Trade Debate Hush up Told In 'Spy Data'

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (UP)—The famous "spy papers" disclosed today that state department officials sought to hush up 1938 trade talks with the Nazis.

The documents, allegedly stolen from the state department files 10 years ago by a red espionage ring, show that:

- 1. The state's interest centered on two main fields of American foreign policy—China and the Nazis.
- 2. The state department got a tipoff on Hitler's plan for conquest of Czechoslovakia six months before the Nazis moved into that country.

State officials as early as 1938 thought that war between the United States and Japan was likely, and that the state department should be prepared for it.

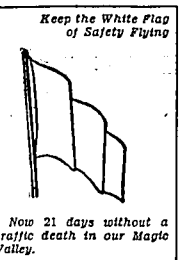

Blind Landing Is Eased With New Pilot Aid

GREAT NECK, N. Y., Dec. 16—A new aeronautical "electronic brain" that does much of the thinking for airplane pilots in making a blind landing during fog or overcast was reported today.

The new device, which has been tested by pilots in flight, is expected to make instrument landings easier and safer.

The instrument combines information from conventional flight instruments and calculates for the pilot what path he must fly in order to get on and stay on a desired compass heading or radio track.

"Zero Reader"

The "brain" known as a zero reader, presents the collected information on a simple two-element indicator which tells the pilot how much to bank and turn his plane in order to fly the calculated path without overshooting the runway.

Spokesmen for the Sperry Gyroscope company, where the instrument was developed, said it was designed primarily to make manual landings on the so-called ILS (instrument landing system). In such a technique radio beams are sent up from an airport and form an "altitude path" on which the airplane follows down through the overcast.

Correct errors

Even with the ILS, the pilot is under strain and must correct errors as he brings his plane down. The zero reader, according to Sperry, corrects those errors for the pilot and reduces the strain and fatigue of blind flying.

Regulations now prohibit contact landings on airports when the ceiling is less than 600 feet. Ports equipped with ILS have minimum ceilings of 300 feet. The new "electronic brain" may eventually bring that ceiling down to zero—truly a blind landing.

If Paint Makes Indians Wild, Look at Women, Speaker Says

Charles Eagle Plume, of the Blackfoot Indian tribe, presented the third in the series of Town Hall programs at the high school auditorium Wednesday night.

Eagle Plume demonstrated the songs and dances of his people and explained the symbolism of his attire. Indians always use feathers of one-year-old golden eagles, he said. Necklaces are made of grizzly bear claws and breast plates of deer bones.

"Most people have the idea that Indians look wild when they put on their paint," he said. "If that is the case there are a lot of wild women in Twin Falls."

Many tribes did weaving in the early days, he said. Most of the Indians lacked the materials for weaving.

"You white men taught the savages to wear clothes," he added, "and now you are taking them off yourselves."

Eagle Plume did a dance which was used by the most primitive Indians and sang an Indian song. "I can appreciate the fact that Indian songs sound strange to you," he said. "But how do you suppose I felt the first time I heard 'Malrazy Dosty'?"

The white man has gone a long way in civilization, Eagle Plume said. "But I wonder if he went the right way."

In explaining the religion of the Indians, he said that God was not thought of as an individual but as a mystery, "that which cannot be explained." Indians do not make requests in prayers but only offer expressions of gratitude, he said. He demonstrated the sign language which is understood by all

Walkout Reduces Output of Copper

Beet Grower Unit Asks Agency for Beet Cost Survey

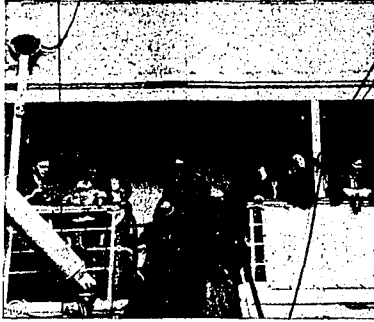

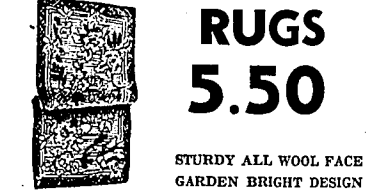

One of the requirements for the honor roll is that herds must average more than 30 pounds of butterfat per cow for the month. Frank Nebeker's herd, including 21 milking cows and one dry cow, averaged 1,022 pounds of milk and 374 pounds of butterfat. Russell Thomas' herd, with 19 cows milking and one dry, averaged 974 pounds of milk and 346 pounds of butterfat. Lincoln County Agent George Cook pointed out that farmers be sure to get the Gooding, Lincoln, Jerome Cow Testing associations know exactly what their cows are producing, how much they cost and their exact income every month.

