Action at Rupert to Ban Operation of Slot Machines

RUPERT, Dec. 8 (AP)—Rupert became the second city in Magic Valley today night to vote to ban slot machines. A hearing of the local city council voted unanimously to ban the devices. Price Searls, clerk, announced. The new ordinance will go into effect at midnight Dec. 31. Twenty machines within the city limits will be affected by the new ruling. The ordinance was drafted last night. Council members said they took the action because of the recent ruling of the attorney general calling for a year's moratorium on the advance of license fees to the state. Russ Clamp Berlin in Mail Exchange Ban to Boost Sanctions

BERLIN, Dec. 8 (AP)—Russia has halted the exchange of mail between the eastern and western sectors of Berlin in the first step to impose even greater sanctions against the western powers because of last Sunday's anti-communist elections, it was announced today. J. H. Gayer, an American communications official, disclosed that Soviet-controlled German postal officials advised him that mail traffic had been suspended Monday, the day after the elections. Previously, 600 mail bags were exchanged daily.

Reliable German sources reported top German communist leaders and Soviet occupation officials were in continuous session at Soviet headquarters in Karlshorst to formulate a new communist program for Germany. The sources said the talks were spurred by Sunday's election and that the communist delegation was headed by Walter Ulbricht who returned from Moscow last week.

Fire Extinguished in Haystack at Wendell

WENDELL, Dec. 8 (AP)—Fire which destroyed an estimated \$30,000 of haled hay Monday and Tuesday at the J. W. "Bill" Newman sheep camp seven miles south of here was reported out Wednesday morning. Wendell Fire Chief Maurice Jamison said the blaze was extinguished Tuesday night, but the stack of burned hay continued to smolder. Three bulldozers and a crew of men are clearing out the smoldering stacks and wetting them down. All fire-fighting equipment has left the scene.

Of the 2,600 tons of hay in the immediate area, about 1,000 tons were destroyed. No hay in the immediate area of the flames can be salvaged, Jamison said. Trucks removed an estimated 300 tons of hay to safety. No insurance covers the loss.

MacArthur to Stay Hanging Of Warlords

TOKYO, Dec. 5 (AP) — General MacArthur made clear today that he would not hang for war crimes while the gallows wait for the U. S. supreme court acts—probably Dec. 16.

Officers at MacArthur's headquarters were amazed that the supreme court, which refused to review the German war crimes case, agreed to hear appeals submitted by two of the seven on Dec. 16.

Only one of the allied missions represented on the international tribunal, which condemned the seven Japanese warlords, would comment.

"I am surprised," said Judge Jo Aon-net, China, "to hear that the American supreme court is to review the appeals after an international court has given its judgment. It is a mistake for the supreme court to review the appeals."

MacArthur's position that no action would be taken until the court acts was given in a reply to a written query from the Associated Press. He declined to make any statement on the court's decision.

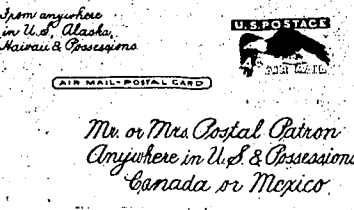

Expert Avows Firms' Profits Not Excessive

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—Business is not making too much profit and higher taxes may scare away investors, an accounting expert told a congressional committee.

Professor W. A. Paton of the University of Michigan testified he believes business is not making an "excessive profit."

He supported the testimony of Harvard Economist Sumner H. Slichter, who said Monday business is not making the record-breaking profits it claims.

Gives Reason
The reason, Paton said, is that accounting methods ignore the fact that the dollar of ten years ago was worth "two or three times" what it is worth now.

He suggested today's inflated dollar should not be called a dollar at all—but a zollar. Thus, he said, it could be distinguished from the 100 cents dollar.

Paton testified before a Senate subcommittee on the cause, site and disposition of business profits which may reach \$21,000,000,000 after taxes this year.

Terms Tax Unreasonable
Paton contended the corporation tax is an "unreasonable" method of taxation and is a "basic weakness in our present tax structure."

He said the corporation is merely a means of administering stockholders' funds, and yet it is taxed as if it were a person.

Common Stock Loser
The common stockholder furnishes the essential layer of risk capital, he said. "It is not assured of a particular level of earnings or of any earnings."

Loggers, Heavy Trunkers Ready For Rise Protest

BOISE, Dec. 8 (AP)—Representatives of the logging and heavy haul industries met with the legislative relations committee today to urge any increase in truck licenses.

L. B. Jordan, Grangeville, said the committee will meet with representatives of the passenger transportation industry today.

The committee is studying a proposed increase in motor fuel taxes, registration fees and income taxes.

Jordan said "we don't have to tell anyone why we need more money for highways in Idaho."

