20-Year Term Given Leppert In Shot Death

BLACKFOOT, Dec. 10 (AP)—Frank H. Leppert, 20, has been sentenced to not more than 20 years in the state penitentiary in the slaying of Max Streiffing, 64, Aberdeen sleepman, last September.

District Judge Preston Thatcher imposed the sentence after Leppert pleaded guilty to a second degree murder charge. The second degree charge was included in a first degree murder complaint, to which Leppert pleaded innocent.

Leppert's wife, Margaret, 23, who also had been charged with first degree murder in the Streiffing case, pleaded innocent and was released by the court. Charges against her were dismissed on motion of defense counsel who claimed lack of evidence against the defendant.

The Lepperts were arrested in mid-October, after Streiffing's body was found under a pile of rocks several miles from his ranch. He had been shot twice through the head, an autopsy showed. Leppert, arrested in Caldwell, told officers at the time he shot in self defense, following an argument involving a hand of sheep. He said that time he shot his wife, who had been arrested in Boise, of any blame in the shooting.

1948 Will Set New Peak for Holiday Cards

CHICAGO, Dec. 10 (AP)—G. L. Parker has tossed some back-hair into news for the nation's postmen.

"There's going to be about as many Christmas cards to deliver this year as in 1947," he said, "and 1947 was a record breaker."

Parker, sales manager for a major greeting card house, said the postmen will have to take about 900,000,000 cards spreading Christmas cheer. At an average of 75 cents each, that's \$17,500,000 worth of sentiment, not counting the stamps.

The war is to blame partially for the big lead. A lot of people were uprooted from their homes, made Christmas card lead, Parker said.

The old-fashioned card, decorated with holy and mistletoe, still is the best seller and there are many new designs. One house alone turns out an assortment of 1,500, costing from two cents to \$2.50 each.

The "filly" expensive kind, edged with lace, go over big with the laboring class, Parker said. But he didn't know why.

In hard times, he said, the lower income groups spend less on cards, but the socialites spend more and use the cards as substitutes for gifts.

Parker himself expects to receive about 470 cards this year, many of them made by his company.

"I have a wisher who is a postman," he said. "It's very friendly, but he doesn't know what business I'm in."

Motor Transport Unit Protests on Unequal Taxing

BOISE, Dec. 10 (AP)—Idaho Motor Transport association members today voiced a protest against "inequities in taxation" at their annual convention.

S. H. Bennion, Idaho association president, said freight and bus line operators in Idaho are willing and able to pay their full share of taxes for maintaining the highways of Idaho on an equitable basis "but on that basis only."

Beverly H. D. Horton, Washington, D. C., president of the American Trucking association, Inc., said the American motor transport industry in 1946 paid out \$70,000,000 in special taxes alone. In addition, he said, the industry paid all regular taxes imposed upon other businesses.

Bennion said Idaho and some other states have done well in adopting an anti-discriminatory law for motor fuels taxation, which retains much taxes for highway development and maintenance only.

The association will conclude its meeting Saturday with election of officers.

2 States End War Pact on Liquor Sales

OLYMPIA, Dec. 10 (AP)—Oregon and Washington signed an agreement today for winding up their wartime whiskey partnership.

The agreement calls for the costs of the joint operation to be paid on a 50-50 per cent basis, with Washington assuming the larger share of the burden.

The liquor acquired in the 1945 purchase of two Kentucky distilleries was divided in this way, Washington received 57 per cent of the whiskey, Oregon 43 per cent.

Joint Meeting Held
Members of the Washington liquor control board and the Oregon liquor control commission signed the agreement at the conclusion of a joint meeting here.

The meeting postponed final approval on claims filed by two attorneys for legal fees in a tax case growing out of a federal government attempt to collect \$4,200,000 in come and excess profit taxes on the liquor deal. The tax eventually was settled for \$100,000 which was paid by former owners of the two distilleries.

Bought Two Distilleries
The two liquor control agencies bought the Waterfall and Frazier distilleries company and the Shewan distillery to produce such quantities to drink during the war when major distilleries were producing commercial alcohol.

A 1944 audit showed the two states bought all the assets of the two distilleries and then disposed of everything except 3,214,000 gallons of whiskey. The deal resulted in the whiskey costing the states \$1,466,666.

Solomons Toll Ratio 10 to 1; History Avers

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—The marine corps revealed today that American forces in the 1943 northern Solomons campaign killed 100,000 Japanese while losing only about 1,000 men.

The American forces also bottled up another 30,000 Japanese in the jungles in the northern Solomons campaign and thereafter they never entered combat again.

Disclosed in Report
These final figures were disclosed for the first time in an official marine corps history and evaluation report on the northern Solomons campaign.

The bulk of the Japanese were on Bougainville, marine historians said.

Approximately 15,000 marines landed at Bougainville in November, 1943, and continued through the other islands. The report praised

the 14th Army corps that "gallantly" defeated a Japanese counter-attack on Bougainville in April, 1944.

2,314 Wounded
In addition to the about 1,000 Americans killed, mostly on Bougainville, there were 2,314 wounded. The Japanese lost 803 aircraft, 24 destroyers, two cruisers and one aircraft carrier during the campaign. The United States forces lost 148 allied planes and two destroyers.

Truman Wins Post Without Majority Vote

Majority Vote

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—President Truman won reelection without a majority of the vote in last month's balloting.

This was shown last night by a count of the total vote in all states—official except for Connecticut.

