

Secret Bombsight Data Given Russ; Spy Prober Says

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (AP)—Congressional spy investigators disclosed today they are looking into a charge that secrets of the Norden bombsight were slipped to the Russians 10 years ago by a civilian who still is on the army's payroll.

Acting Chairman Munds, R., S.D., of the house un-American activities committee told reporters the man now is on leave because of illness but that he still is a federal employe and a civilian.

The man is on the payroll at the army's Aberdeen, Md., proving ground. Munds wouldn't say he is suspected of sneaking out the bombsight secret. But other committee members said that is the kind of thing that Munds said the committee hopes it may have this individual as a witness later in the work.

Another committee member had disclosed earlier that the group had a report that details of the bombsight leaked to Russia as early as 1938.

This member, who would not permit the use of his name, said the report was obtained orally by an investigator and the committee is now pursuing it.

Later, Representative Rankin, D. Md., said he had a similar report from that the other members said, and that the newsmen could use his name.

In 1938, the Norden bombsight was one of the United States' highest secret secrets. Army men boasted that bombardiers could fly a pocket barrel from three miles up, using the sight.

Not That Good In actual combat, it never proved out that good, but was a highly accurate, effective bombing aid. It was what was available to other nations.

The house un-American activities committee pushed its spy hunt into this new field. Munds, R., S.D., said "the feeling on the committee is unanimous that there is a high probability of espionage in Washington now."

Army's Ships Handed Over To Navy Rule

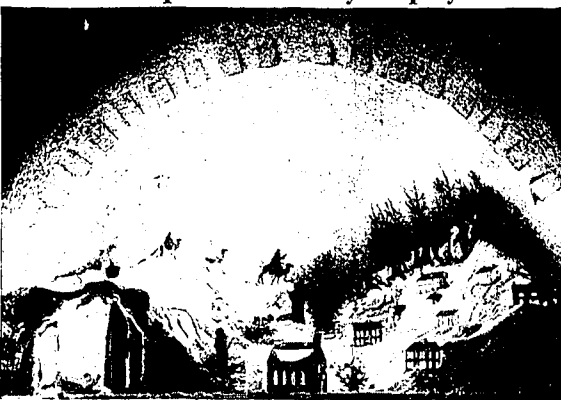
WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (AP)—All 100 American transport ships and 200 army ships, will be consolidated under army command as another step in military reorganization.

Farm Bureau Meet Offered 'Compromise'

ATLANTIC, N. J., Dec. 15 (AP)—Southern delegates offered a compromise last night on an American Farm Bureau federation convention fight on the question of future farm price supports and rigid controls to curb surpluses.

They came here insisting the farm organization come out in favor of continuance of present government 50 per cent parity price supports for major farm products and rigid controls to curb surpluses.

Reversal of Policy This would mean a reversal in the bureau's present policy. Last year's convention endorsed a system of flexible supports, ranging from 60 and 80 per cent of parity. That system was put into a new farm law passed by the last congress.

Apparently convinced that they do not have the votes to put over the high support level proposal, the southerners said they would be satisfied if the convention took no position on the support level issue.

Officers Would Decide They would leave the matter of determining the bureau's stand to its officials and board of directors. The decision thus could be postponed until the issue comes before the next congress.

The compromise plan was put up to the convention's resolutions committee. The committee will make its report Thursday, the final day of the convention.

Minidoka Firms Warned of Bad Check Operators

RUPERT, Dec. 15 — Minidoka County Sheriff Ron Hawkes warned merchants of this area Tuesday that they should be on the lookout for apirious check operators.

According to the sheriff, a forger was apprehended Saturday night in Rupert. He cautioned merchants to telephone him if in doubt about a check and not wait until the person has had a chance to escape.

"In this way we will be able to keep up with these check artists," he said. "Too often a check is written and the party gone for four or five days before it is known to be forged."

He pointed out that the Christmas season is the worst time for this type of crime. He added that although the sheriff's office has but a small number of personnel, the office would like to help the merchants help themselves.

