Non-Stop Mark Set For B-36

FORT WORTH, Tex., Dec. 9 (AP)—The highest altitude made the air force announced today that its giant plane, a B-36, flew non-stop from Fort Worth to Honolulu and returned, breaking its own record.

Homes Urged To Clean up Waste Matter

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 8 (AP)—Keep your garbage can clean to help control flies instead of relying on new chemical killers which are not infallible, three U. S. public health service researchers suggested, it was revealed here.

Declaring there is increasing evidence that strains of flies resistant to DDT and other new insecticides are developing, the researchers voiced their belief that:

"Sanitation is Answer
"The ultimate answer to the municipal fly control problem is simple sanitation, rather than the continuous use of expensive chemical control, except as auxiliary measures, or in special or emergency situations."

Biologist K. E. Quarterman and W. C. Baker and J. A. Jensen, sanitation investigators of the health service's communicable disease center, Savannah, Ga., made the statements. They addressed the closing session of the American Society of Tropical Medicine's annual meeting.

Depend on Control

"The recent tendency for the public to place more reliance on chemical fly control, and perhaps less on sanitation; and the prospects of an increasingly frequent appearance of insecticide-resistant strains," they said, "seemed to make this an appropriate time to re-emphasize the importance of sanitation in municipal fly control."

Among their recommendations were these:
1. That municipalities which now cart their garbage to city dumps—described as the No. 1 breeding places of flies—adopt one of the available methods of "sanitary garbage disposal."

2. That citizens in residential areas—where they said the garbage can is the chief potential source of fly production—be required to provide serviceable containers and keep them clean.

3. That there be wider adoption of municipal ordinances requiring the wrapping of garbage "as is now required in a number of large cities."
They also urged citizens to see to it that waste body products of dogs—second worst source of flies in residential areas—are collected and placed in garbage cans.

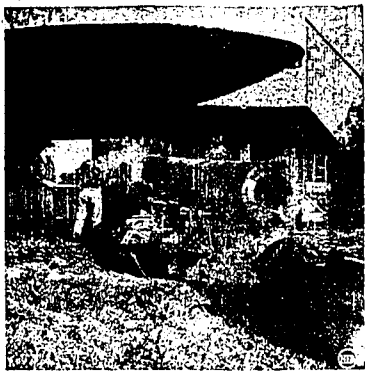

Film Finding Adds Life for Probe Group

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (AP)—Congressional investigators found something more than stale documents when they knocked the top off Whitaker Chambers' famous pumpkin.

Inside also was new life for the house un-American activities committee and perhaps considerable embarrassment for President Truman and the men who were in high positions before he took over.

The late FBI bucked the house committee on all fronts. He forbade the FBI to cooperate with it. President Truman pretty clearly followed Mr. Roosevelt's policies on that. And when the committee's hearings began hitting the headlines last summer with communist espionage exposure, Mr. Truman called it "red hearing" performance.

Hard Times Hit Panel

The committee fell upon hard times this fall. Some citizens letters prompted Rep. Carl E. Mundt, a Republican member, to the senate. Rep. John McDowell, R. Pa., defeated in the November election. Chairman J. B. Eastman, R., M. was indicted on charges requiring kickbacks from the salary of his congressional employees. The hardest blow was the shift of house control to the Democratic party whose leaders are unfriendly.

Election returns scarcely were in before a minority group of house members began to maneuver to vote the house un-American activities committee out of business.

Almost Sunk in '46

It almost was sunk in 1946 when a congressional resolution bill which made no provision for its continuance became effective.

Rep. John E. Rankin, D. Miss., saved the un-American activities committee that time. Members of the house had voted overwhelmingly for the reorganization bill which had the effect of abolishing the committee without saying so directly. But when Rankin came up with a parliamentary fast one which compelled members to take a public stand for or against the committee, the un-American activities inquiry was kept alive.