"Pole Blight" Disease Fight Slated by Unit

BPOKANE, Dec. 7 (AP)—The North Idaho Forestry association acted in a brief convention meeting to combat the "pole blight" disease which has afflicted more than 70,000 acres of timber in the state, officials announced today.

The association adopted a resolution recommending that the federal bureau of plant industry provide a forest pathologist and staff to fight the disease which is destroying marketable timber in north Idaho and western Montana.

End Conference
Nearly 100 members of the association ended their conference at noon today to enable delegates to attend the western forestry and conservation convention in Victoria, B. C. this week-end.

E. C. Rettig of Lewiston, president of the association, suggested at the meeting that the state industrial accident board appoint a committee of two, which would work with timber operators to reduce accidents and fatalities.

Have Many Inspectors
Washington and Oregon have 50 to 60 inspectors making the rounds attempting to enforce the safety code, Rettig said.

James Evenden, Coeur d'Alene entomologist, said the conserving that treatment of insect infestations on 65,000 acres of forest land has shown an 80 to 90 per cent reduction in disease.

Forester Reports
Rocco Gurney, Idaho state forester reported to the group on requested appropriations.

A report on blister rust control was given by Herman Swanson, who stated that the 1948 program had covered 48,000 acres of Idaho white pine timber.

The Idaho Falls squad will go to the tourney with the edge of experience and height in their favor. Idaho Falls' starting lineup averages six feet two inches. All the squad members are veterans of past campaigns.

Caldwell is another tall team, with six lettermen on the squad averaging six feet even. There is one regular from last year's conference championship team playing this year.

Both Boise and Nampa will go to the Pocatello meet with small teams, with the Boiseans having advantage of some experience. Pocatello, playing host to the tourney, will have the advantage of being on the home floor, but beyond that little or nothing is known of the team's promises and chances.

Grid Coaches to Discuss Substitution Controversy

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Dec. 8.—The main item on the agenda when the American Association of College Coaches convenes in San Francisco on Jan. 4 will be the free substitution rule, President Harvey Harman said Tuesday.

Harman, Rutgers university coach, said that some action would have to be taken, and that the association is attempting to find the general opinion of the coaches through a questionnaire.

Bill Bingham, chairman of the rules committee, has mailed the following questions to members of the committee, and Harman said he hopes to note some definite trends before the meetings get under way:

Questions Listed
"1. Do you favor making substitutions only when time is out?
"2. Do you favor substitutions only when the ball changes hands and when time is out?
"3. Do you favor eliminating substitutions while the watch is running?
"4. If we retain the present rule of permitting only one substitution to be made by either team while the watch is running, would you favor permitting "delay of game" for violation of this rule regardless of the number of time-outs the team has used up?"

Fans Like Subs
In his circular to the rules committee, Bingham commented that he has been made aware of the criticism of the substitution rule, and he is convinced that the majority of people like liberal substitution. Some colleges have organized their substitutions much better than others.

Harman said that he thought there were two schools of thought on the rule. "There is one group that wants to see a rule made to change the entire team," he said. "There is another more moderate group which would like to see the rule limited substitution on one time to two or three men."

Harman said that he personally is in favor of the latter proposal. "By limiting the substitutions at one to two or three players, it would take four or five downs to change the entire team," he pointed out. "In the long run, it would save special offensive and defensive combinations, because each player would be required to play on both offense and defense."

Evidences of Q-Fever Are Seen in West

PULLMAN, Dec. 8 (AP)—Evidence of Q-fever, a milder illness which was unknown until recent years, has been found in the inland empire.

It is a respiratory disease resembling pneumonia.

Discovery that two Washington State college students have had Q-fever and that one cow had been identified as a carrier, was reported by Dr. R. E. Nichols, dean of the college of veterinary medicine at W. S. C.

Infection First

In both student cases the infection was fatal. Dean Nichols said the cow may still carry the Q-fever organism.

Cattle and sheep, particularly, fill a "typhoid Mary" role with Q-fever. They carry it without themselves being affected. It is known to cause illness in humans, guinea pigs and white mice.

Dean Nichols said the cow is from the Washington-Idaho-Oregon border region. The two students spent the summer in the blue mountain region, the same general area. The deer and it was not long ago the students were exposed. Both had past histories of what they considered to be flu attacks.

Discovered by Student

The first known inland empire cases were discovered by Dr. Rajan Doodanarayana of India, who is studying Q-fever as part of his work for a Ph. D. degree.

Q-fever was first reported in Australia in 1916. It has appeared in several parts of the United States in recent years, particularly among meat packing house workers.

Last month's issue of the American Veterinary reported in an article on the milder Q-fever. It is not as extensive at the present time in the United States, the disease is considered important enough by public health officials to warrant further investigation.