According to Charles Whitaker, secretary-manager of the Rupert Chamber of Commerce, the tendency toward forgery has increased since the war.

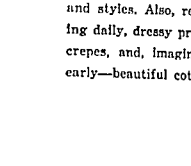

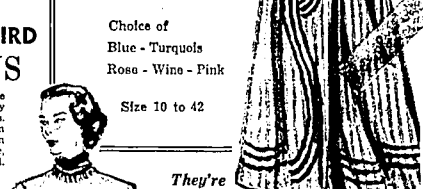
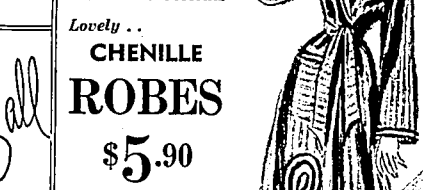

Beet Growers Called on for '49 Increases

BOISE, Dec. 15 (AP)—Robert Shields of Washington, D. C., president of the U. S. Sugar association, called on the nation's sugar beet growers to plant full acreages in 1949.

He spoke at a banquet of the National Sugar Beet Growers Federation last night.

"Unless this is done the claims and aspirations of the domestic beet sugar industry as now stated out in the sugar act of the nation's sugar beet growers will be put in jeopardy," he declared.

Points Out Quota
Shields pointed out that under the act, the beet sugar industry is given a marketing quota of 4,000,000 tons for each year through 1952.

The 1949 production, he said, is estimated to be about 1,200,000 tons. Clarence P. Popham, Carroll, Mont., said the growers did not have enough labor "even though we did have some Mexican nationals last year."

At the general session, the beet growers were assured that their prospects for 1949 "are just as bright as in 1948."

Shields said when farmers plant beet last spring they had a feeling that prices for sugar beets would be in line with competing crops.

Many of the 125 growers expressed disappointment of the 1948 crop payment. The sugar commission's final payment for the crop will not be made until late next year.

The sugar commission's new chairman to succeed L. J. Van Houten of Billings, Mont., today. The growers also will tour Boise today.

Antelope Plant Results in Area Are Reported "Poor"

Results of the antelope planting program in Grassy flats in southwestern Twin Falls county and Owyhee county are poor, according to a report made Tuesday night by Grover Taylor, state conservation director of the Southern Idaho Fish and Game association. Davis, who flew over the area last week in a survey of animal population, said he saw only three antelope, no coyotes and no deer. About 50 antelope were planted in the Grassy flats area in 1946 by the state fish and game department.

Davis pointed out, however, he could have missed many animals while conducting the survey from the air.

Urge Plan's Continuation
The association previously had gone on record urging the state to continue planting antelope in the area. A third plant of antelope is scheduled to be made in 1949.

Antelope are trapped during the winter in the Little Lost river area and transplanted to the flats.

The directors' meeting was the last before the Idaho Wildlife Federation meeting in Boise Jan. 8 and 9. Six representatives, Mel Bruning, Earl Eyster, Art Daw, eds. Jarvis, Warren Skinner and George Scholer, will attend the meeting.

Annual Meet Rescheduled
It was announced that the association's annual meeting, originally set for Jan. 10, will be held Jan. 17. Information regarding the state federation meeting will be presented to members at the Jan. 17 meeting. The program will be announced later.

The resignation of Mel Eyster as an association treasurer was accepted at the meeting. Eyster is moving to Burley. Fulton Eyster was appointed to fill the position. Eyster has been in charge of the antelope on the south fork of the Boise River. It was pointed out several times that the antelope problems are arising.

Watch Movements
Sportsmen are watching game movements in the area 60 far all antelope. It is pointed out in case a creek is formed on the snow, deer and elk might migrate into winter traps. It is pointed out that two game department officials have the area recently and reported seeing 500 elk in one herd. The state has 200 tons of hay in the area to serve as winter feed.

Expect Good Count
Lawrence Clark, Minidoka national forest ranger, reported five feet of snow on the ground in the area. He said the heavy snow has forest service expects to have its most accurate deer count on record this year.