6 Are Rescued By Airplane's Glider Pickup

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Dec. 16—(AP)—A glider pickup rescue mission off the coast of Alaska today rescued six stranded transport plane. The pickup was made from the frozen crust of a river where the C-47 belly-landed in 20-below-zero weather after its radio receiver failed and the plane drifted off course. The plane was returning to Ladd field here from the Barrow area on the northern rim of Yukon territory. Listed as aboard the crash-landed plane were Capt. Charles E. Daly, Torrance, Calif.; the pilot, Lieut. Martin O. Goodyear, New Albany, Ind.; co-pilot, Lieut. Edward Whelan, Fall River, Mass.; navigator, Sgt. Weldon G. Johnson, Glendale, Tex.; engineer, Pfc. Richard D. Leppia, Lima, O., assistant engineer, and Lieut.-Commander Norman W. McLeod, Clarkston, Wash., a passenger. Lieut.-Col. Eugene Strouse, pilot of the C-54 which dropped the glider, picked up the rescue glider and the plane was extremely hazardous because of the curvature of the river. The glider and terrain which afforded less than a 600-yard straightaway run at 10 feet altitude. The plane was down 15 miles upstream from the Yukon territory military camp of McQuesten. After the rescue, the glider was towed to Northway, where the rescued fliers were put aboard the C-54 for the rest of the flight to Ladd field.

Suit for Damages Entered at Boise

BOISE, Dec. 16 (AP)—A \$150,000 damage suit was filed in federal district court yesterday against John Bradley and the Bradley Mining company by Dr. Edward H. Baker, physician at the company's scientific plant. Dr. Baker, in his complaint, charged that Bradley and two employees held him for two days in his Suburbia apartment and employed armed guards to impound and to restrain him from leaving the apartment and prevented him from attending to either personal matters or to his duties to his many patients. The physician also charged that Bradley and the two employees made statements about him that were untrue and which were "uttered with malice, maliciously and unlawfully and with intent and design to injure, disgrace and defame him and to bring him into discredit, personally, professionally, socially and financially."

Truman Visitors Steadily Increase

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (AP)—President Truman is receiving more visitors these days than at any time since he entered the White House. Presidential Secretary Charles G. Ross told newsmen that yesterday, observing "I have never known the calling list to be so heavy." Ross gave these reasons for the increase: 1. A backlog of requests for appointments piled up while Mr. Truman was away from Washington during the campaign. 2. Events of the election brought on a rush of planning as a new administration prepared to get underway.

Copper Output Is 2 Per Cent Below September Rate

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (AP)—Production of copper in October totaled 62,212 tons, a two per cent decline from September output, the bureau of mines said. The bureau said a strike of locomotive engineers which began Oct. 24 at the Kennecott Copper Corporation's Brigham Canyon, Utah, pit cut production of the nation's leading copper producing mine. It said the strike reduced Utah's output 21 per cent for the month and "promised, unless quickly settled, a drop of approximately 20,000 tons a month in the nation's already inadequate supply of copper." The bureau said increases of 14 per cent in Arizona and two per cent in Montana were offset in part by decreases of 19, 10 and 4 per cent in Michigan, New Mexico and Nevada. October copper production by states: Arizona, 32,200 tons; Utah, 18,210; Montana, 4,850; New Mexico, 5,200; Nevada, 3,331; Washington, 1,900; Colorado, 236; Idaho, 120; California, 95; Michigan, 2,117; other states east of the Mississippi, 1,177; Missouri, 235.

Sailed Monarch Exys Communism Not for Nation

NEW YORK, Dec. 16 (AP)—A student, 25-year-old man mounted a lecture platform Wednesday to address New York's Town Hall. He discussed a subject close to his heart—his native country, Yugoslavia. "Our civilization," he said, "can have nothing in common with Marxism-Stalinism." Of 15,000,000 Yugoslavs less than 300,000 are Communists, he said, and these are divided in their loyalty to Marshal Tito. He spoke slowly and calmly. His audience, composed largely of four-coated women, came early and argued for seats. When the 1,500 seats of town hall were filled, chairs were set on the stage and quickly taken. How could a young man in such a large audience? For one thing—his name, King Peter, exiled monarch of Yugoslavia. For another—the report it was the first time a ranking member of European royalty has given a public lecture in this country.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (AP)—President Truman is reported to be keenly interested in a program calling for construction of 1,000,000 public housing units during the next four years, it was reported today. The program was outlined to him by a delegation representing the national public housing conference. The first well-advertised, organized rodeo—a cowboy contest of skill—was held in Denver in 1894.