Nearly Everyone in Community Aids in Work of Declo's PTA

Declo, Dec. 8.—When the Parent-Teacher association meets here, attendance is no problem. But the social committee is faced with the problem of attracting the wide-minded so everyone will be served because when the Declo PTA meets it means that almost everyone in the community is present.

Choosing two big projects to be carried out this year, the parents and teachers started their meetings with a zero membership and treasury. In less than three months of school, one of the projects has been accomplished already, the membership has reached 119, and the treasury has a goodly sum to help finance the projects and keep them going. This is a real accomplishment for a community the size of Declo, with less than 500 people.

Early in the year, PTA members decided to have a school clinic, since some had been held since 1942. With much preliminary work being done by the health committee, Mrs. June Bailey, Mrs. Lois Neave and Mrs. Sarah Osterhout, J.N., the clinic was held in mid-November with Dr. C. Richard, B. Valley physician, and Mrs. Carol Thurston, county health nurse, giving physical examinations to every pupil in the school, both high school and grades. The clinic took most of a week, and check-up work was continued part of the next week.

Mrs. Osterhout, a registered nurse and member of the health committee, reported each student received a physical examination, tuberculosis patch test and immunizations for diphtheria, whooping cough and measles, when needed. Because it was the first clinic since 1942, there was much to be done, and PTA members already are making plans for a pre-school clinic late next spring.

Another accomplishment of the PTA and health committee has been the furnishing of a room where children and teachers, who become ill at school, may rest. Minor treatment for colds and flu may be given. The furniture, linen and other equipment were donated by members of the PTA.

The second project planned was the promotion of a hot-lunch program. In a school in which the majority of pupils come each day by bus, the hot-lunch program gained the interest of the entire community. Teachers, parents and pupils are proud of the basement room being converted into a modern lunchroom. The noise of electrical building equipment is music to the ears instead of an irritation, because it means completion of the lunchroom that much sooner. The new lunchroom will serve between 120 to 150 children, and the kitchen, cooking and storage equipment are being installed.

Price for Lumber Dips 20 Per Cent

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (AP)—Lumbermen said today a recent slump in building activity has brought about a 20 per cent drop in mill prices.

Representatives of the National American Lumber Manufacturers' association said advance in steel and other materials, rather than of lumber, are the chief hindrances to house building.

The statement followed a report by the commerce and labor departments that building activity fell off to \$1,550,000,000 in November.

The seven per cent drop from October was attributed to "seasonal" factors. Even with the decline, the report said, the November total was still nine per cent higher than for the same month last year.

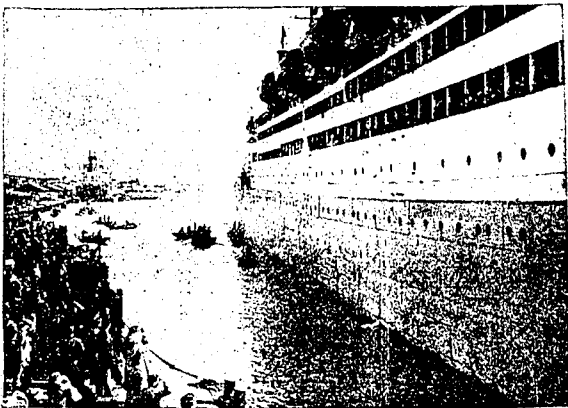
The average increased levy for the 66 communities this year over 1947 was 1.67 mills, compared to increases of 5.8 and 5.31 mills during the two previous years.

Analyst Sees 'Message' in Two Reports

By DEWITT MACKENZIE

There lie before me on my desk two news items which come from widely separated places and have no immediate connection but which, by an association of ideas, combine to convey a striking message.

One dispatch comes from Wiesbaden, Germany, which is U. S. air force headquarters in Europe. It quotes two Russian air force pilots, who fled the Soviet union—Leuts, Peter A. Piragov and Anatoly P. Darsov—as declaring that the red armed forces are torn with dissatisfaction and conflict with a war against the United States. They further say 70 per cent of the Russian people hate the communist regime, but "don't dare do anything about it."