The count will be held in February or March and forest officials will estimate the number of deer permits to be issued in the forest in 1949.

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Sanborn Tells Of Irrigation, Power Needs

GOODING, Dec. 15—Rep. John Sanborn was guest speaker before the Gooding Rotary club, speaking on the dangers of bureaucratic controls and federal monopoly over private industries. Sanborn said southern Idaho needs much reclamation development, but the cost would be prohibitive unless "power" can be developed in a large proportion of the cost.

The continued, "But if federal government control the power very likely would be diverted to the coast where there is a great demand and lack of power." He said that if the demand for power continued the use of water for reclamation would be greatly curtailed.

Public's Voice
If under federal control the people would have no control whatever over the use of water as the federal agency would be responsible only to itself, he added, while private industry is responsible to and controlled by the public utilities commission.

"The more we permit bureaucratic control the more we lose our constitutional rights and individual freedom," warned the congressman.

Plan to Deter Red Activities Being Sought

Suppose the Presidency suddenly called you over to the White House and said, "we've got to stop the communists in the far east, and I want you to draw up a plan. Give me your recommendations as soon as possible."
What would you do?
Quite probably, your thoughts would turn in the direction of a Marshall plan for the Orient. It seems to have been successful in Europe.

Differences Seen
Immediately, some spectacular differences would become apparent. You would discover we have supplied only "marginal aid" to the European nations. That is, we have used dollars to prime the pump for their own industrial machinery. But no Oriental nation has a Marshall-plan-like any industrial machine of importance.

Secondly, you should be confronted with a tremendous difference in political education. The people of Europe have been self-governing for many years.
Prepared to Fight
Hence, they have something to fight for. They have learned to fight for that political freedom, and to fight against Soviet domination—even though disguised by their own communists.

But no such situation prevails in the Orient. For some 200 years, most orientals have been governed either by foreigners or by absolutists. The people did not share in government.
Therefore, the orientals, when confronted by Soviet domination through their own communists, hardly disposed to fight against it.

Money Question
And finally, you would be confronted with the question of money. You would discover the United States, despite its enormous wealth resources, is very poor. At the point where it can accept no further commitments.
So you might start thinking in terms of more limited objectives. Can a strategic line be drawn, in terms of geography, that we might hold? Can you give serious consideration to the proposal—and it is often heard in Washington—that 10,000 American officers, technicians and advisors be sent to China to direct the way against the Chinese communists.

Hard to Form Line
It would be hard to formulate any strategic line because of the present political struggle between the majors and the minors in the Orient.
Until you can show more than 500,000,000 orientals the reason for having them, neither money, equipment, men or a strategic line will be of any value whatever.

'Joe'—Not Stalin, but Aide for Pharaoh—Blamed for Pay Tax

NEW YORK—The author of the first income tax law, who also was the first commissioner of Internal Revenue, was a famous psychologist, never attended college, and achieved the highest office open to an immigrant.
He got that way by selling the idea that he could interpret dreams. He lived to the age of 104, but when he devised the income tax he was only 20. He was great grandson of Abraham, 23d generation descendant of Adam.

His name was Joseph. He is best remembered for his least notable achievement, the wearing of a coat of many colors that made his brothers so jealous they sold him into slavery in Egypt.
It was almost 2,000 years ago that Joseph put across the first income tax, which was at exactly the basic rate at which our tax starts in 1948.

The Tax foundation dug out the story from chapter 41 and 47 of the Bible, and Joseph, presumably familiar with the Nile

and he sent them to Joe.
"Joe the boss, just like I said. You do what he tells you."
They got the grain for money. The Bible doesn't say how much Joe charged, but it does say that in the first year of the famine, Joe sold enough grain to get all the money there was in Egypt, and all the money there was in his native Canaan, and a lot from other lands and he "brought the money into Pharaoh's house," which by that time must have looked like Fort Knox.