What, Why of Prices Index Is Explained

WASHINGTON (AP)—When you see that the "consumer price index" (formerly called "cost of living index") has gone up again, what does it mean?

Who figures it out? How does he do it? Actually it takes many specialists to turn out the index, and here's how it's done each month by the U. S. bureau of labor statistics:

The current index is based on a study the bureau made of 14,500 families in 1934-36. They were all moderate-income families living in large cities. The study showed how they spent their money, and just what kinds and amounts (dozens, pound yards) they bought of everything.

Further, the bureau found the quality of goods the average bought, and the prices on very specific items. Take men's shirts. Here's the type that prices are based on: "Business, broadcloth, nationally advertised, collar attached, cotton or 'blend' cloth, white, pre-shrunk, full cut" and so on.

Checked Each Month All 500 items are checked for price the middle of each month. They are checked in stores where moderate-income families buy their goods. The prices are checked by 30 full-time field agents, selected under civil service and given a four-week training course. There are also 125 part-time people who check July food prices. For food alone, 50 items are checked.

Checking on all 500 items is done in 24 large cities, three or other cities are checked for food alone. During the war 75 cities were checked, which got the bureau into annual reports, but its work has been cut back in recent years. The 34 cities include 60 per cent of the people living in large cities.

Best Data Yearly Rent information is collected directly by agents who visit homes once a year. They get reports by mail the other three quarters of the year. Then they make another visit.

A few prices, which change only occasionally, are reported entirely by mail—such as street car fares and utility bills.

The bureau also keeps a constant check on consumer changes in buying habits. For example, in recent years the bulk of buying shifted from stores to nylon hose. Back in the 30s the bureau had included lamp chimneys. That's changed to electric light bulbs.

All those price figures have to be changed into percentages so you can get a quick idea of what's happening to your cost of living.

1935-39 Is Base Point The statistics take 1935-39 prices representing 100. Prices rose slowly during the years when price controls were on, so that by June, 1946, the index of all items stood at 133.3.

When price control came off, the index climbed rapidly to 152.2 during the second half of 1946. By December 1947 it stood at 167. By April of this year it was 169.3, and by September it was 174.5, but it was down to 173.8 in October.

That's the index figure for the rise in prices for all 500 items. The bureau also gets out index figures for the following special classes of goods: Foods, clothing, rent, fuel and electricity, house furnishings and miscellaneous.

G. F. Woman on Hunger Strike in Mtn. Home's Jail

MOUNTAIN HOME, Dec. 16 (AP)—Mrs. Mark White, 62-year-old Glenn Ferry woman, has gone on a hunger strike in the Elmore county jail here where she awaits trial on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon.

The Elmore county sheriff's office reported this morning that Mrs. White was going into her fourth foodless day.

Probate Judge A. F. Anderson bound Mrs. White over to district court Monday after a preliminary hearing. Her bond was set at \$500. Sheriff Art Stevens said he has been unsuccessful in his efforts to talk Mrs. White into breaking her hunger strike.

The charge against her was brought by Ernest Pasberg, Glenn Ferry, who said Mrs. White shot at him with a rifle. However, he said the bullet missed him and killed his dog which was with him. Mrs. White said Pasberg was trespassing on her property at the time.

Wallace's Son Follows Dad's Farming Trail

DES MOINES, Ia. (AP)—Henry A. Wallace's oldest son is following in his father's farming footsteps. The former secretary of agriculture and vice president was a pioneer in the experimental development of hybrid corn.

His son, Henry B. Wallace, is doing the same thing with chickens. As a young man on a farm 80 miles west of here, and as a student at Iowa State College of Agriculture, Henry A. Wallace spent his early years developing better strains of seed corn. He formed a commercial company specializing in hybrid corn, which has revolutionized the corn belt in the last 10 years.

Tinkering With Chickens Henry Browne Wallace, now 32, was tinkering with chickens while his father worked with corn. The younger Wallace has formed a company which markets the hybrid chickens developed by the same process that his father used to produce better corn.

The breeding pens of the Hy-Line chicken farms owned by Henry B. Wallace at nearby Dalar Center has hatched more than 8,000,000 chickens in 1948.