Other Quotes Mrs. FBI

The other message is from Paris and reports Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt as saying a "serious happening" will occur in Russia. "The people of the declaration of human rights just completed by the United Nations socialist committee in Europe, who was a pioneer in framing the declaration, told a press conference it cannot be kept from the peoples of the world despite state control of information."

Mrs. Roosevelt said the declaration will give "moral strength to the man-in-the-street. It will encourage him to ask questions of his government and demand that individual laws and customs be changed to correspond to the declaration."

All Are Affected

She added: "All governments, even totalitarian regimes which completely control means of information, are affected by what their people want. Sooner or later they have to meet those needs."

"That strikes us as being a shrewd appraisal of the situation. I think we can carry it a step further and say that the Sunspot of human rights one of these days will arise in the shape of revolt by the oppressed peoples and end the bolshevik structure."

Electric Lack Unlikely Says Utilities Head

Power plant capacity in southern Idaho is sufficient to meet the peak demands this month and next, which Auger said are the heaviest during Christmas activity and long evenings.

Supply Adequate

Barring a temporary breakdown of transmission lines or power generators, people of southern Idaho will have a constant and adequate supply of electricity, the PUC members said.

Cost of Food Lowest Since June of 1947

NEW YORK, Dec. 9 (AP)—Wholesale prices as reflected by the Dun and Bradstreet index, today had declined to the lowest point since last June 24.

The index, which represents the sum total of the price per pound of 31 commodities, declined to 86.23 during the past week. It was 86.28 for the previous week. A year ago the index figure was 87.12. The record high was 87.36, recorded on July 13, 1948. The all-time low was 81.4, established on Jan. 31, 1932.

Prices of 12 foods declined this week, while 9 advanced and 10 remained unchanged. Declines included wheat, oats, barley, hams, lard, cottonseed oil, cocoa, eggs, potatoes, beef, lamb and veal.

Lieutenant Smith was awarded the air medal shortly before his death for 29 escort, bombing and strafing missions over Germany, Austria, Czechoslovakia and northern Italy. He was a flight commander, termed Smith's squadron as top-scoring American fighter group in the Mediterranean theater.

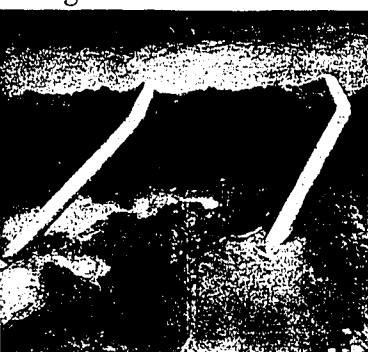

New Devices in Magic Valley Counteract Irrigation Erosion



Counteracting wind and water erosion, which carries away tons of Magic Valley top soil each year, are such conservation measures as pictured above. They are coming into greater use by farmers interested in maintaining the area's productivity and prosperity in future years. Magic Valley Farmers Use New Devices To Counteract Erosion From Irrigation

By HARRY ARNOLD

Conservation measures such as are pictured in the accompanying illustrations are being used by more and more Magic Valley farmers each year, according to Luther Jones, soil conservation service district conservationist.

In general they follow basic principles used in the nationwide battle against erosion—reduce the force of the eroding agent whether it be wind or water and anchor the soil by planting cover crops and increasing the organic content.

The drop structure pictured above is a typical example of how to cut the force of water in a sharply sloping irrigation ditch and thus save productive topsoil which is the backbone of this area's prosperity.

The structure at the left directs water into the high part of a field. The black area in the upper right, behind the fill, is a concrete structure through which the water drops and then goes through the fill without eroding the ditch.

Jones pointed out this type of structure is only one of many re-

service inventions revealed by irrigation systems to locate ditches on non-erosive grades and a more uniform slope, and the design of water control structures.