"When that year was ended they said 'Our money is spent, my lord, also hath our herds of cattle; there is nothing left, but our bodies and our lands. Buy us and our land for bread.'"
"And Joseph bought all the land of Egypt for Pharaoh, and the people he moved to cities from one end

'Neutralizer' for Cancer Revealed

CHICAGO, Dec. 15 (AP)—Experiments with a powerful substance that produces cancers which can be "neutralized" were reported here by a Japanese scientist.
American cancer experts said the report, by Dr. Ryujin Kinoshita, president of the Japanese cancer society, again raises the question of whether cancer is caused by a virus.
If such should prove to be the case, they said, the answer might lie in measures that have brought smallpox and other virus induced diseases under control.
Dr. Kinoshita, in the absence of a direct finding, declines to call the agent known as "O-factor," a virus. However, he said an examination of the agent used in the electron microscope showed black dots, slightly larger but of the same shape as some known viruses.

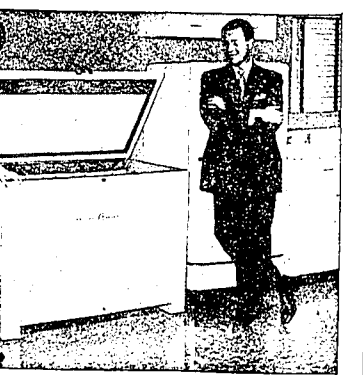

Scientists Say Insect Poison Injures Soils

NEW YORK, Dec. 15 (AP)—Poisoning of the ground by insecticides, DDT and other new wonder-bug-killers, was reported to the American Association of Economic Entomologists, it was announced today.

This poisoning is bad for many plants, good for a few, and of no known human risk.

The discovery does not stop the use of the new insecticides, but opens a new science for farmers and gardeners to "call their shots" by knowing the right insecticide for the right environment.

The report was made by Dr. Frank P. O'Brien, assistant chief, bureau of plant industry, soils and agricultural engineering, Washington, D. C. The other three report writers are B.H.C. Chlorine and Toxaphene.

The government has been studying for four years what becomes of the poisons when they are sprayed to protect crops. They sink into the ground. And they stay there. Even after four years in the ground they are harmful to some plants.

Dr. Cullman said that in spraying, anywhere from six to eighty pounds of insecticide is used per acre. Most of that sinks into the ground.

Then what may happen is surprising. In one kind of soil the stuff is harmless. In another it retards plants and interferes with their growth. It will harm one plant in the same soil where another kind of plant is untouched.

The stuff acts like a hormone to make a few plants grow better. It kills some seeds in the ground, but improves others by killing the fungi that eat them.

Dr. Cullman said these insecticides are raised, selected, bred, and tested. They are used on vegetables and field crops, and reduced expenses of production. Their use will continue, but the government is looking for the safe limits and antidotes.

Churches Resuming Drives for Charity; 'Umpire' Is Appointed

NEW YORK—After a wartime slowdown, the churches have stepped back into the arena as distributors of relief money. The Rev. Paul Reed, secretary of the National Information Bureau, is the "umpire" in this new drive.

Reed checks constantly on national fund-raising campaigns and reports on them to the bureau's members, who include many of the big philanthropists and 1,000 community chests throughout the country.

During the war, he says, hundreds of successful appeals were made by churches, but they were mostly for relief of Europe. Now, he says, with wartime restrictions ended, the churches are stepping up their missionary activities and through their relief agencies and missions they are playing a bigger role in relief work abroad.

Despite the increase in church giving, however, Reed says there is an ever-present danger of racketeers trying to cash in on philanthropy.

Recently the post office department stamped out on a man who had established a "church" and in three months, he had raised his bank account by more than \$200,000. The sum was raised from unsuspecting donors who thought they were helping to build a new building.

Reed studies about 700 big nationwide charities a year. He tries to get the best out of them. He checks and denies the bureau's accreditation to agencies which fail to meet requirements like having a board of directors working without pay, having their books independently audited, or performing services which do not duplicate those of others in the field. Since many of the nation's big contributors follow the bureau's findings, he says, they are likely to win an approving report.

An overseer of charity, Reed says, must be a competent manager. He checks the average American's contributions moving in productive channels.