Production Is Better Hybrid corn has increased yield averages at rates as high as 15 per cent. Wallace claims his hybrid chickens have an average egg production of from two to six dozen eggs more per hen than standard-bred chickens.

The process of hybrid corn breeding starts with in-breeding, whereby a strain of corn reproduces itself year after year so that its breeding factors will become exclusive. The in-bred strains are then crossed with another, resulting in a hybrid corn which has larger ears, higher yield, and other desirable qualities.

More Difficult The same process is followed with chickens, except that the in-breeding process is more difficult. Wallace estimates that "many years, several hundred thousand dollars and trained geneticists are necessary to develop a hybrid bird that can be relied on to lay well."

He believes it takes three times as long to develop the same degree of "breeding purity" in chickens as in corn.

'Own Assessors' Pay More Taxes

LINCOLN, Neb., (AP)—Nebraska taxpayers are more honest when they operate under their own steam than when the government helps them evaluate their property.

This is the conclusion of State Tax Commissioner Philip K. Johnson after a study of tax returns under both systems.

Time was when each precinct had an assistant assessor, who helped taxpayers assess their property. Under this system, Nebraska lost \$1,265,292 in property listed on tax rolls from 1927 to 1936.

This year, under a new law, many Nebraskans worked out their own assessments. The change brought \$203,202,011 back to the tax rolls.

State's Solons to Combine Forces

BOISE, Dec. 16 (AP)—Idaho congressmen will "team up" for Idaho on reclamation and other Idaho problems," they announced.

Rep. John Banhorn, R., Ida., and Democratic Congressman Select Compton I. White conferred yesterday and announced a plan to cooperate on issues vitally affecting the Gem state.

White commented that the "Idaho delegation always has cooperated." He said he would be opposed to any bill "which would disturb the farmers' water rights." White also commented that passage of a Columbia valley authority bill by the 81st congress was "remote."

Trees Are Given In Erosion Battle

BAKERSFIELD, Calif., (AP)—Swift winds sweeping unchecked over the open plains of the southern San Joaquin valley threaten the area's multi-million dollar farm production, warns the Kern County Chamber of Commerce.

Local farmers must fight the wind and duststorms with windbreaks of eucalyptus, lamarack or buckwheat trees, the organization says. The University of California's agricultural extension service offers seeds and young trees to anybody who will plant them.

In addition, experts advise special farming techniques such as "strip planting"—spacing long rows of wind-resistant, protective crops at intervals in vulnerable fields—and cover cropping to hold the loose earth down. The dust problem has been intensified in recent years by unusually dry weather and the plowing of much new land.

Wind-erosion districts are being organized by farmers throughout the threatened valley areas.

Illinois' Officials 'Sign and Sign'

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., (AP)—It took 1,240,000 swipes of the pen by Illinois state officials to get the cash to pay 800,000 veterans World War II bonus totaling \$385,000,000.

The state raised the cash so make the payments by floating \$385,000,000 in bonds. The bonds were in \$1,000 denominations.

Bonus payments were started in July, 1947. Permanent bonds could not be printed in time. So the state treasurer, Richard Rowe, and Secretary of State Edward Barrett each signed 385,000 temporary bonds.

The permanent bonds were ready this fall. Barrett and Rowe sat down and signed them all—385,000 of them.

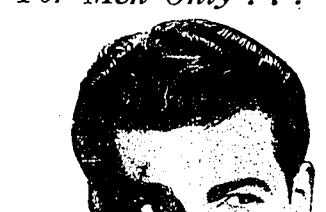

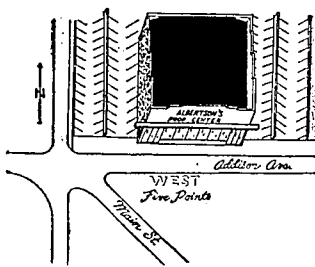

Trick Needed Now to Save Chiang Reign

AP Foreign Affairs Analyst

The situation of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's nationalist armies in face of the Chinese communist offensive is so critical that he will have to perform the trick if he occupies surrender or a negotiated peace.

It is a moment of grave concern for all nations engaged in combating the bolshevist world drive. Figure it any way you will and the vast country of China, housing close to a quarter of all humanity, still remains an important part of the global defense against the red aggression.

Australia Concerned

Australia is taking grave note of this threat to her own security. The Sydney Daily Telegraph sums up the position like this:

"Hitherto we have planned our defense along lines which connect up with Britain, our navy and air force operations east of Suez. We now have to put far more emphasis on our collaboration with American forces in our area, and should have them. We are essential to them, and they are equally essential to ours. We have to admit the possibility that our reliance on strong bases on the mainland of America's defenses in Japan may fail, that would put Australia in the front line again."

