 bushels, with a guaranteed price of \$1.85 a bushel for the first year.

There have been reports that some countries want lower prices for its new agreement because of the big 1948 wheat yield of throughout the world. Such a move probably would meet with considerable opposition.