Uniformed givers, he says, may reduce their gifts by supporting agencies which raise too much money on fund-raising or in overhead.

DDT-Immune Flies Bred by Using Poison

NEW YORK, Dec. 15 (AP)—A new breed of house flies is beginning to appear in America—and the flies were produced by DDT, the great fly-killer.

This new finding in the use of DDT was reported to the American Association of Economic Entomologists by W. V. King and J. B. Gahan, of the United States bureau of entomology and plant quarantine.

These new flies have developed resistance to the killing power of DDT, despite the fact that it is the most potent insect killer ever known. This resistance was not unexpected.

Fallings Reported

In the summer of 1947, the entomologist said, there were reports of DDT falling a little. This year the reports got more numerous and more serious.

The bureau attached house flies from numerous parts of the United States and tried killing them with various concentrations of DDT.

The flies from those places where DDT had been used in previous years were often harder to kill than the flies whose ancestors had never walked in the stuff.

Laboratory's Are Toughened

The flies that figuratively laughed at DDT came from the bureau's laboratory at Orlando, Fla., where they had been specially raised to see whether they would get used to the stuff. It's easy to do just give enough to kill most of the flies. Save those that are left. They survive because they were harder to kill in the first place. They need this toughness on to their offspring, and presently you have a new breed, and need a new poison.

King and Gahan said the government scientists are working with three new fly poisons now.

Bear River Meet Picks Committee To Study Issues

PRESTON, Dec. 15 (AP)—The Bear river commission meeting broke up Tuesday with the appointment of five committees to study further engineering and legal matters affecting the river and its tributaries.

Indian Congress Head Favors End Of Tribal Service

DENVER, Dec. 15 (AP)—Judge B. Johnson, president of the National Congress of American Indians, said that he favors "liquidation" of the U. S. Indian service. It was announced here.

Johnson told a meeting of the congress.

"We believe that the time is here for establishment of a planned program for the progressive liquidation of the United States Indian service," he said.

"We, the leaders of the Indian congress, believe that in some areas a program of cooperation between the states and the federal government can and should be established."

Johnson, from Claremore, Okla., said further that the congress advocates accumulation of the Indians into the general citizenship "wherever such a course is feasible."

The current meeting of the congress, which will run through Thursday, is attended by representatives of 50 tribes from 27 states.

Landowners Okay Increase in Loan

LEWISTON, Dec. 15 (AP)—Lewiston, Orchard resident landowners overwhelmingly approved a supplemental contract with the bureau of reclamation to complete the Orchard irrigation project. The vote was 529 for and 82 against, Walter Hereth, irrigation district manager, said today.

The supplemental contract provides for an additional \$210,000 loan, necessary for completion of irrigation project construction. Total of the new contract will be \$2,500,000 compared with \$1,900,000 in the original contract.

Total vote was light because of unfavorable weather, Hereth said. More than 600 persons voted when the original contract was approved in August, 1947.

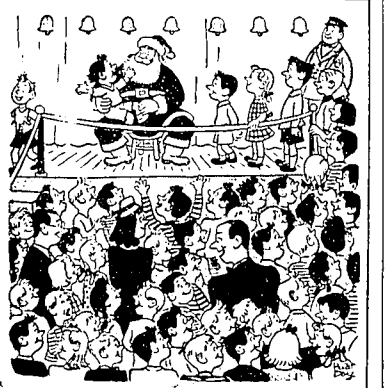
A total of 600 leathernecks are coming "with the knowledge and consent of Chinese authorities," said Cabot.

U. N. Talk Not 'Cheap,' Paris Paper Learns

The wag who fathered the expression "talk is cheap" hadn't seen the assembly of the United Nations in action.

The Paris newspaper France Soir figures that the oratory spilled in the assembly meeting just concluded totals 10,000,000 words. Since the expense of the session was 1,700,000,000 francs, the newspaper draws the conclusion that each word cost 170 francs, which is 53 cents U. S. A.