Banking Plans

The Australian government is making plans to cope with specie and debentures in wartime.

Naturally the United States hasn't overlooked any of the facts of this crisis in considering what, if anything, can be done to save China from the bolshevist. However, Washington reads the signs as indicating that we must be prepared to repulse off China as an almost certain loss.

This doesn't mean that America won't give further aid, it does mean, as I understand it, that Uncle Sam regards it as wholly unwise to try to put the national government on its feet at this late date with a colossal expenditure of our resources.

New Simplot Building Here to Be Ready for Use by Dec. 21

The new buildings of the Simplot Soil Builders of Twin Falls, Inc., owned by Mr. and Mrs. Jack Simplot, will be ready for occupation by Dec. 21, according to Joe McCollum, manager.

Located at 700 Shoshone street west, the main building is 60 feet by 80 feet and is constructed with modified steel. It will house a small mixing plant and also will be used for storage.

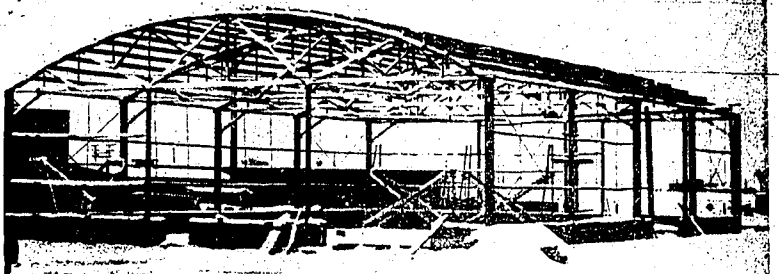
The main store building will not be completed for several years, McCollum said.

The company will be able to supply fertilizers and insecticides to dealers and farmers of 10 southern Idaho counties and Nevada. A complete line of fertilizers will be distributed, and a mixing and blending plant will be in conjunction with distribution, McCollum added.

In addition to the warehouse and mixing plant building, a bulk unloader has been constructed to unload material mechanically from the bottom of a freight car.

The material will then be taken through an elevator into a storage bin where it will be weighed and loaded automatically. The bulk unloader is a new labor-saving device which was designed especially for the new building.

It is expected that within a few years Twin Falls will be the center from which fertilizers will be supplied to other Simplot companies, McCollum said.

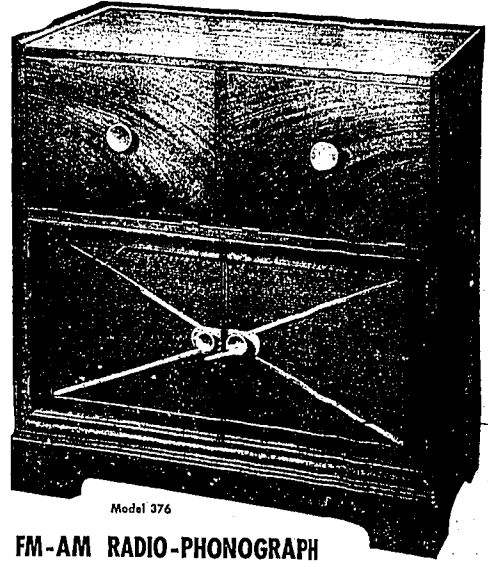

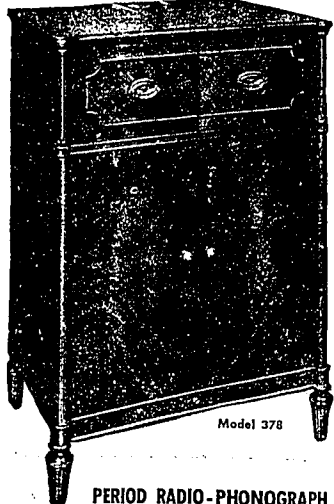

30-Hour Week Is Sighted for "Near Future"

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 15.—A 30-hour week and factories that look like country clubs are not too far in the future, delegates to the Industrial Hygiene foundation's 13th annual meeting here predicted.

The 500 representatives of industry who met at Mellon institute also forecast custom-built machines to fit the capabilities of the new generation of workers and a knifeless surgery technique also was predicted.

Dr. Theodore G. Klumpp, president of Westinghouse Electric Co., New York, used census figures to back up his argument that the 30-hour week is definitely on the way.

