Danger in Floods Is Now Past

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 14 (AP)—Flood waters of a Willamette river mid-winter freshet moved into this Oregon state capital area today without any threat of serious damage.

More lowlands are being inundated, but Red Cross officials anticipated any distress calls from farming districts that were warned of rising waters three days ago.

The Willamette is due to crest here about the end of the week. The main part of this city will be untroubled, but some suburban areas around houses are expected to be under water.

Corvallis and Albany saw the crest pass there late last night with only slight inconvenience. Traffic in the road between the two middle-valley towns was stopped.

A few farmers who left their automobiles stay in Corvallis already are preparing to return. At Albany, 10 trailer families were moved from a bridge to a trailer camp.

Situation Eased Cold weather and cloudy but rainless skies have combined with the deeper lower valley channel to ease the situation. Only a few inches of docks is expected in Portland, at the mouth of the river, when the crest reaches that metropolitan area miles north of here some time tomorrow.

At Eugene, near the headwaters of the Willamette, the trailer families evacuated from suburban Glenwood have started to move back as the river returned to its channel.

3 Aid Nations Gain Profit in Metal Re-Sale

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—The government said today that three nations have gained \$13 million by re-selling to American firms at higher prices.

The economic cooperation administration said the metal deals were made by Britain, Belgium and the Netherlands.

As a result, ECA said, the requests for metal from Belgium, Britain and the Netherlands have had to be cut by \$100 million.

ECA said the three countries bought almost 100,000 tons of aluminum and lead in the Newfoundland and British Columbia areas with the aid of Marshall plan money.

ECA disclosed the deals after unoffical talking for several months. The three countries bought aluminum from Canada at 16 cents a pound and re-sold it at 27 and 30 cents per pound.

ECA also financed lead purchases from the Netherlands from Mexico and Peru and from Belgium from Canada and Newfoundland.

Acting ECA Administrator Howland said in a statement that the deal had helped ECA's revolving fund account in Paris. W. Averell Harriman, as well as ECA's aluminum division, also had the necessary steps to bring the aluminum and lead programs under control.

Postal Workers Deluged With Holiday Mail

Lines at Postoffice Becoming Longer As Annual Christmas Rush Is Started

Lines at the postoffice have become discouragingly long as people wait for stamps to send Christmas greetings.

According to James C. Leighton, acting postmaster, approximately 15,000 one- and one-half cent stamps and 20,000 three-cent stamps are being sold daily.

Leighton expects the peak for this year to be reached Thursday and for in-coming mail on Monday. A total of 151,728 cancellations were made during the first 12 days of December, 1947, as compared with 143,112 for the first 12 days of this month.

There has been a tremendous increase in the amount of parcel post being mailed because of the increase of express rates. Leighton said, business this year is 10 per cent heavier than last year.

Many packages are still being shipped overseas for Christmas. Leighton said. However, they are usually mailed much earlier.

Only special deliveries and parcels will be delivered on Christmas day and on Dec. 26, according to Leighton. Mail carriers will make their last rounds for the week-end on the afternoon of Dec. 24, with service being resumed on the morning of Dec. 27.

In order to handle the surplus of mail pouring into the postoffice, three extra clerks, three men to handle parcel post, and three assistant carriers for the rural routes have been employed.

In spite of bad weather conditions, airmail has been coming in regularly, Leighton said. Snow falling has been the only factor delaying the planes.

Trains, however, have been slowed up considerably by heavy snow, causing some delay in the delivery of mail.

Stores Hoping For Big Rush At Last Minute

Department stores hoped today that a last-minute rush would wipe out a nationwide drop in Christmas shopping.

Merchants reported that business shows signs of picking up after a slow start.

Some believed that by the time Santa harnesses his reindeer, sales volume will have reached last year's record-breaking pace.

Blow Start Discouraging But store owners across the nation acknowledged that the slow start was discouraging the federal reserve board's last week showed that for the week ended Dec. 4, department store sales were five per cent lower than for the same week last year.

Some sources believed buyer resistance to high prices was responsible. At Chicago, President C. H. Franker to Butler Brothers' sales volume, said, and there is too big a gap between the Christmas merchants' gift list and its budget.

Budget Won't Stretch "The American Christmas shopper has been unable to make both ends meet," Mr. Franker said. "If that situation persists and American manufacturers and retailers don't make a program to do something to help the shopper to make both ends meet, we can expect business to be on the downgrade."

But many merchants interviewed by United Press in representative cities believed that the early decline was caused by a return to "prewar buying patterns." Because most wartime shortages had disappeared, the merchants said, customers are in no great rush to buy.

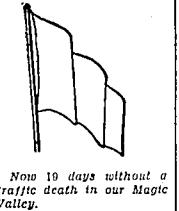

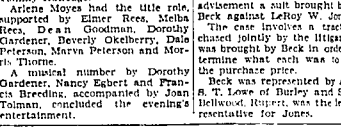

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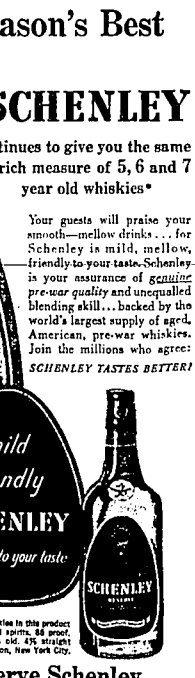

War-Born Soft Coal Demands Have Dropped

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 14 (AP)—The war-born demand for soft coal has collapsed. Production and employment in the nation's bituminous mines is falling off, a year-end survey by United Press disclosed today.