I wish France Soir hadn't worked that out. Such a shocking cost per word leaves your correspondents practically speechless, for through his veins runs a heavy strain of Scots blood. And we Highlanders are frugal.

Bare Bargain

Of course there are exceptional circumstances which warrant such expenditure. For example, Soviet Delegate Andrei Y. Vishinski must feel that he has secured a rare bargain when he can divest himself of such language as this:

"The cause of the second world war is not so much Hitler, but the leaders of France and Britain, supported by the U. S. A."

When you can hand former allies such an insult as that at the rate of 53 cents a word, it's dirt-cheap. As a matter of fact, Russia's share of the cost for words like that is relatively low. Uncle Sam (the old rounder) has been putting up 10.8 per cent of the cost of running the U. N., so that Moscow can well afford to call him high-priced names.

Costly Peace

A journalistic friend of mine, having noted the estimate by France Soir, inquired: "Interesting item. I wonder if it isn't costing as much today to try to keep the peace as it did to wage war?"

Well, that's a sort of academic speculation calculated to stimulate thought rather than to draw conclusive answer. However, the total cost of keeping the peace is colossal. Quite apart from the United Nations just think of the billions of dollars being sunk in protective economic rehabilitation.

Despite all this expenditure, we must arrive at the conclusion that honorable peace at any price is cheaper than war. But there are ways of cutting down the cost of peace.

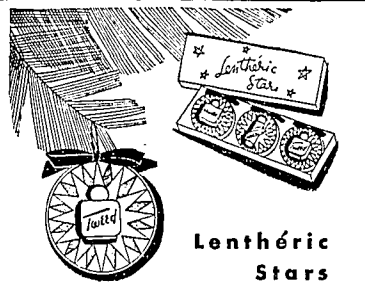

Power Lack May Hamper West Growth

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 15 (AP)—Far western industrial growth may be retarded by power shortages in some areas until 1954.

The San Francisco Federal reserve bank announced that conclusion after a study of the power and fuel outlook in the 12th federal reserve district. Its monthly review for November devoted the first of a series of articles to electric power.

The problem is probably more critical in the Pacific northwest, the article said, than in any comparable area in the seven states of the circuit.

Fast Development Blamed

The situation there is primarily the outgrowth of the rapid development of the electro-metallurgical industry coupled with the prospective demand for power to meet irrigation pumping in the Columbia basin.

Plans for the establishment of new factories in the lower Columbia river basin, the article said, have had to be dropped or indefinitely postponed because the available supply of firm electric power in that region is barely sufficient for the needs of already existing plants.

Agencies Agree

"Both the Bonneville power administration and the public and private utility managers agree that it is probably appropriate to power projects in the Pacific northwest are completed as rapidly as is physically possible, the increasing capacity of the region will not catch up with expected power requirements until at least 1954."

Although the 12th district's power output more than doubled between 1939 and 1944, the peak demand in that year had increased to 102 per cent of plant capacity. Dozens of areas were listed as central deficit areas in northern California, southern Oregon, Puget sound and eastern Oregon.

Soviets Denounce Indiana Scientist On Genetic View

MOSCOW, Dec. 15 (AP)—The Soviet academy of sciences denounced Dr. Herman J. Muller of Indiana University and his views on genetics. It has been announced here.

Muller, 1948 Nobel prize winner in medicine, announced his connection with the academy last September and attacked the academy for supporting the theory of T. D. Lysenko that acquired characteristics can be transmitted from one generation to another by inheritance. Muller was senior geneticist at the Institute of Genealogy and Systematics from 1929 to 1937.

The academy statement said "his former member betrayed the interests of real science and openly passed over into the camp of the enemies of progress in science."

Muller was an accused member of the academy of misleading the position to destroy science for narrow political purposes.

Aide to Manager Of Oregon Liquor Store, Cash Gone

PORTLAND, Dec. 15 (AP)—The Oregon liquor control commission yesterday reported the disappearance of an assistant liquor store manager and \$7,817.

Gene Lee Eugene Hutches, 42, who worked at one of the commission's downtown stores here, was missing Monday. His disappearance was noted at a bank today when a bag supposed to contain \$7,817 in receipts was opened. Instead of currency, strips of newspaper were inside.