Age-Related Risks

Because medicine has solved many formerly fatal diseases, two-fifths of the United States population in the next generation will be more than 65 years of age, he said.

He warned that by 1950, industry will have more workers than it can handle. "By that time," Klumpp said, "there will be 60,000,000 persons over 65 years of age."

Klumpp said the logical solution is to cut the work week to make room for more workers over 65 who can still put in a good day's work. He pointed out that a study showed that nearly one-third of 400 top business executives are over 65, and one-half of United States senators and members of Congress are over 60.

"Clearing out the older workers to make room for younger ones by arbitrary retirements is only another way of saying there are more workers than jobs," he said.

Changes Advocated

Labor-saving devices probably will result in the worker surplus even more, Klumpp said. And if present-day working standards and conditions are maintained there will be a potential labor surplus of at least 30,000,000 by 1960, he predicted.

The "make the job and machine fit the man" idea was backed by Mrs. Lillian M. Gilbreth, president of a Mendocino, N. C., consulting engineering company. She urged a war against outdated "machine age" equipment.

Airlift Pilots Are Weary, but Chiefs Thankful for Training

By ROBERT MUEHL

BERLIN, Dec. 15.—The men who fly the airlift to Berlin are weary from the constant grind—but the men who direct it privately say it is an incredible complexity, a chance to perfect a new weapon.

"That weapon is the airlift itself," said an Air Force official who represents one of the few times that any nation has been able to develop fully its capabilities in a major war asset.

Here and at the American and British airports in western Germany you see this great aerial supply effort falling into a pattern that might one day win a military campaign.

The airlift is feeding and supplying 250,000 persons in the western sector of Berlin. Why could not a similar operation maintain an entire city?

A high official told me about it at Berlin-Main airport outside Frankfurt. As I watched the big C-54s taking off at frequent intervals for Berlin with their 10 tons each of food and coal and medicine and other supplies.

"This thing was pretty much like the war effort," he said. "That's what it was. We had the know-how, but we weren't quite certain how to apply it. Now we know, and we're able to learn on our own terms to establish, maintain and protect such elaborate lines of air communication and supply as this airlift involves."

"Berlin surely didn't plan it this way—but if war ever comes it may turn out that he did us a favor by blockading Berlin."

Some things the air force has learned are apparent immediately as you fly in the airlift and watch it work at both ends of the line and in the air.

Boosts Urged For Teaching By Extension

LINCOLN, Neb., Dec. 15.—Correspondence education is "big business, but schools are missing the boat in developing this kind of learning," according to Dr. Walter H. Gaumnitz.

Gaumnitz, of the U. S. office of education at Washington, addressed the second international conference on correspondence education, held at the University of Nebraska campus.

\$50,000,000 Is Spent

Almost 1,500,000 American spend more than \$50,000,000 annually attending school by mail, he said, falling generally into five categories:

1. Children in small schools which cannot afford to offer vocational work or college preparation.
2. Adults who dropped out of high school and now want their diplomas.
3. Middle-aged men and women who want college education.
4. Adults who want to improve their general education by devoting their increasing leisure time to study.
5. Industries which provide additional technical training for young men with supervisory ability.

Grammar Can Be Forgotten,

 WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (AP)—When a man switches from beach combing to public speaking he can forget a lot of what teachers taught him about grammar.

That's quoting Stuart J. Barnes, editor of "Speak" magazine, who used to be a high school boy himself. Now he makes a nice living writing and giving the speeches for launchers of ships, inaugurations of mayors, councilmen, after dinner speakers—and even congressmen.

Harmar Nichols Barnes, who taught himself how to write speeches, does all of his shooting in the tiny basement of his home here; generally sitting in comfort in his carpet slippers and wearing an old brown sweater.

He charges upward of \$5 for a five-minute speech, depending on the amount of research. Fiftybustlers \$10 a yard. He has crowded into the little book-lined cellar one of the most complete files on general topics in the country. He rarely has to go to the library of congress for help on research.

"A real fear most beginning public speakers have is that they will make mistakes in English," he said. "After they have gained poise and confidence, this fear divides to its proper inattentiveness. Then they begin to adopt the attitude of Henry Kisselbacher: 'When the English language gets in my way, it doesn't stand a chance.'"

Barnes claims there is nothing wrong with an "ain't" now and then. And on occasion he'll spot you the alibi and best you to the nearest split infinitive or gumped up metaphor—"So long as it's plain talk."

"The trend today," he said, "is away from stiff, well-balanced ponderous sentences to abrupt and concise ones. Pithy, country style."