The President got 241,048,548 votes. His combined opposition had 247,372,461. Thus, Mr. Truman trailed by 6,323,913.

He goes back into the White House, however, because he led the Republican campaign, Thomas E. Dewey, by 1,153,025.

Total Vote

The total presidential vote was 468,620,909, second highest on record. But the total number of ballots cast was 475,231,071 or 63.6 per cent of the presidential total. This is explained by the fact that 10 states—official except for Connecticut—held caucuses rather than for the election of electors.

One of the many striking features of the 1948 election which President Truman won with an electoral vote of 304 in 29 states, against 189 for Gov. Thomas E. Dewey in 16, and 39 for Gov. J. Strom Thurmond, States' Rights candidate, in four.

Polls 24,104,848

The President pulled a total of 24,104,848; Dewey 21,903,925; Thurmond 1,600,212; and 1,035,924 Progressive, 1,153,692. No man other than Truman, Socialist, 132,136; Claude A. Watson, Prohibitionist, 102,291; Edward A. Teichert, Socialist-Labor, 27,921; Farrell Dobbs, Socialist Workers, 13,007 and the rest scattered.

Truman won only by a plurality—234,923—instead of a majority of all votes cast. This is the first time a candidate had failed to win a majority since 1916.

Truman's percentage of the total vote was 49.5; Dewey's was 45.1, and the others combined 5.4.

Gooding Hospital Projects Ended

BOISE, Dec. 10 (AP)—Contracts for installation of heating and electrical equipment at the state tuberculosis hospital in Gooding have been completed.

Charles H. Clark, building superintendent, said the state will inspect the jobs soon after accepting the work.

He said the contract for painting the interior of five buildings at the hospital has been completed and accepted by the state.

The heating contract called for installing the heating unit for the prisoner of war camp hospital near Rupert and installation at the Gooding hospital. Clark said five millions in a campaign to complete the hospital unit.

Governor Urges Safety Practices

BOISE, Dec. 10 (AP)—Gov. C. A. Rohde today urged Idahoans to practice safety during the Christmas season.

"One cannot think of the approaching holiday season without entertaining the hope that for everyone it may be a happy joyous occasion," the governor said. "But the thinking thought that happiness for an entire family or several families, ought to result in a determination to lend our best efforts to a campaign to reduce the hazards of holiday travel."

Jim Lemay of Idaho Falls pitched the only no-hit, no-run game of the year, a nine-inning contest against Twin Falls on May 27. On the other side of the docket for pitching records in the league, Cliff Ross of Boise issued 10 no-balls in an eight-inning game Aug. 10 and Hal Ticehoff of Great Falls had the longest losing streak, 12 games from June 17 through Sept. 4.

Other records for Twin Falls pitchers include Kuehn, appeared in 24 games, completed 12 in 14, and lost 7 for a .46 average. Frank Crimell, appeared in 32 games, completed two, won 10 and lost six for a .307 average. Bob Walkington, appeared in 20 games, completed five, won four and lost five for a .500 average. Jim Eckert, appeared in 24 games, completed eight, won eight and lost five for a .615 average. Bob Webster, appeared in 32 games, completed two, won nine and lost 10 for a .474 average. Bob Jones, appeared in 21 games, completed four, won three and lost five for a .375 average. Pitchers who were injured in Maycock, three, Kuehn and Walkington, two, and Eckert, one.

Hearings Set On Columbia Basin Project

SPOKANE, Dec. 10 (AP)—The army engineers revised "303" plan for development of the Columbia river drainage is to be the subject of additional public hearings before the senate approval.

Col. Theron D. Weaver, north Pacific division engineer, said at an executive meeting of the Columbia basin interagency committee the hearings will be the first step toward final approval of the plan. The plan devised by the army has been coordinated with plans advanced by the bureau of reclamation. It includes immediate and long range prospects for development of power generation, flood control, reclamation and allied programs.

Hearings in January Members attending the session said the hearings are expected to be held before the end of January, 1949. They expressed hope that the "303" plan would receive congressional approval within six months.

Portland, Spokane and Pocatello were mentioned as possible sites for the hearings, which would be conducted by the army engineers' board for rivers and harbors. The Columbia basin interagency committee and the Columbia river resources committee met in separate and final sessions yesterday to complete details of their programs.

Plans to be released in the next year. Plans to be released in the next year, a "comprehensive statement of the six-year basin development plan" will be released early next year. The river resources committee, with William E. Webb, Boise, as chairman, adopted a motion urging local and state governments of the northwestern states to take a more active part in the basin development.

The committee also suggested that the army engineers and the bureau of reclamation publish versions of their separate plans and their joint agreement for circulation among the citizens of the basin. The committee took no action on funds to be requested of congress for development in the next year.

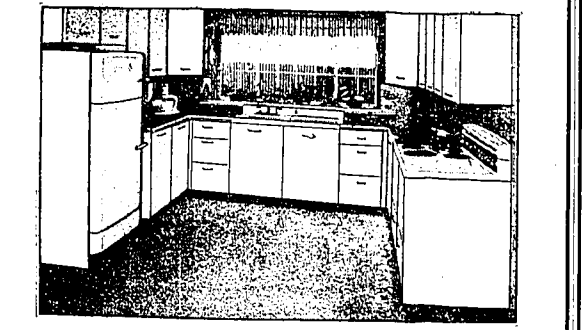