William Hately, enforcement chief of the liquor commission, said Hutches' wife died of an overdose of sedatives Nov. 25 after leaving a note, telling her husband she could stand it no longer.

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U. N. Conservation Conference Will Peer Into Earth's Future

There's a lot of fascinating reading in this general subject. Dr. Warren S. Thompson of the Scripps Foundation for Research on Population has just written a new book, "Plenty of People." It goes into all phases of world population trends since 1800. Mr. Thompson looks ahead to a U. S. population of 165,000,000 in 1975. He is a geographer. He makes other studies for other countries.

When the scientists go into their fields next summer, they will break down their subject into half a dozen fields, each of which will be a forum for experts.

One will be on forest protection and management. Another will be on water control, irrigation, power and land development. A third will cover land resources—soil conservation, increasing productivity, and the use of land. A fourth will go into wildlife and world fish resources. A fifth will consider fuels and a sixth mineral resources.

The idea for this coming conference is to be first suggested by Gifford Pinchot, a President Theodore Roosevelt. He called a world conference, President Franklin D. Roosevelt called it off.

In 1946, President Truman was induced to call such a conference through Ambassador John Winant, then U. S. representative to ECOSOC.

A planning commission consisting of seven Americans, and one representative of Sweden, France, Poland, Venezuela, Chile, Lebanon and Great Britain have been working on the program for two years. Its chairman is Prof. Carter Goodrich of Columbia university.

U. S. government planning has been done by an inter-departmental committee whose active head is Arthur F. Goldschmidt, special assistant to Interior Secretary J. A. Krug. Goldschmidt is slated to become executive secretary of the conference for the United Nations.

Mishaps Cost Farms Many Labor Hours

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (AP)—Accidents cost the nation's farmers a loss of some 6,000,000 man days of work during the first four months of 1948, the agriculture department reports.

The department's estimates are based on a survey of 12,000 farmers in 871 counties, selected as representative of the entire United States.

It is figured that U. S. farmers and their hired help had about 270,000 accidents in the four-month period, with the average time lost per accident estimated at 23 days.

The estimates, the department said, make "no allowance for time lost by persons fatally injured, or permanently and totally disabled."

Twice as many farm people were hurt to fall as in any other type of accident.

The second most common accidents to farmers were those involving animals.

Three in the last were accidents involving motor vehicles.

Farm machines stood fourth as an accident cause, accounting for some 10 per cent of the grand total.

Private Doctors Cooperating For Vets' Treatment

The veterans administration provided 14,770 out-patient medical treatments for 4840 disabled Idaho veterans during the last fiscal year ending June 30, 1948, Leon Prida, Boise regional VA manager, said Wednesday.

Private Idaho physicians cooperating in the VA's "home long" medical program gave 12,008 of these treatments to 3,249 veterans, Prida said. Cost of the fee basis program was \$47,170—an average of \$14.52 per veteran of \$3.90 per treatment.

During the same period, some 1,591 veterans received 2,708 treatments in the VA's "home long" clinics. No case estimates were made for treatments performed by VA staff doctors.

Prida pointed out that VA out-patient medical care is available only to veterans who require treatment for disabilities incurred in war service.

Charges of 'Waste' Levelled at Atomic Project by Solon

LOS ALAMOS, N. M., Dec. 15 (AP)—Rep. Melvin C. Snyder, R. W. Va., declared "there has been waste and extravagance" at the Los Alamos atomic weapons project, but conditions are improving.

In an interview after two days of testimony before his house executive

expenditures subcommittee, Snyder commented:

"The atomic energy commission has made definite improvements in the management... the deficiencies could have been ascertained and corrected quicker."

Similar comments came from the two other committee members, Reps. Chenoweth, R. Colo., and Mansano, D. Ark. They were received at Albuquerque where they boarded a plane for Washington.

Mansano expressed the opinion the project already was operating more efficiently now under the atomic energy commission than during its early days under the army.