Parents, Not Tots, Worry About Santa

EVANSTON, Ill., Dec. 16—(AP)—Some parents worry more about Santa Claus than their children do, a psychologist said today.

Prof. Thomas W. Richards, specialist in child psychology at Northwestern University, said children take the Santa Claus myth in stride. But parents often worry uselessly about whether to keep the legend alive while trying to teach little Johnny to face reality, he said.

Nothing Wrong

"There is nothing about the St. Nick legend to warp atomic age youngsters," Richards said. "Nor is there any record of a child suffering psychological repercussions when he learns there is no Santa Claus."

Richards said youngsters make a "wholesome adjustment" to the myth, accepting Santa as they go. "They learn the truth, he said, they shift readily to adult concepts."

Peppercorn Parents

But Santa sometimes perplexes parents, he said. Many adults feel they must work up a false enthusiasm for bushel-baker, red-suited impeller, and they worry for fear Junior will learn the truth after seeing a Santa on every street corner. But that never bothers the small fry, Richards said.

"They believe in him because they want to," he said.

China Exports To U. S. Top Import of Aid

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (AP)—Hard-pressed China shipped more goods to the United States in October than she got from this country. It was the second consecutive month the civil war-battered Chinese had done so.

Reporting this, the census bureau said U. S. shipments to China in October did increase \$1,500,000 over September to a \$9,500,000 total. But China's shipments here rose \$740,000 to a total of \$11,000,000.

U. S. shipments to China, although they included Marshall plan aid, were little more in October than one-third of the average for the first half of this year.

China's October shipments here, on the other hand, were about 20 per cent higher than the January-June average.

Meanwhile, exports from the Russian-dominated area of Europe to the U. S. dropped more sharply during October than did U. S. shipments to that area.

Officials said this appeared a normal seasonal development—a big drop in Russian fur shipments to the U. S.—rather than retaliation against U. S. restrictions on shipments to Russia.

U. S. export and import trade with the Marshall plan countries (including China with western Europe) scored another shipment-up in October. U. S. exports to those countries fell \$110,000 from September to a \$10,600,000 total. Receipts from those nations fell \$110,000 from September to a \$10,600,000 total.

Monastery Is Being Rebuilt For 4th Time

CASSINO, Italy (AP)—Stone by gray granite stone, the Utriclea monks atop Montecassino are rebuilding for the fourth time the most famous monastery in Christendom.

It was destroyed through what the monks insist was a "ghastly mistake" of American airmen in World War II.

"The excuse given for the bombing of our monastery was that the Germans were using it for an aerial observation post," explained the quiet monks. "There were no Germans at the monastery. The nearest German was a single soldier who lived in a cave down the hill from the southeast corner.

500 Innocents Killed

"But in the bombardment more than 500 innocent civilian refugees were killed. We dragged 370 bodies from the rubble of that corner alone." They pointed to a cleared area which had once been a convent but which now resembled a market place.

"If we had funds we could rebuild the monastery in eight or nine years," the monks said. "But now the work has almost stopped. We have no more funds. We work sporadically as we must. It may take 15 years or more. But" they shrug their patient shoulders, "it has been rebuilt three times before. We can do it again."

Leveled by Quake

The Lombards wrecked the monastery in 520, 51 years after St. Benedict founded it. In 672 the Saracens captured and sacked it. In 1243 an earthquake all but leveled it. On Feb. 15, 1914, American bombers wrecked it more completely than ever before.

1,000-Plane Attack

In mid-February the allies sent a thousand bombers against Cassino, and the monastery on the hilltop, in the greatest air raid ever launched against so small a target.

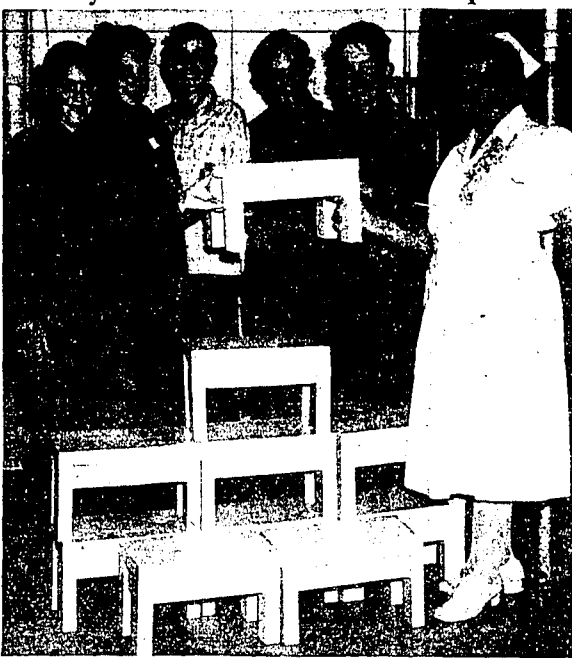

Hope Is Lost On Finding of Lidice's Tots

PRAGUE (AP)—Czech authorities have abandoned hope of finding 90 or more children from Lidice.