Miners' pay checks also are shrinking with the break in the demand which until recently had sent production up since 1941. Thousands of mines have curtailed working schedules—some have closed.

Operators reported that the bottom has fallen out of the market for low grade coal. This has been a blow to the marginal producers who prospered during the seven-year period of coal shortages.

Six-Day Week Folds
The six-day, 320 work week was fading fast with the passing of the emergency. The bureau of labor statistics reported that miners' checks now average about \$78 a week.

But thousands of miners have had their work week slacked to 28 to 30 hours and their pay cut to around \$65 a week. Even big producers of high-grade coal, which still is in good demand, have dropped to a five-day week, eliminating many overtime pay for the sixth day.

Only in mines producing much-needed metallurgical coal for steel mills, is the six-day week general.

Output to Drop
Operators estimated that this year's U. S. soft coal production will drop to 580,000,000 tons from last year's record-smashing 630,000,000 tons.

The blamed drop in demand on sharp decreases in coal exports with the increase in European production, decreased railroad and industrial consumption; high prices; and extremely mild fall weather.

Most operators pointed out that production should improve after the first of the year as the full winter demand develops.

Safety Urged In Christmas Tree Lighting

A single spark can turn the Christmas season into a period of tragedy unless proper precautions are taken to prevent Christmas tree fires, the National Board of Fire Underwriters points out.

Experiments have indicated it is impossible to make a natural tree flameproof. For that reason many families prefer to use small artificial trees which can be made flameproof.

Buy Quickly
If a natural tree is used it should not be brought into the house until a few days before Christmas because it may become dry.

The tree should be placed in the coolest part of the house and any nearby candles or fires should remain until as long as the tree is labelled.

Candles should never be used on trees or employed in any way around the home. Cords used for strung electric lights on the tree should bear the Underwriters' Laboratories label, as the surest sign of safe manufacture.

Check Urged
Tree lights should not be left burning while the family is away and an occasional check should be made to discover whether any needles have started turning brown from the heat of the lights. If so, the location of those lights should be changed.

When the needles start falling, take the tree down and get it out of the house, the board recommends.

Trees should never block exits and should not be located near stairways or elevators which would provide an up-draft through which fire could spread through the building, it was pointed out.

Idaho Groups To Draft Rap Of Rail Rates

BOISE, Dec. 14 (AP)—The Idaho public utilities commission staff expects a conference soon by Idaho farm and industrial groups to prepare material opposing the 15 per cent freight boost requested by railroads.

L. P. Purvis, transportation chief of the commission, returned from Washington where a hearing was held on a proposed interim increase of eight per cent.

Hearing Set
He said regional hearings would be held shortly on the overall 13 per cent increase with one at which western interests will be represented, probably scheduled for San Francisco.

It was anticipated by the commission staff that an Idaho conference will be attended by shippers, farm groups and industrial representatives to prepare testimony for presentation at the regional hearing.

Receive Protest
Purvis said the Idaho PUC has received numerous letters protesting the requested increase. They came from Chamber of Commerce groups and farm organizations.

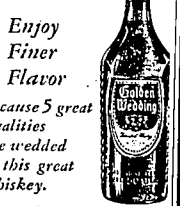

OUR THINKING CHANGES

The north Atlantic defense pact, now being considered by the United States government, vividly illustrates the contrast between the two postwar Americas of this century.

The disinterest does not arise from indifference. It comes rather from a general feeling that we shall ally ourselves with Canada, Britain, France and the three Benelux nations for common defense, and that the alliance is good, necessary and inevitable.

Science and speed have so shrunk the world in the past 10 years that it is hard to appreciate the radical departure of American sentiment from what has always been American tradition.

Our present boundaries are fixed by nature. Our present frontiers are not at the ocean's front or on the Rhine. They are on that imaginary boundary known as the iron curtain.

The Marshall plan was the foundation for those dikes. It was not built without opposition. But the opposition was nothing compared to that which greeted the attack on the Marshall plan in the next ten years ago.

Such a plan involves more than strategy. It involves the actual and potential production of a vast amount of material. That doubtless will mean some form of lend-lease, which in turn will mean added expense and sacrifice on the part of the American people.

This is not a pleasant prospect, but it is being faced by a people who are sure that the price cannot be put on freedom. The basic question was once a subject of bitterness and division has now become a matter of bipartisan agreement which symbolizes for the world our national unity.

ACCENT ON AGE The probable lineup of the new congress shows that the senate and house will be led, and the 18 most important committees headed, by men whose average age is 68.

U. N. Parley Talked Much, Results Little

The United Nations general assembly has concluded a fourteenth session with results which, in the main, are of questionable concrete value.