Jones compared irrigation to fire; both are necessary, both can get out of control easily, and when out of control both can be disastrous. Fire damage can be appreciated immediately, he commented, but erosion is so gradual that many times the damage is done before a property owner realizes it, and too late to be repaired.

In some ways, the soil conservationist pointed out, erosion is like death—once washed away or blown away is gone forever. Its usefulness destroyed and beyond replacement.

250 Accepted At University Out of 1,400

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Dec. 9.—Of 1,400 out-of-state new students from all parts of the nation waiting to be accepted at the University of Idaho this year, only 250 were admitted under the university's selective policy, it was revealed in a report issued today by Registrar D. D. DuSault.

The maximum possible enrollment with existing classroom and housing facilities was estimated at 3,700. Actual enrollment for the 1947-48 year, under university policy, provision was made first to take care of all out-of-state students, priority was given to sons and daughters of University graduates, and then to outstanding students desiring to enroll in forestry or mining, two fields in which there is an acute shortage in the state of university-trained men.

New students registering this year included 21 sons or daughters of alumni in the non-resident classification and 104 sons and daughters who are residents of Idaho.

Despite the fact that Idaho turned away so many out-of-state applicants, its enrollment figure closely follows the national pattern. Total fall enrollment in institutions of higher education in the United States reached a new high of 2,410,000. This is an increase of 72,000 or 3.1 per cent over last fall. The University of Idaho increase is 3.8 per cent, also a new high.

Percentage of veterans in U. S. institutions this fall is 42 per cent, down 8.9 per cent from last year. At the University of Idaho the percentage is now 47.5 per cent, also down from last year.

Nationally, the proportion of women among freshmen is slightly higher than a year ago. At Idaho the situation is exactly parallel, with an increased proportion of 0.4 per cent.

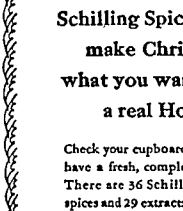

Jolt Readied For Pigeons On Structure

ALBANY, Dec. 9.—Woe to the pigeon that flies too near the New York state education building. He may get an education that he won't welcome.

Capital building superintendents were watching a \$45,000 experiment today that may be the answer to cleaning up after the feathered pest bothers.

The Albany Service company, Syracuse, is wiring the education building to give visiting pigeons a jolt of electricity. The job will be completed next May. If it works, it will succeed where fireworks, poison corn, steel and owl and "pigeon fences" failed.

Shock Not Severe
The shock won't be bad enough to do any harm to the bird, but the humane society. It will just give the birds the suggestion that they are welcome.

The system of wires will set up a field of static electricity. It won't be necessary for a pigeon to touch a wire. If it enters the field, it will get the same kind of shock you get when you cross a heavy carpet and then touch a small object.

The electronic system of pigeon jangling is the latest in 50 years of experiments in Albany.

Early Efforts Failed
Early efforts included shooting Roman candles and skyrocket, use of poison grain which brought down the wrath of the humane society, and the placing of a system of fire sprinklers around the building, each at a cost of \$25,000. After a few confused days, the pigeons hopped over the wires to a flat area and built their nests there.

This summer capital superintendents placed a pair of remarkably life-like stuffed owls in the courtyard. The pigeons avoided the area the first day, ventured within 15 feet on the second day, and roosted on the owls' heads the third day.

Population of U. S. Guessed At 147 Million

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—The population of the United States is 147,289,000, the census bureau estimated today.

The estimate as of Oct. 1—compared with the total of 131,669,278 on April 1, 1940, when the last formal count was made.

The October figure includes members of the armed forces overseas. Of the total 146,914 persons actually are in the United States, about 145,888,000 of them are civilians.

The bureau estimated the population increase for the first nine months this year at 1,800,000. The increase for the like period last year was 2,100,000.

This means, the bureau said, that population growth this year will be somewhat smaller than in 1947 but larger than any previous year since 1940.