The revelation came in the dry legal language of the official gazette, announcing that action had been started to declare the missing children legally dead.

In June, 1942, more than 100 children were packed into buses at Lidice and taken to Kladno by the Gestapo. After they had left, the men of Lidice were shot, the women taken to concentration camps and the village was destroyed.

The Lidice children were traced to Lodz, where a group of racially suitable youngsters were separated and sent to German homes. Most of that group were found after the war, but despite three years of effort by Czech, Polish and other authorities, no trace of the more than 90 others has been found beyond the fact that they were removed from Lidice in July, 1942.

The current issue of the legal gazette confirmed that hope had been abandoned by printing seven announcements from the district court in Uniechov, county seat for the town of Lidice, asking for news of the missing persons.

Each said "the above-named was deported to Kladno on July 10, 1942,

and then to Lodz. From Lodz he was removed July 2, 1942, to an unknown destination, and it is probable that he was killed by the Germans."

One of the seven children named in this issue was Jaromir Zelenka, who was originally listed among the Lidice children believed to have been found after the war. Fourteen children returned to Lidice are believed to be correctly identified, but in at least five other cases the original identification turned out to be mistaken.

Snowbound on Trip

Aged Whisky Stays "Short" For Distillers

NEW YORK (AP)—Rounding out 15 years since repeal, the liquor industry today reports a serious shortage of fully matured stocks, a problem created by the restrictions on distilling imposed in World War II.

But it is the hope of the industry that careful use of the aged whiskeys available will make it possible to meet all demands until 1950, when the whiskeys barreled dated in 1942, upon resumption of full distilling operations, reach the "legal age" of four years.

Utah, on Dec. 5, 1933, ratified the 13th amendment to the constitution, ending prohibition and restoring to the federal government a source of taxes that in the intervening years has brought into the federal treasury approximately \$1,000,000,000.

Prohibition Costly

A report by Licensed Beverage Industries, Inc. pointed out that the 14-year span of prohibition cost the federal government \$35,000,000 for enforcement while at the same time wiping out more than \$4,000,000,000 in taxes that would have accrued otherwise.

Moreover, with repeal the American public apparently decided to cut down on drinking, the report said. Adm. F. E. M. Whiting (USN, Ret.), president of the LBI, told newspapermen that during prohibition "the

American people almost consistently drank more distilled spirits than they have since repeal.

Cites Proof

He cited as proof the estimate that in 1929, a prohibition year, consumption of illegally distilled spirits totaled 29,000,000 gallons, whereas only in 1946 has the legal industry produced as much as 200,000,000 gallons.

Resumed after a 1-year hiatus on Dec. 5, 1931, distilling operations in this country were "for the duration" early in October, 1927, and were resumed partially in August, 1942. But until December, 1946, when restrictions were lifted completely, only a moderate amount of whiskey was distilled.

It is that gap in production that now is confronting the industry with its shortage of matured stocks and for a while, liquor industry leaders believe, the situation will continue to grow worse.

ECA Unit Avers Supplies Sent No

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (AP)—The economic cooperation administration released a statement from its London representative expressing the belief that no scrap aluminum has been exported from Great Britain with the knowledge of the British government. It was reported today.

The statement by Thomas K. Finletter, chief of the ECA mission in London, was made public by acting ECA administrator Howard Bruco after a trans-Atlantic telephone conversation with Finletter.

Bruco told a new conference that Sir Stafford Cripps, British Chancellor of the Exchequer, had conferred with Finletter on the reported

sale of metals, bought with U.S. dollars for the European recovery program, to scrap dealers in the United States.

ECA said yesterday that Britain, Belgium and Holland have been asked to halt such sales of aluminum and lead. Because of such alleged diversions, metal and ore requests from those three countries have been trimmed, and Bruco said the allocations will be reduced "drastically" unless the situation is explained or brought under control.

Today Bruco had no explanation of the discrepancy between yesterday's statement and today's. He