Millions of words have poured over the floor without turning any mill wheels to grind the grist for which peace minded folk are hungering.

Much of this torrent of language has been devoted to the bitter warfare between the Soviet bloc and the anti-communist countries.

This reached its peak Saturday when Andrei Y. Vishinsky, the Russian delegate, hurled at his former allies the awful charge:

West Leads Rapped
"The cause of the second World war is not so much Hitler, but the leaders of France and Britain, supported by the U. S. A."

That was the note on which the assembly adjourned with the Soviet bloc and the anti-bolsheviks apparently further apart than ever.

It is this dangerous division which presumably impeded British Foreign Secretary Bevin to say during a speech in parliament last week that "The United Nations is giving its grave concern as to whether it is going to face up to grave problems at all."

Unless Many Thoughts
Mr. Bevin was voicing the thoughts of observers in general. So long as the world is divided into two hostile blocs, and these blocs are sharply reflected in the United Nations, how can we expect the peace organization to function properly?

The answer, as I see it, is that the U. N. will remain largely humdrum so long as the ideological "cold war" continues. You might as well expect the general staffs of two warring nations to get together and agree on military operations as to expect that those U. N. blocs can cooperate.

Unhappy Conclusion
That is an unhappy conclusion. But I don't believe it means we should abandon the U. N. without further trial.

The establishment of the peace organization is evidence of the great ideal which good men have been pursuing for centuries.

It is a historic experiment. Thomas Edison didn't quit trying to create the incandescent lamp or the "talking machine" because he didn't make his experiments jell the first time. So we must carry on.

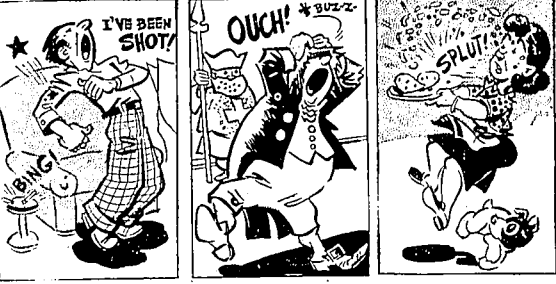

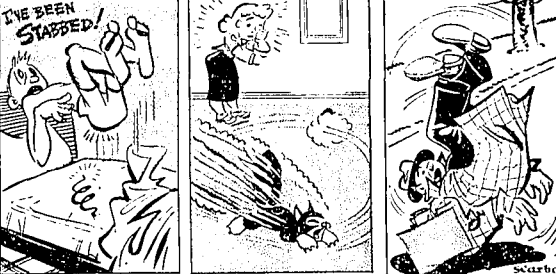

City officials met with local business men and city representatives in a Chamber of Commerce sponsored dinner-meeting to discuss the problem of electricity...

The problem presented by the chamber was that Burley, while trying to interest new business in the city here, could not provide the adequate power both in amount and rate for such business.

City officials explained the city is selling electric power for space heating at such a low rate that all commercial and residential users of power, other than for space heating, have to pay higher rates to make up for the space heating power under the low rate.

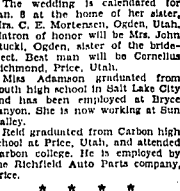

Idaho Bears Take to Shelter

Now that piling snows have blanketed mountain areas of Idaho with a deep covering, one of the Grm state's individualistic game animals, the black bear, has stumbled to winter quarters to sleep out the raging storm.

Black bears are fairly numerous in Idaho. Usually bear are virtually absent in the state, but recent reports of a few specimens being killed in the back reaches of the Selkirk have been received by the game department. This region is near the Canadian border. Others may drift into Idaho from Yellowstone park.

The black bear is nature's nomad, and is an unpredictable denizen of the wild. Perhaps the most well-known idiosyncrasy of the bear family is its liking for sweets and pork, which sometimes brings it into disastrous collisions with farmers. Occasionally a renegade bear is charged with killing sheep or other domestic stock.

Most of them, however, roam the back country, minding their own business.

Considerable controversy has arisen over whether or not bears hibernate. Naturalists have devoted much research to the winter sleeping of the bear family. Most agree that weather conditions influence the hibernation of bears.

A hibernation of bears consists of a combination "sleep" which may be of several months' duration, during which stored fat is absorbed. Metabolism remains normal, temperature is not lowered, and breathing is about five respirations per minute.

Several hunters have testified that bears do not necessarily sleep during their winter sleep. They have inadvertently stumbled into a den and aroused the occupant, who protested in a most active manner.

Bear cubs are born during the female's winter sleep, but do not grow until late in spring. Littering varies from two to five. The cubs weigh less than a pound at birth.

During fall months, bears eat tremendously, storing up fat for winter months. The exact method of absorption of this stored energy during winter months is not known, but it is assumed that the fatty layers are spongy, and by spring the cubs are more sleek. Bears eat heavily for a time after the winter sleep until their digestive systems are activated.

All species of bear in Idaho are classed as game animals. Because grizzlies are rare they are protected. Not all grizzlies are killed for a time after the winter sleep until their digestive systems are activated.
